

Officials Take Long Hard Look School Budget For Next Year

Goldthwaite School Trustees administrative officials are making a careful study of the new 1969-70 school budget as they take a long hard look at financing the school's operations for the coming year.

The proposed budget for the school year is \$284,343.00, carries a price tag of some \$90 over the amount spent last year, with the state's part of the increase listed at about \$14,000.00, leaving the local portion of the increase over \$22,000.

The Teacher pay raise passed by the legislature this year accounts for \$26,000.00 of the increase, school officials announced.

To meet the current budget of \$115,803.00 must be raised by the local district.

School officials point out that to meet this cost the tax valuations must be raised \$2,500,000.00, or about 50 per cent, at the local maintenance tax rate of \$1.25.

Tax reductions for this year total only \$5,318,000.00. The tax rate last year was \$1.80 for local maintenance and bond retirement combined.

With the proposed re-evaluation this rate could be lowered to \$1.55, with \$1.25 for local maintenance and 30¢ for debt service.

As a comparison officials cite the following example.

A person with a \$10,000.00 valuation in 1968 paid \$180.00 in school tax. Under the new proposal the same person would pay at the rate of \$1.55 on \$15,000.00 valuation, or \$225.00.

Two Killed And Six Injured In Three Car Smash-Up Sunday

Two persons were killed and six others were injured in a three car smash-up here Sunday afternoon about 4:45 on North Fisher St.

Highway Patrolman Dwain Cohn reported the accident happened just north of the city limits. Cohn and Robert Robertson of the Mills County Sheriff's department investigated the accident.

Officials reported that Barton E. Eppler, 66, of Gorman, driver of one automobile, and his sister, Mrs. Mary Mehaffey, 63, also of Gorman, were pronounced dead at the scene. They were taken to the Wilkins Funeral Home and later transferred to Gorman for burial services.

Eppler's wife, Pauline, 63, and her two sisters, Bertha M. Gates, 73, Pampa, and Edna B. Nunnally, 77, of Causey, New Mexico, all passengers in the car, were injured. They were all taken to Childress Clinic and Hospital by Wilkins Ambulance.

According to officers the Eppler car collided on a slight curve with one driven by Sgt. Larry E. Rose, 20, of Killeen.

Rose and his wife, Frances, 16, were taken to the local hospital and later taken to Fort Hood Hospital.

The third car in the accident was driven by Mrs. Latrelle F. Huggins of Brownwood. She is the mother of Mrs. Rose and was following the Rose car.

Investigators said the Eppler car was headed north on U. S. 183 while the other vehicles were traveling south when the accident occurred.

Mrs. Gates has since been transferred to an Austin hospital. Mrs. Eppler was transferred to a hospital at Gorman.

Mrs. Nunnally remained in the hospital here and her condition Tuesday afternoon was described as fair by Dr. M. A. Childress.

Mills County voters will cast their ballots in the special amendment election next Tuesday, August 5, on nine proposed changes to the Texas Constitution.

Polls will be open from 8 a. m. until 7 p. m.

Voters in this county will cast their ballots in five voting boxes only, according to announcement by County Judge Cecil Egger, to comply with changes ordered by the Commissioners' Court for this special election. The Court ordered the election to be held in five voting boxes instead of the customary 13 which are the regular voting boxes.

The following schedule of voting boxes and areas involved was adopted:

All residents in Commissioners' precinct 1 and the area of precinct 4, East of Pecan Bayou, will vote in Goldthwaite Box 19.

Those living in Commissioners' precinct 4, West of Pecan Bayou, will vote at the Ridge Box 16.

Those residing in commissioners' precinct 2 will vote at Center City Box 5.

In commissioners' precinct 3, the election will be held in Mullin Box 8, and Priddy Box 10.

Following is a brief outline of the nine amendments and the order in which they appear on the official ballot.

No. 1—to delete obsolete provisions from the constitution.

No. 2—to authorize a \$3.5 billion water revenue bond issue for financing the state's share of a \$9 billion statewide water plan.

No. 3—to raise the present \$4,800 a year salary of state legislators to the state-paid maximum level of district judges (\$18,000) and give the lieutenant governor and house speaker half the pay of the governor (about \$20,000 a year).

No. 4—to exempt non-profit water supply corporations from taxation.

No. 5—to raise the public welfare outlay limit from \$60 million to \$80 million a year.

No. 6—to raise the constitutional interest rate limit on some state government bonds.

No. 7—to provide for assistance payments to survivors of volunteer firemen, police and Texas Youth Council employees killed on duty.

No. 8—to authorize an additional \$200 million in Texas Opportunity Plan student loan funds.

No. 9—to provide for annual legislative sessions.

He made the announcement to let residents of the area know what number to call in case of fire since it is not listed in the regular directory at this time.

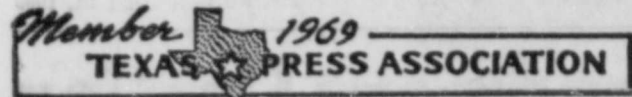

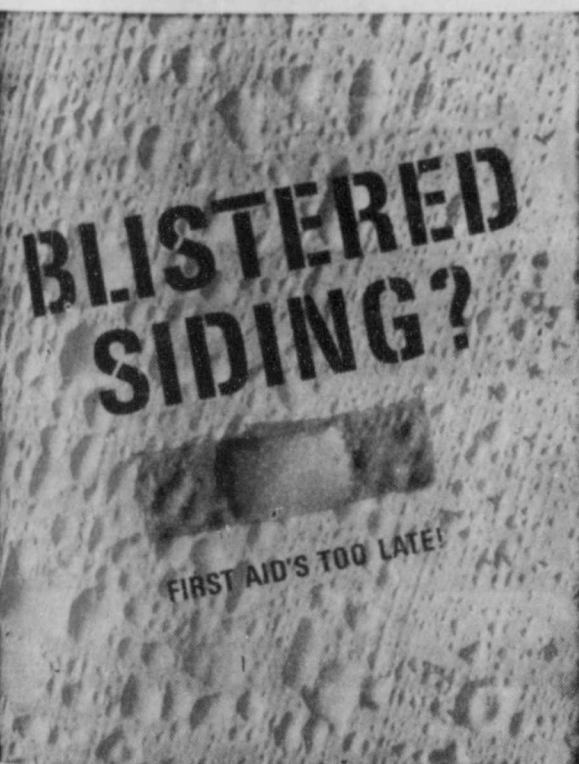

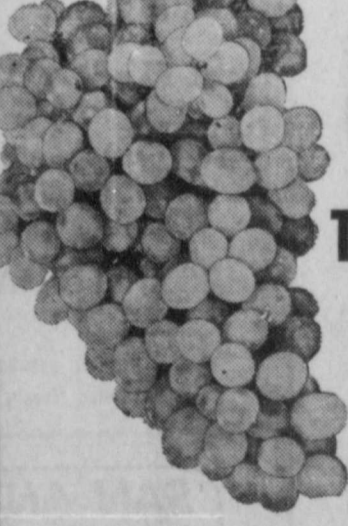
