

Residents Cautioned By Sheriff About Itinerant Exterminators

Local residents were reminded this week by Mills County Sheriff H. G. Brooks to be on alert about making trades for itinerant, or fly-by-night, exterminators who happen to be through town.

Word of caution came after the sheriff had received complaints from local residents who had experienced misrepresentations from itinerant exterminators in recent weeks.

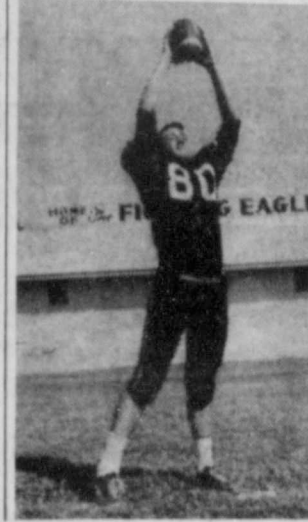
One case involved a team who hired a local lady a job for \$100 and cashed her two checks and left town. The two men, posing as a team with Dallas credentials, were arrested last Friday night and brought back to Goldthwaite by Sheriff Brooks and Texas Ranger Bob Favors, of Brady.

The men were charged in E. H. County Justice of the Peace court with theft of over \$50.00. They are in Mills County Jail with bond set at \$7,500.00 for each.

Brooks said the two men were in a car with Oklahoma license plates and were traced through Texas Department of Public Safety after three days of searching by the Sheriff and other law enforcement.

The only equipment the pair had for their supposedly term exterminating work was in their car, according to Brooks.

About a week earlier another man from Brown County, worked in Goldthwaite. He was picked up after they "sold" one party a job for \$100 and were in the process of working out a trade with another elderly couple.

Last Tuesday night the Goldthwaite Jr. High Eagles took a hard fought contest with the Blanket Jr. High team by a narrow 6-0 margin.

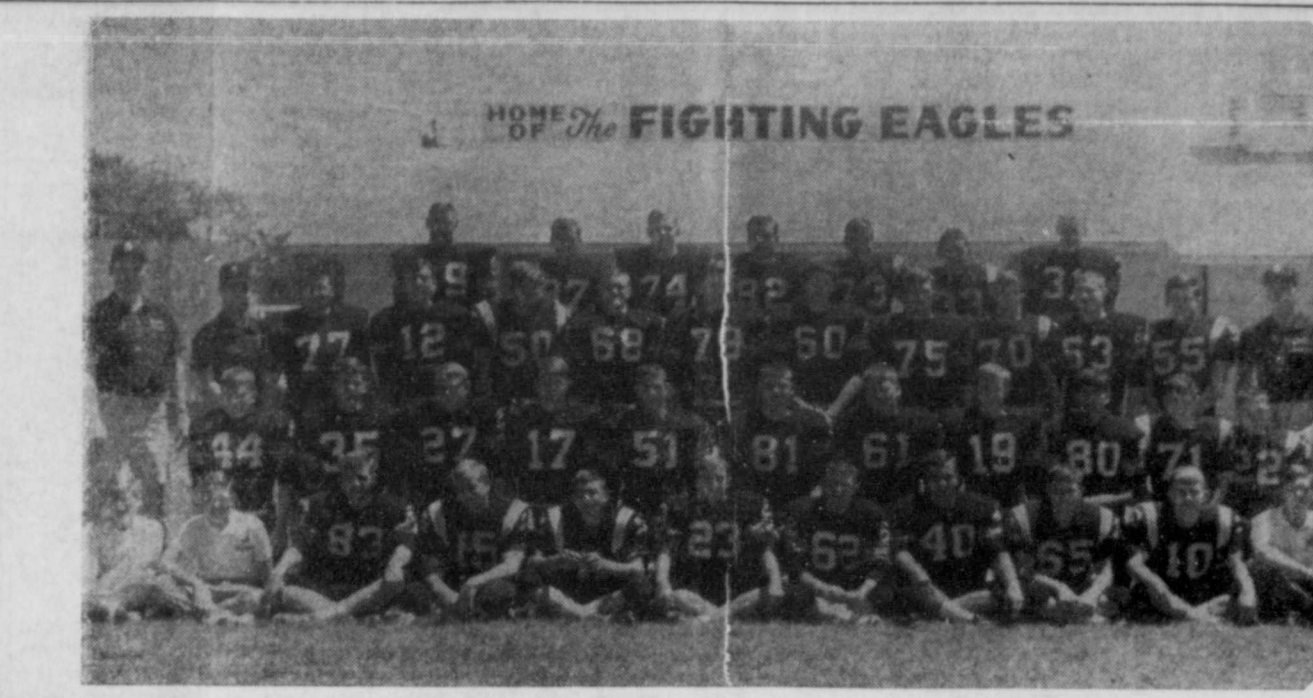

Cross Plains dumped Santa Anna 28-7, and Early, the fifth 9-A member, lost a non-district battle to Jim Ned, 27-20.

The Eagles travel to Cross Plains this Friday night, to match wits with the Buffaloes in what could very well be the decisive game for the district championship. The Eagles have to take this game to remain in the running for the title.

The Eagles scored twice in the next two minutes of play. Johnson booted a 25-yard field goal to place a 10-7 score on the board. On the Dragons' first and ten after the ensuing kickoff, Jeff Stewart intercepted a pass to set the Eagles up on their own 48 yard line. Johnson then completed a pass to Kennon McLean for about 30 yards and one to Stewart for eight yards. Johnson went over on a keeper play and kicked his own extra point to give the Eagles a 17-7 halftime lead.

After a scoreless third quarter, the Eagles poured on the steam and added two more TD's. Mack Casbeer recovered a Dragon fumble just seconds into the final period and the

Eagles were set up for another score. Johnson passed eight yards to Hardgrave in the end zone, and again kicked an extra point.

Joe Hudson plucked off another Bangs pass and the score came when Johnson handed off to Hardgrave who ran about twenty-five yards for the TD. The PAT was good to end the game at 31-7.

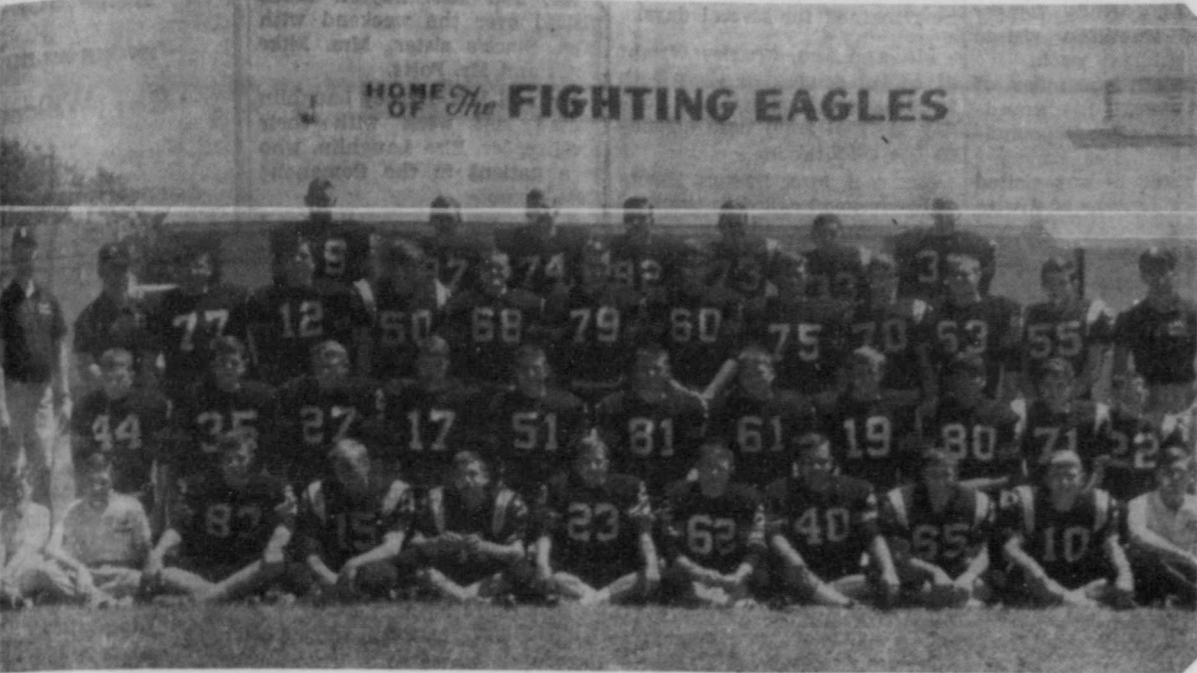

Parents will be especially interested in attending this event, because the program is to be "Understanding 4-H." Anyone interested in 4-H at Mullin is invited to attend, according to Mrs. John Brewer, organization leader.

Halloween will soon be here and where would Halloween be without the apple? This luscious fruit is as vital to the celebration as witches, broomsticks, and Jack-o'-lanterns. Apples for dunking are traditional at most Halloween parties.

Apples are good for tasty snacks, especially Caramel Apples. Here is an easy way to fix them.

Combine a one-pound package of dairy caramels and three tablespoons hot water in top of double boiler. Cook over boiling water, stirring frequently until caramels melt into a smooth sauce.

Wash 6 red apples, remove stems and insert a wooden skewer into each apple part way into stem end. Remove sauce

from heat and tilt pan. Holding each apple by the skewer, quickly twirl it in the sauce, remove from sauce and continue twirling to allow sauce to spread smoothly. Then dip bottom and/or sides in chopped nuts. Place apples, skewer side up, on lightly buttered cookie sheet and refrigerate until serving time.

There have been some requests for the recipe for the broccoli dish I took to the Goldthwaite H. D. Club luncheon so here it is:

RICE-BROCCOLI CASSEROLE
½ cup onions, chopped
1 cup rice
1 pkg. chopped broccoli
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 small jar cheese whiz
Cook onions with broccoli. Cook rice. Mix the vegetables, soups, and cheese whiz. Place rice in casserole as a lining for dish. Pour vegetable mixture over it and sprinkle with paprika. Bake at 375 for 10 minutes before serving. (This may be prepared a day or two ahead of time.)
