regular three year term. Two members will be elected to the Mills County School Board, one from commissioners' precinct three and one from the county-at-large. County board members will be elected to serve a regular two year term. The election in Goldthwaite

Students in the Mills County Schools will have their regular Easter holidays again this year.

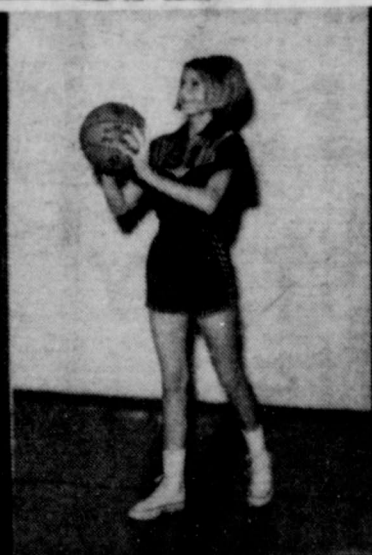
Goldthwaite will dismiss classes Thursday afternoon, April 1, and resume on Monday, April 12.

Priddy will dismiss all day Friday, April 9, for the holidays and will resume classes Monday, April 12.

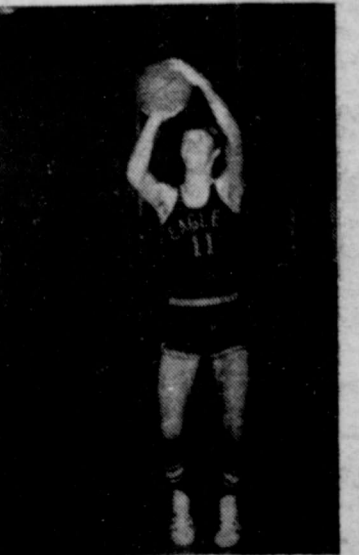
Mullin and Star schools will dismiss on Thursday afternoon, April 8, and resume classes at their regular time Tuesday, April 13.

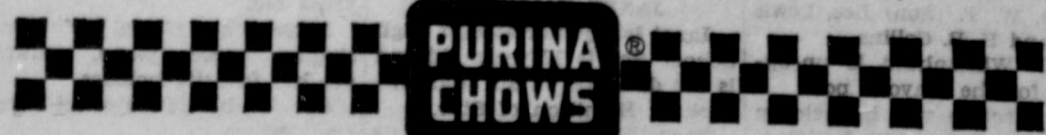

## Either-Sex Deer Hunts Will Be Further Developed By P & WL Dept.

Either-Sex deer hunts have proven successful, according to report by officials from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Bennie D. Schriver, game management officer for Mills County, this week released the following report from the department.

Texas deer management held the attention of wildlife officials and interested individuals during the past season. Bosque and Palo Pinto Counties, along with Grimes and Victoria Counties farther south, held the first county-wide, either-sex deer hunts since the turn of the century.

Either-sex hunts allow the hunter to take his choice of either buck or doe to fill his bag limit. In Bosque, Palo Pinto and Victoria, the limit was two deer, either sex. Grimes was unique with a one buck and one antlerless deer limit. Landowners were responsible for controlling the number of deer taken on their land.

The only restriction was the necessity of attaching a special tag to each antlerless deer for enforcement purposes to identify it as legally killed in the designated county.

Landowners were surveyed by mail after the season to determine total deer kill, hunter attitudes toward the bag limit and kill of antlerless deer. Results from the survey showed that either-sex deer hunting as controlled by the landowner has much merit and will be developed as a means of harvesting deer. Biologists reported little difference from normal deer harvest under the new system which is less complicated with more responsibility for total kill resting with the landowner.

Historically, deer of both sex have been hunted in these and other Texas Counties, but under stringent regulations where antlerless deer permits were issued to landowners on designated areas on a per-acre basis. Records were kept on use of permits issued and the effect of harvesting antlerless deer.

After many years of antlerless deer harvest by the permit system these conclusions became obvious:

- (1) Landowners and hunters readily accepted antlerless deer harvest;
- (2) Landowners as a rule did not use more than 50% of the permits issued to them;
- (3) Landowners are aware of the need to harvest both sex of deer, but are also conservative in allowing hunters to harvest doe deer;
- (4) Permit issuance to areas having surplus deer is difficult where spotty deer concentrations occur;
- (5) The monetary value of deer have caused landowners to think of long range deer management as a part of their annual income;

(6) Proper utilization of deer requires the harvest of both sexes where deer have reached the carrying capacity of the range — whether this be a deer to 5 acres or a deer to 100 acres; and,

(7) In essence, either-sex hunting has been practiced for years, because landowners have been responsible to determine the kill of antlerless deer under the permit system. Normally, less than 50% of permits issued in a county are used.

While antlerless deer have been harvested on selected areas under private ownership, other work has been done on state wildlife management areas. For example, hunter's choice deer hunts have been conducted on the Keer Wildlife Area since 1956. The result has been that either-sex hunting increases the total kill of deer, controls deer herds, and enhanced deer hunting in general.

There have been no detrimental effects caused by harvesting both male and female deer.

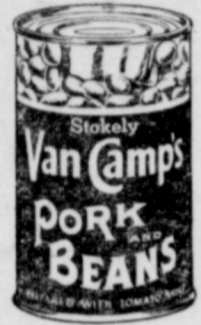

**County Farm Bureau President Joins Group On Livestock Tour**

Homer McCasland, Goldthwaite, represented the Mills County Farm Bureau as a participant in a three-day study tour of feedlots and livestock marketing facilities in the Texas Panhandle and Oklahoma.

The study tour, sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau, left Dallas early on March 15 and returned there late in the afternoon of March 17. The group of 54 livestock producers, representing 46 County Farm Bureaus, traveled on two chartered buses.

McCasland of Goldthwaite, president of the local county Farm Bureau, said that he will make a report to the organization's board of directors on the findings of the tour.

In addition to inspecting feedlots and other facilities, the Texans met with representatives of five other state Farm

Bureaus and the American Farm Bureau Federation while in Oklahoma City. The purpose of this briefing was to acquaint the Texas group with livestock marketing experiences in other states.

The local county president said the purpose of the trip was to gain first-hand knowledge of markets in the booming feedlot region in the Texas High Plains and to learn what other Farm Bureaus are doing in the field of livestock marketing.

Arriving in the Amarillo area on the afternoon of March 15, the two busloads of cattlemen visited a feedlot and packing plant. That night in Amarillo they met with area Farm Bureau cattle raisers and feedlot representatives.

Experiences in livestock marketing in other states were discussed by a panel that evening in Oklahoma City. Participating were livestock marketing directors from the state Farm Bureaus in Arkansas, Colorado, Iowa, Oklahoma, and Wisconsin. The discussion was led by Al Keating of the AFBF staff in Chicago.

On the final day of the tour, the group visited the Oklahoma Farm Bureau state office building (now being expanded to almost twice its present size) and inspected a new auction facility in Holdenville, Oklahoma, which is owned by the state FB.

**Caution Urged In Running Trotlines**

AUSTIN — Running a trotline is more dangerous than it looks. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Water Safety Services reminds fishermen that 15 persons drowned last year while attempting to run trotlines, and in most cases carelessness was a factor in the tragedies.

In all but two of the drownings, the trotliners fell from boats while trying to manipulate the lines.

Shifting winds, waves and the inherent unsteadiness of some types of boats all make it a good idea to wear an approved lifesaving device while running trotlines.

It's a good idea to avoid trotling in bad weather, and it's also recommended to have a partner along to help control the boat when the lines are run.

And when you are through using the line, remove it from the water. Each year fatalities occur when innocent swimmers become hooked or entangled in abandoned trotlines.

## Notice Permits Use Of "Mutton Or Chevon" To Identify Goat Meat

A notice proposing to permit the use of the name "Mutton" or "Chevon" to identify goat meat on markings and labels of federally inspected meat and meat products has been published in the Federal Register.

The notice was published after a delegation of Texas meat packers and representatives of goat producers petitioned the Consumer and Marketing Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, to use the common or usual names that are readily understood by both consumers and industry. The names mutton and Chevon have been used on goat meat and meat food products containing goat meat to identify products distributed in interstate commerce in the Southwestern area of the United States for many years, the notice said.

In addition, the petitioners further claim the name "goat meat" is discriminatory since meat from other species of animals does not have to be identified by names that include reference to the common name of the species of animals from which they are derived; for example, cattle meat, pig meat and sheep meat.

No decision on the proposed label change will be made until the public has had a chance to comment on it, the USDA said.

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association has gone on record in support of the term "mutton." All goat producers and others are urged to submit two copies of comments to the Hearing Clerk, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250, prior to or by April 22.

Bill Sims, executive secretary of the TS&GRA, said the duplicate comments on the proposal should carry a reference to the date and page number of the Federal Register announcement. The notice appeared on Page 5435, Federal Register, March 23, 1971.
