

Landscape Plans For Courthouse Grounds Are Presented To Local Group Thursday

A suggested construction and planting development plan for the courthouse grounds covering the courthouse grounds for Mills County was presented at a special meeting in the Commissioners' Courtroom last Thursday afternoon.

Hal E. Stringer, Landscape Architect and Land Planner, of Waco, presented the proposed plans which represent a good ambitious program of improvement. The plan would retain all present land around the courthouse and jail for landscaping.

Present for the meeting were members of the Commissioners' Court, members of the Garden Club Courthouse Landscape project committee, and others.

Representing the Court were: County Judge Cecil Egger and Commissioners, A. R. Rowlett, Fred Wall and Burthel Roberts.

Garden Club committee members were: Mrs. Roy Wilkins, chairman, Mrs. V. Z. Cornelius, Mrs. Robert McCoy and Mrs. Malcolm Jernigan.

Others attending were: Home Demonstration Agent Weedon Echols, County Agent George Reese, County-District Clerk, Walter A. Bryant and Eagle Editor Vic E. Koleber.

Mr. Stringer went over the map of the proposed plans which cover five phases. He explained the various phases and outlined some of the work involved along with suggestions for carrying out the overall project which will include the entire courthouse grounds.

Copies of the suggested construction and planting development plan covering the five phases for the project were presented to all those present for further study.
