Farmers Reminded Of March 20 Deadline For Program Sign-Up

Mills County farmers who are to participate in the Cotton, Feed-Grain or Wheat programs for 1970 must sign-up at the ASCS Office by Friday, March 20, 1970, it was announced this week.

To date, 150 farms have been signed up to participate out of a total eligible number of about 560. This indicates that there will be the usual last minute rush near the close of the sign-up period. Farmers may save themselves from standing in line if they come in now, according to Bob Jarvis, office manager of the Mills County ASCS.

Participation in the cotton, feed, and wheat programs is voluntary. Those who sign up and comply with the program provisions will earn benefits such as eligibility for price support loans, price-support payments or wheat marketing certificates, and may earn payments for additional diversion of feed grain and wheat acreage beyond the diversion required for program compliance.

To earn these benefits, producers must comply with all program provisions including growing the crops involved within their agreements and maintaining designated acreage in soil conserving use.

Farmers are also advised that the U. S. Department of Agriculture has a target date of mid-August for completion of all 1970 farm program payments. To achieve this goal, participants in the farm programs are being asked to certify compliance as early as possible.

The County ASCS will begin processing payment papers as soon as a producer certifies that he has complied with all program provisions. Payments could begin as early as July 1 for those producers who certify early that they have complied with all program provisions.

With gardening in full swing, here are some reminders of things you need to do in March.

Fertilize all established plants as well as the lawn in early March. A general application of lawn fertilizer with an 8-8-8 or similar formulation used at the rate of 3 pounds per 100 square feet of area beneath the branch spread of the trees and shrubs will suffice. Fertilize lawn area at the rate of 15 to 20 pounds

of 8-8-8 per 1,000 sq. feet.

Diseases and insects to watch for this month include Azalea Petal Blight, Camellia Tea Scale, Aphids, White Fly, Pillbugs, and Caterpillars. For details regarding control of these problems, there are two Extension Publications available, they are MP-574, "Diseases on Ornamental Plants," and L-199, "Insects on Ornamental Plants." Do come by the office if you need these.

Complete all dormant pruning of evergreens and summer flowering shrubs in early March. Be ready to prune spring flowering shrubs as soon as they have completed blooming. For information on pruning, we have available in the Extension Office an Extension Publication, B-977, "Modern Pruning Methods."

Now is also the time to cut back old mum plantings to encourage new growth. It is best to use only container grown or balled and burlapped plants from March on throughout the summer. Be very selective in buying bareroot plants on sale at this time of year.

Deadline Is Passed For Ordering 1970 Texas License Plates By Mail

The deadline is passed to order 1970 Texas motor vehicle registration plates by mail, but there is still time for motorists to register their vehicles without a lot of the bother of former years. H. G. Brooks, Mills County Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector, announced this week.

The cutoff date for mail orders was March 1. But the three-part computerized form which all Texas vehicle owners received just after January 1 still will save time—if motorists act quickly.

All one needs to do is to take the registration application to the county tax collector's office with the fee.

The process is greatly simplified and the lines—if any—are fast-moving.

That's still no guarantee there won't be long lines facing those who wait until the last few days before the midnight April 1 deadline. Each year, thousands of motorists put off registering their vehicles until the last minute.

And, each year, the final days of the registration season find tax collectors' offices and substations jammed with procrastinating drivers.

The Texas Highway Department has these tips for quick and easy registration:

Don't throw away your registration application; don't write on it or mar it. However, if the address is incorrect, you should show your correct residence address in accordance with instructions on the form.

Don't separate the three parts of the form. Take it to the county tax office or substation in one piece.

Don't send your application to the Highway Department in Austin; and, remember, the deadline is passed for ordering license plates by mail from your county tax office.

If you did not receive a three-part registration form by mail, or if you have lost it, take last year's motor vehicle registration receipt and your car title to the county tax collector's office or substation. Your vehicle registration will be processed as before, and you'll receive a time-saving computerized form next year.

Selection of the silver is made by the students early in the school year and is on hand throughout the year for use in studying flatware design and construction, and buying principles.

The program is brought to its conclusion at graduation exercises in June, with the presentation of the silver to the outstanding senior home economics student. This is the first year that Goldthwaite High School has participated in the Sterling Silver Homemaking Award program.

Hunters Kill 19,000 Turkeys

Hunters in Texas killed approximately 19,000 turkeys during 1969, according to estimates and surveys made by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game management officers.

The kill was down from the 1968 kill of 24,000, but still high compared to the 1967 kill of 10,000 birds.

Pierce Uzzell, wildlife coordinator for the Department, said the successful 1968 and 1969 seasons were the result of a virtual turkey population explosion from approximately 206,300 turkeys in 1967 to approximately 575,000 in 1968. Although the population of turkey dropped approximately 15 per cent for the 1969 season, hunters were still able to kill far better than average numbers of the big birds.

Counties with big kills were: Blanco with 408; Callahan, 500; Edwards, 500; Gillespie, 700; Kendall, 720; Kerr, 1,443; Medina, 3,100; Real, 707; Sterling, 405; and Sutton, 520.

The forms may be obtained from the Parks and Wildlife Department. Social Security numbers and a return address will be required on the applications, and applicants must be 17 years of age or older and hold a valid Texas hunting license. Deadline for submitting applications is 5 p. m. April 7.

The lucky hunter will be notified as soon as possible after the drawing.

Springs said "This hunt will provide some hunting at a time when guns are usually on the shelf. It won't be as easy as fall turkey hunting because the birds will be less concentrated."

The usual limit in regular turkey seasons is two gobblers or bearded hens, but the special hunt limit is one gobbler only.

The Kerr Area is a wildlife research station designed for conducting research on wildlife and developing management techniques applicable to the Hill Country.
