The purpose of the Panel is to assist rural people and rural communities identify the services they need for economic, social, and cultural growth and locate and secure the needed services. The panel will also assist individuals and groups with economic development plans, community development projects, inventories and surveys.

"There are many programs available to communities and people," says Doug Sellars, TAP Chairman "but many times people or communities aren't aware of such programs." The aim of the TAP, which is composed of people from Federal, State and local agencies, is to extend these programs to rural areas and people. Any individual, group, or community can receive assistance by contacting any of the above named people.

Grazing Dates For Diverted Acres Remain The Same In Mills County

The State ASC Committee was notified on April 16, 1969 of an additional option that could be used relative to the period of time that grazing could be permitted on cropland acres diverted or to be diverted under the 1969 annual wheat and feed grain programs. Earlier, producers had been informed that the non-grazing period for such acres in 1969 would be between the dates of April 30 and October 1.

After consulting with county ASC committees in the areas of

the State where it is common to graze small grain crops such as wheat, oats, rye and barley, the non-grazing period for annual program diverted acres has been set between the dates of May 14 and October 15 for the following 48 counties:

The non-grazing period for annual program diverted acres for all other counties in Texas remain as announced earlier—between the dates of April 30 and October 1. Mills County is included in this group, according to announcement made Tuesday by Bob Jarvis, office manager for Mills County ASCS.

Ray Standley Elected President Of Brush Control Association

Ray Standley has been elected county chairman of the Brush Control and Range Improvement Association.

Nearly 80 per cent of the rangeland in Texas is infested with weeds and brush. This infestation is complex, with wide variations in types of brush, soil, water and climatic conditions. The carrying capacity of nearly 100 million acres of land is being reduced by 50 per cent or more.

Much research has been done on controlling brush and improving rangeland, but there is an urgent need for a crash program to raise funds for additional basic research.

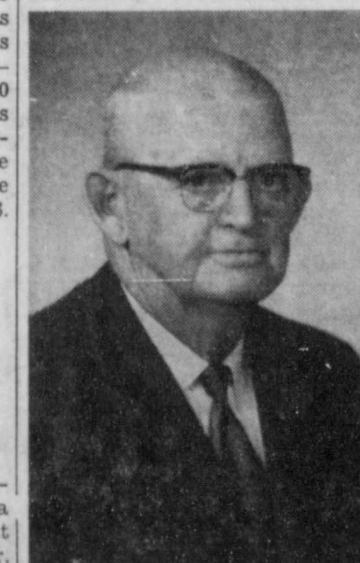
The Brush Control and Range Improvement Association is a Non-profit, tax exempt association formed to raise funds from any source to promote more intensive research on the problems of brush and the improvement of the land after the brush has been brought under control.

The Association was formed by a group of interested ranchers and representatives from the Farm Bureau, the Farmers Union, the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers, and the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

The immediate goal of the Association is to raise, from the landowners of Texas, one cent an acre per year for five years. Businesses, foundations, city, state or federal governing bodies interested in the control of brush and land improvement will be contacted for donations and assistance.

The funds will be made available to universities, individuals, companies or foundations for projects approved by the Evaluation Committee of the Association.

The Treble Clef Club of Lometa Wednesday night reports are that it was a full from start to finish. Eagle could have predicted with absolute certainty the personnel of the

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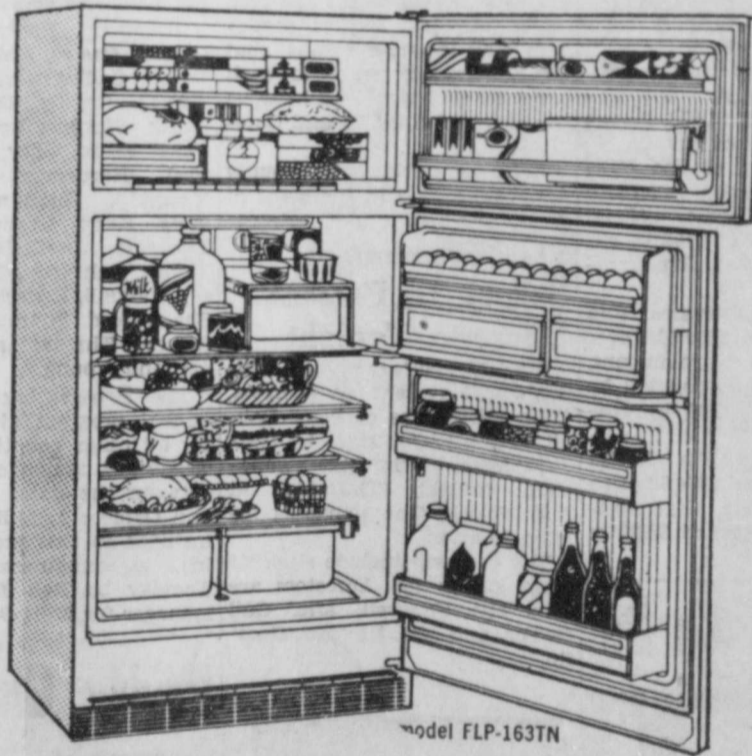
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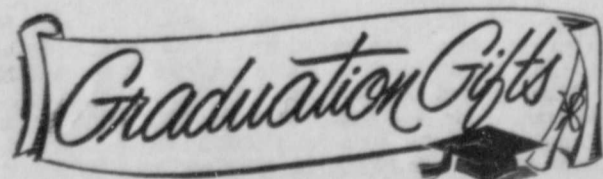
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Miss Linda Ann Scott And Gary Townsend Butts To Wed

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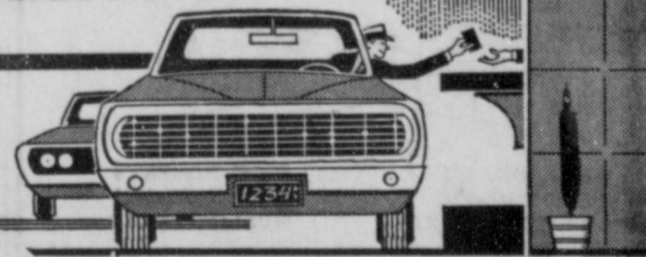
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Community News From Mullin

The opportunity is at hand for the Federal Government to ask for indictments and tell these revolutionary students

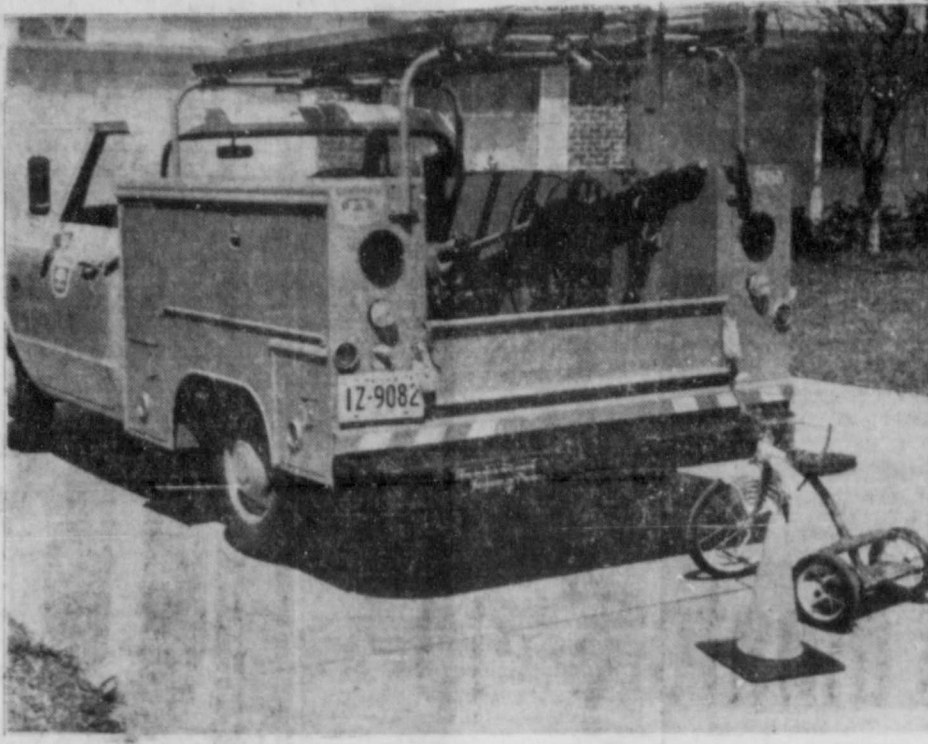

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D. C. — The Department of Justice has available to it several laws which could be invoked to seek indictments against instigators of disturbances on college campuses. Laws related to interference with military recruitment are a case in point.

Primarily and essentially, the responsibility for the maintenance of order on college campuses is that of the school's administrators and trustees. The least desirable remedy is the Federal Government's intervention but some may be necessary.

The prevalent excuse for the militants' behavior is opposition to ROTC programs and military recruiters on college campuses. This becomes a direct Federal problem. General Leonard Chapman, Commandant of the Marine Corps, has made public the fact that some college administrators not only are failing to control student take-over but are denying recruiters facilities to obtain volunteers.

Both the Army and Air Force are having the same experience. Militant students on many college campuses are protesting the maintenance of courses for officers training. Of course, our enemies are the benefactors of this conduct.

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proper officials, then it seems not only right but the responsibility of the Federal Government to look for a better place to spend the taxpayers' money to assist educating our young people.

This in itself should be enough to apply the pressure of withholding funds but, in addition, the bombing and arson aimed at ROTC and selective service recruitment is a criminal act which should be dealt with. There is no guesswork at the intent of the Students of a Democratic Society which is the core of the revolutionary tactics on many campuses. In January they passed a resolution, a part of which states "students alone can not and will not be able to bring about the downfall of capitalism" but could advance this objective by stepping up disruptive demonstrations on college campuses, by attacking police institutes, centers of counter-insurgency, and "the repressive nature of America's police, courts and military."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR7)
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 64 to read as follows: "Section 64. All other provisions of the Constitution notwithstanding, bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority shall bear such rates of interest as shall be prescribed by the issuing agency, subject to limitations as may be imposed by the legislature."

Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.
(e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state.
(f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.
(g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the authority of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$5,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature, to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year."
"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes."
"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary to make such federal matching money available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons."
"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care services or assistance shall also include the objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of a person or fitting lenses human eye to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. 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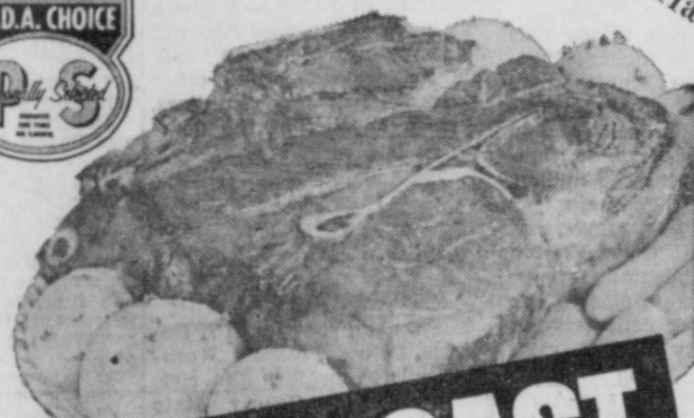

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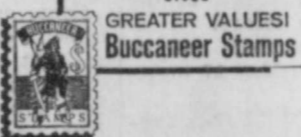

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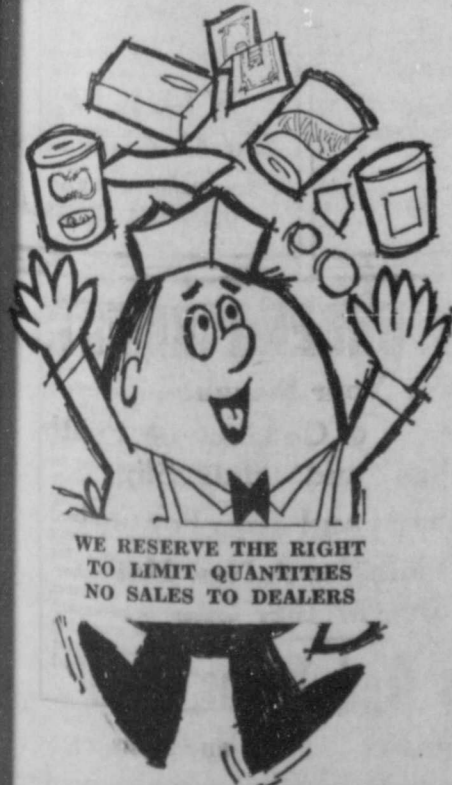
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Scholastic Achievement Awards Go To Nocy Murray & Brenda Ethridge

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AUSTIN, Texas — Showdown time is near in the Legislature. That's when the time comes for crucial issues of spending and taxation.

Moving at a billion-dollars-a-minute clip, the Senate whipped through a record \$5.8 billion 1970-71 appropriations bill which would require a minimum \$63.3 million in new taxes.

Of this \$5.8 billion budget, \$69.7 million is recommended for support of the State Department of Public Safety, an increase of \$10.2 million over the current level of spending by that agency. Difference would pay for the hiring of 150 more highway patrolmen, 50 more narcotics agents and 10 additional intelligence agents, as well as \$864,638 for an addition to the Homer Garrison Jr. Police Training Academy in Austin.

Despite all its heft, the Senate bill contained no funds for the anticipated \$220 million teacher-pay-raise, the contemplated \$30 million lift in the welfare ceiling, \$16.5 million for two new medical schools, \$7.5 million for a new dental school or \$6 million for planning new colleges.

Include these high-priority items and you are looking at a tax bill a lot closer to \$345 million than \$63.3 million.

However, House Speaker Gus Mutscher has called for an appropriations bill which will require no new revenue. It would include money for new medical schools, dental school and college planning.

Major difference in the bills is in the area of higher education, where the Senate would raise general fund appropriations of 22 senior colleges and universities \$106.5 million, public junior colleges \$19.3 million.

First hearings on major tax bills are getting underway. Hearing on Gov. Preston Smith's supplemental revenue recommendation, to place a one-half of one per cent levy on chemical producers and raise cigarette rate to 15 cents a pack, will be set for mid-April.

House may very well pass its version of the budget next week. It would permit a \$240 million increase in general revenue spending without additional taxes. Difference between lean House and fat Senate spending measures must be ironed out in conference committee during the next two months.

Tax battle, which must start in the House, will see-saw back and forth from House-to-Senate - and - vice - versa. Senators have some revenue ideas of their own.

House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee Held a Hearing on Three of the Bills

by Reps. James Nugent of Kerrville, Lamoine Holland of San Antonio and Joe Salem of Corpus Christi — and sent all three to the same subcommittee, which presumably will combine the most desirable features of all three into one bill.

Holland's bill aims at obscene literature, Salem's at dirty movies and Nugent's covers the whole field of obscenity.

Only opposition to the bills came from a spokesman for the Texas Drive-In Theater Owners Association, who said the bill would hurt the 1,000 legitimate theaters in Texas to get at the "50 or so that show skin flicks."

Also meeting favorable receptions in the Legislature are bills to exempt from prosecution under the anti-obscenity laws projectionists who own no interest in theaters.

AERONAUTICS GAG

Texas Aeronautics Commission has proposed new rules and regulations for the hearing of cases before it — including a prohibition against anyone connected with a case from discussing the merits of the case with newsmen.

Commission's jurisdiction primarily involves the certification of intrastate airlines and the granting of state airport-aid grants to communities.

Proposed rule, which will be considered at a May 15 hearing, says a party to a case may not discuss it with newsmen "outside the presence of all other parties or their representatives, unless a member of the Commission is present."
