

Annual Meeting Scheduled Saturday San Saba For PCA Stockholders

Stockholders of the San Saba Production Credit Association will convene for their Annual Meeting at the San Saba High School Auditorium on Saturday, June 28th, at 10:30 a. m. according to the schedule of the Goldthwaite office.

W. H. Calkins, Vice President of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, will be the featured speaker. Calkins has been associated with the credit bank at Houston

for 36 years and is an authority on agricultural credit. He is responsible for the credit activities of his bank, and through his office over 700 million dollars of credit is provided for Texas agriculture annually. Along with his busy schedule as a loan executive, he appears many times each year before agricultural groups to discuss credit, fiscal matters, and economic outlook for agricultural credit.

"While we anticipate a rise in the very near future in our interest cost to our borrowers," Mr. Conradt states, "we are extremely proud of the fact that we have maintained during the past few years of high interest costs a simple interest rate of 7% from December 1, 1967, until February 15, 1969, at which time the rate was increased to our present rate of 7 1/4%. During 1968 we loaned 30 1/2 million dollars to the farmers and ranchers in this area, and our low rate of interest represents a tremendous savings to our stockholders."

A statement of condition of the San Saba Production Credit Association as of the close of business March 31, 1969, appears elsewhere in this paper. This statement shows assets of \$14,873,501.28 and net worth and reserves of \$2,438,609.43. The association is entirely owned by farmers and ranchers in an eight county area.

The stockholders of the San Saba Production Credit Association will hear in addition to the address by Mr. Calkins a report of the association's financial status by Newell A. Oliver, President, a report from its board of directors by the Chairman of the Board, J. C. Ellison, and will elect three directors.

Mr. Clayton Egger of Mullin serves the Goldthwaite office territory as one of the five directors of the association and as well serves as an alternate on the Loan Committee. Mrs. Margaret Duren is employed as an assistant to Mr. Conradt in the Goldthwaite office.

Two Grass Fires Caused By Storm Monday Night

Lightning from the severe electrical storm that passed over the area Monday night caused two grass fires in Mills County, burning off nearly 2,000 acres of pastureland.

A barn was ignited on the W. V. Horton place southwest of Star at about 8 p. m. and started a fire that burned parts of the Horton and Jim Soules ranches and practically all of the C. D. Owens home place. High winds made the fire spread fast but the Goldthwaite Volunteer Fire Dept. and several units with equipment from surrounding counties finally brought it under control around 3:00 o'clock Tuesday morning.

The other fire started about 8:30 p. m. on the Weatherby place Southeast of Lake Merritt when lightning presumably struck a tree. One truck from the local fire department answered the call and had the fire out within an hour.

"I have been noticing certain publicity in regard to your public library. It would seem that additional funds are needed," so starts a letter received by W. P. Duren at Mills County State Bank from a person living outside Mills County as he issued a challenge to local residents to support their public library.

This letter was written after a story appeared in the Eagle awhile back showing local support to the public library running below the average. In fact it is considerably below even the low state average.

Texans support their public libraries to the tune of \$1.24 per capita per year. In California the figure is \$3.89; in Massachusetts it's \$4.61. The Jennie Trent Dew Library budget in Goldthwaite amounted to \$0.20 per capita.

This friend of the library living a few counties away who prefers that his name not be mentioned, mailed a check to Duren in the amount of \$50.00 to be given to the library here provided 20 citizens of Mills County will each give a similar amount.

In announcing receipt of the letter and accompanying check Duren stated: "Local citizens should jump at a proposition like that and make the guy 'Cough Up' the \$50.00 for the local library."

The fifty dollars happens to be deposited in the bank awaiting reaction of interested persons who would be inclined to make a donation to the library, for one of two reasons. One, an interest in their library and willingness to support it, or, two, let this friend of the library pay up on the sporting proposition he made.

Mr. Duren will be happy to hear any comments on this challenge that has been made to residents of Mills County to support their own public library.

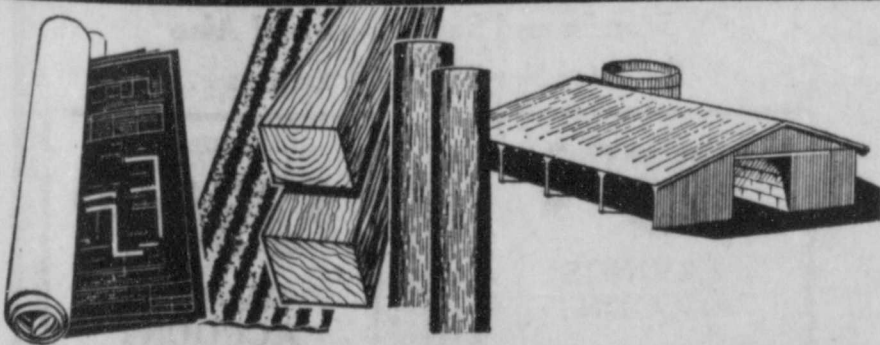

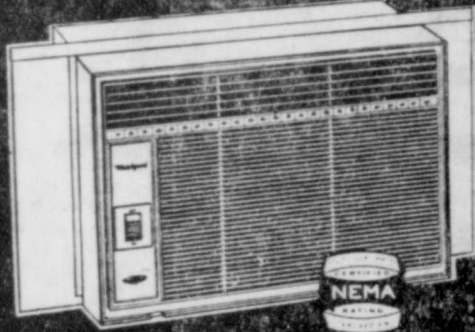

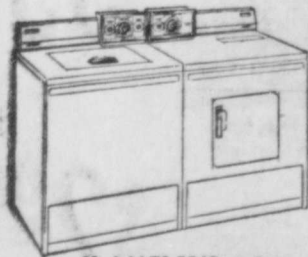

Proposed Postal Rate Increases Announced By Postmaster Duren

An "inherited" postal deficit of \$1.2 billion is responsible for the proposals to raise the postage bill for residents of Goldthwaite, Postmaster Norman Duren has announced.

Mr. Duren said he had been advised by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount in Washington, D. C., that the record \$1.2 billion 1970 deficit compelled President Nixon to seek postage rate increases. Without higher rates the Department will be left with a staggering deficit that would become an added public tax burden.

In addition to increasing letter mail from 6 to 7 cents, as proposed by the Johnson Administration, President Nixon also asked that second and third-class mailers help reduce the large postal deficit which would otherwise be paid by taxpayers, the postmaster said.

For bulk third-class mail and most magazines and newspapers, the rates would be increased 16 to 20 per cent above today's levels, he noted. These percentages include rate hikes already scheduled by previous action of Congress.

The President's recommended increases will reduce the

1970 postal deficit by more than \$600 million.

The postmaster listed these other details on the proposed increases:

First-class mail: Letters to 7 cents and post cards to 6 cents each, on July 1, 1969. Airmail postage would remain at 10 cents. This will yield \$557.2 million in new revenues.

Second-class mail: A handling charge of 3/10ths of a cent per piece for circulation outside home counties would become effective July 1, 1969. This would yield \$15.3 million annually and would represent a 12 per cent increase in addition to the 8 per cent rise scheduled to take effect January 1, 1970.

Third-class mail: For single pieces, rates would be increased one cent per piece. This would yield \$12.4 million. For regular bulk third-class, the minimum would be increased to a uniform rate of 4.2 cents January 1, 1970, as contrasted with the present rate of 3.6 cents. The 1970 increase would lift revenues by \$46.8 million annually.

Rountree And Moore New Members Of Charolais Association

W. T. Rountree and Frank D. Moore of Goldthwaite have been accepted for membership in the American International Charolais Association, Houston, the nation's fourth largest and fastest-growing beef breed, announces J. Scott Henderson, executive secretary.

Originating in France more than 200 years ago, Charolais has become well established in this country.

Registrations of purebred Charolais during the past year totalled 22,191 animals, a 39% increase above year earlier figures. Transfers of cattle also rose 39% as more and more new breeders enter the production picture. Membership increased to 7,372 members, a 38% increase over new members the previous year.

Activities by junior breeders also showed a sharp increase during 1968, with 390 new members, 40% more than the number of new junior breeders added to the roster a year earlier.

There are now approximately 82,091 purebred and 231,094 recorded animals in the association's herd book and appendix, for a national herd of 313,185 animals.
