The deadline for students to make an application to transfer from one school district to another is May 30, according to announcement this week by school officials.

Students who desire to transfer must make application and present it to the receiving district for approval. All applications for transfer must be presented to the receiving district no later than May 30. After this date the only scholastic transfers that will be made will be hardship situations, and they must be approved by the Texas Education Agency, it was announced.

Parents and students are reminded of this deadline since last year they were given more time to apply for transfers. The extra time last year was because of the newly adopted change in regulations that moved the office of the county school superintendent to the respective districts.

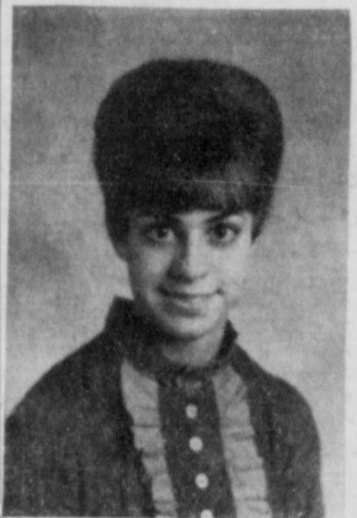
Local contributions are to be left at the First Baptist Church where the collection center will be set up, according to Hale. Collections will be shipped from here to Lubbock next Monday, May 25.

Committee Named To Complete Lions Bulletin Board Fund

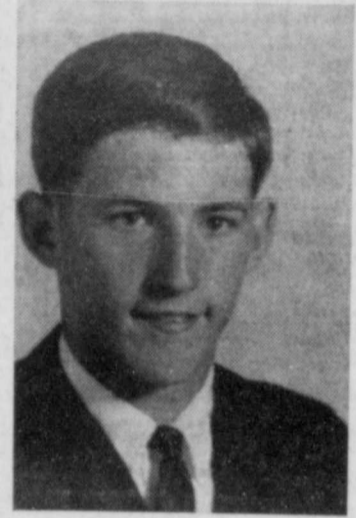
A committee was named at the Lions Club meeting Tuesday night to complete raising funds to pay for the community bulletin board that was recently installed in downtown Goldthwaite.

from the senior class, were Queen Dianna Gist and King Mack Casbeer.

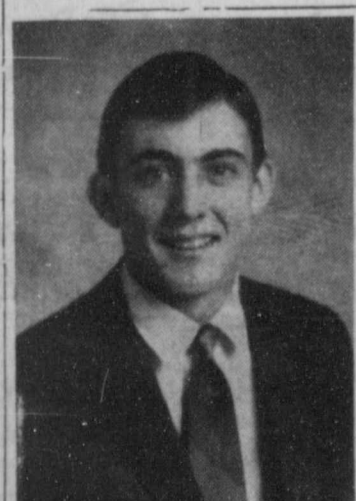

Pecan Tree Spraying Should Be Started Now

Spraying should begin this week for the control of Pecan Nut Casebearer. Moth emergence from pupae collected in bands has developed rapidly in the past ten days, according to County Agent George Reese.

Moth emergence and egg-laying indicates that egg hatch will occur over a short period of time.

Casebearers can be controlled with 1½ quarts of malathion per 100 gallons of water or 2 pounds of Sevin per 100 gallons of water.

Two pounds of Zinc Sulfate may be added to the spray material for the control of Rosette.

Complete and thorough coverage is required for the control of the casebearers. If trees surrounding the treated area are not sprayed, moths may enter the sprayed area and a serious infestation of second-generation larvae may develop. Under these circumstances, a second application may be required in June or early July, Reese stated.

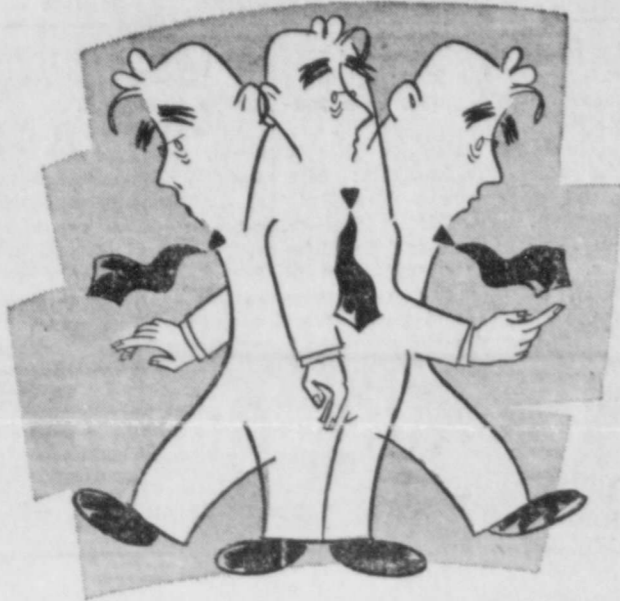

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The Administration's Postal Reform recommendations have taken on a complexion of a different hue under a "compromise." When submitted several months ago, the President's plan called for a reorganization of the Department a long corporate lines. It provided for a non-profit corporation somewhat comparable to the TVA and the Commun-

ication Satellite operation to run our mail services with certain limited authority reserved to the Federal Government.

Since our mail service is not what it should be, coupled with the fact that deficits in the operation of the postal service continue to climb, there has been great appeal for this idea.

This approach to make the Post Office Department mostly independent from direct Federal control was opposed by the

Postal Unions of which there are seven.

At the time of the strike of postal employees in New York City and in a few other large offices, Postmaster General Blount and Mr. George Meany, head of the AFL-CIO, worked out a compromise. The first part of the agreement was for the Congress to vote a postal pay increase, which it immediately passed and the President signed.

The remaining part of the agreement will be before the Congress in the near future. As introduced, it is H. R. 17070.

The idea of the Postal Corporation has been abandoned. In its place the Department would become the U. S. Postal Service with "independent status" somewhat like the Federal Reserve and NASA but still a part of the Federal Government.

The proposal authorizes the unions and the Postal Service to negotiate compulsory "union shop" contracts for all employees. Postal workers would come under the National Labor Relations Board as do unions in the private sector. It would take away an employee's choice of belonging or not belonging to the union. The unions would not be under the so-called Landrum-Griffin Act, which requires reporting and accounting of funds by union officials.

Following the agreed recommendations between the Postmaster General and Mr. Meany, the AFL-CIO head indicated his pleasure with such an arrangement by saying that he expected the provisions of H. R. 17070 to give the same kind of power to postal employee unions that is now allowed in the private sector. He said the provisions would soon be extended to all Federal employee unions as well as at the State, County and City level.

Should compulsory unionism become the law, no employee could exercise his right to freedom of choice nor would he have any say as to what was done with his union dues. Obviously, a Federal edict of this kind would override a State's Right-to-Work Law and would cancel binding arbitration of disputes.

There is no question but that changes are needed in our postal operation. From the beginning, the postal service was never intended to be a profit making enterprise or for that matter a break-even proposition. Neither was it ever envisioned to be an agent of those using its services for profit. It was supposed to serve the people as a public necessity and convenience. Postal rates are set at a level to partially pay for services rendered but not intended to subsidize commercial users.

Under the proposal, considerable latitude would be given to the new organization but it appears that the "independence" referred to is hardly achieved. It gives certain veto rights to the Congress but there is no doubt that mailing rates will be increased and that employees will have their freedom of choice impaired. Under present Law it is illegal to strike against the Federal Government. Assuming that the non-strike provision can be enforced (it was not in the recent strike) present Law may be better than to remove the provision entirely.

Amendments to the proposed Bill could make reorganization of the Post Office Department highly desirable.

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AUSTIN, Tex. — State Welfare costs may go up sharply next year if Congress passes a new Medicaid bill.

State Senate Committee on Welfare Reform heard estimates that Medicaid amendments alone will require at least \$25.9 million in additional state outlays during the coming biennium.

Burton G. Hackney, State Welfare Commissioner, predicts President Nixon's Family Assistance Plan of legislation might cost Texas a minimum of \$22 million more each year and double the number of children on state aid rolls.

Senate committee heard estimates that Medicaid changes will add more than \$6.2 million to the state's obligations for the present biennium.

While welfare officials are now optimistic over being able to continue present program levels until the next legislative sessions, they will, at best, be in debt \$13.5 million come January. That's the amount Gov. Preston Smith transferred to welfare from medical school construction funds to head off the scheduled April 1 cut in payments to the needy.

If rough estimates presented the committee are correct, the legislature will be looking at an increase of \$70 million for new programs during the next fiscal period — not to mention another \$20 million "catch-up" money carrying over from the current biennium.

If Congress places mental retardation under new limitations for impatient services, the state could end up with another \$9 million a year in new obligations, plus \$8.2 million in unexpected expenses for the present fiscal period.

SCHOOL FUND

Largest single piece of income for the Texas permanent school fund, \$139 million, has been assured. After 11 months of discussion, School Land Board accepted a unitization agreement on the huge new sulphur deposit found in Culberson County by the Duval Corporation of Houston. Deposit is the second largest in the world. It contains 81 million long tons of sulphur. Agreement involves the drilling of 6,000 wells.

High bids on public school land oil and gas leases totaled \$3.1 million, representing an average of \$36.84 an acre. Twenty-two per cent of the acreage sold was in El Paso and Hudspeth counties. Land lying in Loving and Ward counties brought a bid of \$120,006, topping all others.

Second highest bid of \$113,040 was on a 1,440-acre tract of submerged coastal lands in Jefferson County.

Third highest was \$110,053 for 411 acres in Reeves County.

Receipts from the sale boosted the permanent school fund to \$339.6 million, for total increase of nearly 86 per cent in last decade.
