June 3 Social Security Checks To Show 10 Per Cent Increase

First checks to include the new 10 per cent monthly benefit increase authorized in legislation acted upon this week by Congress will reach 26 million social security beneficiaries on June 3.

Robert M. Ball, Commissioner of Social Security, said today that the regular June 3 checks covering benefits for the month of May will reflect the new higher monthly amount. Separate checks, scheduled to reach beneficiaries later in June, will cover the amount of the increase for the months of January through April. Ball emphasized that social security beneficiaries do not need to get in touch with a social security office to get the checks. The payments will be mailed to beneficiaries automatically.

It will take a little over one month, Ball said, to refigure the benefit amounts for all beneficiaries, including the adjustment to take account of events that have affected their individual benefit payments for a particular month in the retroactive period. Over 2.5 million such adjustments are required in a typical month, he said, for such reasons as the death of a beneficiary, the remarriage of a widow, a child's attainment of age 18, a beneficiary's earnings, etc. The refiguring of benefit amounts is being scheduled so as to avoid delay in the regular delivery of the April 3 and May 3 checks, he said. Sign-Up Continues Through April 9 On 1971 Set-Aside Farm Programs

Cotton, feed grain, and wheat producers who want to qualify for program benefits must sign up to participate during the period March 1 through April 9, at their County ASCS Office. It was announced by ASCS officials.

Producers with established wheat or cotton allotments or feed grain bases for their farms are eligible to sign up.

Set-aside percentages are 20 per cent of the cotton base acreage allotment, 20 per cent of the total feed grain base, and 75 per cent of the domestic wheat allotment. Set-aside land must be equal in productivity to the average of the farm's cropland productivity.

Wheat may be substituted for feed grain (corn or grain sorghum). Feed grain may be substituted for wheat. Wheat or feed grain may be substituted for cotton, for acreage history purposes. Barley is not in the feed grain program and may not be used as a substitute crop. Grazing is prohibited on set-aside acreage from May 1 to October 1, 1971. No crop which grows or matures on the set-aside acreage in 1971 may be harvested.

In addition to the set-aside acreage, conserving base acreage must be maintained in a conserving use throughout calendar year 1971. Conserving uses include grasses and le-

gumes wildlife food or habitat plantings, summer fallow, and other practices. Each County ASCS Office has a detailed list of the conserving uses approved for that county.

A farm operator may sign up his farm for participation in one program and not another, even though he is eligible to participate in more than one program. For instance, if he chooses, a producer may participate in the cotton program and not the feed grain or wheat programs, even though his farm has a wheat allotment and feed grain base in addition to a cotton allotment. Likewise, owners or operators of more than one farm may sign up for participation on one farm and not on the other. "Offsetting" or "cross" compliance is not required in the 1971 farm programs.

History of cotton, feed grain, and wheat production on a farm will be protected if at least 45 per cent of the feed grain base is planted, 90 per cent of the cotton allotment, and 90 per cent of his wheat allotment.

Services may be requested at the County ASCS Office for measurement of set-aside acreage, for acreage planted to cotton, feed grain and wheat, and, if desired for measurement of other acreage of price-supported crops and of the conserving base. The charge made for this service covers the cost of measurement.

Before receiving a farm program payment, each participant will be required to certify he has set aside his required acreage, maintained his conserving base, and otherwise complied with provisions of the farm program or programs he signed up for. At the time of this certification, the farm operator will designate the exact location of his set-aside acreage. Following certification, the farm may be spot-checked at any time.

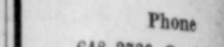

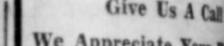
