The election was held in the city hall with an unusually high turnout.

The following were elected to the board: O. O. Smith, Hollis Blackwell, Jack Reid, Howard Campbell and W. G. Saylor.

Smith, Blackwell and Reid were re-elected for a new term. Campbell and Saylor were elected to the two places to be filled on the board of supervisors. Farrest Frazier retired from the board at the end of the last term and the other vacancy was formerly occupied by the late J. Raymond Little.

Grand Champion Fat Steer Exhibited By Jan Geeslin

The grand champion fat steer at the 31st annual Mills County Livestock Show here last Friday and Saturday was shown by Miss Jan Geeslin, 4-H Club member. Jan is 16 years old and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Geeslin, Goldthwaite.

Jan showed her 970 lb. Black Angus to first place in the heavy weight class before he was named grand champion of the show. The steer was bred

by Pete Geeslin and was fed under the supervision of County Agent George Reese.

Karen Horton, 4-H Club member of Star, showed the reserve champion steer, a Hereford weighing 890 lbs. This steer won first place in the medium weight class before being named reserve champion. Karen is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. V. Horton, Jr., and her reserve champion Hereford was

bred by W. V. Horton, Sr. The number of steer entries in the three classes was up considerably this year with 18 shown. Stock show officials are hopeful that the entries will be even better next years.

Seven Easements Still Needed For Brown-Mullin Creek Project

The flood control program on Brown-Mullin Creek watershed has progressed since the December 5, 1968 meeting, according to Scott Lanford, Chairman of the District board of supervisors.

Bill Bishop and LeRoy Schwartz, the two supervisors from the Mills County portion of the Brown-Mills S. W. C. D., expressed optimism for obtaining

the seven remaining easements which would permit beginning of construction for flood control.

In view of recent progress the District has granted a 30 day extension of active status time for obtaining the seven remaining easements for placing the watershed project in next year's construction schedule.

If after the easements are cleared by about March 15, the Brown-Mullin Creek project will be declared ready for construction and can be placed in the schedule, Lanford says.

Those who have easements yet to be granted may contact LeRoy Schwartz, Bill Bishop or David Waiters either of whom can accept them for the Brown-Mills S. W. C. D., which is the local sponsor for the project.

New EDDD Telephone Service Will Go Into Effect Here Sunday

Long distance telephone calls will be completed much faster for telephone users in Brownwood, Coleman, Blanket, Bangs, San Saba, Goldthwaite and Zephyr, beginning at 1:01 a. m. on Sunday morning, January 19, 1969, when Expanded Direct

Distance Dialing (EDDD) is introduced, according to Mrs. Winnie B. Burnett, Brownwood traffic supervisor for General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

Customers will then have at their fingertips a vast network of telephone equipment which will permit them to dial their own long distance calls direct to thousands of cities and communities throughout the United States and Canada.

In discussing various changes in the telephone industry, Mrs. Burnett explained that her position as traffic supervisor was formerly referred to as "chief operator." The industry has long referred to the movement of telephone calls as "traffic," and the department of the telephone company responsible for the movement of calls is the "traffic department." Modernization of the telephone industry has resulted in the traffic supervisor's being responsible for many phases of the operation rather than being just a "chief operator."

With this latest innovation in modern telephone service, EDDD, telephone customers will

The clinic and hospital will be operating under the firm name of Childress Clinic & Hospital, the announcement stated.

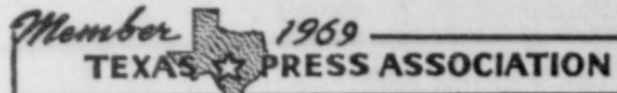

be almost unlimited in the number of telephones they may dial directly, Mrs. Burnett estimated that some 90,000,000 telephones, or about 90 per cent of the total telephones in the United States, will be accessible by EDDD.

"Any out-of-town number you are calling can be dialed directly if it has either two letters and five numerals or seven numerals," the traffic supervisor explained. "First you dial the access code, '112' for station-to-station paid calls or '110' for other type calls, and then you dial the area code of the city you are calling. Next you dial the complete number of the telephone you are calling, all seven digits. That's all there is to it — it's almost as simple as dialing any local number."

Special instruction booklets are to be distributed to all telephone customers in Brownwood, Bangs, Blanket, Coleman, Goldthwaite, San Saba and Zephyr during this week prior to the inauguration of EDDD. These booklets give detailed instructions on the dialing of all types of calls.

"We suggest to our customers that they keep their own personal directory of long distance numbers in order that they may take advantage of this fast new service," Mrs. Burnett said. "A handy personal telephone directory in which you can record these numbers can be obtained by contacting our service center."

"If you do not know the area code of the city you are calling, just dial the operator and she will give you the area code."

"If you do not know the out-of-town number, you obtain the number easily. Just dial the access code '112,' then dial the area code of the city you are calling and dial 555-1212. This will connect you with the information operator for the city you are calling. There is no charge for this type call."

"If you make a call that you cannot dial, place the call with the operator, and be sure to give her the area code. It will help to get the call completed quicker."

"All of the operators and I have been pleased to serve all telephone customers in these seven communities," Mrs. Burnett concluded, "and we will all be here to continue in assisting the customers with any calls that they cannot dial directly."
