According to Coach Sam Wink, the Pirates trailed 27-26 at the half, but rolled off 24 points in the third quarter to leave Pottsville helpless. Don Hopper tossed in 25 points to lead Priddy, with Ronnie Hohertz and David Druockhammer collecting 16 and 15 points respectively. Johnny Hopper scored 16 points in a losing cause for Pottsville. Names may be placed on the official ballot by the candidate signing up in person or by petition signed by five regularly qualified voters of the respective districts.

Candidates nominated by petition also must sign the affidavit for candidate for public office in the office of the County Judge 30 days before the election in order for the names to be placed on the official ballot.

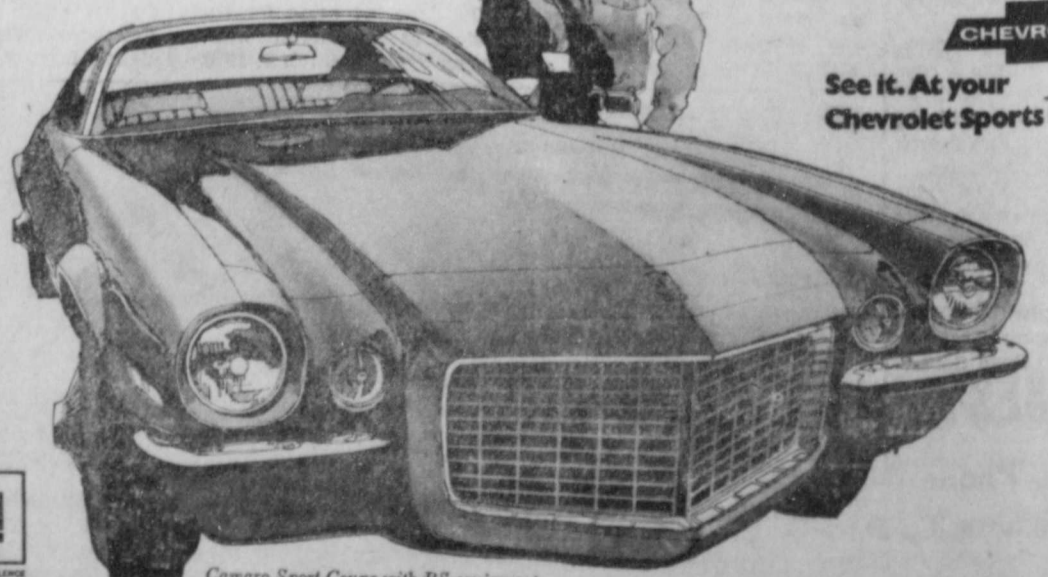

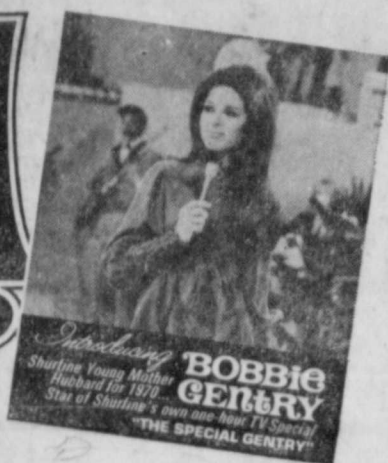

Payroll during the year totals \$220,105 which is paid to 50 members of the faculty and employees.

Annual budget for Goldthwaite school system this year is \$257,357. This does not include lunchroom operations.

There are 28 teachers and administrators in the school system.

The school system operates seven buses and one private carrier driving approximately 102,000 miles per year.

Estimated value of school buildings, land and equipment and all physical facilities of the district would run in the neighborhood of \$750,000. These include Elementary School, High School, Gymnasium, Stadium, Agriculture Building, Storage Building, High School Lunchroom, and approximately 80 acres of land.

Total enrollment for the 1969-70 year has now reached 450 pupils for both high school, junior high and elementary school.

Goldthwaite Schools operate two modern lunchrooms serving an average of 360 meals daily and total expected for the year of 65,000.

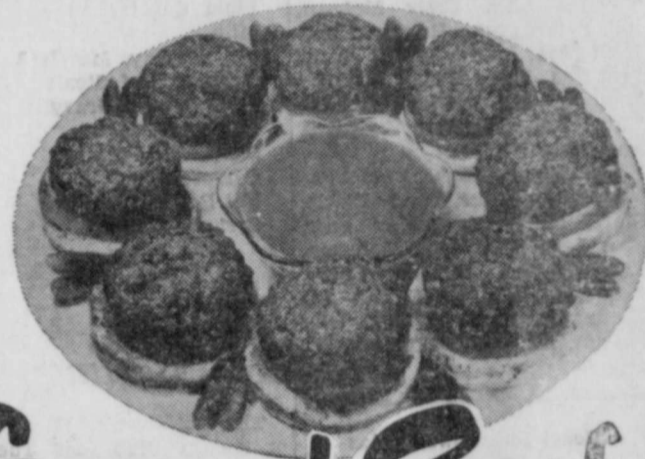

FFA President Murray Edwards Talks About "A War On Hunger"

In the seventies, bright as those years may appear, we will be entering a crisis — a world crisis far greater than either of the world wars or the Korean or Vietnam conflicts. As in other world crises, the United States will be drawn into this war because only we have the technology and the resources to fight it. It will be a war on hunger.

This disaster is beginning to show itself now. In India the population is outgrowing food supply. China is preparing for war in the near future because it does not possess the technology nor the fertile land with which to feed its people. Even today two-thirds of the world's population go to bed hungry. We as Future Farmers cannot escape the bleak realities that look us in the eye.

We will have basically the same tools as in the past with which to fight this battle against starvation. Only four per cent of the earth's surface, or about 3½ billion acres, is suitable for crop production. Today in 1970, there are 3½ billion people in the world, or a ratio of one person to one acre of land. In the year 2000, our world population will have doubled. Obviously our land

area will not increase; we dilute this ratio to one fed on one-half acre of land. Will the Future Farmer of today and the successful farmer of tomorrow be able to win the war against hunger? Strangely enough, we possess the knowledge to win our foe. We have the knowledge to take to the production of food world greatly — knowledge increase yields 20 and 30 percent compared to present yields. For example, if the six countries surrounding Japan (Thailand, Korea, Indonesia, India, and Taiwan) could increase rice yields to the average of Japanese, the increase in production of rice would be sufficient to feed 2½ billion people for one year. If these countries and Japan could increase rice yields to the level considered to be the top 20 percent of the world, the production of rice could feed four billion people for one year.

Future Farmers, we possess the knowledge and the tools to make the word "hunger" obsolete in our world. We must take the role in this fast-changing nation called agriculture. We can change the attitude of indifferent America. We can if we will.
