1895 Mullin School Cornerstone Reveals Some Historical Notes

The cornerstone of the old Mullin School built in 1895 was removed last week Monday and revealed some interesting items for history buffs.
Bill Murray and Melvin Parford are razing the old rock building which has not been used since 1955 when the new Mullin School building was constructed.
The cornerstone contained a small sheet iron box measuring in size about seven inches square and four inches in height. The box with contents were brought to the ASCS office in Goldthwaite by Mrs. Bill Murray who is employed there.
Members of the Masonic Lodge placed the box and contents in the cornerstone in special ceremonies at 3 p. m. on September 5, 1895.
Items contained in the box included a letter, with uncancelled 2 cent postage stamp, containing a sketch of Henry Barker's life; a billhead of Mullin merchants Abney and Roberts with the date written on it; business cards of Clements and Harrison, land, insurance and

abstracts; copy of the Goldthwaite Mountaineer; copy of the Mullin Courier; business cards of Shipman & Anderson, Brownwood, Marble and Granite business; Cisco Marble Works; a 25 cent coin with 1887 date; a five cent coin, with date undistinguishable; a Masonic apron; and copy of 20 year bond issued to finance the school building.
The yellowed copy of the Goldthwaite Mountaineer listed J. E. Vernor as proprietor and carried Volume X, No. 24, showing the paper in its 10th year. This would have the paper started back in 1885. While the paper was yellowed it was in good condition, unlike papers dating back to the 1890's which

have been exposed to light, air and becoming so brittle that they break up when pages are turned.
Abney & Roberts were listed as publishers of the Mullin Courier and that paper carried Volume XI, No. 1, indicating it had been started back in 1885.
The 20 year school bond was in the amount of \$2,400.00 and was payable to First National Bank in Goldthwaite with interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum. John P. Sharp signed the bond as president of the district and M. C. Kirkpatrick signed the instrument as secretary.
Most of the Mullin and Goldthwaite citizens whose names appeared in the box still have descendants living in the county.
Rocks from the original school building are being moved to the ranch of Maxwell Kirkpatrick who is related to the late school board secretary.
While the issue of the Mullin Courier in the box had little mention of the event, the Goldthwaite Mountaineer carried news and editorial about the new town of Mullin being established and other facts relating to the new school building.
The Mountaineer carried considerable advertising from a number of apparently live wire merchants in Goldthwaite at that time.
Clements & Harrison seemed to lead the way with advertising promotion of real estate of the day.
They carried one real estate ad which took up two full columns along with some other smaller ads of individual parcels. Their large ad listed 36 pieces of property including items of interest such as the following:
160 ACRES, South Bennett, has on it Willow Springs, \$300.
ONE-HALF undivided interest in Wagon Yard, \$500.
ONE ACRE lot, unimproved North of Judge Mohler place, \$80.00.
The second story of the stone building known as the Exchange Saloon, Priced Low.

Central Texas Telephone Board Approves Contracts For Expansion

The Central Texas Telephone Cooperative, Inc., board of directors at their last regular meeting approved contracts in excess of one \$million for plant expansion of the system, according to announcement by Raymond Summy, general manager.
Three contract were approved by the board to cover part of major improvements that the Cooperative is planning in the seven county Central Texas area.
Contracts have been submitted to the REA where they are subject to approval before construction work gets underway.
Contract for 10 central office buildings, with number 11 to be added later, was awarded to Truett Aldridge of Goldthwaite in the amount of \$132,500.
C&B Pole Line Contractors, of Mineral Wells, received the contract for \$610,390.00 covering pole line and outside plant construction.
Contract for Central Office Equipment for the office buildings went to Stromberg Carlson Co. in the amount of \$325,371.
The 10 new central office buildings to house the new equipment will be constructed in the following locations. Center City — covering the Star and Caradan exchanges; Lohn, Evant, Mullin, Big Valley, Cherokee, Bend, Mercury, Doole and Eola. Rochelle is to be added later as the 11th exchange building.
Projects covered in the three contracts will be the beginning of the program to up-grade the Cooperative's one and four party telephone system, according to Summy.

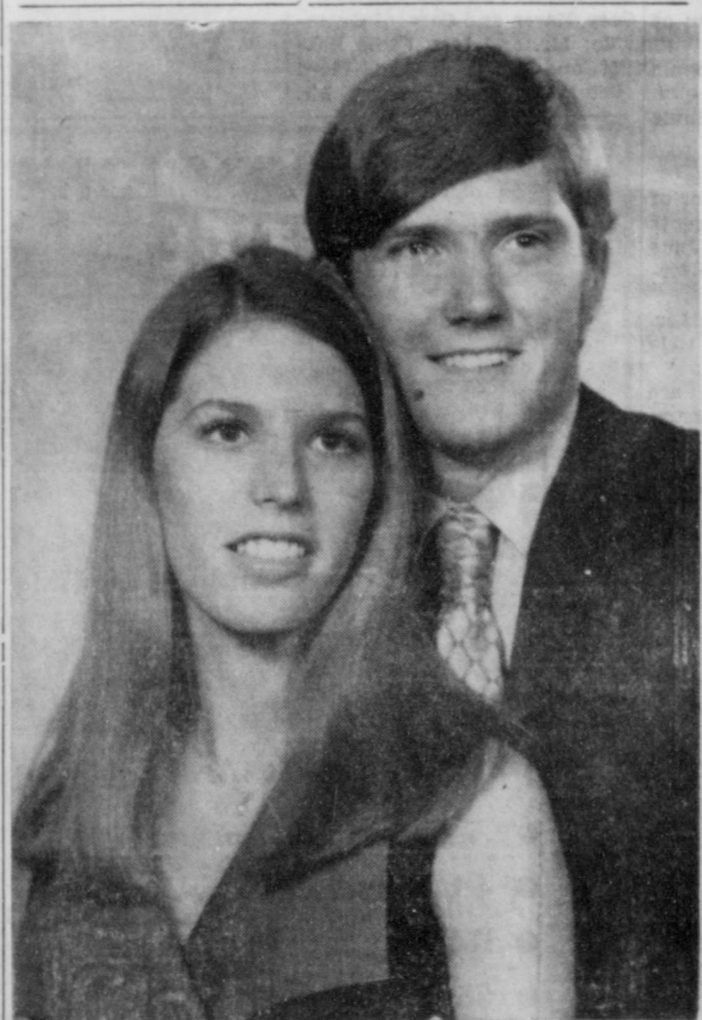

Farmers Receive Early Program Payments, According To Bradford

Farmers who have contributed to stabilizing markets for food and fiber and to the conservation of soil and water resources by taking part in the 1970 wheat, feed grain, and cotton programs are receiving their program payments earlier this year than ever before, according to V. C. Bradford, Chairman of the Mills County ASC Committee.

The first batch of payments were made beginning July 1. Additional payments will continue to be made as rapidly as farmers certify compliance with program requirements and as fast as individual farm records can be processed and checks returned to ASCS county offices for distribution to farmers.

Most payments should be completed by mid-August, if farmers who signed up will complete the necessary certification indicating that they have complied with all of the program provisions.

Farm program payments help maintain a balance between supply and demand, the Chairman explained. He pointed out that both farmers and consumers benefit from this balance.

"Agricultural productivity almost doubled in the past 20

years, but farmers' markets take only about a third of this increase," said Bradford. "This means we need new markets. Farm programs help us hold down farm production and maintain farm income until new markets are developed and old ones expanded.

"Huge surpluses must be avoided. They are costly in tax dollars and are wasteful of food and fiber.

"Farm programs help farmers make adjustments in their individual farming operations that in the long run will result in more farm income from the marketplace and less from the public treasury.

"Since farmers are \$50-billion-a-year purchasers of goods and services produced in our cities and rural towns, the workers and business firms in cities and towns benefit from farm programs, too."

Farm programs also make contributions to conservation of natural resources and help fight pollution. Acres that are diverted out of crop production under the farm programs are put to conserving uses such as the growing of grass and trees. Such practices conserve soil and water, provide habitat for wildlife and small game, help prevent pollution of our streams from sediment and agricultural chemicals or waste products, and reduce air pollution caused by blowing dust, the Chairman explained.

"When a farmer takes land out of production and puts it to a soil-and-water conserving use, he gives up the value of the production he normally would have received as income. At the same time, the farmer pays taxes on land removed from production even though that land produces no crops. Program payments are designed to compensate him for these voluntary contributions toward a more stable farm economy and a better environment," Bradford said.
