Rev. and Mrs. Dale Gore attended the Baptist General Convention of Texas held in San Antonio last week.

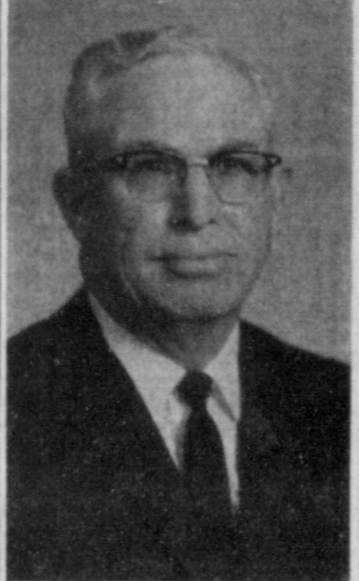

planning your holiday time. Food gifts from the kitchen are always appreciated by friends, neighbors, the postman, etc. One pound of fruit cakes and larger, decorated with candied fruits and nuts, and wrapped in cellophane are beautiful and most acceptable. Here is a recipe for one of the best fruit cakes I ever tasted.

FRUIT CAKE
1 lb. pitted dates, cut up
1 lb. chopped pecans
1/2 lb. candied cherries, cut up
1/2 lb. candied sliced pineapple, cut up
1 cup sugar
1 cup flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. nutmeg
4 eggs
1 tsp. vanilla

Mix cut up dates and fruit with coarsely chopped pecans. Sift dry ingredients and mix with fruit and nuts. Beat eggs with vanilla and pour over other ingredients. Mix well. Pack into pans. Bake at 250 for 2 hours, cool, remove from pan. Wrap in cellophane. Tie with ribbon and decorations.

HINTS FOR MAKING THE FRUIT CAKE

Line angel food pan with heavy brown paper, including tube. (Use tape or rubber band until batter is packed—remove band). You can grease paper or not. Teflon doesn't eliminate the need for paper. Do not use burnt pan. Batter must be packed to eliminate crumbling. One recipe makes 4 loaf pans or use the whole recipe in a large tube pan. Bake 2 hours for big cake—1 hour, 45 minutes for loaves. Must be accurate oven temperature. Cool cakes completely (leave overnight). Then peel paper which may stick around the edges. Peel carefully. Don't use cubed candied pineapple in syrup or batter. Buy the candied slices and cut up. Take color choice. The top may be decorated by removing from oven after 1 hour and returning to oven.

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Price-Support, Loan Payment Rates Announced For 1970 Upland Cotton

The U. S. Department of Agriculture, on October 31, 1969, announced 1970-crop upland cotton price-support loan and payment rates.

The national average price-support loan rate for Middling upland cotton at average locations has been set at 20.25 cents per pound for the 1970 crop. Price-support loans available to program cooperators for different individual qualities will be based on the Middling 1-inch cotton. This is the same rate as that applicable to the 1969 crop. The price-support payment to program cooperators has been established at 16.80 cents per pound. This payment is in addition to the price-support loan. It is the amount necessary

to provide producers at least 65 per cent of parity on cotton produced within the acreage permitted under the program. The payment is made to cooperators on acreage planted within the domestic allotment which is 65 per cent of the total farm allotment. The 1970 rate compares to a 1969 program price-support rate of 14.73 cents per pound.

This announcement, along with previous determinations, gives cotton producers basic information on next year's program prior to a mail referendum, December 1-5, on 1970-crop cotton marketing quotas. In the referendum, at least two-thirds of the upland cotton growers voting must approve marketing quotas before the essential features of the program can go into effect. If more than one-third of the growers vote "no," the only cotton program will be price support at 50 per cent of parity for growers who do not exceed their acreage allotment.

The carryover of upland cotton as of August 1, 1970, is expected to fall to the lowest level since 1953. In view of the small carryover, payments will not be offered in 1970 for diverting acreage from cotton. Special provisions for small farmers, however, will be continued.

Small farms, that is farms with allotments of 10 acres or less or with projected production from the allotment of 3,600 pounds or less, may plant the entire farm allotment and, in addition to the price-support payment on the domestic allotment, receive payment on 11.95 cents per pound on the project yield of 35 per cent of the farm allotment.

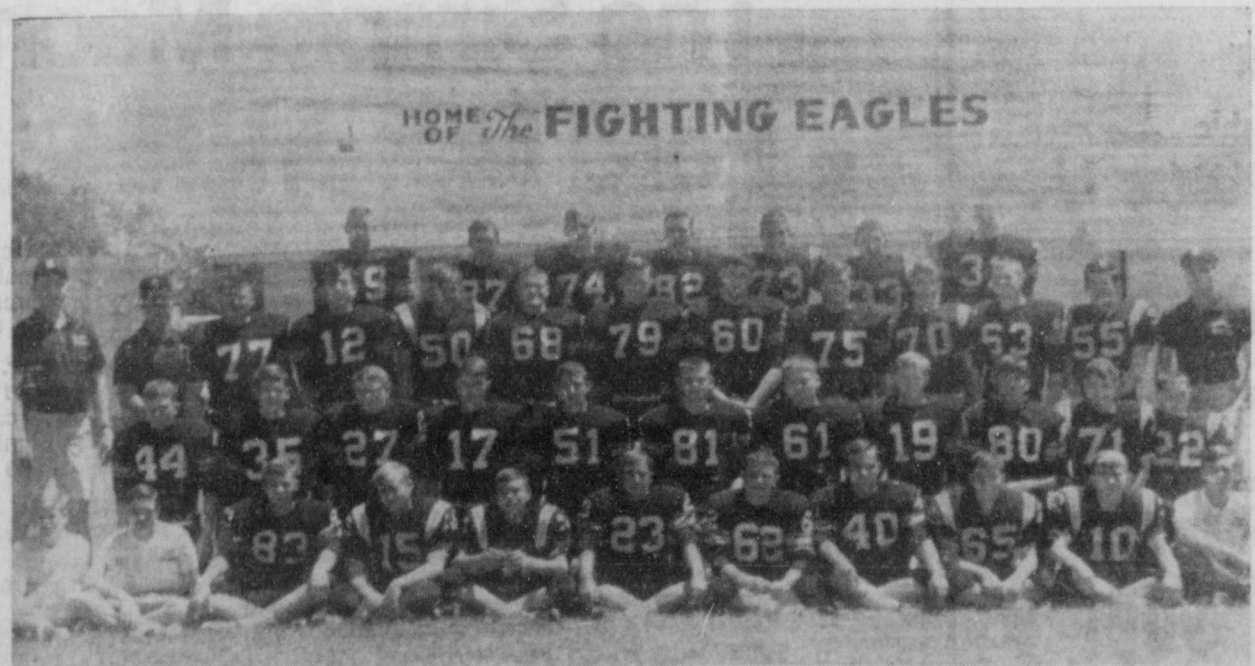

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

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Sheep And Goat Raisers Discuss Two Major Problems Of Industry

Two major problems which threaten the ranching industry of today were posed for discussion and consideration when the directors of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association met in a tri-yearly meeting in San Angelo October 20-21.

It was disclosed by members and directors of the Association that ranchmen over the state are deterred from engaging and continuing in the sheep and goat business because of predatory animals. In a resolution passed by the general session, the TS&GRA resolved that its individual members request their representatives and senators in Washington and Austin to seek funds for establishment of a Buffer Zone to prevent the movement of such predators into sheep and goat raising areas.

A second major problem threatening the ranching industry was viewed when guest speaker Senator W. E. (Pete) Snelson, 25th District of Texas, warned producers of the problems concerned with the next redistricting of the Texas Legislature in 1971.

"The five largest counties in the next redistricting will be able to control a majority in both the House and Senate and may well make it difficult for the rural people to have adequate representation," said Snelson.
