## \$495.00 Needed For Park Fund To Carry Program For This Year

Park Committee Chairman, W. P. Duren, announced Monday that an additional \$495.00 is urgently needed for the Mills County Park Fund. This will provide the funds needed to insure a caretaker through this year.

The minimum requirement for the maintenance job is \$1,200.

Park Fund contributions to date this year total \$705.00, the chairman announced.

The committee is urging those who have not sent in their checks to do so now so that the job may be completed.

Members of the committee have hopes that enough interested parties will come through with enough support to put the program over the top again this year.

Checks should be made out to the Park Fund and may be turned in to Duren at Mills County State Bank or they may be given to any member of the park committee.

The committee has a goal of 100 supporters at a minimum of \$12.00 each to provide the funds needed for a year's upkeep.

Fifty have given to date. A number of them have donated more than the suggested \$12.00, which is a big help, it was pointed out.

It is hoped by the committee that the goal will be oversubscribed within the next week. A few dollars over the minimum need for upkeep will be used to good advantage, the chairman stated.

## Vaccinations For Horses Are Provided Free

Starting Monday of this week all Vaccinations of horses against Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis (VEE) are being provided free and are paid for by the Federal Government, according to Dr. Mike Hoover, Goldthwaite Veterinarian.

Also starting Monday at midnight horse owners within the county are allowed to bring their animals to the Vet's Clinic for the shots.

Dr. Hoover stated that he will be at the Clinic in Goldthwaite on Thursday and Friday of this week, from 3:00 to 6:00 p. m. for the convenience of those who wish to bring their horses in for the vaccinations.

By Tuesday of this week about 500 head of horses had been vaccinated out of the estimated 1,000 to 1,200 head in the county, Hoover stated. Vaccination started here last Friday and he stated there has been no serious trouble.

In an effort to control the disease, state health officials have issued a quarantine, forbidding movement of horses and mules. They may be moved 14 days after they have been immunized, however.

Health officials are urging all owners to have their horses vaccinated during this program, Hoover stated.

## New Law Requires Immunizations For Students In Texas Schools

Texas now has a new law that requires immunization for all students enrolled in schools and institutions of higher learning, according to announcement by Supt. Gilbert Davis.

This law is now in effect and requires that all children entering Texas elementary or secondary schools or institutions of higher education must have been immunized against six diseases: diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis, measles, rubella, and smallpox. The law states that "the State Department of Health shall provide the required immunizations to children in areas where no local provision exists to provide these services."

All immunizations should be completed by the time school is entered. However, if this is not possible, all students will be allowed to enter their respective school systems during the Summer and Fall 1971 terms, with the provision that their immunizations against at least one of the aforementioned diseases will have been started by January 1, 1972 and all completed as soon as medically feasible.

## Eagle Sells To Young Publishers; Ownership Change On October 1st.

Sale of The Goldthwaite Eagle by Mr. and Mrs. Vic E. Koleber to Mr. and Mrs. G. Frank Bridges of Schulenburg, Texas, was announced Monday.

The sale was finalized Saturday with the change of ownership effective on October 1. When the new publishers will take over the property, following a 19 year tenure of ownership by the Kolebers.

With the sale the Goldthwaite Eagle-Mullin Enterprise, weekly newspaper with job printing and office supply departments, will transfer to a fourth generation Texas weekly newspaper family.

Mr. Bridges' great-grandfather, J. P. Bridges, was the founder and publisher of the Luling Signal and served as first president of the Southwest Texas Press Association in 1891 and third president of the Texas Press Association in 1889.

His grandfather, H. F. Bridges was publisher of the Nixon News and founder and publisher of the Waelder Home Paper, still in operation.

Frank's parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Bridges, are owners of the Flatonia Argus which they have published the past 26 years.

Frank grew up in Flatonia where he got his newspaper start at a very young age. He graduated from high school there in 1961 and graduated from Sam Houston State University in 1965 with a Bachelor's Degree in Journalism.

Mrs. Bridges, daughter of Mrs. Frank Lukovsky and the late Mr. Lukovsky, is a native of Moulton, Texas, where she graduated from high school in 1962.

She is an experienced newspaper woman in her own right having worked with her husband for the past several years.

Mr. and Mrs. Bridges have two sons, Stuart 3, and Steven one year old. They will move to Goldthwaite shortly after September 1, after winding up their business affairs in Schulenburg where they have been publishing the Schulenburg Sticker, weekly newspaper and job printing business for the past three years under lease contract.

Their other newspaper work includes publishing the Nixon News and the Smiley Tabloid, which they had leased from his grandfather; sports writer on the Galveston News-Tribune, and work on several papers during his college years.

In Schulenburg, Mr. Bridges has been a member of the Lions Club, Jaycees, Volunteer Fire Department and other civic and community groups. Mr. and Mrs. Bridges are members of the First Baptist Church in Schulenburg.

They stated that they are looking forward with keen interest to their first newspaper ownership and their move to Goldthwaite to establish their home and become a part of the community.

In announcing the sale of the Eagle property Koleber also announced his plans to retire from active newspaper publishing after a career of more than 39 years.

He started with metropolitan newspapers on June 1, 1932, when he joined the circulation department of the Wichita, Kansas, Beacon. In 1935 the Kolebers moved to San Antonio where he was with the circulation department of the Express and News. During his stay with the San Antonio papers he took a leave of absence for 60 days to go to Houston where he worked with Texas Parade magazine to help establish their circulation department. Texas Parade was published by the Texas Good Roads Association.

In 1936 they moved to Edinburg where he was circulation manager for the Daily Review. During the 10 years with this paper he transferred to the advertising and business departments with the last four years spent as publisher there.

In 1946 the Kolebers bought the Florence Citizen in Colorado which they published for six years until 1952 when they sold out and bought the Goldthwaite Eagle and moved here.

## Gospel Meeting To Start Sunday At Goldthwaite Church Of Christ

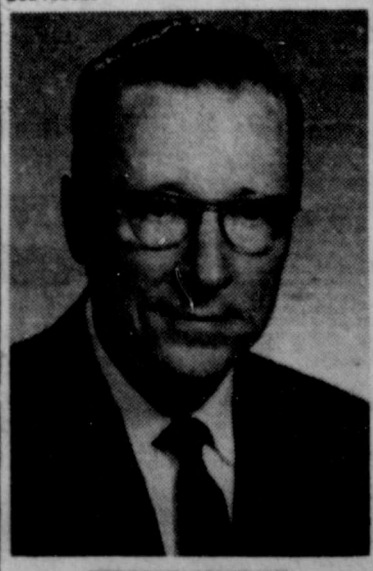

Water is an item which is scarce as hen's teeth around our country. A rain would benefit everybody and everything especially one particular item on a farm or ranch which is virtually a necessity. This is our stock tanks. Stock tanks provide our livestock with water when there is not any available from natural sources. They also serve as a means for a lot of fun and recreation — fishing. Most of the stock tanks are stocked with fish which provides for a lot of enjoyment. However, during a dry spell like we are in, stock tanks are getting real low, those that have not dried up already, and the presence of fish can create a reverse effect.

Stock tanks that get low on water with fish in them can become a place of potential disaster for livestock. If the fish start dying in a tank and are not removed, the dead fish can contaminate the tanks and can cause livestock to become sick and die from drinking the contaminated water. When stock tanks get to this dangerously low level, it might be wise to chemically kill or remove the fish from the tank in some other fashion.

Fish can be killed out of privately owned tanks legally with the use of rotenone powder. The amount to use is 5 pounds of 5 per cent rotenone powder to each acre-foot of water in the tank. Mix the powder with enough water in tubs or buckets to make the mixture about the density of milk and pour the solution into the water from out of a boat which is being rowed or motored. The solution has to be mixed into the tank water completely to be effective. Since rotenone effects only the gills, fish killed by this method may be eaten if cleaned while fresh. This treatment is not harmful to livestock or humans using the water. Other fish not taken for eating, should be hauled out of the tank and disposed of. After rain has filled your tank again, it can be restocked with fish.

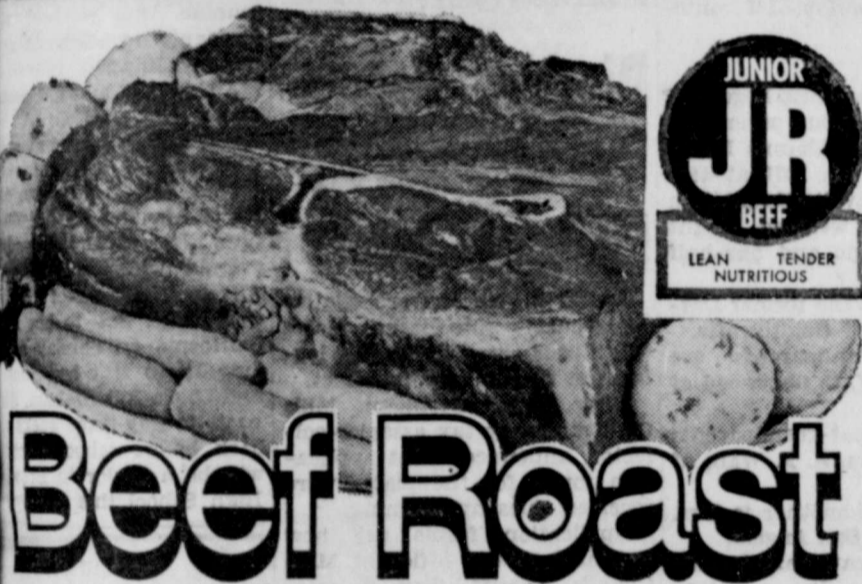

## 18 Through 20 Year Age Group May Now Vote In All Elections

A new group of voters will go to the polls to cast their ballot when the next election rolls around.

Mills County Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector has received notice from Martin Dies, Jr., Secretary of State, informing him of the new laws permitting 18 through 20 year registered citizens to vote in all elections.

The letter reads as follows: "This is to formally notify you

that persons 18, 19, or 20 years of age who are presently registered to vote for federal elections only may now vote in all elections in your county and other political subdivisions.

"The 26th Amendment to the United States Constitution lowering the voting age to 18 in all elections has been duly ratified by the state legislatures as prescribed by the Federal Constitution. The Federal Register in Washington, D. C. confirmed July 1, 1971, that this new amendment went into immediate effect. This United States Constitutional Amendment overrides Article VI of the Texas Constitution insofar as it requires an otherwise qualified voter to be 21 years of age to be eligible to vote. Thus as of July 1, 1971, any registered 18, 19, or 20 year old may vote in any election - federal, state, county, city, or other political subdivision.

"Persons who turned 18 years of age after the close of the regular 1971 registration period may still register for the current voting year. The certificate is effective for any election held 30 days after registration. It is not necessary to segregate these late registrations from any other age classification on the list of registered voters. Also, do not stamp any of these registration certificates 'FOR FEDERAL ELECTIONS ONLY'."
