The following schedule for the Star Tigers has been released by Tidwell. The games will start at 8 p. m. until November when the time will change to 7:30.

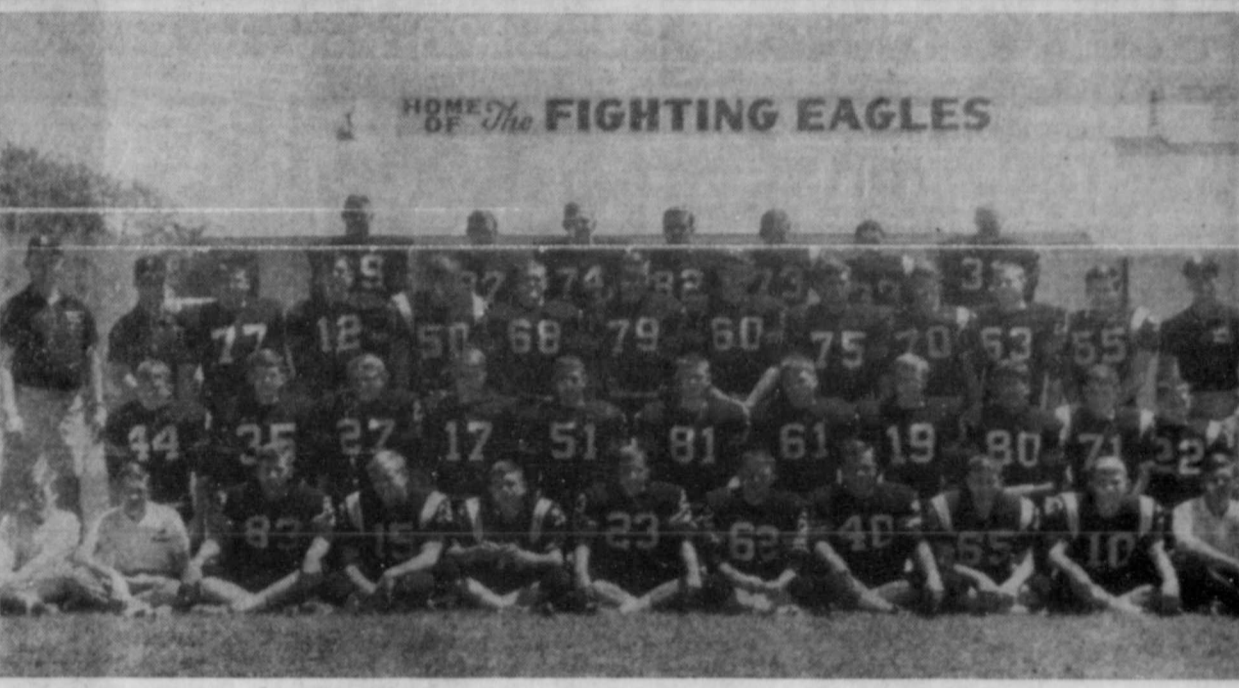

Eagles Open Season Friday Night At San Saba Against AA 'Dillos

School and town spirit is high and team attitude is good as the GHS Fighting Eagles prepare to officially open their 1969 season, this Friday night, September 12, at San Saba. Kick off time for the big game is 8:00 p. m.

San Saba has defeated the Eagles the past three years in their traditional season opener. Last year the AA Armadillos took home a 23-0 victory.

The Harris rating system favors San Saba over Goldthwaite by three touchdowns in Friday night's game, and Eagle Head Coach, Leslie Johnson, anticipates a real challenging contest. San Saba offers a much better offense, but their defense is about par with last year, stated Johnson.

Last Thursday night the Eagles scrimmaged at Ballinger and seemed to be shaping up good. They moved the ball well and were really aggressive, according to Johnson. They seemed to have quite a bit of trouble with fumbles and pass interceptions, but these are trouble spots that just have to be ironed out, said the coach. He reports the best team attitude from the boys that he has had all year.

Reggie Robbins, starting fullback, suffered a knee injury at Ballinger, but it is hopeful that he will get to see some action at San Saba Friday night. Robin Reid broke his arm in an early practice session, but has been present at all workouts and may get to play in the "B" Eagles' first game. Johnson reports no further injuries other than the usual bumps and bruises.

Coach Johnson has named the following Eagles as the probable starting line-up against San Saba:

Johnny Johnson will be quarterback and Reggie Robbins or Danny Sutherland will be fullback. In the halfback positions will be Joe Dan Hardgrave and Eric Wright.

Gerald Hale will fill the center spot, and Sam Watson and Leland Knight will be guards. Tackles will be Mac Casbeer and Ronnie Wetterman, and Kennon McLean and Jeff Stewart will be positioned as ends.

Defensive starters will include Scott McLean, Richard Scott, Gary Weidebusch, Joe Hudson and Mike Covington.

Reserve seat tickets for the San Saba game were about half

sold Tuesday morning, and will be available until noon Friday at the Production Credit Association office, according to Supt. Gilbert Davis.

Full season reserve seat tickets for the Eagles' home games are still available in a small amount at the PCA office. They will go off sale at noon Friday, September 19.

Supt. Davis also stated that all bids for parking space along the inside fence at Eagle Field must be turned to him before 12:00 noon Thursday (today).

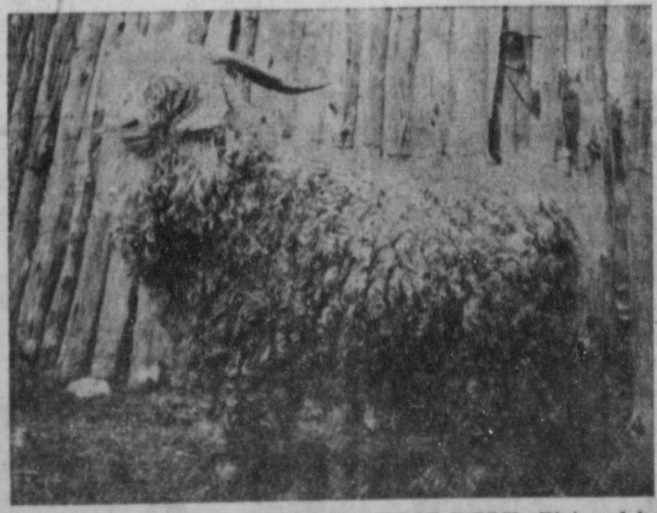

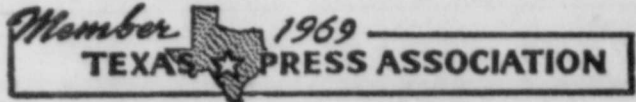

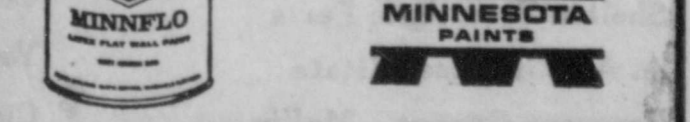

News About Social Security

Some employees and self-employed do not realize that only in case of disability can they freeze their earnings record for social security, Glen McNatt, of

the Brownwood Social Security Office, says a number of people who are not disabled have inquired recently about fixing their earnings level at the highest rate so as to leave out periods of low earnings.

They know that the higher their average, the more their retirement pay will be, and they are concerned lest their average be reduced by periods of low wages or low net profit from self-employment.

McNatt explained that five years of lowest earning are automatically dropped from the average of every worker, disabled or not. A worker who becomes disabled before retirement age, however, whose illness or injury meets all requirements for establishing a period of disability, can and should freeze his earnings record to keep his average (for the rest of the time besides the five years dropped) from being lowered. A freeze makes it unnecessary to average the time while disabled with the rest of the time.

"The number of years which must be used in figuring people's average earnings varies," McNatt said. "The older workers' earning are averaged over a shorter period than are earnings of younger workers. In this way older workers have an advantage. Establishing periods of disability when there are little or no earnings helps the worker maintain his higher average on which his social security payment will be based."

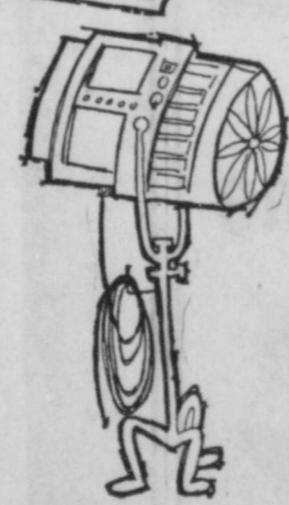

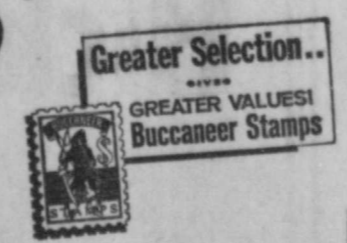
