National Children's Dental Health Week will be observed this year from February 7 through 13.


Mrs. Lillian Stokes, Mills County School Health Nurse. has announced that February is being observed as Dental Health Month for the schools in Mills County.





1/3 cup margarine 2 eggs (at room temperatue) 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract

In a large bowl thoroughly mix % cup flour, sugar, salt and undissolved yeast.

Combine milk, water and 1/3 cup margarine in a saucepan. Heat over low heat until liquids are warm. (Margarine does not need to melt.) Gradually add to dry ingredients and beat two minutes at medium speed of electric mixer, scraping bowl occasionally. Add enough additional flour to make a stiff batter. Beat by hand 5 minutes. Brush top of dough with melted margarine. Cove; let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about one hour

Stir batter down; cover tightly with aluminum foil and refrigerate overnight.

Turn out onto a heavily floured board. Divide into 3 pieces; roll each piece into a 30-inch roll. Braid the rolls together; pinch ends to seal. Place on large greased baking sheet. Cover. let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour. Bake in moderate oven 375 degrees F. about 20 to 30 minutes, or until done. Remove from baking sheet and cool on wire rack. Best when served warm, either plain or frosted with Sugar
