Moisture Measured Here

And for the first time in many months, it is wet from rain and snow, rather than from the abundant irrigation wells dotting the farms of the area.

About 1.50 inches of moisture has been received here since early Thursday morning, with only a brief recess on Friday.

A snowfall measuring about two inches was on the ground early Thursday morning, contributing a small amount to the total received.

On Saturday, a slow, dripping rain began that continued through Sunday and Monday, soaking into farm and ranchland to give the area the maximum benefit of the moisture.

Monday afternoon, the government weather rain gauge kept at the home of W. E. Williams showed a total of 1.34 inches of moisture, including the snow. The "Chamber of Commerce" gauge at the same location measured 1.90.

2 medium tomatoes, chopped 2 slices American cheese, cut in triangles



Several years later, W. Lee O'Daniel traveled over the state with a string band and was elected governor. We'll never forget the day he came to our town, and how disappointed we were to get a kiss on a dirty, freckled face, instead of those biscuits we were expecting.

One never knows what Texas will do. After being firmly lined up behind the Democratic party for nearly a century, except 1928, Texans turned the tables in the 1950's and went all out for a Republican for president. 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

Do you want to read a good sermon? Paul preached a good one in Antioch of Pisidia, which is written in Acts 13:14-43, His theme was salvation through Christ. He preached the sermon in a Jewish church-house, on their day of worship-the Sabbath, He had to convince the Jews that they were lost even though they were religious. Paul was trying to get them to change their religion. The high point of his sermon is verses 38 and 39, "Be it known unto you therefore, men and brethren, that through this man is preached unto you the forgiveness of sins; and by him all that believe are justified from all things, from which ye could not be justified by the law of Moses." He had to impress this truth on their minds, Heb. 7:19, "For the law made nothing perfect, but the bringing in of a better hope did; by the which we draw nigh unto God," This "better hope" by which one draws "nigh" to God is the blood of Christ in contrast with the blood of animals offered under the law, Ephesians 2:13. Paul gave his audience a brief history of God's dealing with the Israelites, and showed them that everything before Christ was mere preparation for Him. Paul tried to convince them that Jesus was the seed of David and was already on David's throne, at God's right hand in heaven. If Paul's sermon should be believed and obeyed, his audience would cease to be Jews and become Christians; too, they would stop observing the Sabbath and start honoring the Lord's Day.
