## Dr. Henry Garber, Evangelist For Revival Services At First Baptist

Dr. Henry Garber, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Denison, will be the evangelist for revival services March 23-30 at First Baptist Church. The revival is one of thousands being held this year throughout the Western Hemisphere as over 20 million Baptists cooperate in Crusade of the Americas. "Christ the Only Hope" is the theme of the vast campaign.

Dr. Garber is a former pastor of the First Baptist Churches of Mullin, Lometa and Mineral Wells. A native of Beaver Falls, Pennsylvania, and a World War II veteran, he graduated from Howard Payne College in 1949 and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1953. In 1966 Howard Payne College conferred on him an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree.

He has served as a trustee of his alma mater and as a member of the executive board of the Texas Baptist Convention and presently is a trustee of the Southern Baptist Convention Home Mission Board. A Master Mason and Knight Templar, he is listed in "Who's Who in the South and Southwest." He is president-elect of the Denison Rotary Club.

Dr. and Mrs. Garber have traveled extensively throughout Europe and the Middle East. They have two sons, one who is now serving in Vietnam and one who is a student in Baylor University.

Revival services are scheduled for 7:30 p. m. Monday through Saturday. The Sunday evening services will be at 7:00. Men of the church will attend a breakfast Saturday morning, March 29, at 7:00 in the banquet room.

Revival music will be directed by Rev. Dale Gore, pastor.

Tax Returns  
Now Filed With  
Service Centers

(Dallas, Texas)—Federal income tax returns should no longer be filed with the Internal Revenue District office at Dallas, but with the Southwest Service Center, 2651 S. Interregional Highway, Austin,

Texas 78740, beginning January 1. This applies both to tax returns with remittances and those with refunds due.

The IRS Southwest Region which includes Texas, is the latest to require direct filing of all income tax returns with IRS regional service centers, under a law enacted November 2, 1968. Mr. Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue, said today.

Direct filing of returns will eliminate initial handling at the district office, where they are packaged and shipped to the service center for processing.

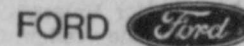

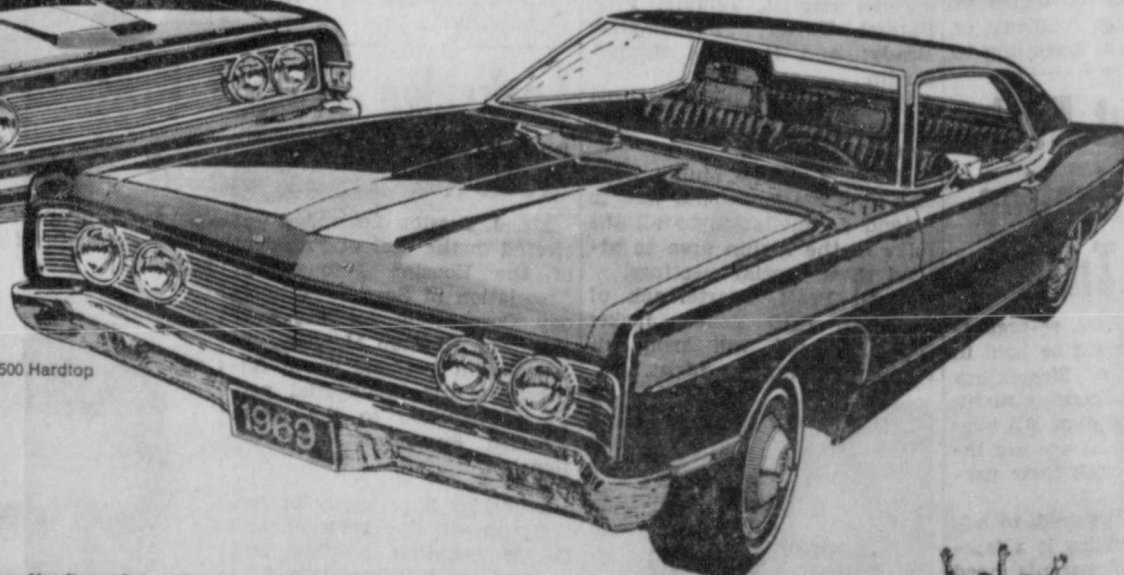

# Yarborough's

AUSTIN, Tex.—Texas lawmakers are nearing the halfway mark of the 61st legislative session and the pace is beginning to quicken visibly.

More than 1,200 House bills and some 700 Senate bills (plus nearly 100 proposed constitutional amendments) were filed by Friday, the deadline for free introduction of bills. A four-fifths majority now is required.

Although floor sessions are brief, a lot of legislation is getting passed — 63 bills last week alone including some of the session's major business.

And the lights burn bright at the state capitol after midnight for some committees which schedule hearing on as many as a dozen bills at a time. Other committee meetings begin as early as 9 a. m. and last until floor action starts in the House and Senate.

So far, the Senate has reversed its usual form. It is cranking out general bills far faster than the House, where the representatives are pursuing a more methodical look-over-carefully procedure.

Last week, for example, the Senate banged through 34 bills on its regular calendars, some so fast there was no time allowed for explanation, let alone debate. Across the rotunda, the House passed only 13 measures on major calendars, but representatives reduced the gap considerably by cranking through 16 local bills at a single, hour-

long sitting. Gov. Preston Smith signed six more into law.

One thing is sure . . . as the second lap of an historic legislative session begins, things will get a lot faster and a lot more hectic before early June when adjournment is scheduled.

## MAJOR BILLS MOVING

Legislature has completed action on, and handed the governor, a tough new measure providing fines up to \$200 and jail terms up to six months for disruptive activity on college campuses. Bill won't take effect until the start of the new school year.

Senate passed key bills to put sharp teeth in air and water pollution controls, require breath tests of suspected drunk drivers, require public agencies to give three days notice of their official meetings and provide tougher controls over teenage drinking.

Other Senate bills would authorize payment of up to \$5,000 for moving homes and businesses displaced in highway right-of-way condemnation proceedings, remove the \$8,400 salary ceiling on which teachers contribute to retirement, establish a temporary Governor's Human Relations Committee, set up a new commission to regulate credit unions and request the U. S. Congress to ease restrictions on cable television.

Both houses have passed their own version of bills to permit schools to teach in a foreign language those students who have difficulty with English in elementary grades, to lower from two years to one year the minimum time between elections to adopt or abolish city sales taxes and to close some public roads on state-owned land held for use of the Texas Department of Corrections.

House approved creation of a new Texas Technological College of Medicine at Lubbock and voted to strike down immunity of government units from lawsuits for damages.

Representatives gave strong support to a bill to give the Legislature the right to set Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Columbus Day and Veterans Day holidays on Mondays to conform to the federal holidays.

Another bill sent to the Senate would permit the state's 14 courts of civil appeal to issue writs of habeas corpus in domestic-relations cases.

Senate has adopted an amended version of a House bill to permit a statewide cooperative network of local libraries. Governor Smith now has the bill.

## BILLS RUNNETH OVER

Several education bills have been filed in the last few days. Rep. Guy Floyd of San Antonio wants the Attorney General's office to assist school districts threatened with the loss of Federal funds.

Rep. David Evans of San Antonio wants the state to contribute as much money to private school students as it does to public school students through the minimum Foundation School Program.

Rep. Jim Nugent filed a bill to prohibit the Legislature from enacting an individual state income tax.

Rep. Carlos Truan of Corpus Christi has a constitutional amendment to remove the ceiling on welfare payments.

Rep. Neal Solomon of Mount Vernon has a bill to allow the agriculture commissioner to prohibit the sale of any milk not meeting agriculture department standards.

Rep. David Allred of Wichita Falls introduced a one bill package prohibiting racing a car motor, sudden stops or starts, unnecessary horn-blowing, contesting speed, fighting, indecent language, throwing things, littering, loitering or intoxication on shopping center parking lots.

## LEGISLATION MOVES ON

Governor Smith has signed into law bills to raise state employee retirement benefits an average 10 per cent and to raise from five to six and a half per cent the maximum interest rate on state and local bonds.

Senate passed 30-0 and sent to the House a compromise workmen's compensation reform bill, raising top benefits from \$35 to \$49 a week for in-

jured or ill workers. Senate also passed a proposed constitutional amendment to authorize appropriation of funds for governors-elect between general election day and inauguration, bills to create separate boards of regents for East Texas State and West Texas State universities, authority for county commissioners to furnish free office space and telephones to legislators in their home districts and tax exemption for 500 non-profit rural water cooperatives and nursing homes.

House lagged far behind the Senate but did complete action on the bond interest bill, create a commission to operate the Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz Museum in Fredericksburg and pass a bill to permit local libraries to join in a statewide network for exchange of books and service.

Liquor-by-the-drink constitutional amendments landed on Senate and House calendars with favorable committee reports and predictions of support by two-thirds of lawmakers. Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes appeared to be taking a personal hand in steering the senate legislation.

Meanwhile, the Senate Constitutional Amendments Committee unceremoniously killed another familiar measure — San Antonio Sen. V. E. (Red) Berry's proposal to legalize horse race gambling in Bexar and Harris Counties.

Constitutional amendment to remove welfare ceiling has cleared Senate Committee.

Bill is pending in Senate to rename Corpus Christi State School for the late Sen. Bruce Reagan who handled legislation creating it.

## AG OPINIONS

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin gave this advice to Governor Smith on when state appointments come due:

When board or commission has staggered terms, the legislature meant terms of members to begin on effective date of act . . . But when law set up a single position and did not specify date of terms, term begins on the date first appointee took office.

In other recent opinions, Martin held that:

• Regulations for ambient air quality could not be the same or as strict in metropolitan areas as in an area with no industry, but emission of polluted matter into the air should be more rigidly controlled in a metropolitan area of industrial production than in an area where little pollution exists from emissions into air.

• It is contrary to public policy for a member of board of trustees of a community center to be a stockholder of corporations contracting with the center, but there is no conflict of interest for mere employees of facilities in a contract between facilities and center.

• Abandoned county road right-of-way property should be offered at private sale to adjoining or abutting property owners. If they don't want it, property can be sold at public auction after advertisement.

## TAX TIME

House Speaker Gus Mutscher has been talking with legislators to see what sort of tax program they will support to pay for the new programs which they may pass. Governor Smith's tax program was introduced by Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas. It also puts a \$10 "super-fine" on all who violate the traffic laws where motion is involved.
