

## C. F. Jeske, Pioneer Merchant, Banker, Rancher, Buried June 21

C. F. Jeske, banker, merchant, rancher, and longtime resident of Priddy and Mills County, died June 19, 1969, in St. Joseph Hospital, Bryan, Texas, after a brief illness. At the time of his death, Mr. and Mrs. Jeske were visiting their son and family in Bryan.

Funeral services were held in the Zion Lutheran Church at 10:30 a. m., June 21, 1969. The services were conducted by the Reverend Richard F. Winkelmann, pastor of the Zion Lutheran Church, of Priddy. Burial was in the Zion Lutheran Cemetery under the direction of the Roy Wilkins Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Albert Schumann, G. J. Drucekhammer, Troy Dutton, Ernest Senger, Elton Bufo, Raymond Tlemann, Glenn Jeske and Robert Jeske.

Mr. Jeske was born June 12, 1887, in Washington County, Texas. His father, Carl Jeske, was an immigrant from Poland, and his mother, Elizabeth Kraft Jeske, was an immigrant from Switzerland. He was baptized in infancy by Rev. John Strite, an itinerant Methodist minister. Later in life he joined the St. John's Lutheran Church in the Prairie Hill Community, Washington County, Texas. At the time of his death he was a member of Zion Lutheran Church, Priddy, Texas.

In 1908 he moved to Priddy, Texas, where he engaged himself as a barber. After having earned enough to make a down payment on a wagon and team, he began hauling freight from the rail head in Goldthwaite to Priddy. Later he traded the wagon and team for a horse and buggy and sold patented hatchets and other items of hardware throughout the county.

Following this he worked for Oscar Sullivan, a general merchant in Priddy.

In 1911 he married Ella Regina Schuster. Shortly after he married, he purchased the Oscar Sullivan business and the J. M. Pfluger Mercantile Co., which then became known as Carl Jeske & Co., as it is known today.

In 1917 he became interested in banking. Through the friendship and help of Mr. Brooksmith, a Brownwood banker, he opened the Farmers & Merchants Bank in Priddy. He was a sound and careful banker and fully realized a banker's obligations; he steered his bank through the panic of 1921 and again through the great depression of the thirties. He was a strong believer that banking belonged to bankers, like wars to generals, and neither should be left to politicians.

He loved the soil and was a genuine soil conservationist, realizing its importance early in life. In the early twenties he terraced his farmland under the supervision of his close friend, W. P. Weaver, who was the Mills County agent at that time. These terraces were some of the first built in the county as well as in the State. He was a strong advocate of brush control and range improvement and practiced it.

He never once moved from the county in search of, as he put it, "greener pastures."

In good times, as in bad, he kept his sense of humor, and many times when everything seemed to go wrong, he quoted the famous words of Martin Luther, "And were I to know that the world would perish tomorrow, I would still plant my apple tree today."

He is survived by his wife, Ella, three daughters, Mrs. Eleanor Gromatzky of Priddy, Mrs. Neida Helmcamp of Kaufman, and Mrs. Viola Lamert of McGregor; two sons, Arnold C. Jeske of Bryan and Carl A. Jeske of Priddy, seven grandchildren, three brothers, D. A. Jeske of Star, Fred Jeske of Benham and Ed Jeske of Richmond.

## School Board Studies Report Of Accreditation Visit By TEA

The Goldthwaite School Board is giving some study to the report recently received from the Texas Education Agency regarding their 1969 accreditation visit to the local school system.

The Goldthwaite Independent School District, fully accredited, and in good standing, received an accreditation survey visit in 1968 from which a report was written. The report recommended that the district receive a regular visit during the spring of 1968-69 school year.

Milton Schwartz, board president, stated this week that the report will receive some more extensive consideration in the weeks and months ahead in light of accomplishments and improvements that have been made during the past and those needed in the future.

In addition to the routine matters regarding area covered, assessed valuation, tax rate, debts, instructional program and staff, etc., the report outlines and calls attention to improvements made during the past year and also to some areas that need attention in the future.

Improvements cited included: A system-wide self-evaluation completed.

One regular classroom had been converted for use as work space and shelving for the library with connecting classroom converted to a reading room.

Aluminum windows, fluorescent lighting, and suspended acoustic ceiling tile had been installed in seven of the 10 high school classrooms with the remaining classrooms to be "face-

lifted" as rapidly as possible. Science classes had been so scheduled that all classes had the use of a laboratory facility.

A new roof had been put on the high school lunchroom. The district had made significant progress with regard to development of local curriculum guides, with additional progress to be accomplished in that area.

A written guidance plan had been developed and adopted by the board of school trustees. The guidance program appeared to be quite effective at the secondary level.

The report commented on the elective courses for seventh and eighth graders which are technically meeting standards but do not seem to realistically meet the needs of students in these grades.

Basic skills are adequately taught in grades one through six, implementation procedures of the elementary school's program of education appeared to be of high quality.

Some of the areas where improvement is called for include: A police of piecemeal program of plant maintenance which reflects that adequate financial resources had not been applied to building maintenance, the high school suffered from the lack of good custodial care.

Limited space in the high school building facility restricted the possibility of program enrichment by the addition of new courses to curriculum, and no space for a teachers' workroom.

The central library in the high school and room libraries in the elementary school contained ample number of books to meet standards, but the report questioned the quality of some books and placings for support of instructional program.

The disparity between the number of old books and new acquisitions reflecting that the library program had suffered over a period of years from the lack of a well-planned acquisition program.

The elementary school principal being assigned teaching responsibilities for almost all day in addition to his administrative duties.

Two certified teachers given assignments for which they had not completed an approved program of teacher training.

The report concluded by stating: "Using the evidence for needed school improvements as indicated by the district's recent self-evaluation report, in addition to the contents of the current report, the district (with the cooperation of the administration, teachers, and community), should be able to establish realistic procedures for more substantially meeting standards."

### Free Inoculations Offered To All Mills County Pre-School Children

Free inoculations for red measles or polio and for DPT (diphtheria and whooping cough) will be offered on Saturday, July 12 to all Mills County children from 1 to 6 years of age, according to M. A. Childress, M. D., city health officer.

These inoculations will be given between 1:00 and 3:00 p. m. in the Nurse's office in the Elementary School building in Goldthwaite.

The measles vaccine will be administered by a jet injector which implants the vaccine under the skin by air pressure and is virtually painless. It is being supplied by the Texas State Health Department and the program is sponsored by Dr. Childress, R. Glynn Raley, D. O., county health officer, and Mrs. Lillian Stokes, R. N., county school nurse.

The inoculations are believed to give lifetime protection against the diseases named. While red measles formerly was not considered dangerous, the New York Times recently reported that it is responsible for a mysterious deadly disease of the brain and central nervous system which kills 100 American children each year.

Children to be inoculated must be accompanied by a parent, or by another adult with permission signed by the parent.

### \$76,000 Social Security Benefits Paid To County Residents Annually

Monthly benefits totaling \$76,000 were being paid to residents of Mills County as of the end of 1968, according to Glen Matt, manager of the Brownwood Social Security Office.

This is an annual rate of \$1,000.

Throughout the nation, monthly benefits payable at the end of 1969 amounted to nearly \$1 billion, about \$350 million higher than a year before.

Matt continued, "About three-fourths of the increase resulted from higher rates authorized by 1967 amendments to the Social Security Act. The remainder of the increase was due to a greater number of beneficiaries."

By the end of May 1969, social security had paid more than twenty-five million people each month—1 out of every 8 Americans.

In Mills County there were 22 beneficiaries, and unless the population of the county changed considerably since the 1960 Federal census, this would mean about 1 of every 100 people receive social security benefits.

The public continues to look for social security as just a program for old people," Matt said, "but in Mills County people under age 60 receive benefits."

Nation-wide, monthly payments to the family of a worker who dies leaving a widow and two or more children range from \$22.50 to \$434.40 a month.
