CENSUS TAKERS EASY TO IDENTIFY

Householders will not have any difficulty identifying enmerators for the 1970 Census of Population and Housing, District Manager Robert C. Ford pointed out. Enumerators, or census takers (most of whom are women), started making their rounds in the area on April 1 and are expected to complete their work in three to five weeks.

Each census taker will wear a red, white, and blue identification card. This card bears the seal of the Department of Commerce, and the words "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" are printed across its face. It bears the census taker's signature and certifies that she is authorized to perform the duties of a census enumerator and has sworn to keep confidential all census information you provide.

Persons purporting to be census takers who do not have this dentification card should be reported immediately to the local police or to the census district office, which is located at 1209 Washington, Waco, Texas. Phone A/C 817 752-9245.

Census takers will be further identified by the portfolio containing their supplies. The portfolio is blue and bears the legend, '1970 Census." In the portfolio, the census taker carries her supplies of report forms, maps, pencils, and other tools necessary
