

GHS Eagles Host Early Longhorns For District Opener & Homecoming Friday

A Close, Tough Non-Conference Game With Mason Punchers 21-20

The mighty GHS Eagles upped the seven-point favorite Cowpunchers 21-20 Friday night as they played their non-conference game of the season on a veer through the right guard for a fifteen yard touchdown run. Johnson added the final touch with a good kick. The score now stood a close 21-20 with the Golden Eagles leading.

Late in the fourth quarter the Eagles threw a do-or-die goal line stand as they held Mason to four downs on the one yard line. Playing with great determination on the goal line stand were Gary Summy, Bill Fisher, Sam Watson, Reggie Robbins, Johnny Miller, Gary Wiedebusch, Scott McLean, Eric Wright, Kennon McLean, Jeff Stewart, and Johnny Johnson.

The 21-20 victory over Mason brought the Eagles' season record up to 4 wins and 1 loss. Sam Watson carried the ball 28 times for a total of 110 yards; Johnny Johnson 8 for 112; Joe Dan Hardgrave 10 for 53; Joe Hudson 5 for 26; and Benny Humphries 3 for 10.

The Eagle team's desire, aggressiveness and teamwork did not fail to go un-noticed by everyone in the stadium.

"Our offensive line completely blew Mason off of the field," announced Head Coach Les Johnson, who also stated further, "It was just another tremendous team effort where every boy played to his best ability."

October 14 Is Opening Day For Personal Appearance Absentee Vote

Wednesday, October 14, to Friday, October 30, inclusive, is the period for absentee voting by personal appearance in the November 3 general election, according to an announcement by Mills County-District Clerk Walter A. "Toby" Bryant.

Any qualified voter in Texas who expects to be absent from the county of his residence on November 3 may cast an absentee ballot. To do so, he should take his voter's registration certificate to the county clerk's office during its hours of operation in the October 14-October 30 period.

In addition to state, district and local races, the November 3 ballot will include seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

By subject, the proposed amendments relate to: (1) censure and removal of judges; (2) authority for mixed beverage law; (3) assessment of farm, ranch and forest lands; (4) reconstitute State Building Commission; (5) county road bonds and assessed valuation; (6) increase value of homestead exemption from forced sale; and (7) authority to consolidate functions of government.

Texas has a record 4,150,645 registered voters this year. Normally, absentee voting accounts for approximately five per cent of the total vote turnout.

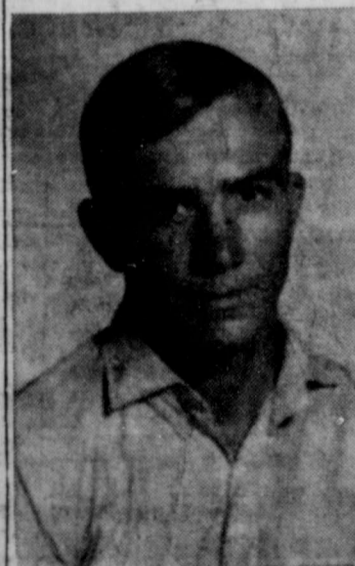

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. — It is somewhat difficult to keep in mind the original purpose and intent for which the United Nations was created. Its goal, of course, was to preserve peace in the World. At the time of its organization, Admiral Nimitz said "as long as men talk they do not fight."

It is really difficult to measure the United Nations in terms of accomplishments. The Security Council has settled some pretty sticky situations around over the World which could have conceivably led to war. The trouble is that it has developed offshoots which, in its operation, is causing the tail to wag the dog. It is engaging in activities not originally intended.

The 25th Anniversary of the United Nations is to be observed in July. At that time, a World Youth Assembly is to be a part of the celebration. It bodes likely that such a group will attract anti-American revolutionaries and furnish a forum for attack on this Country.

From reports, United Nations officials who are making arrangements for the Assembly have agreed to issue invitations to Communist China, North Vietnam and East Germany who are not even members of this body. One hundred twenty-six invitations are to go out. It can be assumed that a large number will use the occasion to make propaganda against the United States.

As far as can be determined, there are no rules about voting, which means that communist elements can be expected to rig the outcome of every resolution.

The Forum to be furnished by the Assembly could produce little more than abuses against America and the Free World. If encouragement was needed, it could come from statements made by the United Nations Secretary-General U Thant at a United Nations Conference in Tampere, Finland. As a part of

the Lenin Anniversary ceremonies, U Thant is quoted as saying that the principal author and creator of the Soviet Totalitarian System was "an outstanding scholar and prominent humanist" who championed the advance of "human rights and fundamental freedoms."

It is striking that the man he praised butchered and starved untold numbers of human beings who opposed him in Russia. He dismissed morality and prompted terrorist campaigns against all who resisted the communist theory. It is hardly conceivable that the Secretary-General of the United Nations, who is supposed to be dedicated to peace and freedom, could

heap praise upon Lenin and describe him as standing for fundamental freedoms.

On other occasions and in general, the United Nations has stood as the whipping boy in the United Nations. The Secretary-General has from time to time downgraded the United States and the values on which it is built.

The UN is not popular in this country and it will be less so if it permits young revolutionaries from all over the World to use its 25th Anniversary as an occasion to revile America. The organization had better get back on the track of trying to settle disputes among nations and stop trying to distribute America's wealth all over the World and sponsoring other socialistic schemes for which it was never intended. The American taxpayer will be cut about \$110 million this year for the running of the United Nations which is about 40 per cent of its budget.

If the Youth Assembly turns out as to be expected, there will be a justified demand in this Country that we stop paying beyond our share of these expenses and many will advocate our complete withdrawal from it. It makes no sense that Americans should pay for an organization which sponsors those who would heap abuses on our system and who would like to see our downgrading President Nixon and the State Department to deny the admission of the left-wing propagandists to the Youth Assembly. They should not be permitted to set foot on American soil.

Mills County Savings Bond Report For August

United States Savings Bond sales in Mills County during the month of August totaled \$1,110,000, according to County Savings Bond Chairman W. P. Duren. Sales for the eight month period were \$16,989.99 which is 28 per cent of the 1970 goal of \$60,000.00.

Texas sales during August amounted to \$15,063,651 while the year-to-date sales totaled \$121,269,825 for 67 per cent of the 1970 goal of \$179.9 million. Series E Sales alone during August 1970 were \$14,841,344 compared to 1969 sales of \$14,036,564—an increase of 5.7 per cent. The January-August sales for Series E Bonds totaled \$114,763,654 in comparison with \$108,578,640 during the same period of 1969.

Over the nation, Series E and H Savings Bond sales amounting to \$388 million were purchased during August — a 12 per cent increase over August 1969 sales of \$348 million. The eight month sales totaled \$3,149 million compared to \$3,048 million — 3.3 per cent above a year earlier.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has announced that antlerless deer permits for designated areas of Mills County will be issued at the County Courthouse on Friday, Oct. 30.

Landowners or their agents can apply for permits between 8:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m. on these dates. All interested landowners or agents are urged to obtain antlerless deer permits during this issuance period.

Maps showing permit issuance rates and compartments of issuance will be posted in the County Courthouse prior to the dates of permit issuance, it was announced this week by Benny D. Schriver, Game Management officer for Mills County.

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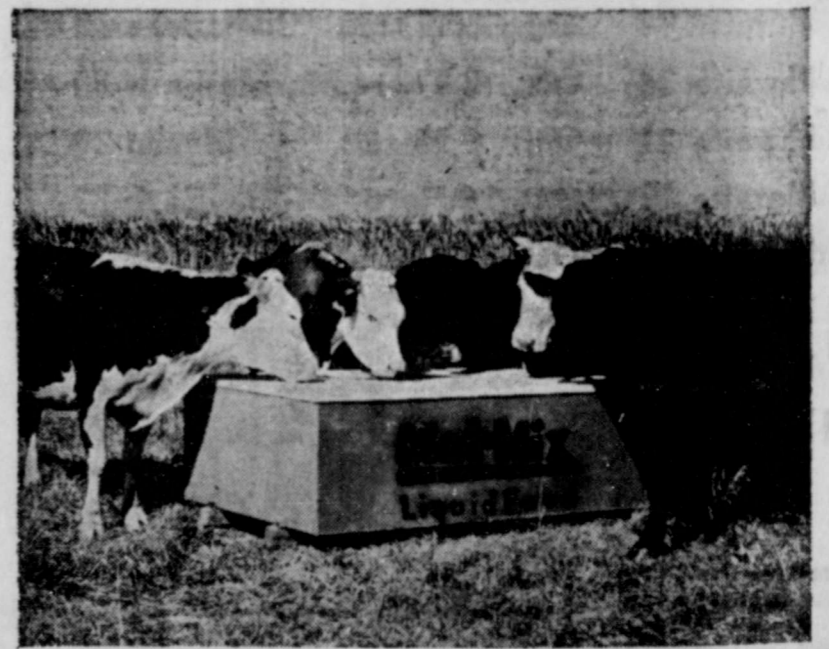
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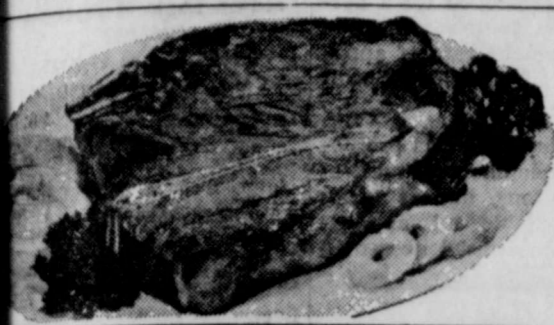
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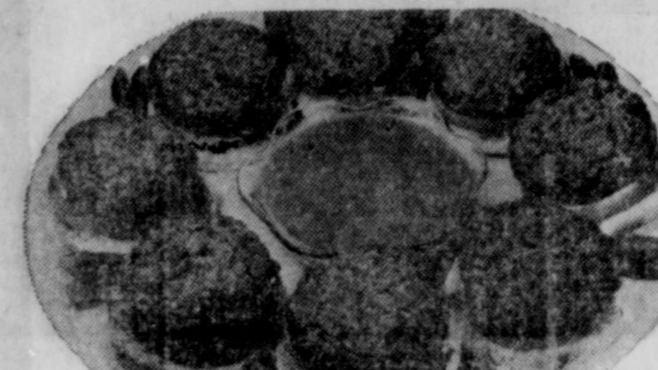

Cong. Omar Burleson Is Presented "Watchdog Of The Treasury Award"

Congressman Omar Burleson has been presented the "Watchdog of the Treasury Award," of the National Associated Businessmen, Inc. The award was made in recognition of Burleson's voting for economy and against inflation. The presentation was made by H. Vernon Scott, Executive Vice President of the businessmen's organization.
The N. A. B. has been rating members of Congress on their votes for fiscal responsibility since 1964 and presents awards for each Congress to those members whose records are for economy and against excessive Government spending. Burleson has received the award on previous occasions.
In accepting the award, Burleson said, "Government, like an individual, cannot forever spend money it doesn't have and maintain the confidence and credibility necessary to support it. The interest on the public debt is now approaching \$20 Billion. The prospects are for more deficits and more borrowing." "In addition," Burleson said, "the Federal Government is engaging in costly programs for which it was never designed, which end in failure and waste. There is enough expense of Government without doing so many things of doubtful value."
In accepting the recognition, Burleson expressed his appreciation for the encouragement it gave him to continue efforts to keep the Country's financial position strong and at the same time restrain the inflationary pressures eroding the value of the dollar.
"In the face of all the demands for more Federal money, restraints have got to be imposed if inflation is to be curbed," Burleson said. "I question no man's sincerity but I do question judgments. The symbol of the bulldog as watching the Treasury is good but sometimes I feel he is surrounded and outnumbered by the pack," the Congressman commented on the occasion of receiving the award.
