Bank Deposits Over \$1 Million During Past Year

Bank deposits in Mills County State Bank were more than one and a half million during the past year, according to a statement of condition appearing in this issue of the Eagle.

The statement shows one of the highest years in growth in the history of the local bank.

As of June 30, 1971, deposits totaled \$1,672,336.21 while on June 30, 1970 they were \$1,106,477.41.

Checks and discounts went up to one million during the year. On June 30, 1970, checks and discounts were \$5,000,000 and on June 30, 1971, they were up to \$6,955,916.71.

Resources of the bank increased from \$12,405,789.32 on June 30, 1970 to \$14,106,477.41 on June 30, 1971.

W. R. Poage, of Waco, congressman for the 11th Texas District will be representing Mills County under the new re-districting plan as approved by the Texas legislature.

In a letter to the editor regarding Mills County being placed in district eleven Congressman Poage wrote the following:

"Mills County has just been placed in the Eleventh District which I have the honor to represent. I realize that your people have been most ably represented by Hon. Omar Burleson for many years. Technically, he will continue to be your Representative for some months but both he and I will try to serve in any way we can.

"I am happy to have the opportunity to include Mills County in the Eleventh District. I am sure you will find the people in the counties which have heretofore comprised the District to be among the finest in the world just as they are going to find their new associates.

"Our office staff is, I believe, one of the best. If we can be of service, we are always glad to try. We cannot always get the desired results but if you feel that we might help, let us know. "I hope to have some opportunity to get acquainted over the new counties in the near future, but whether you have met me or not, don't hesitate to call on us. We are in Washington to 'represent' you."

Lions Join Community-Wide Protest Of Santa Fe Plans To Close Station

Members of the Lions Club at their regular meeting Tuesday night in the high school lunch-room went on record to protest plans of Santa Fe Railroad officials to close the Goldthwaite station.

Club members voted to present their resolution opposing the removal of the local station agent at the special hearing to be held in the District Courtroom Thursday, (today), July 8, by the Texas Railroad Commission.

The hearing is scheduled for 9:00 o'clock this morning and a large local representation of interested parties is expected to be on hand to voice their opposition to the proposed change.

H & F Club Shareholders To Consider Purchase Of Lake Merritt Property

The annual meeting of stockholders of the Mills County Hunting — Fishing Club, Inc., will be held this week Friday, July 9, at 8:00 p. m. at Lake Merritt, according to official announcement and notice mailed to all shareholders.

Dr. T. C. Graves, president, and W. P. Duren, secretary, mailed out a special letter to all shareholders since this meeting calls for something more than the usual business to be transacted.

In addition to electing four directors the shareholders will consider an item of business involving an option for the purchase of the Lake Merritt property.

Officials stated that it is urgent that all shareholders attend this meeting since the future of the club rests on decisions made at this meeting.

The following proposal was mailed to each stockholder, by Club officials.

A PROPOSAL TO PURCHASE LAKE MERRITT

"A few weeks ago Dr. Graves was contacted by representatives of Santa Fe who stated that the Lake Merritt property had been sold to Santa Fe Land Improvement Company, and

that it would be necessary to negotiate a new lease with the Club or sell us the property. The proposed lease on approximately 160 acres would be around \$4,500.00 per year plus repairs and upkeep of the dam, which could have involved several hundred dollars per year.

"At a recent meeting between Directors of the Club and representatives of Santa Fe, a purchase option was agreed on whereby Mills County Hunting and Fishing Club, Inc., would be given an exclusive 90 day option to purchase the entire Lake Merritt property comprising approximately 417 acres for a cash consideration of \$145,000.00. The Club would have 45 days after exercising the option to pay for the property.

"A proposed way of handling the purchase plus additional expense to be incurred on repairing the dam and fencing the property would be for each stockholder to pay \$800.00. In this way the property would be clear of any debt. It is thought that your share of stock would immediately be worth \$1,000.00 or more. Financing will be available on an individual basis should you as a shareholder need it.

"This is an URGENT matter. Lake Merritt is a valuable property and has tremendous possibilities with the Club owning it."

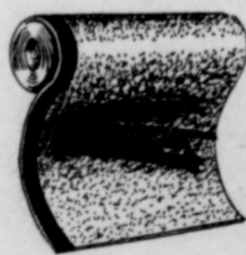
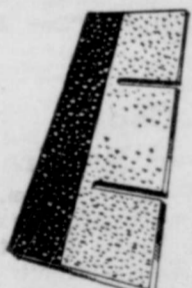

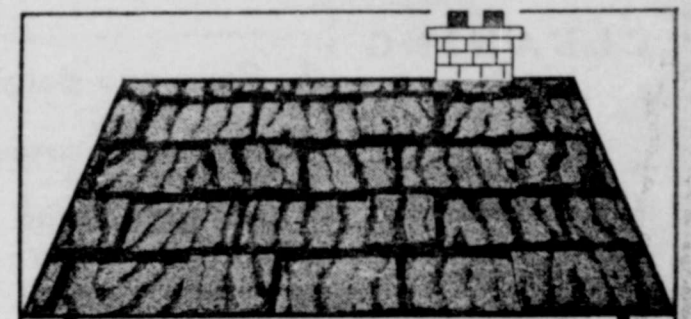

Lack of water has caused many headaches for the past few months. Ranchers and farmers in Mills County have to depend nearly 100% on rain to produce their livestock and crops.

Cattle production during a drouth is a very rough situation but there are some ideas which can take away some of the hardship. One good practice to follow is a strict pasture rotation. By dividing your pasture land into at least four smaller pastures, a rancher can graze one quarter while the other three quarters rest and get a little growth to them even in a time of drouth. Norman and Ray Duren are both practicing pasture rotation where each part of their pastures is getting at least 3 to 4 months of rest each year.

Pasture rotation is just one aspect of good ranch management. By culling old cows or non-producing cows out of a herd increases the amount of grass available for the best cows in a herd. During dry weather, good dry grass is essential for roughage but the protein, minerals, and vitamins are lacking. Cattle need to be supplemented by feeding these items in order to maintain their body needs as well as provide and nurse a calf. Cattle need to be sprayed for flies and drenched for worms. Flies cause cattle to lose a lot of needed flesh by a constant fighting of flies. Drenching cows for worms twice a year has been proven to increase a cow's efficiency of feed and also their ability to raise a healthier and faster growing calf.

Many ranchers have improved grasses for supplemental grazing. This is a life saver in a time of drouth if rotation and management are well practiced. Fertilization of these improved grasses can increase their potential which in turn provides the rancher an opportunity to summer his cattle much easier and with a lot less money. Killing mesquite and other brush in your pastures also improves pastures in many ways. One is the fact that they take away a large amount of much needed moisture from the grasses in a pasture.

There are many ideas of livestock production during a drouth and not every one of them works all the time. There is not a definite solution but ideas from different sources can be very beneficial in your own operation.

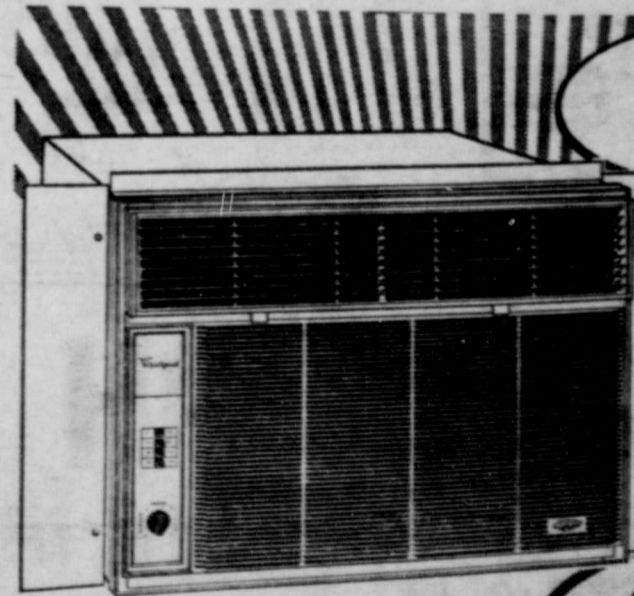
