

## Council And Engineer To Take Another Look Monday At Sewer Expansion

Members of the City Council and Engineer, Bob King, will take another close look Monday night at the proposed sewer system expansion that has been under study.

The plan as announced last week would be for the city to begin sewer system improvements on a pay as you go basis with customers sharing a small part of the cost and without a property tax increase.

The proposal under study by the council and citizens of the town during the past two weeks included the first phase would include three projects to be done over a two year period and costing an estimated \$50,000.

Projects and areas were selected on the most pressing need to provide service to the most families. The three include: 1—Alley between East Front Street and Lynch Street; 2—Proctor Drive and Live Oak Street System; (this would not include Hannah Valley Road at this time, which could be added at a later date); and 3—Pine and Maple Street System. Number two and three are both located in the Northwest area of the city where the need has been the most pressing.

Money to pay for the work would come from the following sources: Use \$6,500.00 cash on hand from the sewer fund for the first year. Also an estimated \$15,000.00 from the electric fund each year. Customers would be charged \$150.00 for connecting to the main. This would cover only connecting to the main on a cost share basis for the project and would not include the customer's service line to the mains. And, monthly sewer charges and garbage fees would be raised to double the small amount they are at present. These two items, it was pointed out by officials, are long overdue since present collections from the two sources are only about one half the amount that it costs the city to provide this service to customers.

W. C. Barnett, city manager, and some members of the council have announced that a number of interested citizens have commented favorably and are discussing the proposed sewer improvements since tentative plans were announced in the Eagle last week.

Residents of the areas covered in the proposals and all citizens of Goldthwaite are invited to express their views to members of the council or the city manager and to ask any questions that they may have regarding the matter.

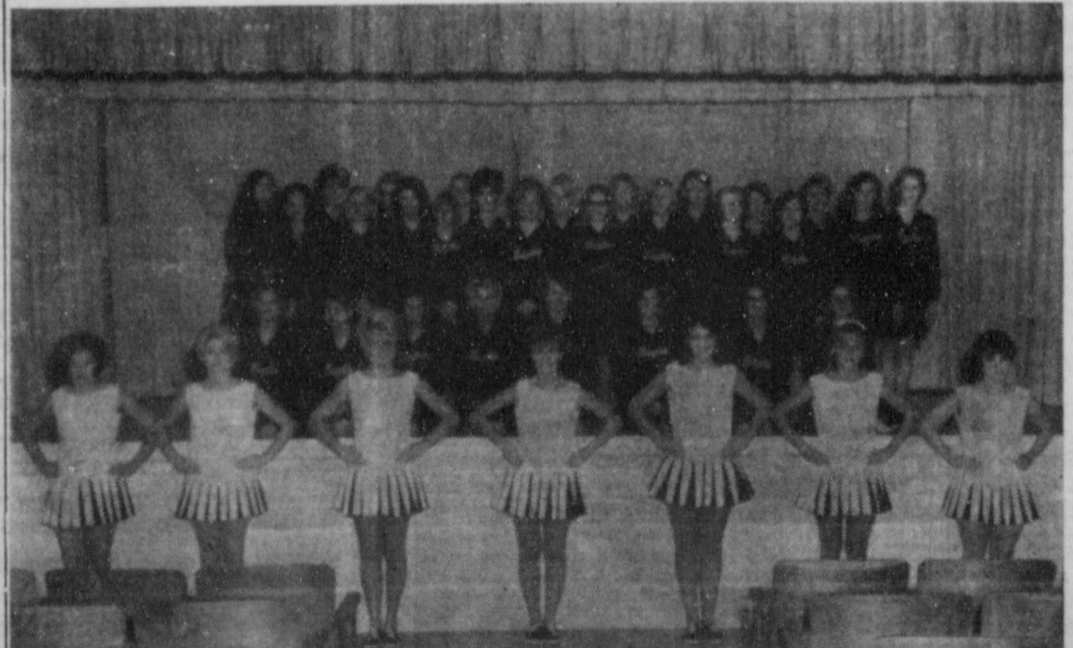

## Bond Sales Report For Mills County

Saving Bonds sales in Mills County during the month of August totaled \$1,294, according to County Chairman W. P. Duren. The year-to-date sales totaled \$16,331 for 27 per cent of the 1969 goal of \$60,000.

During August total sales of E & H Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Texas amounted to \$15,376,241 — an increase of 6.8 per cent over sales during August of 1968. Last year sales in Texas totaled \$14,390,299 during the month. Year-to-date sales totaled \$119,638,086 for 70 per cent of the 1969 goal of \$170.1 million.

Over the Nation the sale of Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares for the first eight months totaled \$3,277 million
