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## Commissioners Okay Expenses

Details concerning new procedures brought about by the creation of the new 287th Judicial District were discussed by the Parmer County Commissioners Court, at the court's regular session on May 8.

Due to the creation of the new district, it had been pointed out to the court in a letter from new District Attorney Johnny Actkinson that county will need to shoulder a larger pro-rata share of the salary of the District Attorney's secretary and the travel and benefits for the District Attorney's investigator.

The county has been paying on both of these items in the past, but due to the fact that the new judicial district is comprised of only two counties, Parmer County's share of these expenses needed to be increased.

A motion was passed that the county's budget be amended to show the District Attorney's secretary salary at \$8,000 per year, of which Parmer County would pay \$383.13

per month (\$4597 per year) pro rata share, according to population.

The travel and benefits of the District Attorney's investigator will be \$3,800 per year, of which Parmer County would pay \$2183 per year, or \$181.98 per month, for its pro-rata share.

Four estimates had been received for repairing and painting the ceilings of five rooms on the second floor of the courthouse. A motion was passed to accept the bid from Sherrill Lumber Company of Bovina, in the amount of \$525.

A discussion was held with Wendel Gresham, representing Ethridge-Spring Insurance Agency of Friona, concerning insurance coverage of county buildings not located in Farwell. It was the opinion of the commissioners that these buildings should be covered, and Gresham plans to get a firm figure from his company and report back to the court.

Motion was passed to approve the bond for Charles Aycock as county attorney.

M.C. Osborn and Duval Burton of the Soil Conservation Service met with the court to present a proclamation for consideration. A motion was passed declaring the week of May 23-31 as Soil Stewardship Week in Parmer County.

Request for easement to cross a county road with a gas line in Precinct 1 was approved.

## City To Add New Lights

City Alderman met Thursday, May 7, in regular session. Present were Mayor Lusk, Aldermen Gober, Scott, Hastings, Hughes and city manager Tom Bonds. Guests present were Mike Spears and Eugene Griffin.

The board passed a motion to install street lights on Ave. I and K and Forth Street in the 100 block.

Mayor Lusk appointed Oakley Stevenson, Durwood Bell, Robert Calaway, and Dickie Clayton to the Equalization Board to hold a meeting on July 29, 1981.

John Detten was hired as City Marshall to start June 1. The council also voted to put sewer lines in the alley between blocks 70-71, to be connected with sewer lines on the west street.

In other business, the board voted to borrow up to \$10,000 from the First State Bank of Bovina to repair the well on Ninth Street and also to extend the sewer lines. This loan is to be repaid with the Revenue Sharing money as it is received.

The new budget was accepted and it was voted to adopt the "Police Reserve Officer Policy and Procedures."

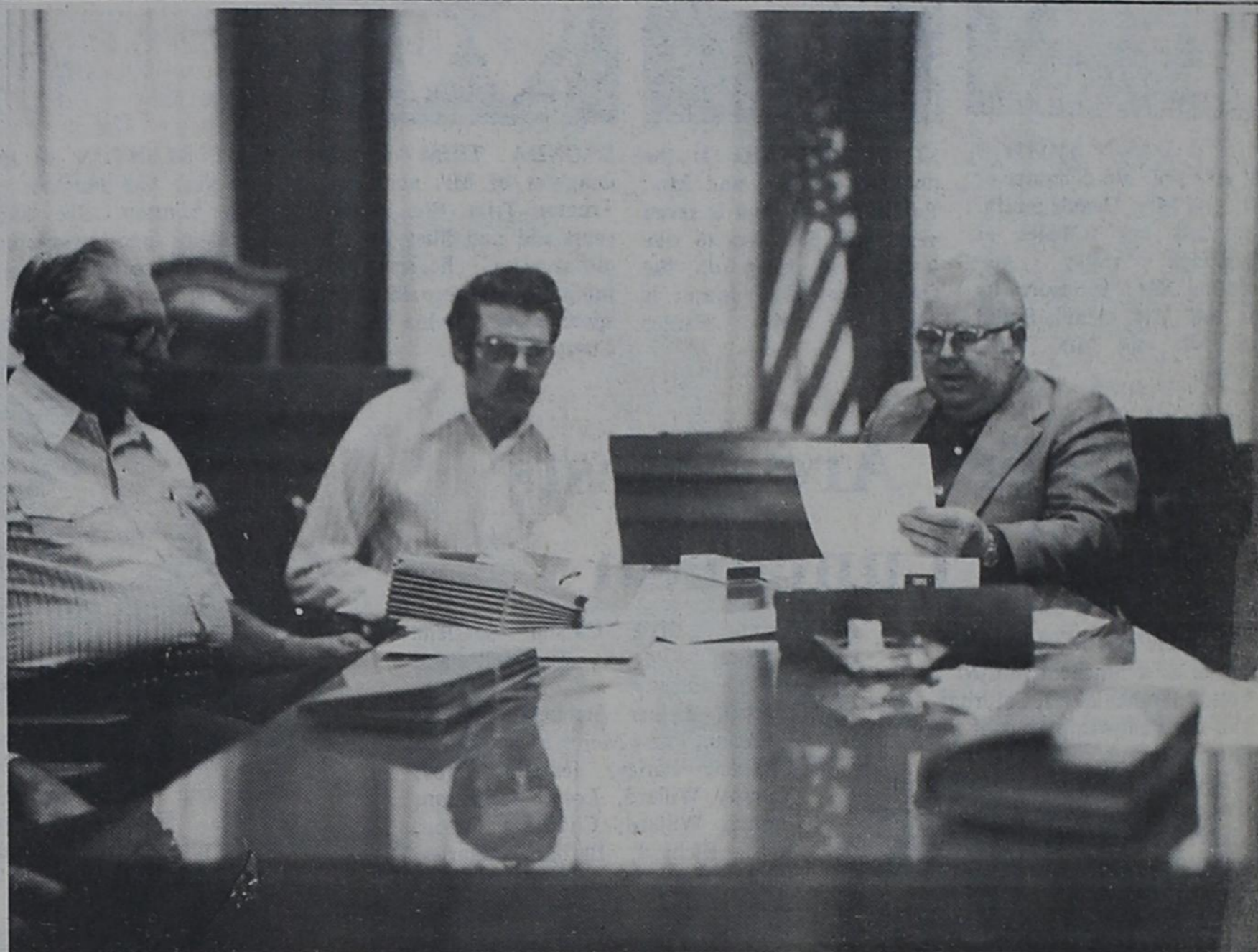

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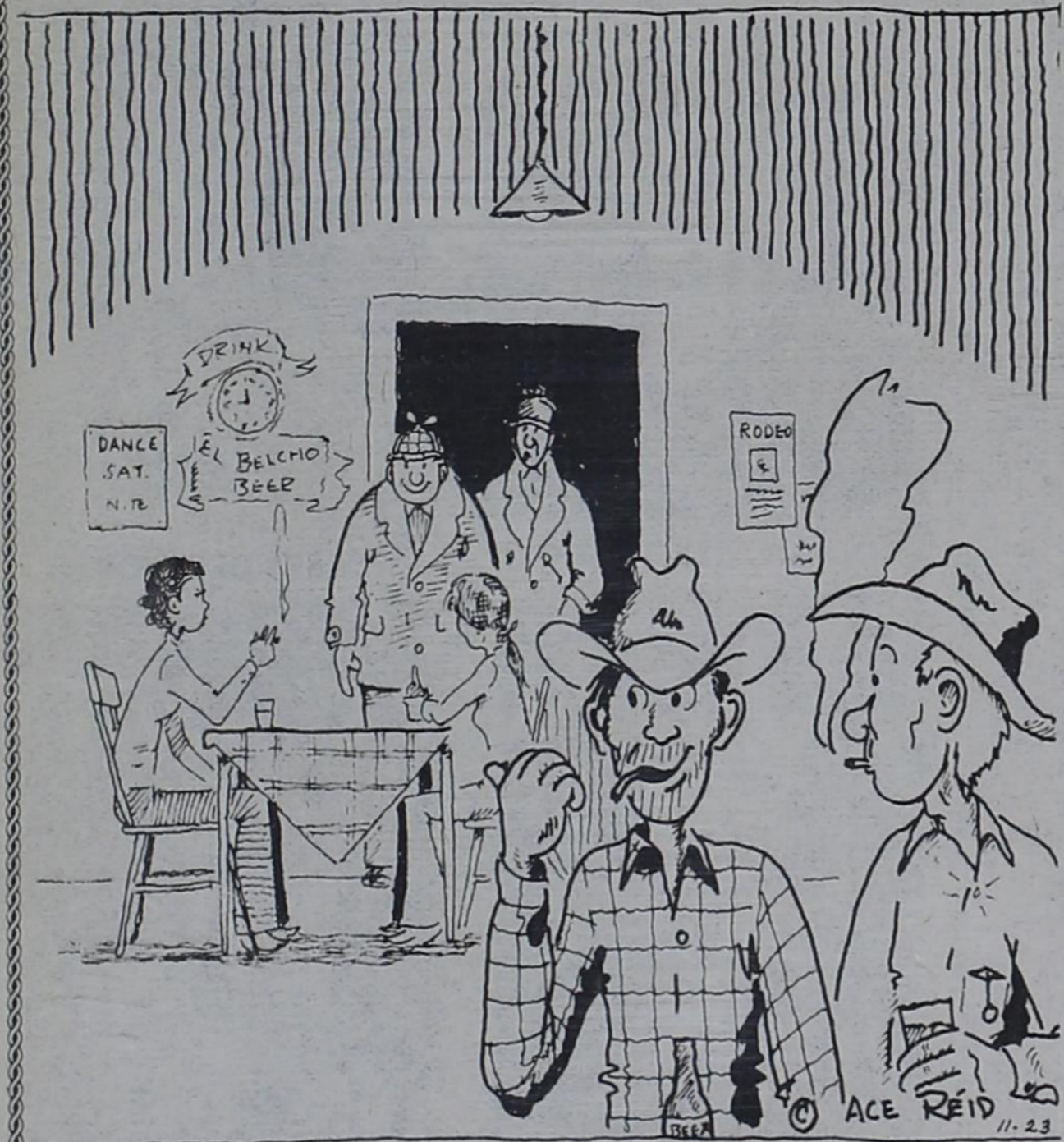

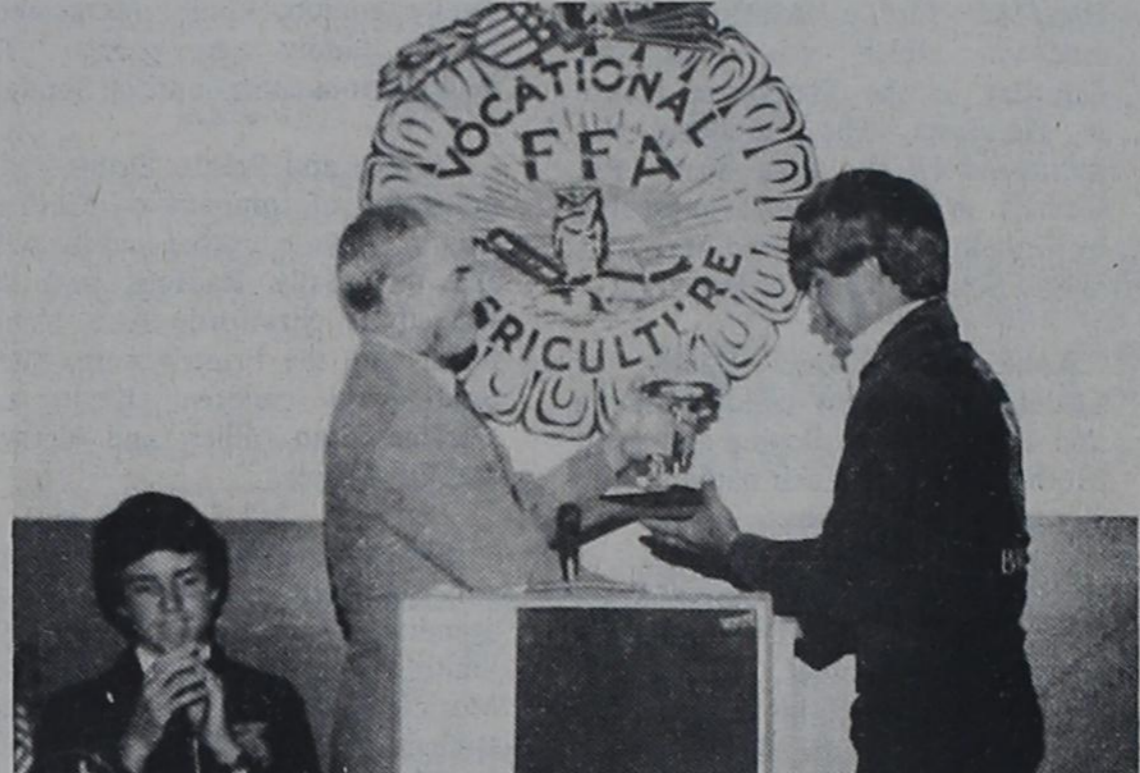

## CCC Will Not Sell Government Corn

Commodity Credit Corporation will not sell 23-25 million bushels of the government owned corn that is now stored in the Texas High Plains. This volume has been designated for use in disaster programs only.

Grain Sorghum Producers Association (GSPA) received this news May 5 after months of negotiations between the two groups. Sorghum area Congressmen and Texas Corn Growers Association have also expressed concern as to the effects upon High Plains grain prices, if CCC were to sell the entire 52 million bushels that were shipped into the heart of the grain sorghum area. This corn was shipped from the northern corn belt with the government paying all costs of transportation in relocating the grain.

## Methodists Have Film

Bovina United Methodist Church would like to invite everyone to view "In Remembrance," a film that recreates the dramatic events surrounding the celebration of the Last Supper, this Sunday, May 17, at 6:30 p.m.

GSPA executive director, Elbert Harp, met with the top USDA officials on May 2 in Washington, D.C. He was assured, at that time, that USDA would do everything possible to keep their sales from affecting the market. GSPA has and still contends that exporting the grain is the best way to protect the High Plains grain market.

Long ago, on an early spring evening, a small group of friends met to share a last meal together. Today, almost two thousand years later, that simple and distant event is celebrated by people around the world.

USDA argues that it would be too expensive for them to pay freight into the export markets. GSPA believes this disregards the fact that they (CCC) paid the freight while shipping it into West Texas. No decision has been announced on what the disposition policy will be for the balance of the corn that CCC has stored in West Texas.

Now, that celebration has inspired a motion picture of unique beauty and warmth, "In Remembrance." It is an unforgettable story of the men and women who chose to follow a young teacher from Nazareth and of the night that would change their world forever. It is a film about real people, fiercely Jewish people, who felt, as we feel, the fears, doubts, loves and loneliness that are the common bonds of all humanity.

Harp commends the USDA action which seals the 25 million bushels for disaster use only. He added, "We are continuing our work with them as they develop a favorable policy on the balance."

In Remembrance tells of their darkest night together, and of their last supper. It begins among the shadows of the first Passover, a mysterious night of death in Egypt, and ends with death's destruction at Golgotha.

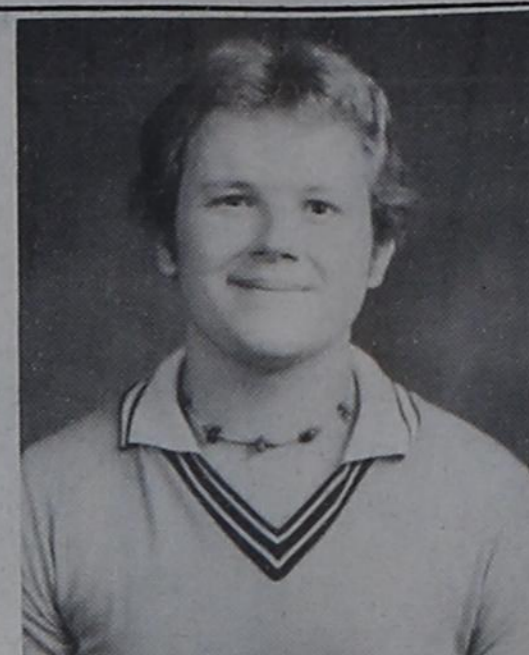

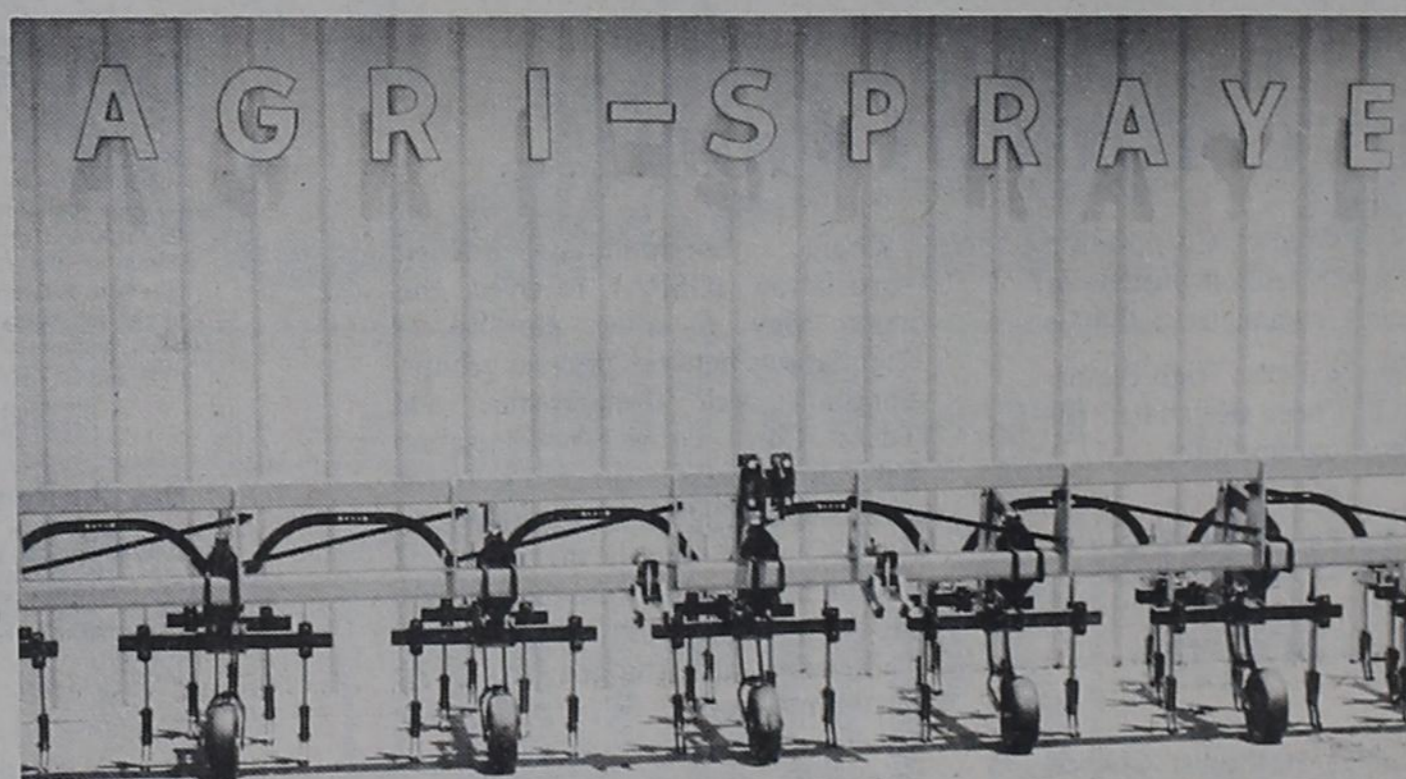

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## The Speaker Reports



by Bill Clayton

AUSTIN—The 67th Texas Legislature has passed a bill which would exempt the co-generation of electricity from government regulation by the Public Utility Commission.  
 Co-generation is the use of waste process heat emitted by an industry or small-scale user to generate electricity. Facilities to use this wasted energy are commercially available, but industry has avoided using them because of fear of becoming regulated utilities. This new law, which is now in effect, should erase the fear and encourage industry to employ energy-saving co-generation capability.  
 Use of co-generation will result in numerous benefits not only to industry, but to small-scale and residential users of electricity as well. Major industrial operators may experience a rise of up to one hundred percent in fuel-efficiency by using co-generation. The excess electricity not used by the generator may then be sold to a utility thereby aiding all consumers. The consumer's utility bill will either be lowered or will be held to less-than-expected increases as a result of the sale of excess electricity.  
 Small-scale users of supplemental energy sources such as wind or solar power may also sell excess electricity to the utility in the area.  
 In addition to the obvious benefits of conservation, the economic savings resulting from co-generation will serve to relieve the general rate payer from having to finance all of the large new power plants that otherwise would be needed.  
 The passage of the co-generation bill is another milestone in our state's quest to identify and develop potential sources of energy conservation.

# Research Begins On Grain Dust Explosions

The elusive causes and specific conditions that may inevitably cause grain dust explosions in grain elevators and feed mills are virtually impossible to "nail down" in every case, but not from the lack of financial and manpower support of the grain elevator industry.  
 Currently, more than \$1.6 million has been pledged by firms in the grain industry to conduct research for the purpose of identifying these causes and conditions. All of this money has been made available by private industry, including many grain firms that have facilities in Texas. Texas Grain and Feed Association has provided a \$10,000 donation. Texas A&M University is among the twenty universities, private firms, and research organizations currently engaged in specific research projects.  
 "The National Grain and Feed Association, through its 52 member Fire and Explosion Research Council, is guiding the efforts for this unprecedented grain industry financed research program. Today, 20 research projects totaling more than \$500,000 in industry donated funds have been awarded," according to National Grain and Feed

Association spokesmen.  
 "The Council is sponsoring practical research that has the best chance of yielding workable results that can be put to use immediately by grain and feed firms to maximize safety," they emphasize.  
 From recent attention-getting headlines and irresponsible statements made by various "headline grabbers" it would appear that there are more fatalities in the grain elevator industry due to dust explosions than in any other industry. According to USDA there have been 12 fatalities during 1979 and 1980 in grain elevator explosions, while the National Safety Council during 1979 reported a total of 13,200 fatalities in all industries with the construction industry responsible for 2,600; agriculture 1,900; manufacturing 1,800; and government related jobs 1,700.  
 It would appear that with government related jobs accounting for 1,700 fatalities, more inspectors is not the answer. Until the conditions which prompt these explosions and the causes are definitely identified, inspectors may be at a loss as to what to look for

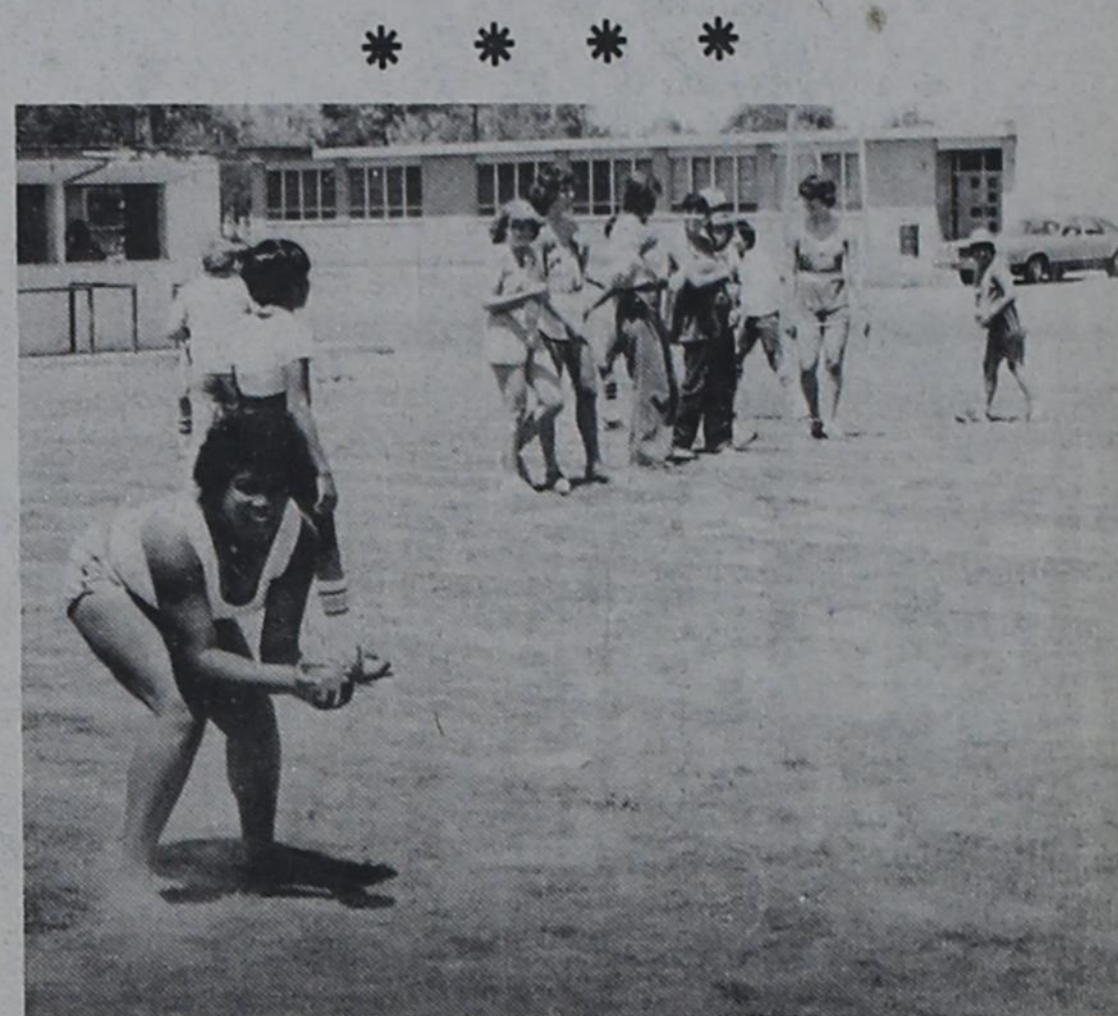

## Week Sets Emphasis On Stewardship

Soil Stewardship Week will be held nationwide this year, May 24-31, according to Raymond Schueler, member of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Since 1955, Soil Stewardship Week has been recognized in churches and schools across the nation. It is designed to focus on the nation's natural resource problems and to consider ways to solve them.

"This country must, at whatever cost, maintain the capacity of the land to produce food and fiber," says the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) in its booklet for the 1981 observance. NACD sponsors Soil Stewardship Week in cooperation with the nation's 3,000 soil and water conservation districts.

"With our own population at 220 million and growing and with many regions of the world depending on the United States to supplement their food supply, the need to maintain our productive capacity becomes increasingly apparent," according to NACD.

This year's event focuses on "Society's Pressure Points" as its theme and covers such topics as soil and water conservation, urbanization, and loss of prime farmland.

Information and materials for the 1981 observance of Soil Stewardship Week have been made available to local churches from Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.



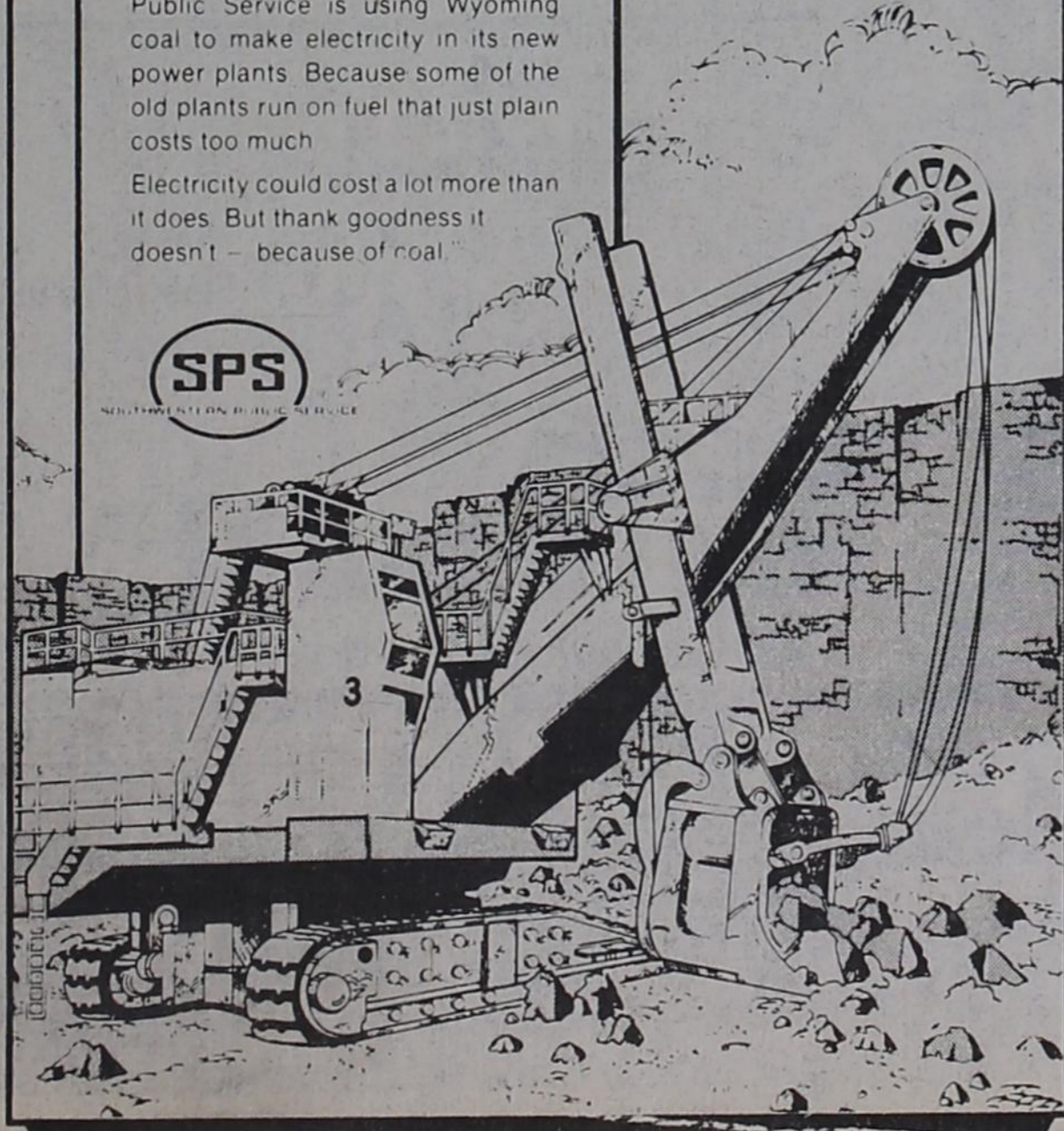
