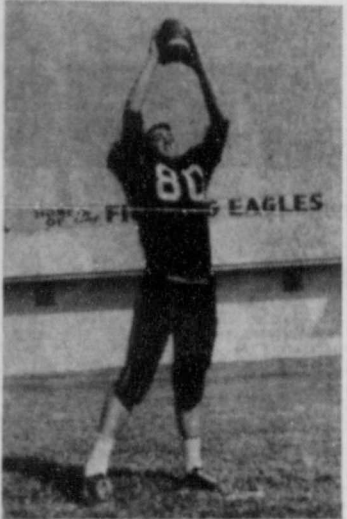
PHILIP GUY NICKOLS ATTENDS E. T. S. UNIVERSITY

The Cross Plains Buffaloes snatched the district 9-A lead from the GHS Fighting Eagles Friday night, when the two teams met on the Cross Plains field.

The Eagles boasted a 13-6 lead going into the final minutes of the game, but were faced with a fourth down situation deep in Buffalo territory. Eagle QB Johnny Johnson ran out of the end zone giving

The Eagles pulled ahead in the final period when Johnson again connected with McLean, and added a good kick. The loss put Goldthwaite 1-1 in district play and gives Cross Plains a 2-0 mark.

Lockwood Corp. And Sides Family To Introduce New Pecan Harvester

GERING, NEBRASKA (Special to The Eagle) — Lockwood Corporation and the Sides family of Goldthwaite, Texas, principals of Metal Masters Manufacturing, have combined efforts to introduce a new pecan harvester known as the Lockwood-Sides Model 480 Pecan Special.

The new machine will be demonstrated and exhibited at major pecan grower association conventions yet to be held in 1969.

Chief performance features of the Model 480 Pecan Special are simple, fast operation and extreme maneuverability achieved through floating rotary sweeper heads, hydrostatic drive, and three-wheel design.

In extensive testing in Texas, the machine consistently gave pickup 10% to 15% better than hand labor. It is able to operate

when there is grass cover up to eight inches high, and with twigs and small branches in the sweep area. Separation is through mechanical, vacuum, and double sizing and cleaning screens. The 300-lb. capacity rolling drum catch bin can be elevated and unloaded in a single operation.

Power is from a Wisconsin V-4D engine delivering 28 h. p. at 2400 r. p. m. The 480 Special can turn in its own wheelbase length of 124 inches because of a three-wheel design that has a single wheel at the rear. Low-profile of 66 inches in height permits work in young orchards and under mature trees with low-hanging branches. Sweep width is 48 inches.

Lockwood and Sides will carry out a joint marketing effort on the machine.

Loans a year ago were \$4,761,163.71 and at the time of bank call for October 21, 1969 they were up to \$5,269,336.63.

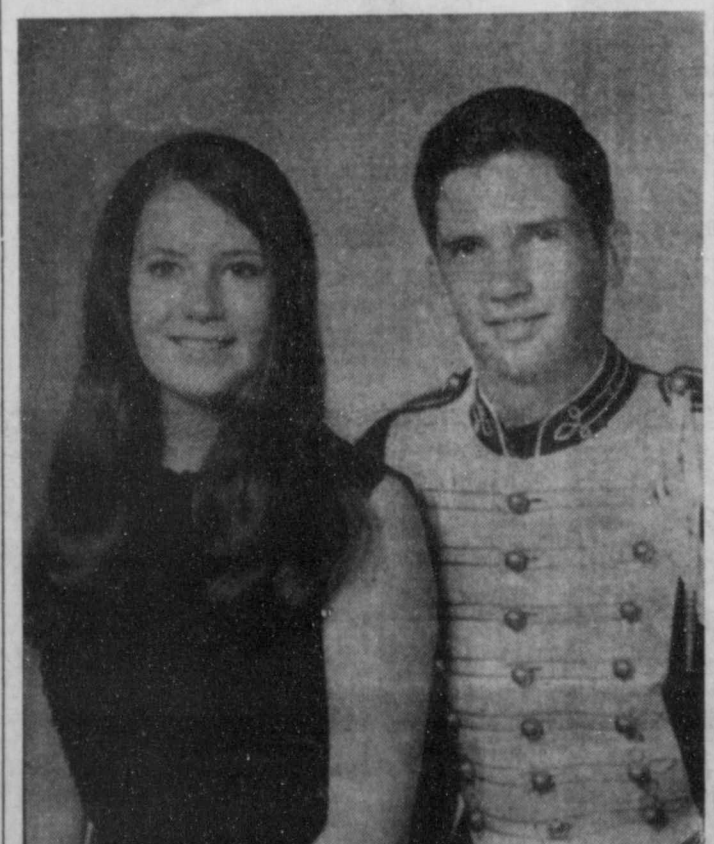
During the same period total resources went up from \$10,563,745.76 to \$11,559,876.11.
