Special Christmas Lighting Program Under Consideration

Plans for a more elaborate Christmas Lighting program and contest for Goldthwaite and surrounding area were discussed at the last meeting of the Garden Club.

Council Votes To Undertake Expansion of Sewer Facilities

The City Council meeting in regular session Monday night in the City Hall voted to go ahead and undertake the sewer extension program that has been under study the past month.

Action was taken after the matter was gone over and discussed further with their engineer, Bob King, of Fort Worth, who met with the council for the Monday night session.

Before voting to go ahead the council heard a report from the

engineer about the basic choices available to the city in undertaking the improvements. Two basic choices discussed were to do the job by issuing bonds or by using funds the city now has on hand and can get in the future.

It was decided to start the program on a pay as you go basis with the customers sharing some of the cost of the project, as had been outlined during the past two weeks, with no

increase in the property tax. The first phase will include three projects to be done over a two year period at an estimated cost of \$50,000.

Projects and areas have been selected on the most pressing need to provide service to the most families. The three include: 1 — Alley between East Front Street and Lynch Street; 2—Proctor Drive and Live Oak Street System; (this would not include Hannah Valley Road at this time, which could be added at a later date); and 3—Fine and Maple Street System. Number two and three are both located in the Northwest area of the city where the need has been the most pressing.

An engineer with some members of the city crew will start next week to make surveys and establish grades for the layout. Actual construction is expected to get underway about November 1, on the first project which is the smaller of the three.

As work progresses on the first project further engineering will be done and preparations made for the second one which will require some lift stations in the system.

The program as approved by the council will be a continuing process with a certain amount of work done on the sewer system expansion and extensions on an annual basis.

Official statement including financial details for the project as approved by the council is being prepared by city officials and is to be published in the Eagle next week.

Dr. Gordon Clinard To Speak At Mills Baptist Ass'n. Convention

Dr. Gordon Clinard, president of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, will speak at the eighty-first annual convention of Mills Baptist Association on Monday, October 13, at Mullin Baptist Church.

Messengers from the eight Southern Baptist churches in Mills County will assemble at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon for the first of two sessions to hear reports of the past year's work, elect officers and plan work for the new year. Representing the state convention, Dr. Clinard, who is also pastor of the First Baptist Church in San Angelo, will outline convention proposals for the seventies. His message will come in the evening session and will conclude the

meeting. Other speakers will be Dr. Clifford Nelson, Heart of Texas Area Missions Secretary, bringing the keynote address in the first session, and Dale Gore, pastor at First Baptist Church, Goldthwaite, and moderator of the Association, elected to bring the annual sermon. Representatives from Howard Payne College, the Baptist Student Union of Tarleton State College and Heart of Texas Baptist Encampment — all receiving support from the churches of the association — will also be heard.

A report of the Mexican mission, organized this year in Goldthwaite, will be presented. The afternoon session, beginning at 4:00, will conclude at 6 o'clock. Women of the Mullin church will serve supper to all messengers and guests. The convention will resume at 7:15

The entire Mills County area received a heavy downpour of rain last Saturday afternoon and night measuring all the way up to over seven inches.

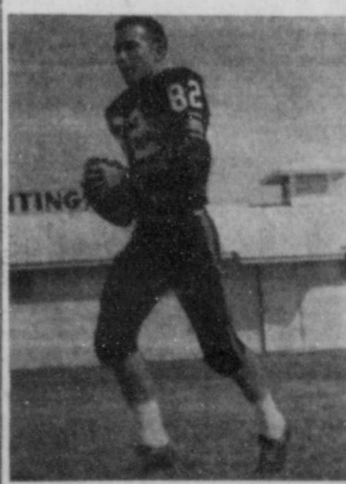
Lake Merritt reportedly caught three feet of water from the rainfall and many stock tanks over the county were filled and running over.

Reports to the Eagle office were from three to seven and one half inches in scattered sections of the county.

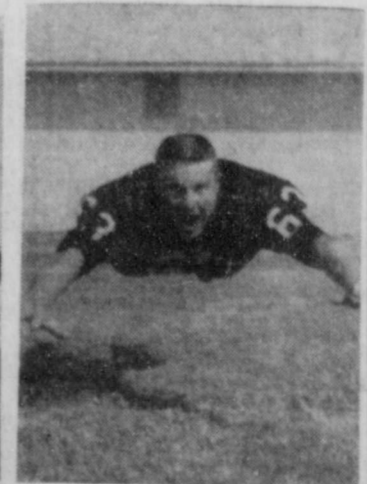

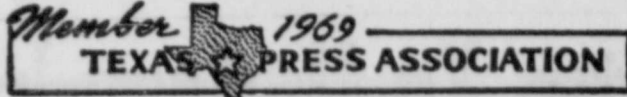

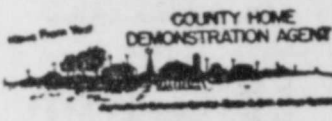
Bobby K. Masters Graduates From Officers Trng. School

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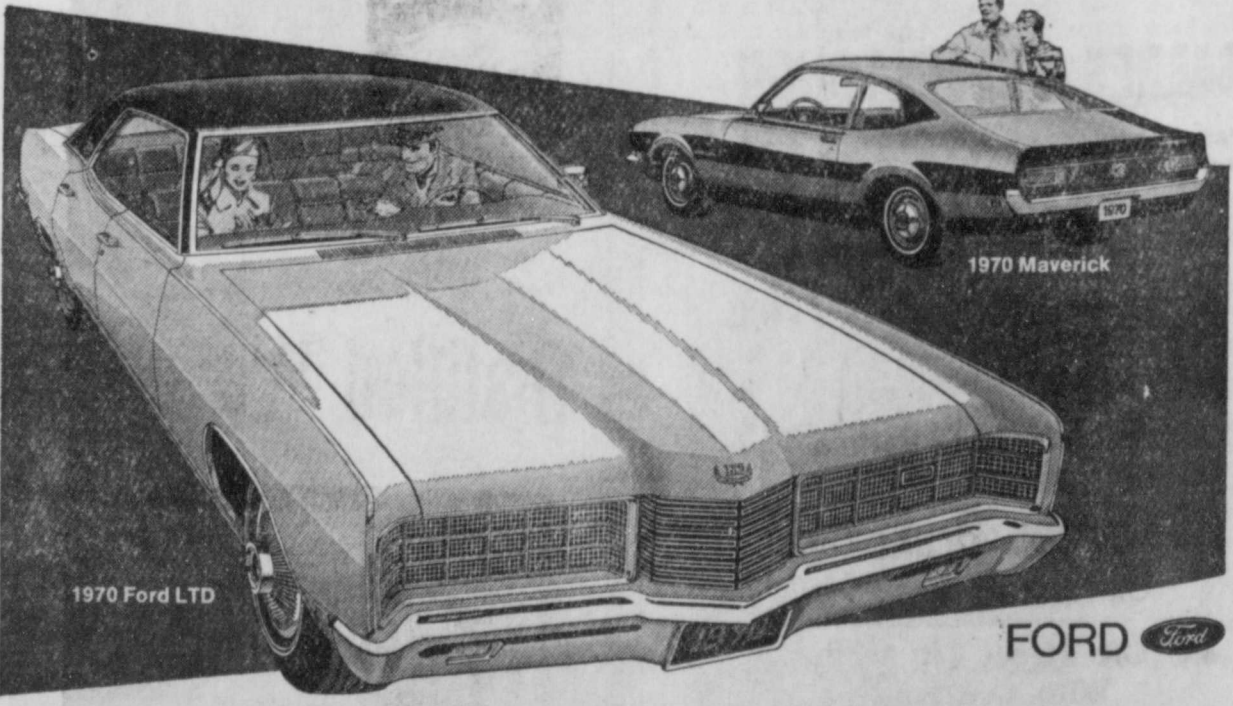

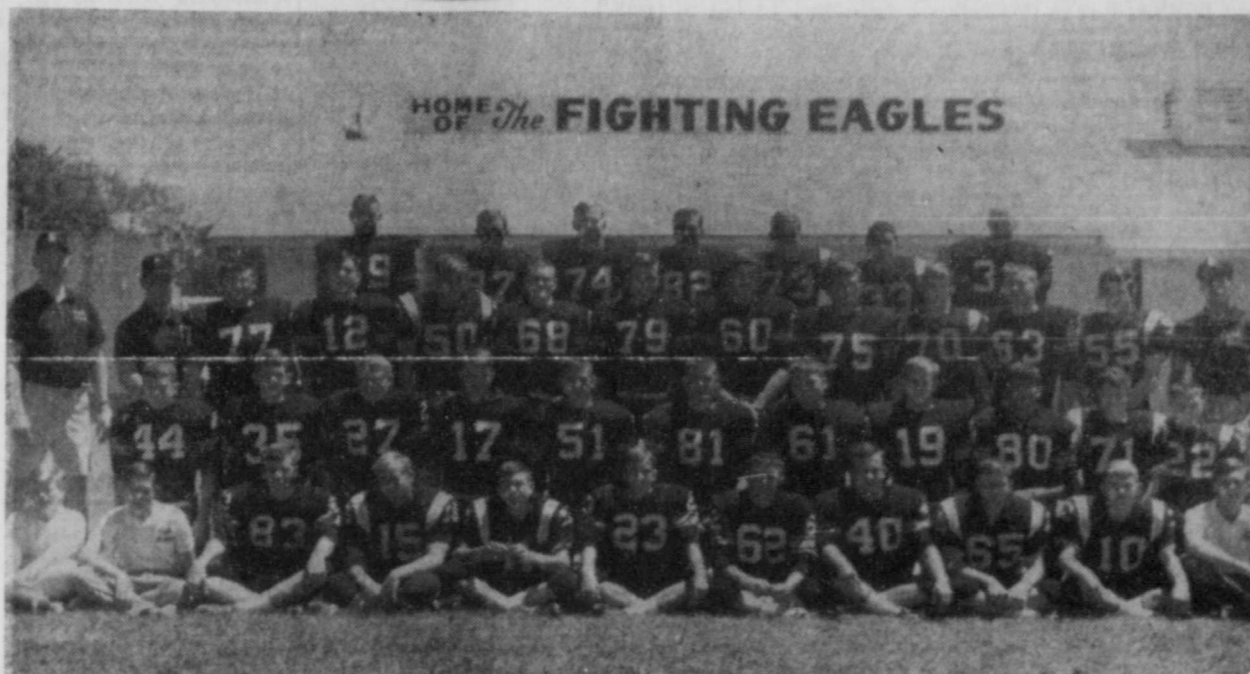

Plans For Christmas Lighting Outlined At Garden Club Meeting

CHRISTMAS LIGHTING IN GOLDTHWAITE

"From Alaska and Florida, from Hawaii and Canada, from many out-of-the-way places come reports that the pleasant custom of lumanarias at Christmas time has spread across the world. It began back in early days of Spanish colonization of New Mexico. Lacking festival lights, the colonists improvised and made little bon-

fires of bright burning pinon wood. These little fires on Christmas Eve lighted the route of the procession to the village church and were placed on pathways in front of homes "So the Christ Child could find his way."

"In later years, when caravans from Mexico and the East brought to New Mexico dishes and other breakables that were wrapped in paper, the women saved the bright wrappings and fashioned them into gay little Chinese lanterns to decorate their patios or homes for fiestas and other festive occasions.

"Finally, with the coming of paper bags and commercial candles, New Mexicans improvised again. They substituted candles in paper sacks for the bonfire lumanarias. These are not lanterns, but rather symbolic little fires lit by simple folk whose hearts believe the Christ Child wanders softly through the night and blesses all who set a guiding light."

"The city of Albuquerque a few years ago took up the custom of lighting lumanarias and made it such a tremendous spectacle that thousands of people, cars and buses jam the streets on Christmas Eve to witness the spectacle of the lights. Tourists who have visited Albuquerque on Christmas Eve have taken the custom back to their home towns.

"It is amazing that such a simple device as a No. 8 or 10 paper sack, a vigil light or plumber's candle, and a couple of inches of sand for the bottom of the bag to rest the candle in could develop into such a popular and heartwarming custom.

"The Christmas lighting committee of the Goldthwaite Garden Club has made plans to urge every home and business establishment to display this custom in Goldthwaite this year. They are asking that everyone help in outlining the Courthouse grounds and the church lawns as well as their homes.

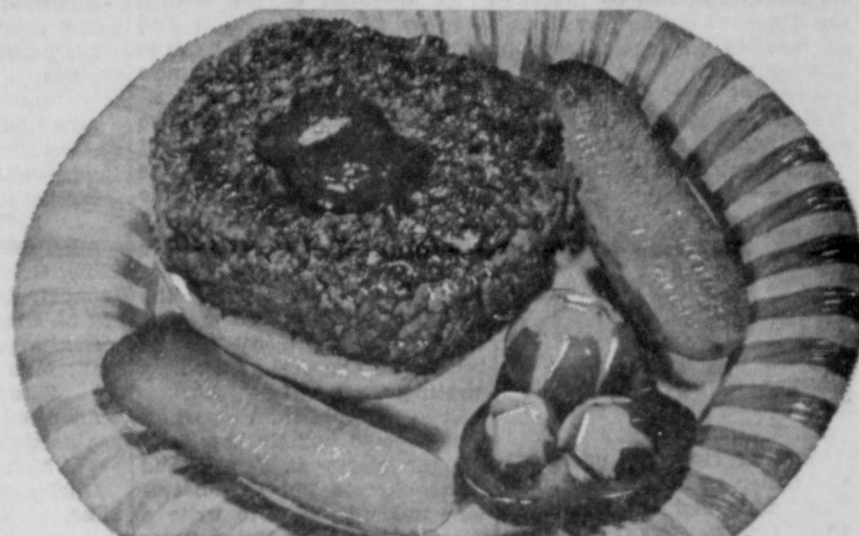

Increase In Sewer And Garbage Rates Approved By City Council

An increase in the sewer and garbage rates charged customers for this service by the city was approved by the City Council meeting in regular session Monday night.

Some of the present rates date back to 1935 and have been due a revision for a long time, it was pointed out as the council

took action to bring the charges up to date.

As approved by the council charges for sewer service and garbage collections will be raised to double the amount now being charged for this service.

Collections from these two sources have only been about one half the amount that it has been costing the city to provide this service to customers.

The new rates will be effective on January 1.

Ordinances establishing the new rates were ordered prepared and will be presented to the council for approval at the next meeting.

The City Secretary was instructed to write a letter to the Cable Vision Company regarding the poor service in reception experienced by local customers. Members of the council have been receiving many complaints regarding the Cable Vision service.

Monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments of the city were presented to the council by City Manager W. C. Barnett. He also presented quarterly treasurer's report.

The Council authorized the city manager to see about the purchase of a new pickup truck with an old one to be traded in.

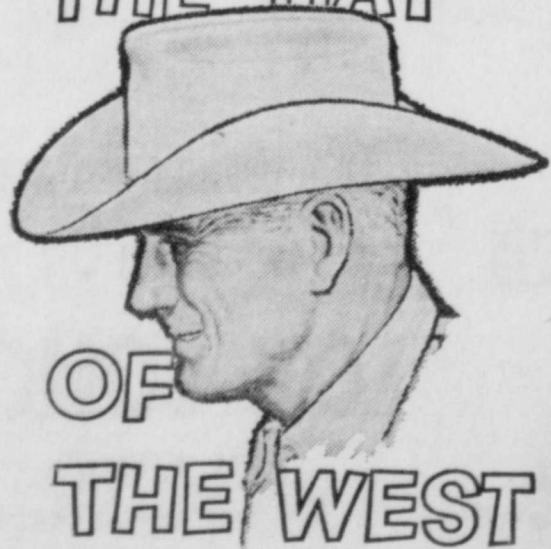

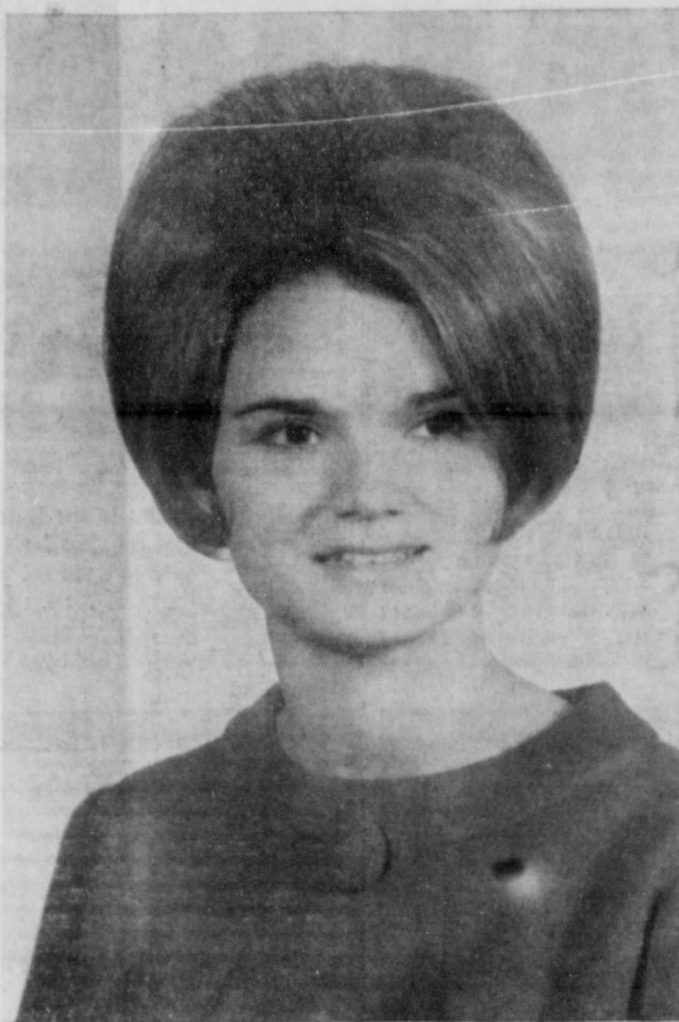
