Forty-Six GHS Eagles Report For First Workout Of New Grid Season

Forty-six GHS Eagles reported at Eagle Field Monday morning for the first practice of the 1969 football season. Coach Les Johnson announced he expects two or more to begin play when school starts.

The Eagles are going through workout sessions daily through this week and part of next week as they get ready for the opening of the new grid season. Regular practice sessions are being held from 7 to 10 o'clock in the mornings and

the same time at night. Coach Johnson reports that team attitude, spirit of cooperation and their desire to win couldn't be better. This year's group of Eagles is a hard-working, determined team, he said.

Johnson is head coach of the Eagles, and he will have two assistant coaches working with him. Jerry McDonald will be coaching the line while Johnson concentrates on the backs. Randy Baker will handle the "B" team.

Bangs and Cross Plains are reportedly the two top-rated teams in the district again this year. The Eagles will be working toward defeating these two teams, stated Johnson.

As a matter of tradition, the Eagles will open their season play against the AA San Saba Armadillos. The opener will be played at San Saba Friday night, September 12.

Annexed to the Star Box 6 includes all area east and north of Elms Road, F. M. Road 572 and El Duncan road. The area west and south of these roads was annexed to Center City Box 4.

All new students who have not attended Goldthwaite Schools previously are asked to come to the High School or Elementary School Principal's office Friday morning between the hours of 8:00 and 10:00 a. m.

Buses will run regular routes on schedule on Wednesday, August 27, which will be the first full day of school, from 8:30 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. Lunchrooms will operate in both the elementary school and high school.

There will be assemblies at both schools at 8:30 a. m. The public is cordially invited and encouraged to attend. At this time new teachers will be introduced. Any announcements and regulations of the school will be discussed.

School officials are looking forward to a good school year. To be able to do this the school must have the cooperation of each and every individual of the school community, according to Supt. Davis.

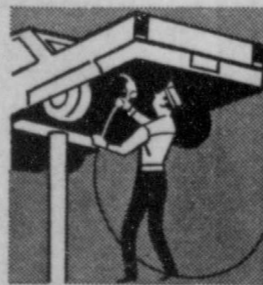

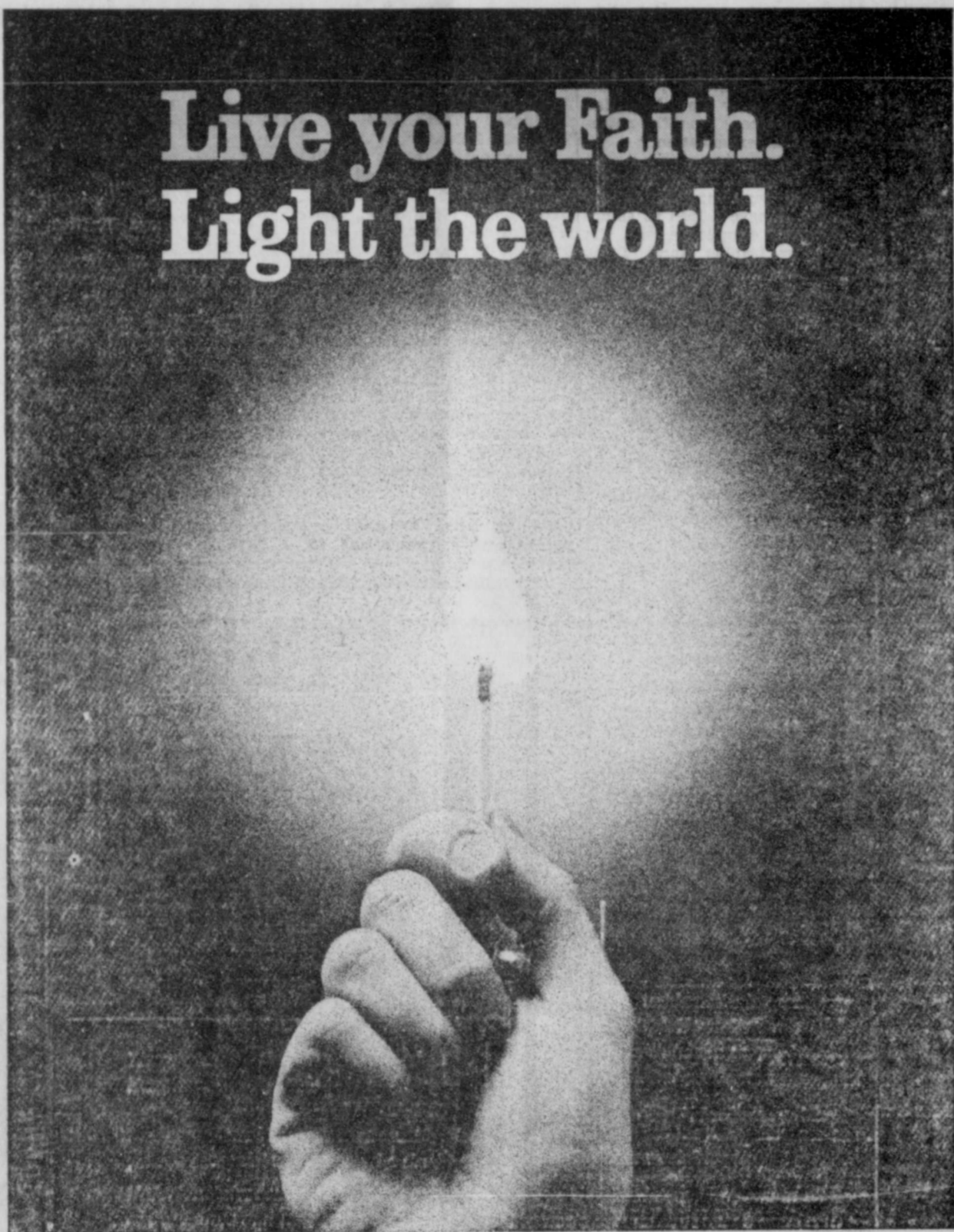

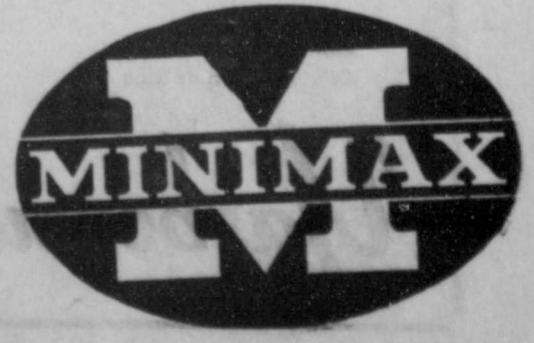

Hunting Seasons Set For 1969 By Parks And Wildlife Commission

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission in a regular meeting in Austin set the longest deer, turkey and dove seasons possible.

The traditional deer and turkey season in regulatory authority counties begins on the second Saturday of November which this year falls on Nov. 8—the earliest possible date in the month a second Saturday could fall. By the same token, next year's season will begin on Nov. 14—the latest date possible.

Dove hunters will get an additional hour of hunting daily because of the Daylight Savings Time. Last year dove hunters could start blasting away at 12 noon Central Standard Time or 1 p. m. Daylight Saving Time. This was eliminated from the Federal guidelines this year and in effect dove hunters can begin shooting an hour earlier.

Several standard changes were approved for all counties under regulatory authority. Of major importance was the postponement of setting this year's quail seasons and bag limits until the September Commission meet. Biologists said it was too early to set the seasons when many factors could still influence this year's population.

Below is a wrapup of the hunting seasons and bag limits as set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

Whitewing dove seasons will be Sept. 6-7 in Brewster, Brooks, Cameron, Culberson, Dimmit, El Paso, Hidalgo, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Jim Hogg, Kenedy, Kinney, La Salle, Maverick, Presidio, Starr, Terrell, Val Verde, Webb, Willacy and Zapata Counties along the Rio Grande.

Mourning dove season will be Sept. 1 through Oct. 30 in the North Zone and Sept. 20 through Nov. 16 in the South Zone except in those counties having a white-winged hunt where it will be Sept. 6-7 and from Sept. 20 through Nov. 16.

Bag limit on both species will be 10 per day and 20 in possession. A bag and possession limit of both species will be permitted during the concurrent season. Shooting hours for dove will be 12 noon local time to sunset.

Following is a summary of the major harvest stipulations in the Possum Kingdom regulatory authority area which includes Mills County.
