City Council Orders Election To Be Held On Tuesday, April 7

The City Council meeting Monday night ordered the regular city election to be held on Tuesday, April 7, 1970.

Purpose of the election is to elect three aldermen for a regular two year term.

Members of the Council whose terms expire this year are: Hollis Wiggins, E. R. Bruce and Lester Geeslin.

Holdover members of the city official family are Mayor Ray Duren and Aldermen Carl Lettner and Harvey Parker.

Candidates will have until March 7, to file with City Secretary, Glynn Collier, and have their names printed on the official ballot for the election to be held on the first Tuesday in April.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business matters the council passed on third and final reading an ordinance granting a rate increase to Lone Star Gas Company for service to customers in Goldthwaite.

City Manager W. C. Barnett presented operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments for January. He also reported on tax collection.

Barnett also gave a progress report on sewer system improvements that are underway. The first phase located east of the railroad is nearing completion and some engineering has been done and grades established on the second phase which includes Hannah Valley Road, Live Oak Street, Proctor Drive and the entire Fairlawn Addition. Work will be started in that area this month and is expected to take about two years.

Mullin To Have City Election

Mayor A. R. Whisenhunt has ordered a regular city election for the City of Mullin to be held on Tuesday, April 7, being the first Tuesday in April.

The election is for the purpose of electing three councilmen for a regular two year term.

Councilmen whose terms expire are Carl Hohertz, Alvin Spinks and Bruce Scott. Holdover members are Ed Ferguson and G. I. Alldredge.

The election will be held in the Community Center Building, Mayor Whisenhunt stated.

1970 Cancer Crusade Goal For Mill County Set At \$1,431.00

The final chapter of the award-winning history of cancer can be written in the 70's, according to Don Dillmore, State Campaign Manager, Chairman of Dallas. Mr. Dillmore addressed the 31-county ACS volunteer delegates attending the Society's District Crusade meeting in Abilene, January 27, 1970. N. F. Harms of Goldthwaite represented the Mills County Unit at the meeting.

Mr. Dillmore, quoting Doctor James Grace, Director of Roswell Park Memorial Institute, said last year each person's share for cancer research was 91¢ as compared with \$125.00 for each person's share for the Vietnam war. He then reminded the delegates that the American Cancer Society had to turn down \$15 million in approved research grants because of lack of funds.

He said he believed cancer research held great promise in the 70's and cited possibilities such as blood tests to detect cancer through changes in or the absence of certain enzymes in the blood.

Mr. Dillmore said the Texas Crusade goal is \$3,000,000 and urged volunteers to carry the educational and fund raising Crusade into every Texas town.

N. F. Harms reported a crusade goal of \$1,431.00 for Mills County.

Stockholders Of Mills County State Bank Have Annual Meeting

Stockholders of Mills County State Bank held their regular annual meeting at the bank here last week Tuesday night when annual report was presented and directors and officers were elected.

W. P. Duren, president of the bank, reported on another record year for the financial institution that has served Mills County and this Central Texas Area for 81 years.

The 80th annual report shows deposits, loans and discounts at a new all time high for the bank which was started here in 1888. When the bank was started it had deposits of a little over \$4 thousand and with stock account of \$11 thousand. This past year, 81 years later, the bank reached total resources of over \$12 million.

Some details of the 80th annual report of the bank appear in ad on another page of this paper. This report shows a tremendous growth in the past 20 years with deposits growing from a little over \$2 million in 1949 to nearly \$11 million in 1969.

Rainfall Light, Weather Is Cold During January

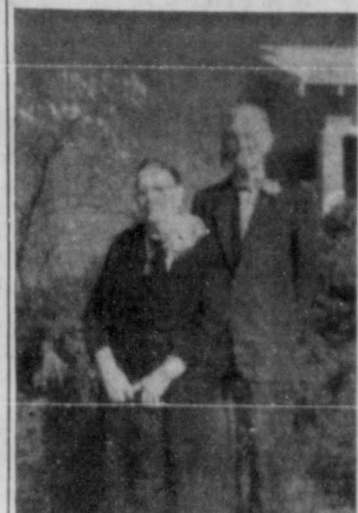
Rainfall recorded here during January was light with only .44 inch recorded, according to official Weatherman Harry Allen.

A Word From IRS On Credit Cards For Income Tax

The Internal Revenue Service announced today that it has not entered into any arrangements with banks or others for the payment of taxes by credit card or through any other credit means. The IRS said it will not accept credit cards and that any credit arrangement for the payment of federal taxes is strictly between the taxpayer and his bank or other credit company.

On the other hand, if a check or other document issued by a bank or credit company and used by a taxpayer in payment of taxes is acceptable by the Federal Reserve District concerned as a negotiable instrument for banking purposes, it will be accepted by the IRS. The IRS said, however, that if a check or similar instrument is not honored by the bank on which it is drawn, the taxpayer may be subject to penalties.

The tax laws provide a penalty of one per cent of the amount of any dishonored check and a minimum penalty of \$5.00. This is in addition to other penalties and interest for non-payment of taxes.

Names may be placed on the official ballot by the candidate signing up in person or by petition signed by five regularly qualified voters of the respective district.

Candidates nominated by petition also must sign the affidavit for candidate for public office in the office of the county judge 30 days before the election in order for the names to be placed on the official ballot.

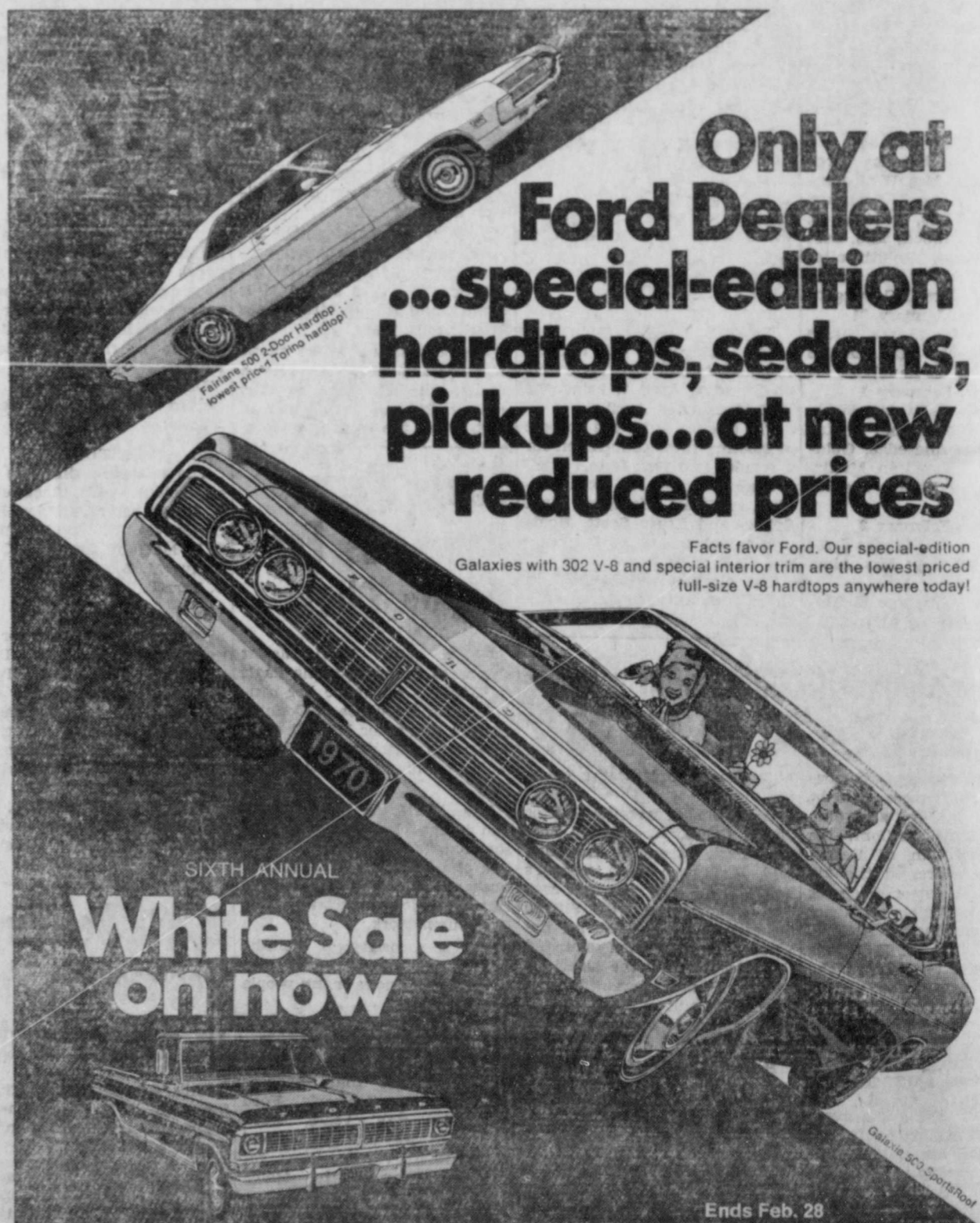

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

Motor Vehicle Inspection Law Changes Announced By Col. Speir

With the State's April 15 motor vehicle inspection deadline approximately 80 days away, large numbers of Texas motorists have yet to take their vehicles in for the mandatory annual safety inspection.

U. S. Bond Sales In Mills County Fall Short In 1969

United States Savings Bond sales during 1969 in Mills County totaled \$25,904, according to Mr. W. P. Duren, Chairman of the Mills County Savings Bonds Committee. The county has achieved 43 per cent of its goal of \$60,000. December sales totaled \$787. Sixty-nine counties in Texas have achieved their 1969 goal.

Texas has achieved 103 per cent of its goal of \$170.1 million with year-to-date sales totaling \$175,487,920. December sales were \$13,997,243 while sales during the same period of 1968 totaled \$13,070,587 — an increase of 7 per cent.

Bond sales over the Nation during 1969 amounted to \$4,740 billion with 97 per cent of goal achieved. Sales of Freedom Shares totaled \$348 million during 1969 — 26 per cent above the \$277 million sold in 1968.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today urged all motorists whose vehicles have not been inspected to visit an inspection station as soon as possible. "Those getting the inspection now will avoid long lines which are certain to develop at many stations as the April 15 deadline draws near," he said.

The DPS Director noted that Texas adopted an annual inspection program on September 1, 1969. All vehicles inspected since that date have had the

sticker placed on the left side of the windshield with a large number tab inserted to show the month of expiration.

For example, vehicles inspected in September have the number nine displayed and will require reinspection before September 30, 1970. Those inspected in October have the number 10 and must be reinspected before October 31, 1970. Vehicles which are inspected in January will bear the number one and reinspection will be required before January 31, 1971.

All vehicles which currently have a sticker on the right side of the windshield have not been reinspected in compliance with the new law, and their owners have only until April 15 to visit an approved inspection station.

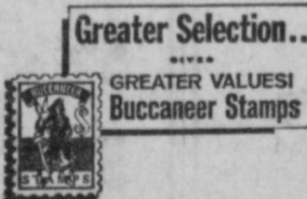
