Grass Management Tour Thursday Attended By Mills County Group

Grass management was the objective of a group of about 30 from Goldthwaite, Brownwood and San Saba on a Soil Conservation District tour Thursday morning.

Attending from the Goldthwaite area were Bobby Baird, Clayton Egger, Charm Whittens, Olin Kemp, Elbert Phillips, Billy Hale and members of the SCS Work Unit.

Marvin Daniel, D. C. in charge of the S. C. S. Work Unit office in Brownwood, directed the group over the Kenneth Boyd and H. R. Stasney ranches to observe results of brush control and range seeding with grass management.

Kenneth Boyd displayed an

abundance of carry-over grass at the closing of the current grazing season. His cows were found to be in vigorous condition after raising a calf crop that weighed over 600 pounds per head with no supplemental feed being used for either cows or calves.

About 500 head of cattle were observed in the Weeping Lovegrass planting on the H. R. Stasney (Lucky) Ranch just below 10 mile crossing on the Bayou. Cattle on this ranch are grazed on irrigated Coastal Bermuda during the summer months, generally May through October.

While on the Coastal, the native rangeland and Weeping Lovegrass is rested for winter grazing.

About one pound of cottonseed cake per day for protein supplement is given each cow while on Weeping Lovegrass.

Balance between the summer and winter feed is obtained from Bermuda hay and ensilage.

March Fifth Is School Trustee Filing Deadline

Next Wednesday, March 5, is the last day which candidates may file for the school trustee election and have their names printed on the official ballots. Filing deadline is 30 days before the election which is scheduled for Saturday, April 5.

Two trustees will be elected to the board for the Goldthwaite, Mullin, Star and Priddy school districts for a regular three year term. Two members will be elected to the County School Board, one from commissioners' precinct three, and one from the county-at-large for 2 years.

Candidates must file with County Judge Cecil Egger. Names may be placed on the official ballot by the candidate signing up in person or by petition signed by five regularly qualified voters of the respective districts.

Candidates nominated by petition also must sign the affidavit for candidate for public office in the office of the County Judge 30 days before the election in order for the names to be placed on the official ballot.

Two Priddy Seniors Selected For Week Of Studies In Washington

John Holland and Douglas Meter, seniors at Priddy High School, arrived in Washington, D. C. Saturday, February 22, to spend a full week studying government as two of 300 selected seniors from high schools throughout the United States.

They are members of the first class of A Presidential Classroom for Young Americans and will be at the Washington Hilton Hotel where all the students will live, eat and study during the week in specially prepared quarters.

John is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Holland, and Douglas' parents are Mr. and Mrs. Milton Meter. They were selected by officials at their school, on the basis of their outstanding academic and personal school records.

The Classroom is a new educational project started in 1968. There will be five classes this year of 300 students each, planned to teach the operation of government in-depth for a seven-day period. The theme of the five classes is: "The Challenge of Opportunity," taken from President Richard M. Nixon's Inaugural Address.

In addition to attending classes and seminars in the hotel headquarters, the students will visit all branches of government, the departments and agencies, and meet and talk with Congressmen and Senators and other government officials.

James B. McCoy Is Named Member Of Charolais Ass'n.

James B. McCoy of Goldthwaite has been accepted for membership in the American-International Charolais Assn., Houston, the nation's fourth largest and fastest-growing beef breed, announces J. Scott Henderson, executive secretary.
Originating in France more than 200 years ago, Charolais has become well established in this country because of the breed's greater weight-for-age, greater feeding efficiency and improved carcass values that produce a greater ratio of quality lean meat to fat than other breeds.
Registrations of purebred Charolais during the past year totalled 22,191 animals, a 39% increase above year earlier figures. Transfers of cattle also rose 39% as more and more new breeders enter the production picture. Membership increased to 7,372 members, a 38% increase over new members the previous year.
Activities by junior breeders also showed a sharp increase during 1968, with 380 new members, 40% more than the number of new junior breeders added to the roster a year earlier.
There are now approximately 82,091 purebred and 231,094 recorded animals in the association's herd book and appendix, for a national herd of 313,185 animals.

Questions And Answers Asked At Draft Boards

Editor's Note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 702 Colorado Street, Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q—I am a college student. My registrar said I had to take 15 semester hours in the fall semester to make proportionate progress under the new draft law. Right?

A—That depends on your situation.

Q—I'm a freshman on a football scholarship and have time to take only 12 hours. Will that give me a deferment in Class II-S?

A—Yes, for the present. But whether it will in the future depends on what degree you're seeking and how long normally it takes to get it.

Q—I'm studying business administration. It takes four years, or less if you go to summer school. I plan to pick up some hours each summer. What's the least number of hours a year I'll need to take?

A—That depends on the total semester hours necessary to get the degree. You should get one-fourth of them off each of the four years.

Q—It takes 126 semester hours to get the degree. Let's see—that means I need to average 31½ hours a year. Is the summer term included in each year?

A—Yes.

Q—Let's see. If I take 12 hours this fall, 12 hours next spring, and 12 hours next summer—that's 36 hours. I'd be ahead of schedule, wouldn't I?

A—You sure would.

Q—In order to qualify for a II-S student deferment, must I enter college in the first class commencing after graduation from high school?

A—No. If you are not reached for induction on account of your age before you enter college, you may receive the deferment even though a period has passed when you were not in school, provided your age are not yet 24 years old. Once enrolled, you must request deferment from your draft board in writing, then remain a full-time, satisfactory student.

Q—How can I become a member of the local draft board?

A—If you are a citizen, at least 30 years of age, reside in the area over which the board has jurisdiction, and are not a member of the armed forces or its reserves, you are eligible. Contact the present members of the board, or write the State Selective Service Director, or the Governor, indicating your interest. Members are recommended by the Governor and appointed by the President of the United States.

TB Association Makes Appeal For Additional Funds

An appeal is going out today to the 25-county area of the Central Texas Tuberculosis Association. The funds requested are needed to carry out an effective program of control and eradication of TB and other respiratory diseases. The special appeal is being made in an effort to bring the annual campaign to a successful close and to continue the year-round service program of the association.

"A cutback in the program at this time would have serious consequences," officials of the TB group said. "It would mean fewer tuberculosis tests for children, less research, health education, and less help for victims of emphysema."

Mills is one of 25 counties in transition in the Central Texas group's reorganization. The establishment on an area basis is designed to accomplish a realistic goal — the eradication of tuberculosis.

There are counties in the area that have not had a TB control program. Funds collected in these counties and over the entire area will be used to wage fresh attacks on tuberculosis and lung-crippling diseases in every locality of Central Texas.

Funds also will be directed toward continuing education and research.

Payroll during the year totals \$204,131 which is paid to 50 members of the faculty and employees.

Annual budget for Goldthwaite school system this year is \$250,446. This does not include lunchroom operations.

There are 30 teachers and administrators in the school system.

The school system operates seven buses and one private carrier driving approximately 102,000 miles per year.

Estimated value of school buildings, land and equipment and all physical facilities of the district would run in the neighborhood of \$750,000. These include Elementary School, High School, Gymnasium, Stadium, Agriculture Building, Storage Building, High School Lunchroom, and approximately 80 acres of land.

Total enrollment for the 1968--69 year has now reached 482 pupils for both high school, junior high and elementary school.

Goldthwaite Schools operate two modern lunchrooms serving an average of 360 meals daily and total expected for the year of 65,000.

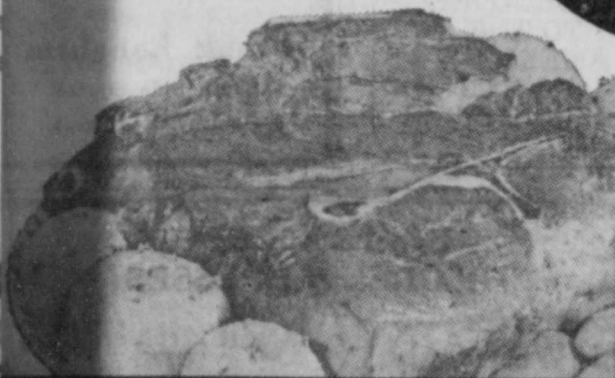

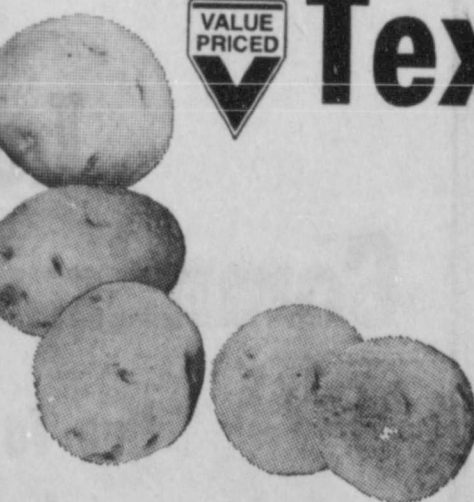

The Easter Seal Society offers physical and occupational therapy, speech and hearing programs, and special equipment loans to enable disabled persons to make the best use of their abilities to overcome handicaps. These services are financed by the annual Easter Seal Appeal.

The Society also provided for research into the causes and cures of crippling conditions, finances public education programs, and provides scholarships for training of professional personnel to staff rehabilitation centers.

Mr. Collier pointed out that all of these programs are important if Texas is going to continue to provide the best in rehabilitation services for its own disabled citizens.

During 1968, the Texas Easter Seal Society helped to provide treatment and services to 11,390 children and 6,232 adults who were in need of rehabilitation services. These services are available to any disabled person

who can benefit from help provided by the Easter Seal Society, Mr. Collier added.

The Easter Seal Campaign will run through Easter Sunday, April 6. Mr. Collier urged increased support for the Easter Seal Society and its program of services to crippled children and adults.

AUSTIN, Tex.—Gov. Preston Smith handed the 61st Legislature a \$261.5 million new revenue program to balance his general revenue budget recommendations totalling more than \$1.4 billion.

Reaction varied widely, though few expect the \$148.8 million direct biennial tax bill submitted by the governor in his message to the joint session will pass as proposed.

Ninety per cent of \$138 million in general fund spending which Smith recommended over the Legislative Budget Board's \$1.1 billion appropriations bill would go to education. Teacher pay raises — \$1,266 a year for B. A. teachers and \$1,580 for M. A. holders — would take \$220 million over the next two years.

Smith suggested ways in which the extra money could be raised, some of them already controversial.

One of these was the so-called "Cavness plan," advocated years ago by Former State Auditor C. H. Cavness and now sponsored by his son, Rep. Don Cavness of Austin.

It proposes to divert all but 27½ per cent of the revenues from the public school lands into day-by-day state aid to schools. This would pull an estimated \$71.6 million in two years which otherwise would go into the permanent school fund. Under present law, all the income from school oil and gas leases goes into the permanent fund and is invested. Income from the investments is distributed among schools on a per capita basis.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler and the School Land Board have come out against the proposal to spend 72½ per cent of the income.

Smith's other revenue proposals are these:

- An increase from 11 to 14 cents a package in taxes on cigarettes, to raise \$45 million in two years.

- An increase in the tax on other tobacco products, to raise \$6 million.

- Extension of the sales tax to cover services such as laundry, dry cleaning, repairs, parking and cable TV, to raise \$48.8 million.

- Extension of the sales tax to cover wine, beer and liquor, to raise \$40 million.

- Extension of the sales tax to the purchase of cars and other equipment bought for rental purposes, to raise \$9 million.

- Putting an additional state fine of \$10 on all moving traffic law violation cases, to raise \$38.5 million.

- Raise notary, corporation charter and uniform commercial code fees, to raise \$2.6 million.

- Increase fees paid to the Secretary of State, to raise \$2.6 million.

- Remainder of Smith's revenue would come from the \$58.5 million surplus.

Governor urged the following for education in addition to the teacher pay hike:

- Vocational-technical education improvements totalling \$25 million more than previously recommended; \$12 million to hire more teacher aides; \$16 million increase for special education of handicapped; \$5 million to conduct a pilot eight-week optional summer school program; \$3.3 million for teacher sick leave; \$12 million more for junior colleges; \$3 million to develop regional educational closed circuit television systems; \$8.3 million each for new medical schools in Houston and Lubbock; \$7.3 million for new dental school in San Antonio; \$600,000 to ex-

pand Baylor dental and medical units and \$300,000 for studies measuring results of public education.

Governor thinks \$11.7 million more is needed for medical assistance programs; \$6.5 million for a 3.4 per cent state employee pay raise; \$5 million more to pay employer group insurance premium; \$2.2 million more for his own office; \$1.8 million to implement water planning; \$200,000 for Water Right Commission; \$200,000 each for urban studies at Arlington and Houston; \$300,000 for Parks and Wildlife Commission and \$300,000 for centralized services. Department of Public Safety would get \$8.5 million more from special funds to hire more personnel, build additional facilities and improve communications.

But on one of the big issues of the legislative session, increased appropriations for higher education, Smith stood pat with the Legislative Budget Board recommendations. This is \$73 million less on the seven "formula" items. College presidents told the appropriations hearing that they simply cannot handle the flood of new students without the \$73 million.

On the proposals of Gov. John Connally's Committee on Public School Education for consolidation and tax equalization, Governor Smith drew a middle ground. He advocated a state stamp tax on real estate transactions as a way of studying the variation in assessment bases for local school tax purposes. He referred to the rural school consolidation proposals in critical terms, but did not come out against it or suggest to the Legislature any decision on the recommendations for consolidation.

ALLOWABLE BOOSTED

Lone Star Gas Company To File For City Gate Rate Adjustment

L. G. James, President of Lone Star Gas Company, announced that Lone Star has commenced preparation of an application which it expects to file with the Railroad Commission of Texas in early summer to adjust upward the Company's authorized intracompany city gate charge for gas delivered in Texas. The last application filed of such a nature by

the Company was in December, 1958.

James stated that the current city gate charge is insufficient to compensate for the increases in expenses and investment incurred by Lone Star's transmission division since 1958.

Lone Star's transmission division purchases and gathers natural gas and transports it to the city gates on the system. Lone Star's distribution divisions receive and pay for gas at the city gate and distribute it to customers' premises.

James said that residential and commercial rates would not be immediately affected by the filing with the Railroad Commission. After the new city gate charge is established and specific computations made for each city and town, requests would then be filed for increases in individual cities and towns where they are justified.
