Children who will be six, or under 18 years of age, September 1, 1971, should be listed on the school census roll before the last day of January.

Karen's 1100-pound Hereford steer, named "20 Grand," took first place in the heavy weight class before he was named grand champion of the show. The steer was bred by her father, W. V. Horton Jr., and was fed under the supervision of County Agent George Reese. This was Karen's second grand champion at the Mills County Show.

The reserve champion was exhibited by Ricky Shelton, 13-year-old Mullin FFA'er. His steer was an 1185-pound Char-

olais-Hereford cross. It took second place in the heavy weight class before taking reserve champion honors. Ricky is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Denny Shelton of Mullin. Gary Hulsey, Mullin Ag teacher and advisor, supervised the feeding of Ricky's steer.

Debbie Lindsey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Lindsey of Mullin, exhibited the first place steer in the medium weight class. The top steer in the light weight class was shown by Lee Owens, son of Mr. and Mrs. Davis Owens of Center City.

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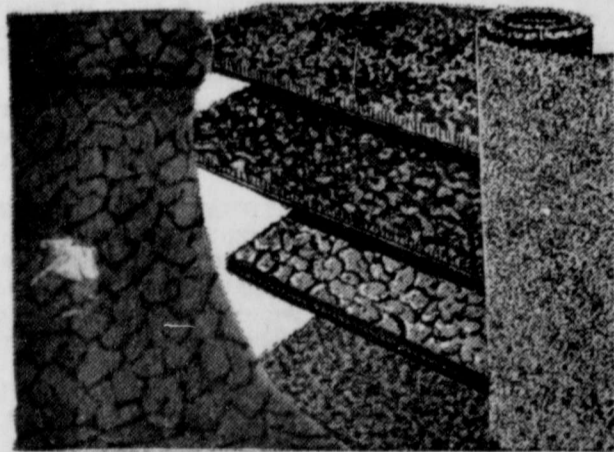

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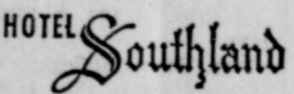

"CATTLEMAN'S" Is New Name For Production Credit Association

The San Saba Production Credit Association, which has borne this name since it was chartered in December, 1933, has changed its name, effective January 1, 1971, to Cattleman's Production Credit Association.

"Many ranchers and farmers will fondly remember their Production Credit Association by its former name since it was founded in the Depression of the Thirties and at a time when credit was hard to be found anywhere," states Charles Conradt, Vice President of the Cattleman's PCA. "Since it started operation in 1933, a total of \$378,876,231 has been loaned to ranchers and farmers in this area during both good and bad times."

Conradt stated further that the reason for the name change is that to many people "San Saba Production Credit Association" implied strictly a San Saba firm, but is in fact as much a part of any other town or county within the eight counties served by the association.

"It was the feeling of our Board of Directors that 'Cattleman's' is quite a general name which applies well to the agricultural economy of this area since about 75% of the total agricultural income is derived from cattle," says Conradt, "and quite frankly, we just liked the sound of the newly chosen name."

"It would well be imagined that the charter members of the Association were much more concerned with getting quick, much-needed credit in 1933 than they were with naming the Association they founded, although the charter name has served well down through the years. Little did the founding fathers realize that the meager capital they put into their credit institution would grow into something over 3 million dollars in capital and reserves in 37 years of operation," states Conradt. A

Statement of Condition elsewhere in this paper reflects that the Cattleman's Production Credit Association had a loan volume in excess of 17 million dollars as of December 31, 1970.

The Cattleman's Production Credit Association is completely owned and operated by 1,123 stockholders in Burnet, Gillespie, Lampasas, Llano, Mason, McCulloch, Mills and San Saba Counties. Offices are located at Brady, Goldthwaite, Lampasas, Llano and San Saba.

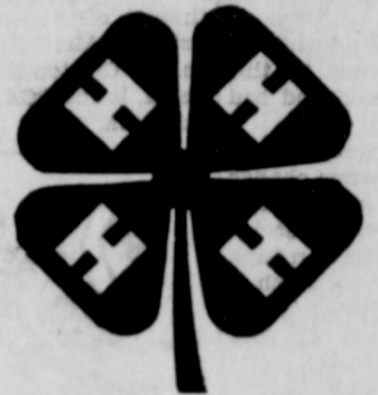

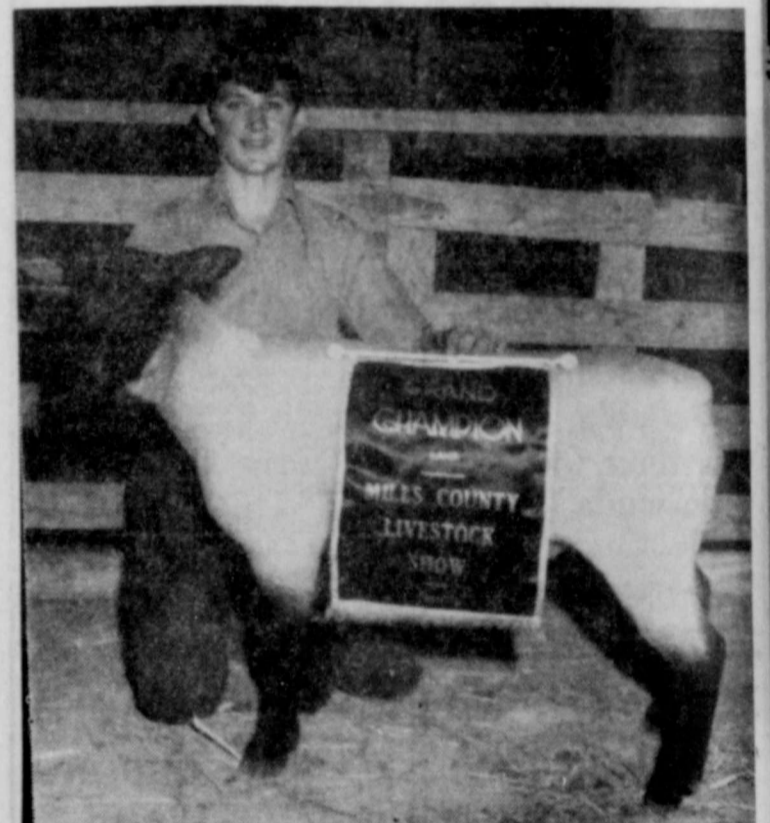

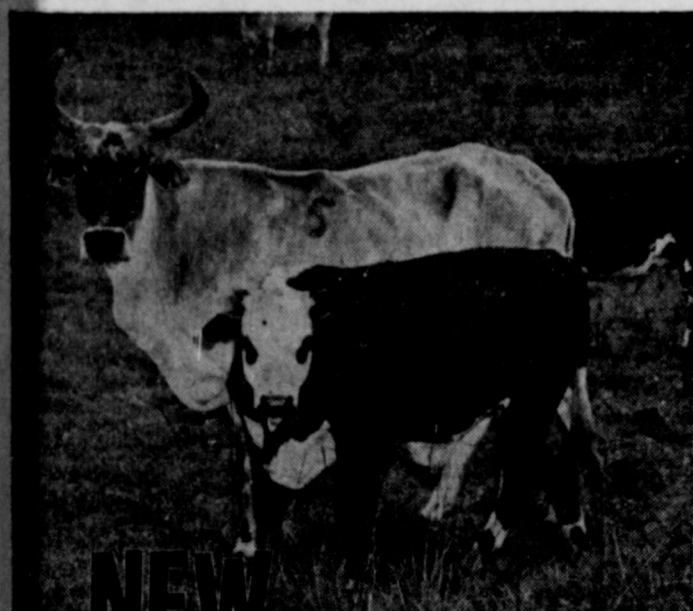

Wildlife resources are a valuable asset to many local landowners. These resources can and in many cases are becoming more and more important to Mills County residents in developing outdoor recreation, according to Wayne Borchardt, Range Conservationist, with the Soil Conservation Service at Goldthwaite.

Most of the land in Mills County has some value for some kind of wildlife and does have a definite potential for hunting and recreation. The potentials for quality hunting leases are dependent upon the willingness of the operators to develop and maintain a desirable habitat for wildlife, state Borchardt.

Controlling brush in patterns

and proper grazing use are just two of many measures that can be used to help improve both rangeland and wildlife habitat.

Heavy grazing pressure has caused much of the rangeland to steadily deteriorate and have less value for both wildlife and domestic livestock. Choice forage plants have been replaced with plants that provide less food for wildlife and livestock.

Planned revegetation of rangeland can be done in such a way as to benefit both domestic livestock and the game species present. Improved and highly productive rangeland will offer a more stable wildlife food supply.

Depleted grasslands infested with brush will provide plenty of cover but little food during stress periods such as droughts or severe winters.

Deer and other game animals are often the losers in intensive land-use programs, but careful planning can reverse this trend and make Mills County wildlife a bigger asset.
