Beard has been superintendent here since 1962, and effective July 15. He has been superintendent at Goldthwaite from 1945 until 1956 when he moved to El Paso. He came from Lometa to Goldthwaite.

Horton stated that the school would move within a few days and will live in Star House owned by the school district.

The Goldthwaite High School Class of 1939 held its first reunion on Saturday, July 5, at the Holiday Inn at Brownwood, Texas. Seventy-one persons attended, including thirty-three class members and their guests.

Activities of the evening included a 6:00 p. m. "Get Acquainted Hour," followed by a dinner with program, and informal visiting late into the night.

The reunion was a result of visits to Texas by Duward Langford about a year ago. As he visited he secured addresses of class members and talked about getting together. Assisting him in plans were his sister, Clorie Gill, and Frances Calder, Eugene Dyas, Herbert Faulkner, and Thelma Mauldin.

Master of Ceremonies for the dinner hour was Herbert Faulkner, class vice-president, assisted by Dr. Joe Bailey Kerby, class president. Oda Daniels said the invocation. Dinner music was several piano selections played by Bill Laughlin, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Laughlin.

Herbert Faulkner read excerpts from issues of "The Goldthwaite Eagle" published in 1939—the emergence of television, the approach of World War II, dedication of the Goldthwaite-San Saba bridge with free barbecue, prices like bananas at 10¢ a dozen and choice steak at 17¢ a pound. Forgotten school events were recalled by reading from "The High School Herald," a school column published in the Eagle.

Dr. Joe Bailey Kerby read the class prophecy, and Mrs. Delton Barnett, class sponsor, led in singing the school song.

A popular center of interest was a wall on which members posted pictures of children and grandchildren, old class pictures, letters from absent classmates, news clippings, and other memorabilia. Another was a United States map with markers locating members of the class.

Students posed for a class picture, along with Mrs. Delton Barnett. Photographer was Tommy Collier, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rex Collier.

In a brief business meeting the class decided to meet again in five years. Appointed to head a planning committee for that reunion were Mrs. Sumter Gerald and Mrs. Dick Long.

"The Goldthwaite Eagle," on May 19, 1939, called this graduating class of forty-eight students the largest in Goldthwaite history. In the class were




Penny Walker On Dean's Honor List At Texas Tech

announced by Milton Schwartz, president of the board.


Mr. Davis took over his duties here on Wednesday of this week, and he hopes to move his family here by August 1, as soon as housing becomes available.




