One project that has been completed is replacing the old wood bleachers. This was done some time ago and cost about \$450.00.

Lions Club To Sponsor Broom, Mop Sale Today

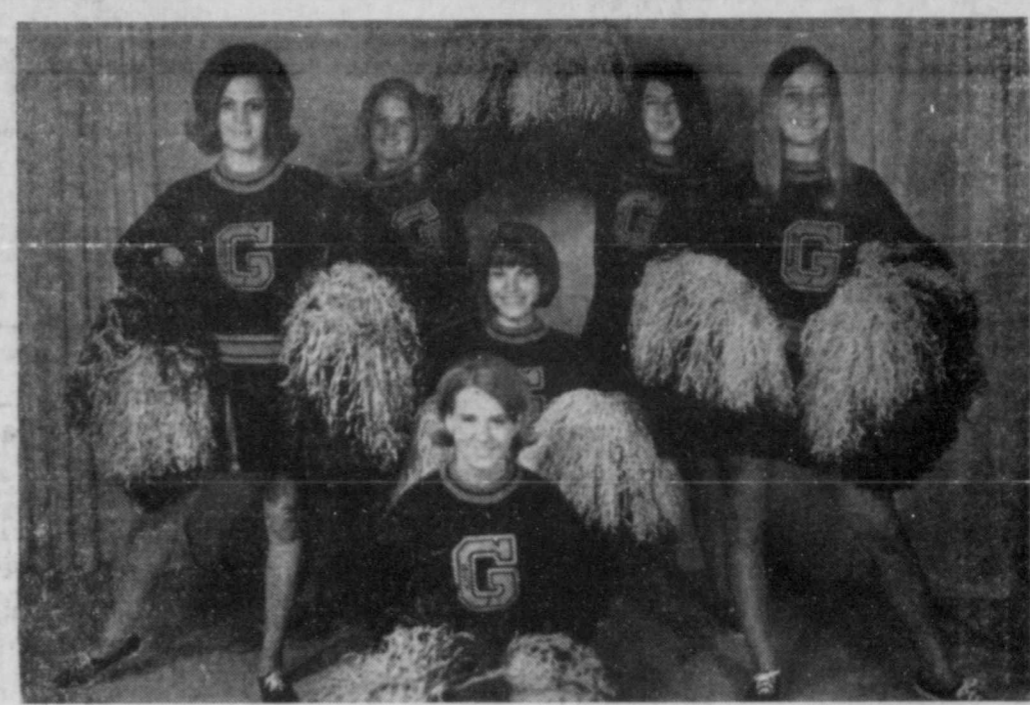

Clyde Estep Catches 43½ Pound Catfish

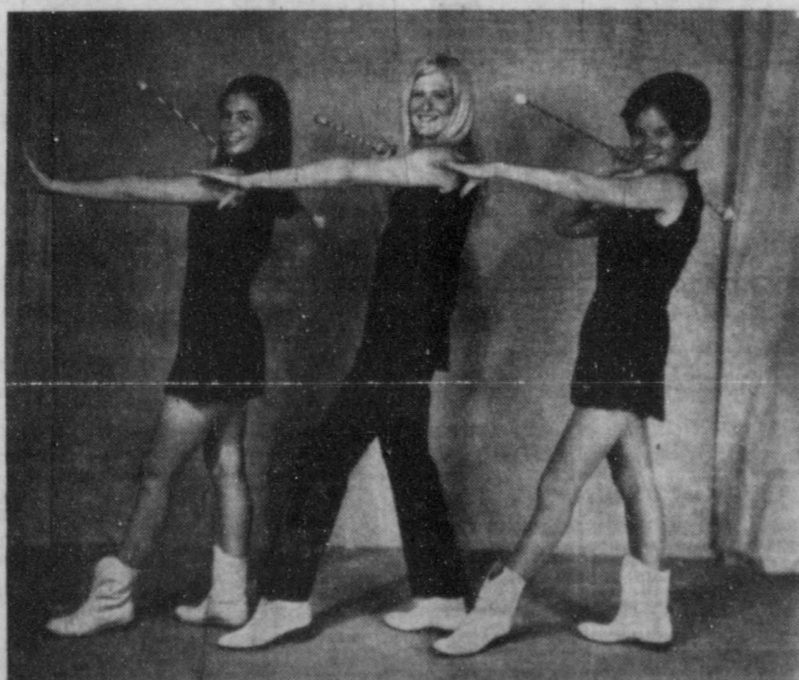
Clyde Estep caught a 43½ lb. yellow catfish on his rod and reel last week at Lake Merritt.

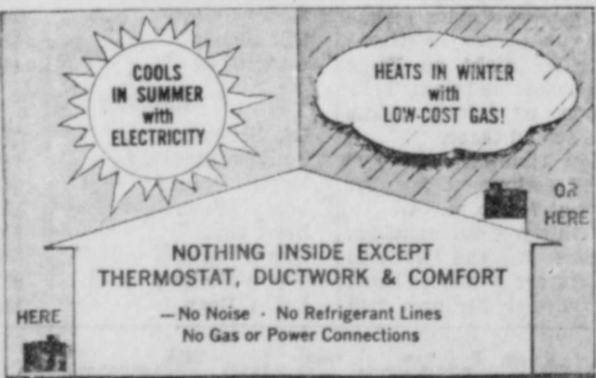

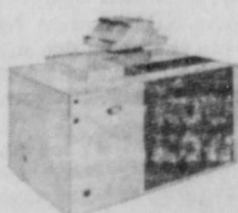

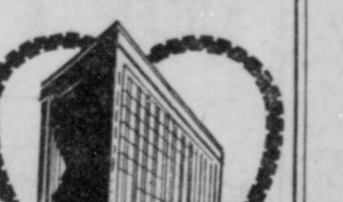

Rural Housing Credit Aids County To Build And Improve Homes In '69

Families in Brown and Mills Counties borrowed \$337,240 from the Farmers Home Administration to build and improve homes during the calendar year 1969, the Federal agency's county supervisor, Harold Kennedy, reported today.

"These funds, advanced under the Farmers Home Administration rural housing program, provided better and more comfortable homes for more than 40 Brown and Mills County families," Kennedy said.

He quoted James V. Smith, National Administrator of the Farmers Home Administration, as reporting that more than

61,500 rural families across the nation participated in the rural housing program last year, borrowing a record \$587.9 million. More than 250,000 persons are living in better homes because of the program.

"We are attempting to keep housing credit flowing into our small towns despite the tight money situation and the national general housing construction slump," FHA County Supervisor Kennedy said. "At the same time, we are encouraging builders and developers to step up their efforts to invest in rural America by increasing the volume of rural home completions."

Mr. Kennedy noted that local banks and lending institutions participate in providing loan funds which are insured by his agency. He added that nationally more than 98 per cent of individual family rural housing loan funds were provided by private investors.

"An important fringe benefit to rural America," Kennedy said, "is that the rural housing loan program is creating more than 35,000 man-years of employment, contributing directly to the income of rural people."

Farmers Home Administration housing loans are made only to applicants unable to obtain credit from other sources, and who live in communities of not more than 5,500 population. The Brown County office, located at 209 South Greenleaf, is one of 1,700 offices serving 3,000 counties of rural America. Mills County is served through their office located in the Soil Conservation Service office.

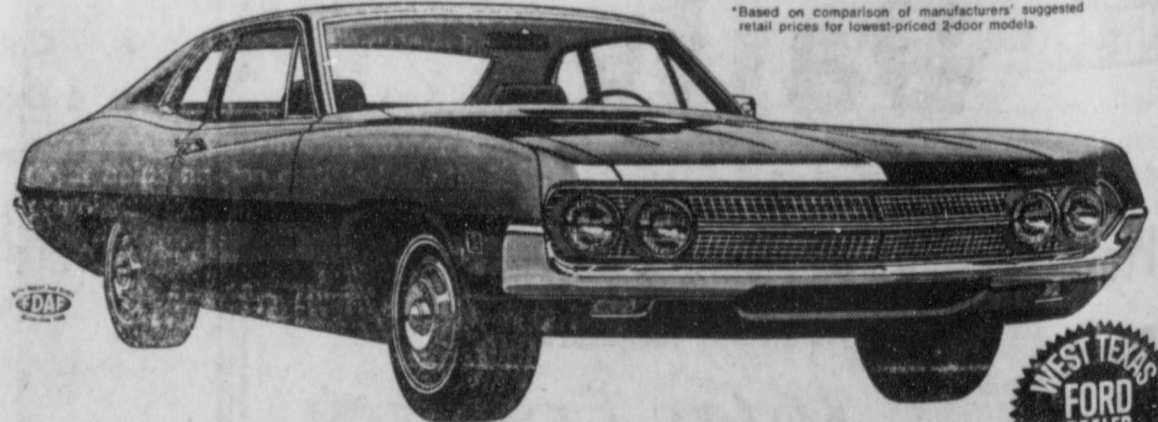

The directors and president of the San Saba Production Credit Association will attend a Group Director and President Conference September 9 and 10, 1970, at the Inn of Hills in Kerrville.

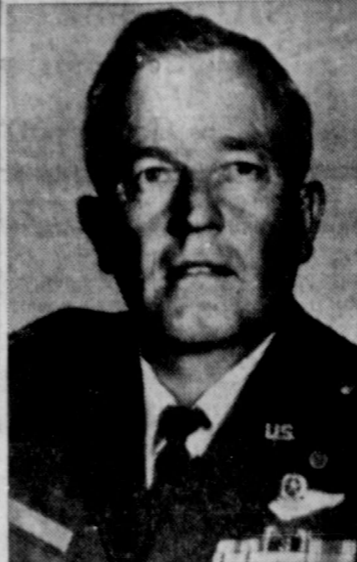
