Sheep Producers And Lamb Feeders Vote On Major Decision June 7-18

Sheep producers and lamb feeders throughout the country are scheduled to make a major decision June 7-18 when the American Sheep Producers Council (ASPC), headquartered in Denver, Colorado, will call a nationwide mail referendum to determine if sheep owners want to continue the 16-year-old promotion program for both lamb and wool.

According to Louis L. Farr, president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, the referendum is called by the ASPC after each passage of the National Wool Act in Congress. The Wool Act was passed last year as a part of national legislation.

The referendum is to determine if producers want to continue to have deductions made from their income tax payments which are in lieu of finance lamb and wool advertising, sales promo-

tion, education and sheep industry development programs as carried on by the American Sheep Producers Council (ASPC), headquartered in Denver, Colorado.

Farr added that the ASPC was set up in 1955 by sheepmen through a "self-help provision" of the National Wool Act that allowed for deductions from income tax payments to finance lamb and wool promotion to the nation's consumers. At present, deductions amount to 1½ cents for each pound of shorn wool and 7½ cents for each 100 pounds of unshorn lamb sold.

Since 1955, four referendums have been called after passage of the Wool Act. Farr states that sheep owners gave "overwhelming support to their promotion program in all of the past votes."

The referendum vote is to be conducted through county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) offices. All sheep producers and feeders are eligible to vote who have owned sheep or lambs, six months of age or older, for any one period of at least 30 days since January 1, 1971. Ballots will be mailed to producers and feeders by June 7 and must be returned to county ASCS offices not later than June 18. Farr emphasized, approval of two-thirds of the total number of producers voting, or of producers having two-thirds of the total volume of production represented in the referendum is required to keep the promotion program in effect.

Only 6.09 Inches Of Rainfall Here In Five Months

City Council To Protest Santa Fe's Proposed Change For Local Station

Members of the City Council meeting in regular session Monday night in the City Hall voiced their protest against proposed change that Santa Fe Railroad officials are planning for the Goldthwaite station.

Santa Fe officials have filed an application with the Texas Railroad Commission to close the Goldthwaite station and make it a prepay station.

A hearing is scheduled to be held on the matter in Austin on Thursday, July 8.

Interested parties, especially shippers and receivers of freight through the station are urged to request that the hearing be scheduled in Goldthwaite. This would make it more convenient for everyone who uses the station facilities to appear before the examiner and state their views.

In other business the Council approved the purchase of new bucket truck, heard operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments of the city for May and other progress reports of city work projects.

Purchase of the new bucket truck with hoist facilities was approved by the council. This matter had been under consideration and discussion for the past year. City Manager W. C. Barnett was instructed at the last meeting to secure some additional information about prices and specifications. When it was presented Monday night the council voted to place orders for the bucket truck with boom and hoist facilities at a cost of \$12,478.00 and a new two ton truck chassis to mount it on at a cost of \$4,160.00, for a total cost of \$16,638.00. Delivery of the equipment is expected in 120 to 150 days.

Barnett presented monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments. He also gave progress report on the sewer expansion program and other city activities.

The council discussed salary scheduled and approved some increases for city employees to be incorporated in the city budget for the new year, that will be prepared and presented to the council at the next meeting.

Morning session will be devoted to 4-H and FFA judging contests and the afternoon session will cover information on Angora Performance Tests.

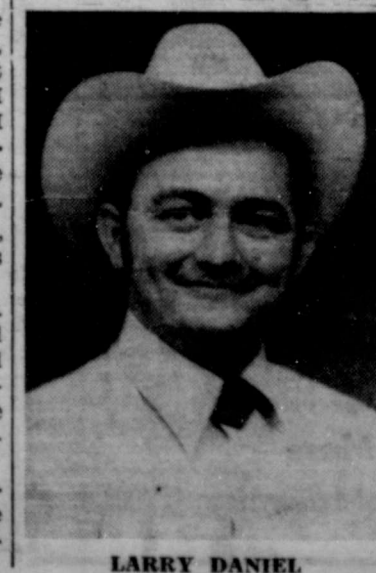
Haden Haby, County Agriculture Agent for Edwards County, is program chairman for the field day.

The meeting will begin at 7:00 p. m. and last until 9:00 p. m. Everyone who is interested is invited to attend.



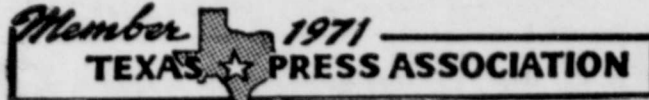
