Extensive Improvements Underway At Goldthwaite School Lunchrooms

Extensive improvement, including new equipment, for the Goldthwaite School Lunchrooms was announced this week by Supt. Gilbert Davis.

The project covering both lunchrooms will involve an expenditure of approximately \$8,000. Of this amount 75% will be provided by Federal School Funds while the local district will pay 25% of the cost.

Davis stated that application had to be made for these funds showing the local needs for the improvements, financial status of the school, number of students served, etc.

Before the application was approved bids had to be secured for all items needed. It was pointed out that only a number of schools were able to apply for this assistance and very few of them were approved for this type of project.

Improving the lunchrooms is part of an overall three year improvement program the school has undertaken.

Social Security benefits paid to residents of Mills County totaled \$76,000 a month (almost a million dollars yearly) as 1969 ended, Glen McNatt, manager of the Brownwood office, reported this week.

A benefit increase effective January 1970 raised the monthly rate by 15 per cent, about \$137,000 yearly, for the 1,078 social security beneficiaries in Mills County McNatt noted.

Of the beneficiaries living in the county, 797 are retired workers and their dependents. Another 191 are receiving benefits as survivors of workers who died, and 90 others get benefits as disabled workers or dependents of disabled workers.

In Mills County 77% of the social security beneficiaries are past 65, with 500 of these 825 people being age 72 or over. There are 78 beneficiaries 21 years of age or younger.

The Brownwood office serves a three-county area consisting of Mills, Comanche, and Brown Counties. There are 9,126 beneficiaries in the area, with 5,464 in Brown County and 2,584 in Comanche County. Monthly payments in the area are \$759,000, a rate of over 9 million dollars yearly.

30 More Christmas Decorations Are Authorized By City Council

Thirty more electric Christmas decoration pieces for Goldthwaite streets were authorized for purchase by the City Council at their last regular meeting.

The Christmas lighting program came up for discussion at the May meeting of the council when City Manager W. C. Barnett reported on the matter.

Barnett told the group how plans for the overall program were started several years ago when representatives of all civic groups met to discuss new holiday decorations for the city.

At that time the group approved long range plans calling for the purchase of 75 new electric decoration pieces. Eight of these were purchased the first year and were placed around the courthouse square. Two years later the City Council purchased 34 more through the Electric Department which brought the total to 42. Last year none were added.

The latest purchase of 30 brings the total electric decorations for the Christmas holiday season on Goldthwaite streets to 72. This number was determined after a thorough survey was made by Barnett and Assistant Manager Dale Allen on possible locations to cover the entire business district of the city.

Order has been placed for early shipment of the new decorations and city crews will start in the near future on installation work for the removable poles. All of the fixtures and most of the poles are removed after the holiday season each year and stored until the next season.

The first group of fixtures cost \$109.50 each. The same pieces are now priced at \$129.80. But, by making the purchase this early in the year the city will receive a substantial discount and the decorations will cost \$109.98 each.

With this purchase the ambitious Christmas lighting program undertaken several years ago will be completed.

Work Proficiency Citation Awarded To Dale Allen And James Knight

Austin — (Spec.) — An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Dale Allen and James Knight, plant operations specialists for the Goldthwaite water and sewage control system.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water Utilities Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount

of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to the community and state.

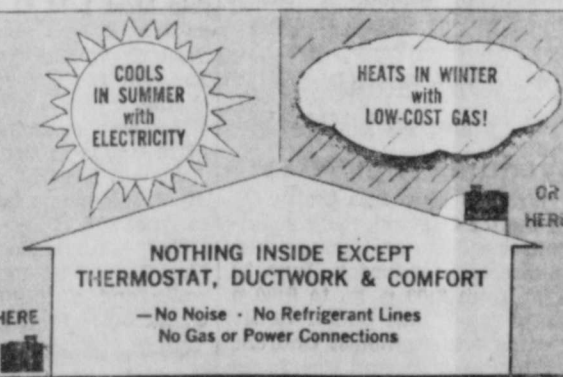

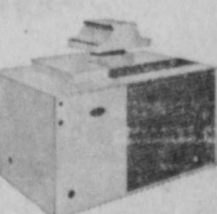

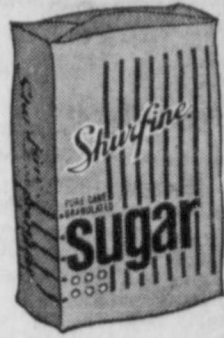

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Turkey Federation of Bryan, Texas proposes a referendum on July 27, 1970, under provisions of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not turkey producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of two cents per live hundredweight paid for plus an additional one cent per head on mature birds as defined by U. S. D. A. grade, to be collected at the point of first processing or sale, and to elect members for a fifteen man commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment for purposes of promotion, research, education, and disease and insect control designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of turkeys.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot furnished to all eligible voters not later than fifteen days prior to election date. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at P. O. Box 3929, Bryan, Texas 77801, before midnight on the election date.

For purposes of this referendum, a turkey producer is defined as a person, firm, or corporation having actual ownership of turkeys during production. All persons in this category are eligible to vote in the referendum and election, since they would be required to pay the proposed assessment.

Any person qualified to vote in this referendum and election may place his name in nomination for election to the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such application must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Wise Conservation Practices Today Can Be Income Producing Tomorrow

More than 60 per cent of the land area of the United States is privately owned. It is operated by 3 million farmers and ranchers who, under a democratic form of government, may do largely as they please with their land.

Yet more than two million of these private, independent businessmen are seeking and using technical assistance of the Soil Conservation Service and Soil and Water Conservation Districts in voluntarily practicing resource conservation without regulation or coercion.

This widespread movement is the hope of the young people of America for a fertile and productive inheritance that will keep America strong in natural

resources. Soil and Water Conservation work on the land enhances wildlife habitat.

There are more kinds and greater numbers of game birds, game animals, furbearers, and game fish in the United States today than were here at the beginning of this century. To a great extent these increases in wildlife are the result of the widespread use of conservation programs involving strip croppings, contour cultivation, conservation irrigation, crop rotations, stubble mulching, grassed waterways, improved grasses on ranches or pastures, and other conservation practices that provide needed food and cover.

There are now more man-made ponds, reservoirs, and watershed lakes, that support fish and provide homes and feeding havens for water fowl. Many of these are in areas where there was little or no fishing fifty or even ten years ago.

Now there are thousands of miles of vegetated fence rows, terraces and ditch banks, windbreaks, shelter belts, field borders, and grassed waterways, that provide food, cover and protected travel lanes for wildlife.

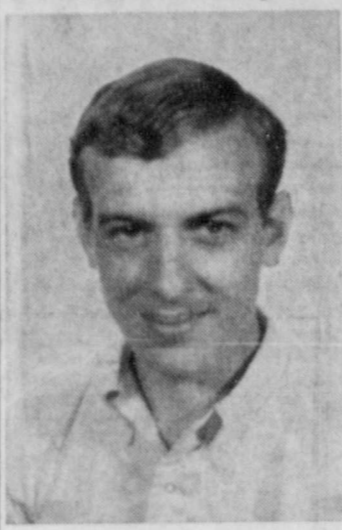

Hearings For Game Law Changes Will Be Conducted During June

Several important proposed changes in the State's game laws are scheduled for public hearings over the State beginning June 1.

The hearings will be conducted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in counties under regulatory authority of the Department. Hearings in these counties will be confined to general proposed changes and proposed changes affecting the regulatory authority area in which the hearing is held.

The following are proposals to be discussed in the hearings:

1. Change the open season for deer from the second Saturday in November through January 1 to the Saturday nearest November 15 through the first Sunday in January. This would establish a standard 51 day season every year.

2. Outlaw rimfire ammunition or .22 caliber jet or rocket guns in the taking or shooting of, or in attempting to take or shoot, wild deer, wild elk, wild antelope, wild aoudad sheep, or wild desert bighorn sheep.

3. Open the archery season in all counties under regulatory authority which do not have an archery season now.

4. Outlaw shooting of furbearing animals from a boat on public waters.

5. Institute an experimental either sex deer hunting season in several regulatory counties. These include Bosque and Palo Pinto Counties in the Possum Kingdom Regulatory District; Victoria County in the Oak Prairie Regulatory District; and

Grimes County in the Trinity Brazos Regulatory District. Under the proposal hunters would be allowed two deer of either sex in Bosque, Palo Pinto and Victoria Counties, and one doe and one buck in Grimes County.

6. Institute an any sex turkey season in Bandera, Crockett, Edwards, Gillespie, Kendall, Kerr, Kimble, McCulloch, Menard, Real, Schleicher, Sutton and Val Verde Counties in the Edwards Plateau District.

7. Open an experimental spring turkey season in Bandera, Crockett, Edwards, Kerr, Kimble, McCulloch, Menard, Real, Schleicher, Sutton and Val Verde Counties in the Edwards Plateau District.

8. Open a spring turkey season in all regulatory counties of the Possum Kingdom District except in Bosque, Erath, and Hamilton Counties where there will be on open season.

9. Prohibit the use of trotlines in those portions of streams bordering a State park or bodies of water totaling less than 500 acres lying totally within the boundaries of a State park in all regulatory authority areas.

10. Change the definition of legal buck in the Southeast Regulatory Authority Area to "having a hardened antler protruding through the skin" so that it will be consistent with other regulatory counties throughout the State.

11. Provide a prairie chicken season in Cochran, Hockley, Terry and Yoakum Counties in the Permian Basin District.

12. Change the opening date in the Panhandle for the deer and turkey seasons to the Saturday prior to Thanksgiving and running 16 consecutive days.

13. Set the aoudad sheep season in the Panhandle for November 14 through November 20.

14. Change the mule deer season to run 16 consecutive days starting with the first Saturday in December.

COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENCY

Summer is the time for picnics, and many people get food poisoning from improper handling of food. Food poisoning is a matter of chance. Five factors must come into play to produce it. You must, of course, have bacteria present, and you need growth supporting temperature, suitable food, time, and susceptibility.

Improper sanitation or improper refrigeration are the main causes of food poisoning. Almost without exception in poisoning cases the food was contaminated after having been cooked and was allowed to stand at temperatures which encourage bacterial growth.

Food to be served cold, such as potato salad, should be taken through the danger zone rapidly by keeping preparation time to a minimum and refrigerating it in a shallow container so the entire mass will chill quickly. Keeping it cold until the picnic meal is served is important.

If you're not planning to serve a hot food right away, it is best to refrigerate and then reheat it thoroughly just before serving. You might carry along a portable grill to do this.

Be careful of leftovers. A major source of food poisoning is picnic leftovers which have been exposed to warm temperatures for too long a time. Return potentially hazardous food to the ice chest immediately after the meal. If there is no ice left or the food has stood at an unsafe temperature for long periods, throw it away. Try not to have leftovers.

The best advice for picnic food is: keep it hot, keep it cold, or don't keep it at all.
