Deadline Nears For Voter Registrations

Tuesday afternoon of this week, 1,851 Mills County citizens registered to vote, according to an announcement by H. G. Brooks, Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector. A good many of the 1,851 registered consists of 20 year olds. There are slightly over the 1,790 registered to vote last year a little less than the 2,000 registered two years ago at this time. She had a single lamb the first two times, then she produced triplets and since that time has had a set of twins, for the total of seven. Doggett reported that she raised all three of the triplets too.

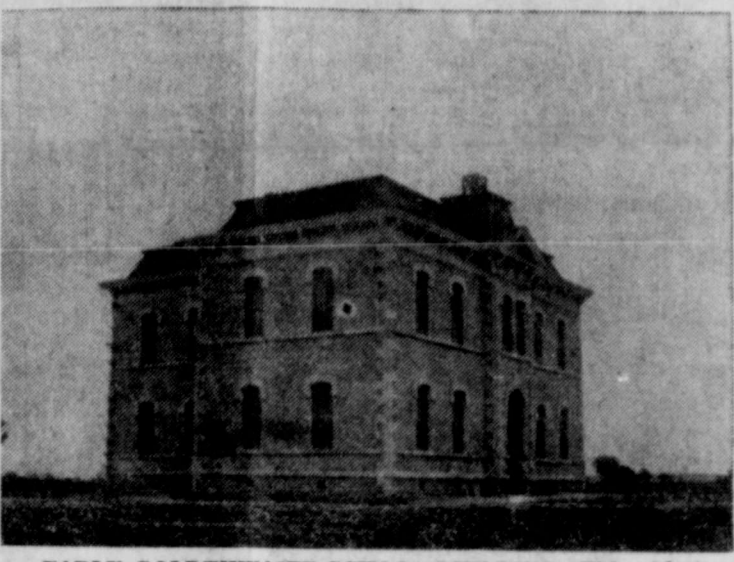
Doggett stated that the ewe was purchased from a flock owned by Charlie McLean.

EARLY GOLDTHWAITE SCHOOL BUILDING—This old stone structure was the early day school building in Goldthwaite on the hill where present school buildings are located in the northwest part of the city. Corner stone of this building carried a date line of August 22, 1890.

The building was razed to make room for a new two story high school building that was used until the 1950's when progress again stepped into the picture and it too went out of the educational picture in Goldthwaite by being replaced with new buildings. This early day school and the high school building that followed stood on the site now occupied by the Vocational Agriculture Building.

Drug Abuse Program Attended By Approximately 200 Citizens

The Mills County Drug Abuse Program was well attended by interested citizens from all areas of the county Monday night.

After a general session and introductory phase, the audience was divided into three sections. Each of the sections had an opportunity to listen and talk with the three speakers for the evening.

Mrs. Marilyn Hoster, Regional Drug Abuse Consultant for the

Texas Education Agency, used a slide presentation in explaining the many types of drugs being abused by citizens of the country today.

Mr. Ernie Scholl, Director of the Narcotics Division of the Department of Public Safety, gave a very informative lecture on drug use and abuse from the law enforcement viewpoint and gave the audience an opportunity to smell burning Marijuana his department had confiscated in narcotics raids.

Mr. Steve King, a young Waco citizen and former drug abuser, discussed his own personal experiences with the drug scene and emphasized some of the things parents and interested adults could do in fighting drug abuse.

Dr. Tom Cody Graves, president of the Drug Abuse Committee, closed the program with a general assembly consisting of an informal question and answer session. The audience of approximately 200 was most attentive throughout the program and vitally interested in this ever present social problem.

1971 License Plates To Go On Sale At Mills County Tax Office Feb. 1

The new 1971 license tags for cars, trucks and trailers are scheduled to go on sale in Mills County at the Tax Assessor-Collector's office starting next Monday, February 1, according to an announcement by H. G. Brooks, Tax Assessor-Collector. Deadline for buying the new

license tags without penalty is April 1.

A lot of frustration has been taken out of registration again this year by the Texas Highway Department. The key to convenience is the new three part application form that was mailed out to vehicle owners in early January. This is the second year for the new method of registration to be in use.

The owner needs only to take the application form and registration fee to the tax office. The clerk will validate the application with the new license numbers and return part of the form as a receipt.

Another part of the form will be retained for the county's record, and the third part will be sent to the Motor Division of the Texas Highway Department in Austin.

Anyone in Mills County wishing to register his vehicle by mail should send the entire renewal application, the fee and an additional \$1.00 to the county tax office. The \$1 additional charge is provided by statute to cover the cost of handling and postage.

An owner may register his vehicle in person until April 1, but if he wants his plates mailed to him, he must send in his application and the necessary fees by March 1. This allows 30 days for delivery before the 1971 license plates must be displayed on vehicles after midnight, April 1.

The new method of registering vehicles eliminated a lot of standing in line and waiting last year and it is expected to provide the same relief this year, according to Billie Helen Jernigan, Deputy Tax Collector.

Governor Smith Tells Of Ways To Balance Budget Without New Taxes

AUSTIN, Tex. — Gov. Preston Smith told Texas lawmakers they can balance a \$6.8 billion budget without new taxes — by deficit finance, bond issues and federal assumption of welfare costs.

While legislators liked to hear that they can escape a tax bill, many found the Governor's approach contingent on too many "ifs." Voter approval of bond issues, they noted, is highly uncertain and congressional assumption of welfare is doubtful.

Here, in brief, is what the Governor proposed:

- ☆ Financing of welfare programs for only 10 months in anticipation that Congress will take over full funding by then.
- ☆ A maximum \$450 million

Mildred Anderson Serves With Temple Sen. Citizens Center

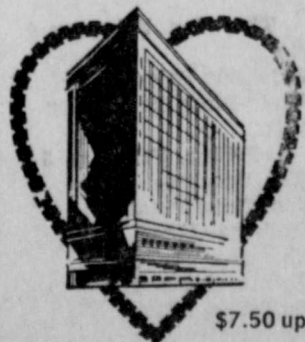

1 1/2 cups boiling water
1/8 teaspoon cream of tartar
2 tablespoons light corn syrup
Butter sides of heavy 1 1/2 quart saucepan. In it combine sugar, water and cream of tartar. Stir over medium heat until sugar dissolves and mixture comes to boiling. Cook without stirring to soft ball stage (238 degrees). Immediately pour on platter. Do not scrape pan. Cool until candy feels only slightly warm to the touch, about 30 minutes; do not move candy. Using spatula or wooden spoon, scrape candy from edge of platter toward center, then work until creamy and stiff. Knead with fingers until free from lumps. Wrap; place in covered container to ripen 24 hours. Tint, flavor, or shape and roll in confectioners' sugar.

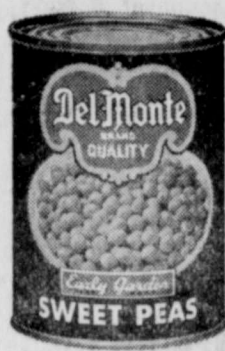

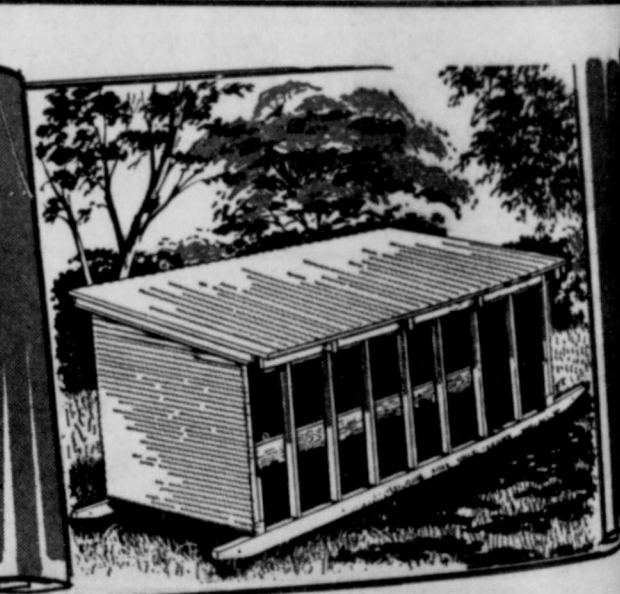

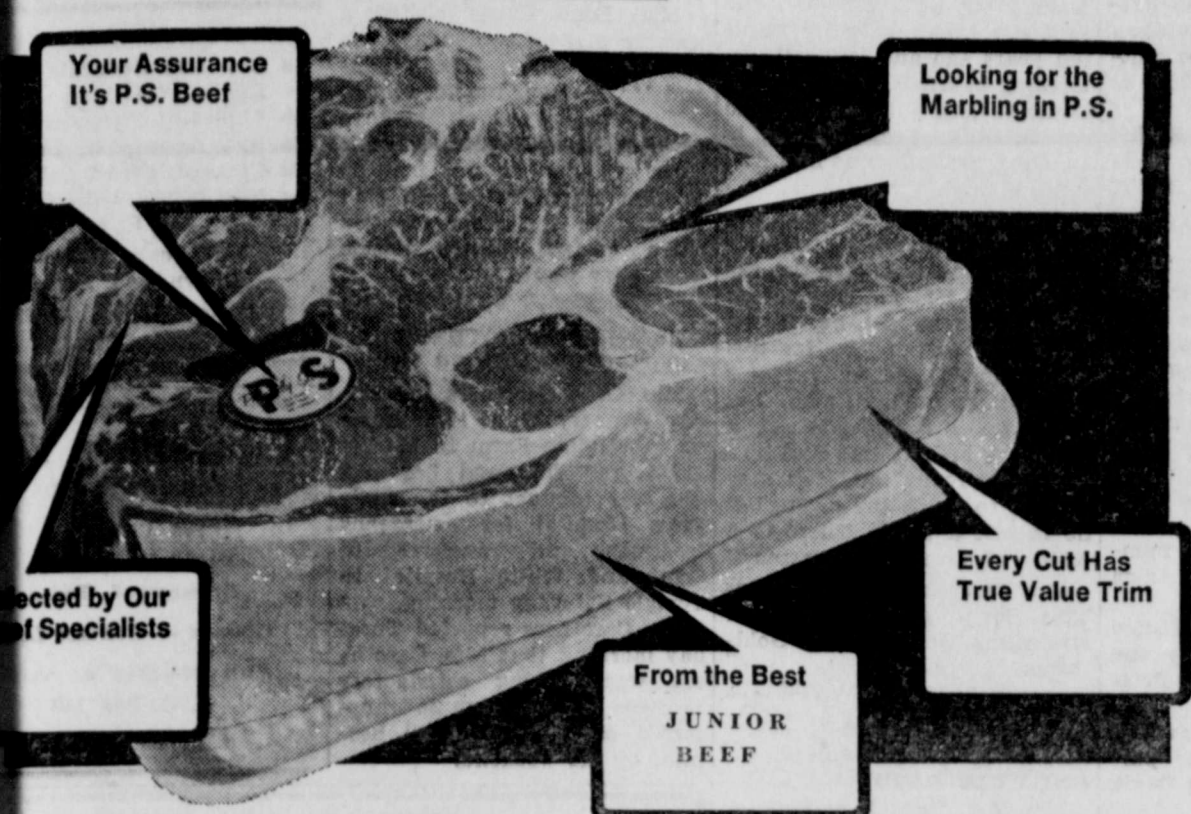

January Is Registration Time For Aliens

Information furnished by an alien in making his annual address report to the Government is confidential.

According to Mr. John W. Holland of the San Antonio Immigration and Naturalization Service office, the information furnished by aliens in reporting their addresses has been declared confidential by statute.

These reports must be submitted during January each year by all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions. Forms on which to submit the reports are available at any Post Office or office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Persons who are unable to pick up a form because of illness, or other reasons, may have a relative or friend obtain a card for them.

The card should be returned to one of these offices or mailed directly to the nearest office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Parents or guardians of aliens under fourteen years of age submit reports for such children.
