It is the former John Berry property and is located between the high school block on the south and the Eagle track field and Campbell Street on the north. The property has Earl Street on the East and is bounded on the West by Pecan Street.

McLean purchased the property from R. L. Burdette who secured it from the Berry Estate and had it platted for a housing addition. Plat of the addition was filed with the city and duly approved by the City Council on June 7.

H & F Club Directors Are Authorized To Purchase Lake Merritt Property

Members of the Board of Directors of Mills County Hunting & Fishing Club, Inc., at a meeting last Friday were authorized by the stockholders to exercise

their option for the purchase of the Lake Merritt property. Stockholders voted for the directors to proceed with plans to negotiate for the purchase of

the property which consists of approximately 417 acres including Lake Merritt and the club facilities.

In excess of 100 shareholders were represented at the annual meeting which was held at the lake and unusually well attended. There are 200 shareholders.

The meeting was presided over by Dr. T. C. Graves, president, and W. P. Duren, secretary of the club. They explained to the group the proposal to purchase the property. The matter was well discussed during a question and answer session and shareholders in general expressed their feelings that this was the only solution for the club.

Club officials and representatives of Santa Fe had agreed on a purchase option whereby the Mills County Hunting & Fishing Club would be given an exclusive 90 day option to purchase the property for \$145,000.00 cash. The club will have 45 days after exercising the option to pay for the property.

A proposed way of handling the purchase plus additional expense to be incurred on repairing the dam and fencing the property would be for each shareholder to pay \$800.00.

Officials announced that financing will be available on an individual basis should any shareholder need it.

Those who felt that they can't go along with the purchase plan and want to offer their share for sale were assured by Club officers that they would help them find buyers for their shares.

NEW DIRECTORS

Four directors were elected for a two year term. They are: Dr. T. C. Graves, J. D. Harper, Dr. M. A. Childress and Dawson Cooper. Holdover directors are: W. P. Duren, Dr. R. Glynn Raley and B. A. Hodges.

Dues were approved the same as last year at \$30.00 per share with \$5.00 extra for cabin owners to pay for water. Permanent residents at the lake will be charged \$2.50 per month for water.

City Council Adopts Ordinance For Tax Levy And Approves New Budget

The City Council meeting in regular session Monday night in the City Hall adopted an ordinance to levy taxes for the governmental functions of the city and approved budget for the fiscal year starting July 1.

Budget for the new year including all departments totals \$242,000.00.

This action was taken after City Manager W. C. Barnett presented detailed financial statements covering each of the utility departments, and the general government for the year ending June 30, 1971. He also presented financial statements covering the library, swimming pool, cemetery fund, and the park fund.

The ordinance will levy taxes for the use and support of the Municipal Government of the city and provide for interest and sinking fund for the year 1971-72. The tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100.00 valuation remains the same as last year with \$1.40

for the general fund and \$1.0 (ten cents) for interest and sinking fund.

The new tax roll is expected to be completed and presented to the council at the September meeting.

Barnett also presented monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments for the month of June and the quarterly treasurer's report.

PAVING PROJECTS

The council heard a report from the city manager regarding the summer paving and street improvement program now underway.

Petitions have been presented to the city by residents of three areas requesting street paving. These include the north end of Reynolds Street, Earl Street from Hanna Valley Road north to Campbell Street and a section of Trent Street south of the football field.

ACTION RESCINDED ON MASONIC CONTRIBUTION

The council rescinded action taken earlier this year when a cash contribution of \$1,000.00 to the Masonic Lodge for their new building fund was approved. Payment had not been made.

This move was on unanimous vote of the council after it was found the earlier action was illegal since the law prohibits donation of municipal monies.

In cities operating under general law: "Donations of gifts of municipal monies to any organization or individual — no matter how worthy the purpose — are forbidden."

Cecil Ira Egger Named Registrar For Draft Board

Cecil Ira Egger of Goldthwaite has been appointed a registrar for the Burnet, Lampasas, San Saba, and Mills County draft board in the Goldthwaite area.

Young men who reach the age of 18 can register in Goldthwaite by calling on Mr. Egger at the County Judge's Office in the Courthouse on Monday through Friday, 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 Noon and 1:00 to 5:00 p. m.

A registrar is maintained in the area so that men will not have to travel to the draft board office at Lampasas to register.

All males are required under the new draft law on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter. Maximum penalties that can be applied for failure to register are \$10,000 fine, or five years in prison, or both.

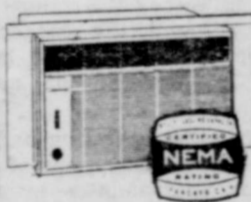

Santa Fe Station Closing Hearing Continued For More Recent Records

Hearing by the Texas Commission of the appraisals from Santa Fe Railroad officials to close the Goldthwaite station will be continued three to four months for present, or up-to-date, records from Santa Fe.

About 100 people attended the hearing during the day with 35 appearing before the commission as protesters. Most of those protesting the station closing are actually involved in the shipment or receiving of goods through the local Santa Fe station.

The hearing was held in the District Courtroom of Mills County Courthouse from 9 a. m. until noon last Thursday, July 8. In the afternoon, due to the heat, the hearing was moved to the community room of Mills County State Bank where it continued until 6 p. m.

After the hearing Thursday at 6 p. m. TRC Transportation Division Director Walter Wendlandt told the Santa Fe chief accountant, W. A. Gibson, that the commission required the company's most recent financial exhibits.

Wendlandt said that financial reports which Santa Fe presented during the hearing Thursday were 20 months old. Exhibits covered a period from November 1967 to 1969.

Before he could make any ruling on the fate of the local depot Santa Fe would have to comply with the TCR ruling to bring the exhibits up to date, Wendlandt stated.

Officials of Santa Fe said it will take them about three months or more to prepare the exhibits for the commission.

Date and location of the future hearing is not definite. It is possible the hearing could be rescheduled in Goldthwaite or it may be in Austin.

Wendlandt acted as examiner during the hearing. Joe Wells from the TCR was also present.

Attorney John McDowney represented Santa Fe Railway. Gibson and Santa Fe transportation inspector Steve Patterson both appeared during the hearing.

Representing the people of Goldthwaite who are protesting the removal of the station was Murray Watson, Waco attorney. Also attending the meeting in protest were Senator J. P. Word of Meridian, whose district includes Mills County and Charles Cass of Belton, executive director of Central Texas Council of Governments.

If the commission decides in favor of the railway's application to shut down the Goldthwaite station it will become a non-agent prepay station.
