**Report To Mohair Council Indicates
Slump In Prices For 1969 Marketing**

If present mohair prices hold about steady through the end of the year, support payments to growers will be considerably less than on marketings made in 1967-68, reports Keister N. Adams, acting director of the livestock dairy division, ASCS.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture official told Mohair Council of America officials that through October 1, the overall average price paid on all mohair sold in 1969 was 63.8 cents per pound, compared with an overall average of 44.9 cents per pound paid through the first 10 months of 1968. In a report to the Mohair Council in San Angelo, Adams said the overall average price paid in 1969 was 18.9 cents per pound more than the price paid during the same 1968 period.

The payment rate on 1967-68 marketings ranged from 86.8 per cent of market return in 1967 to 71.2 per cent on 1968 marketings. Payment rate for mohair is expressed as a percentage and is applied to each grower's dollar returns from the sale of mohair. For example, under the 1968 program, producers received \$71.20 for each \$100 received in marketed mohair.

As the end of the market year approaches, many growers are under the impression that support payments on 1969 mohair will be fairly equal to 1967-68 payments. However, with simple average mohair prices being above 60 cents per pound through the first 10 months of the year, it now appears the support payment rate will not exceed 25 to 30 per cent, or producers will receive no more than \$25 to \$30 for each \$100 worth of mohair sold in 1969.

Many Goldthwaite people attended the football games Thanksgiving, some at Fort


Worth, some at College Station while others went to Georgetown and elsewhere, while a few went hunting and almost everybody made a genuine and enjoyable holiday of the time.
