Wild may be a descriptive word for the Texas governor's race before the Democratic primary this spring.

The total number of candidates is already too great to remember almost and more are promising to join in.

One of those who is expected to announce this week is Dolph Briscoe from Uvalde.

We don't know much about his political outlook at this point, but we'll try to give him every consideration when we cast our vote because of his given name, if for no other reason.

People who know tell us that houses for rent in Bovina are almost non-existent. In the first place, the community has a shortage of suitable houses for rent and those which are available are now occupied for the most part. This makes it difficult for newcomers to find living quarters with which they're happy.

Therefore, an investment in rent houses might be a wise one in Bovina at the present time.

This shortage of rent property is nothing new. Except for periods of not more than 30 to 60 days at a time, this has been the case in Bovina for years and years. The population here would be greater now, no doubt, if sufficient living quarters had been available for rent down through the years.

However, we'll admit that we'd rather live and work in a town which had a shortage of vacant houses than in one which had an abundance of same.

That theory is small consolation, though, to the fellow who wants a place to rent here right away.

It stands to reason that rent property will become more and more scarce in the future unless there is some construction. Development of cattle feeding and packing industries in the area are expected to bring more people and thereby increase the already acute need for places for folks to live.

Downstate, Texans are highly optimistic about HemisFair '68 which is scheduled in San Antonio from April 6 through October 6.

The estimate is that \$205 million will be spent outside of HemisFair by fair visitors during the six-month run.

Due to HemisFair, Texas tourism is expected to be at an all-time high this year.

Our area is probably too far north and west to benefit significantly from HemisFair proper. But it's a good deal for the state and some of those extra dollars might be spread around here, you can't tell.

A large number of Parmer Counties will probably take in the fair and will be directly concerned with it in that way.

Otis Huggins, the Southwestern Public Service man, expects the company's new representative to begin his duties here in the near future.

He is Lewis McDaniels from Dimmitt and has been attempting to locate suitable housing here for his family.

The original announcement from SWPS said the representative might not come here until summer. However, the deal has been rushed up and McDaniels will be here much sooner, according to Huggins.

Huggins, incidentally, started his 25th year of serving Bovina for the electric company January 1. He lives in Farwell and also tends to his company's business there and at Texico.

Difficult it is to please everyone about the weather. The warm, slow rain over the weekend came closer to doing just that, though, than any weather we've known about lately. Farmers, especially, are all smiles about the moisture which fell slowly in temperatures above freezing. The rain will give a substantial boost to the wheat crop which had been greatly below normal in growth because of a moisture lack.

This should go a long way toward putting more wheat in the elevators come June and harvest-time.

We've even heard old timers say they've never seen such an ideal rain here in January.

## Two New Businesses Locating In Bovina

Two new businesses and a remodeled building to house them are set for Bovina.

According to an announcement from A. L. Glasscock, the new businesses will be Chuck's Aerial Spraying Service and an accounting service offered by Williams and Merriman of Muleshoe.

The firms will be located in the building on Highway 60 formerly occupied by Bovina Auto Parts. In addition to these two, the building will be the location of Glasscock Real Estate's office.

Remodeling work on the building is presently underway and is scheduled to be completed within the next week, Glasscock said.

The spraying service will be owned and operated by Chuck Stallings of Lariat. Stallings provided aerial spraying service in this area last year. In addition to the spraying service, farm chemicals, including insecticides, fungicides and herbicides, will be offered.

Junior Lambert, from Muleshoe, will be associated with the spraying service. Both Stallings and Lambert have recently purchased homes here.

The office of Williams and Merriman will be open one day each week, Glasscock said. It will be operated by Dave Sudduth of Muleshoe.

Also to be in the remodeled building will be Glasscock's real estate office. It is presently located at the corner of North and Third Streets.

Glasscock recently purchased the building on Highway 60 from Sam Sudderth.

## 1.50 Moisture Measured Here

Parmer County land is wet. And for the first time in many months, it is wet from rain and snow, rather than from the abundant irrigation wells dotting the farms of the area.

About 1.50 inches of moisture has been received here since early Thursday morning, with only a brief recess on Friday.

A snowfall measuring about two inches was on the ground early Thursday morning, contributing a small amount to the total received.

On Saturday, a slow, dripping rain began that continued through Sunday and Monday, soaking into farm and ranchland to give the area the maximum benefit of the moisture.

Monday afternoon, the government weather rain gauge kept at the home of W. E. Williams showed a total of 1.34 inches of moisture, including the snow. The "Chamber of Commerce" gauge at the same location measured 1.90.

Apparently a like amount has fallen in all areas from Bovina, giving the county its first general rain of the young year.

provide water for wheatland, were turned off over the weekend, saving farmers hundreds of dollars in operational costs.

Amount it will save by cutting down on pre-watering is difficult to determine this early in the year. The rain, along with snow received in December, has given the ground good seasoning.

Boost to wheat crops will amount to thousands of dollars, as well as getting the soil in good shape for other crops this year.

Snow falling here Thursday morning apparently only included a strip from Farwell to Friona. Some reports of heavier snowfall south of Bovina were received.

"A rain like this during January," says Weatherman Williams, "only happens about every 10 years."

Temperatures during the nights did not dip low enough for the falling rain to freeze, as it usually does this time of year.

Driving conditions have remained good, except for rain-slick highways and streets.

## Tax, Vote Sign-Up Deadline Wednesday

Deadline for paying state, county, city and school taxes is one week from today, Wednesday, Jan. 31.

That is also the deadline for registering to vote in the 1968 elections.

Those paying taxes after the deadline will be assessed penalties, tax collectors say.

City of Bovina mailed tax statements this year totaling

\$25,703.68 on all properties valued at \$2,234,942.50, according to Mrs. Mary Ruth Martin, city secretary.

After Jan. 31, a penalty of one and one-half per cent will be added for each month the taxes are delinquent.

Bovina Independent School District has collected slightly more than 66 per cent of the tax roll of about \$237,000, Mrs. Zoe Clary states. After Jan. 31 a penalty of one per cent will be charged.

In reporting the collections, Mrs. Clary said one check had been mailed her office from Germany. The sender was Dickie Clayton, who paid his personal tax on his automobile, even though serving his country in the U. S. Army.

Citizens of Parmer County wishing to register for the 1968 elections should mail their applications to the tax assessor-collector's office in Farwell before the deadline. A certificate will be returned to them.

Application forms were mailed

ed residents of the county this year with the county and state tax statements from the office of Hugh Moseley.

Moseley points out that 1968 is a major election year, on the national, state, county and local scenes.

For the first time in many years, Texans will have the privilege of voting for a president of the United States without having to pay a poll tax. Likewise, it will be the first time for a governor to be elected without voters paying the tax.

Last year, 1967, was the first year for the new Texas registration law, but few major elections were held.

Voter registration application blanks are available at city hall in Bovina, Mrs. Martin announces.

## Students Recovering

Attendance in the Bovina Schools was down about 15 per cent last week, L. F. Jacobs, superintendent, reported, but is beginning to return to normal.

Students have been out with a number of illnesses, he said, and the drop in attendance could not be attributed to one disease.

However, some students have been out with "flu" and there are also a few cases of mumps. Although a definite figure was not available, enrollment is about 20 students higher than at the same time last year at mid-term, Jacobs said.

At mid-term this year, enrollment in the Bovina Schools stood at 641. Last year at the same time enrollment was 621. At one time the enrollment this school year reached the peak of over 700 students, but always falls following the crop harvest here.

Boys entering their animals in the show returned home Monday, but sponsor John Paul Jones stayed at the show for the sale of the animals.

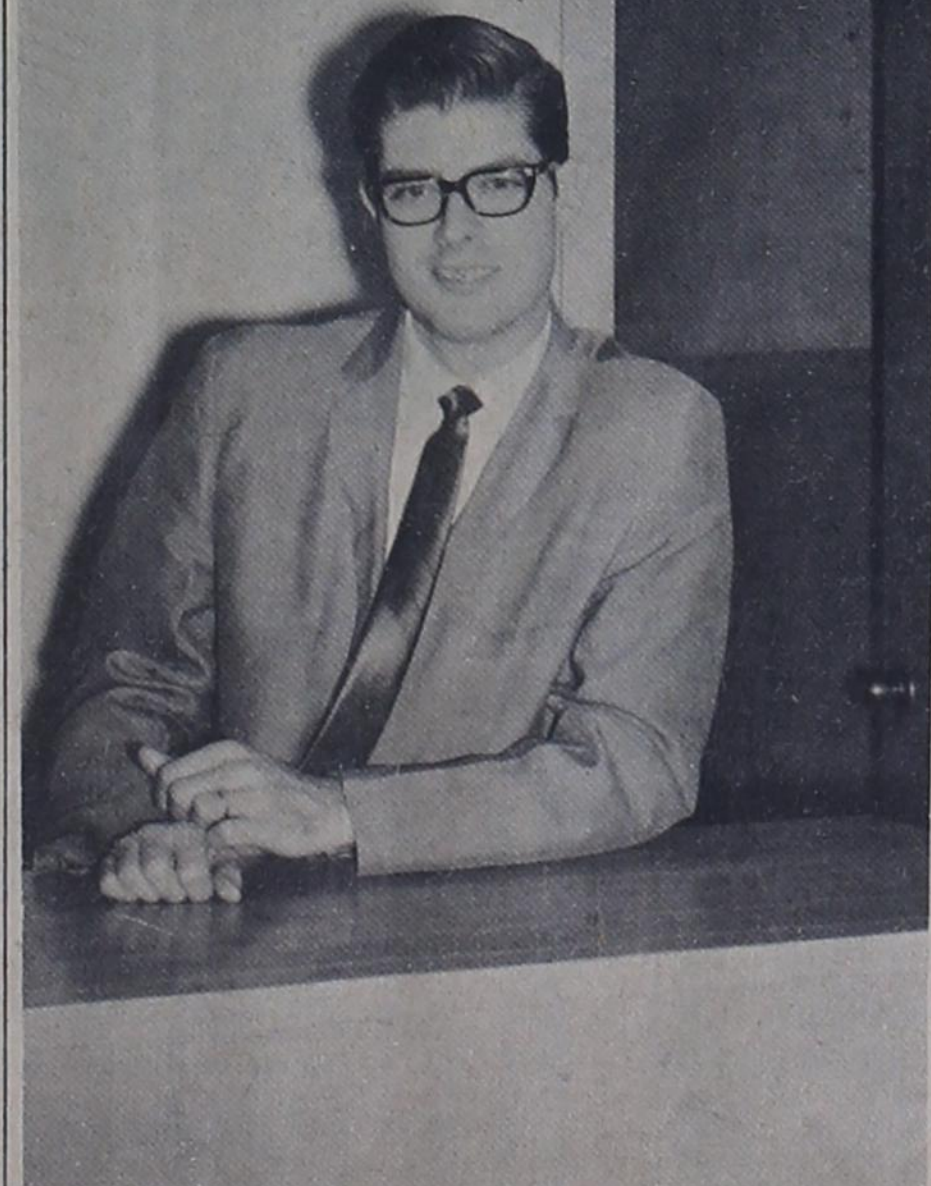

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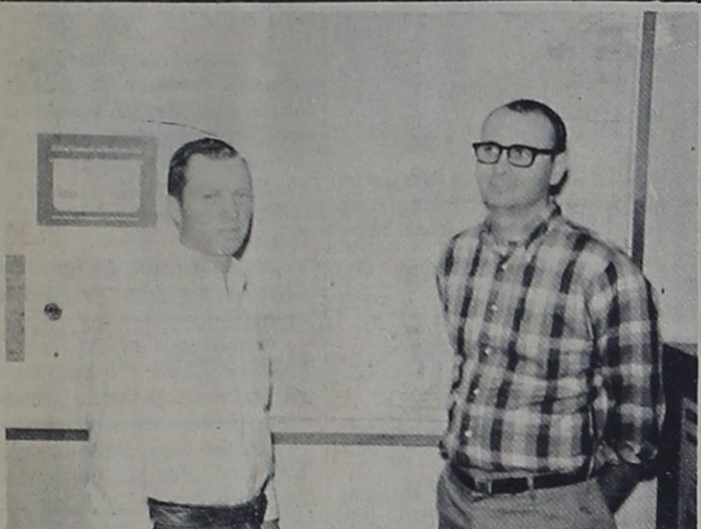

# New School Move Planned

Classes will begin in the new Ridgelea Elementary School on Dimmitt Road and Ninth Street Monday, Feb. 5, according to Superintendent L. F. Jacobs, if current plans are fulfilled. A few finishing touches remain to be done this week to the six-classroom building and if these are completed, the move will be made on schedule. The school tax office, now in downtown Bovina, will remain open there through Jan. 31 and patrons of the district may continue to pay their taxes at the downtown office through the deadline Wednesday. On Thursday, Feb. 1, the tax office will open at Ridgelea Elementary School. However, classrooms will not be moved until the following weekend, Jacobs said, Feb. 3 and 4, with school beginning there Monday morning, Feb. 5. The first and second grades are scheduled to move to the new building. Teachers of these grades are Mrs. Pearl Hickman, Mrs. Jerry Burnett and Mrs. Lois Jones, first grade; Mrs. Jay Boothe and Mrs. Dolph Moten, second grade. Telephone number at both the school tax office and Ridgelea Elementary School will be 238-3941, Jacobs said.

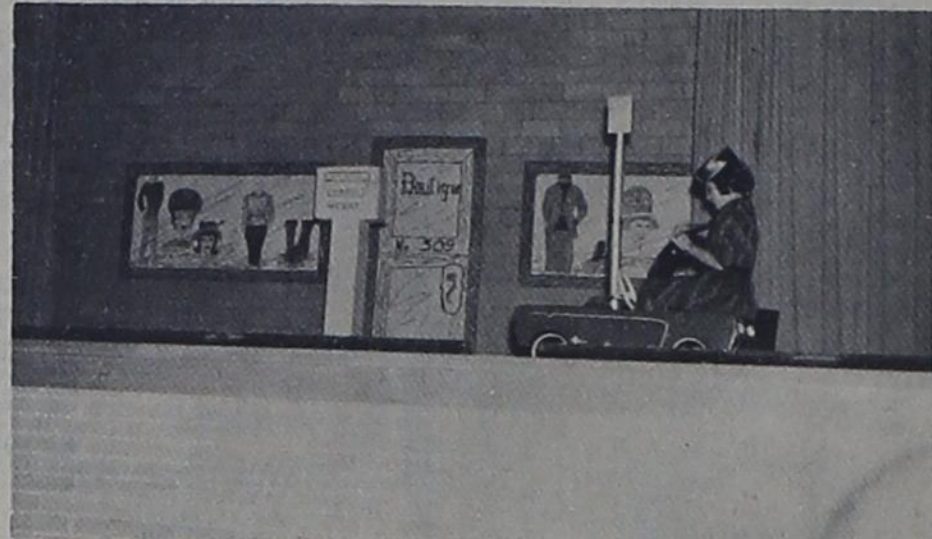

### Know The Truth

Do you want to read a good sermon? Paul preached a good one in Antioch of Pisidia, which is written in Acts 13:14-43. His theme was salvation through Christ. He preached the sermon in a Jewish church-house, on their day of worship—the Sabbath. He had to convince the Jews that they were lost even though they were religious. Paul was trying to get them to change their religion. The high point of his sermon is verses 38 and 39, "Be it known unto you therefore, men and brethren, that through this man is preached unto you the forgiveness of sins; and by him all that believe are justified from all things, from which ye could not be justified by the law of Moses." He had to impress this truth on their minds, Heb. 7:19, "For the law made nothing perfect, but the bringing in of a better hope did; by which we draw nigh unto God." This "better hope" by which one draws "nigh" to God is the blood of Christ in contrast with the blood of animals offered under the law, Ephesians 2:13. Paul gave his audience a brief history of God's dealing with the Israelites, and showed them that everything before Christ was mere preparation for Him. Paul tried to convince them that Jesus was the seed of David and was already on David's throne, at God's right hand in heaven. If Paul's sermon should be believed and obeyed, his audience would cease to be Jews and become Christians; too, they would stop observing the Sabbath and start honoring the Lord's Day.
