About 20 More Boosters Needed For Park Maintenance Fund Goal

The drive can be completed and the goal of 100 can be reached if a few more donations are made this week.

In order to insure a park caretaker for the year a minimum goal of \$1,200.00 is needed.

For the past several years the committee has been conducting the volunteer contribution drive to provide money for the park upkeep.

When the plan was first adopted it called for enlisting 100 persons to give \$12.00, or more, to the park maintenance fund

Boykin Acreage Annexed To City

The City Council meeting in regular session Monday night in the City Hall accepted a petition and adopted an ordinance accepting the James Boykin acreage into the city limits. Boykin appeared before the council with the petition.

Comprising 99.59 acres the acreage is the former "Duke" Clements property which was purchased some time ago by Mr. and Mrs. James Boykin. It extends East of the Hickman Nursing Home property and back of a number of homes located on the South side of the Waco Highway.

'71 Grid Season Underway As Eagles Report For Physicals On August 11

\$751,000 REA Supplemental Loan Approved For Cen-Tex Tel. Co-op

Approval of a \$751,000 Rural Electrification Administration loan to Central Texas Telephone Co-op., Inc., was announced this week.

Raymond Summy, general manager of the cooperative with headquarters in Goldthwaite, stated that this is a supplemental loan to go with earlier ap-

proved funds for the overall expansion program that has been underway. The original REA loan to Cen-Tex Telephone Co-op. for expansion was in the amount of \$1,532,000.

The improvement program is to upgrade the cooperative's one and four party telephone system, according to Summy. Work has been underway for the past several months on construction and installation.

The overall program covers construction of 11 new Central Office buildings to house new equipment as well as many miles of line construction.

The new office buildings are in the following locations: Center City — covers Star and Cardan exchanges; Lohn, Evant, Mullin, Big Valley, Cherokee, Bend, Mercury, Doole, Eola, and Rochelle.

This supplemental loan as approved by the REA will provide funds to complete the expansion and improvements that have been underway for the past year according to Summy.

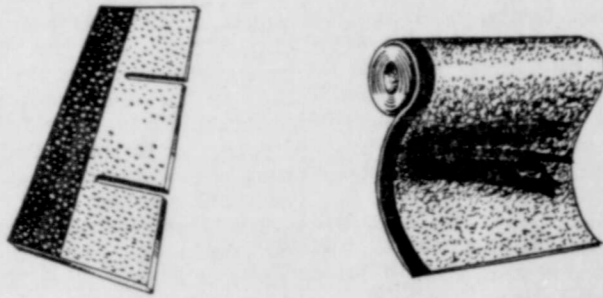

The grass is greener on both sides of the fence now and with a little luck, we can go into the winter with some grazing. After the good rains that we have had, it is hard to imagine that anything bad could come from it. However, if caution is not taken with our livestock, especially cattle, a large number of livestock could be lost to prussic acid poisoning.

After the extended dry weather which we have just had and then the sudden change with rainfall and cool cloudy weather, prussic poisoning is very likely in the new growth of sudan, Johnsongrass, and other hybrid sorghums. If livestock is being grazed on a field and not taken off, the possibility of being affected is not as great. Livestock turned in on new growth is the dangerous situation.

There is no fast, economical means of detecting prussic acid poisoning. If an individual has a field with new growth of hybrid sorghum or Johnsongrass and wants to turn livestock in on it, precaution should be taken. After a rain and cloudy weather as we have had, a waiting period of 10 days to two weeks should be observed before turning cattle into a field such as mentioned. Then as a precaution, one or two head should be turned in by themselves sort of serving as guinea pigs.

If they graze for an hour or so and do not become sick, the field is presumed safe. Ordinarily, cattle with prussic poisoning will die within 5 to 15 minutes. Another safety measure for individuals is to have Sodium Thio-Sulfate on hand which can save the life of livestock in many cases affected by prussic poisoning if it is injected into the vein of the cattle immediately.

Livestock producers should keep in mind prussic acid poisoning. Profit margins in livestock are slim enough without loss due to careless management. One individual in East Texas recently turned in on new growth late one evening. Next morning, out of 24 head, he had lost 17 head with prussic poisoning.

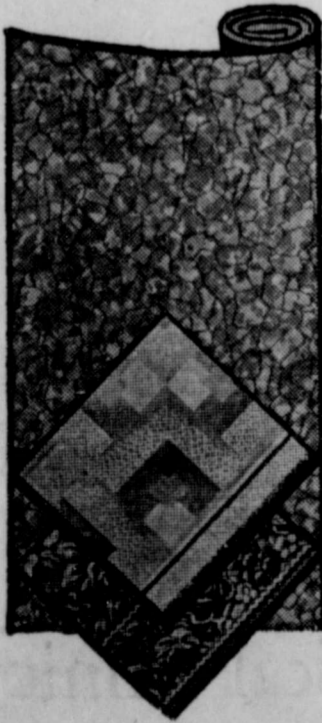

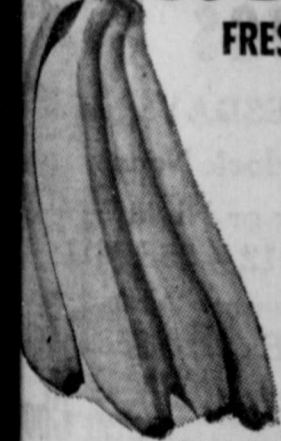

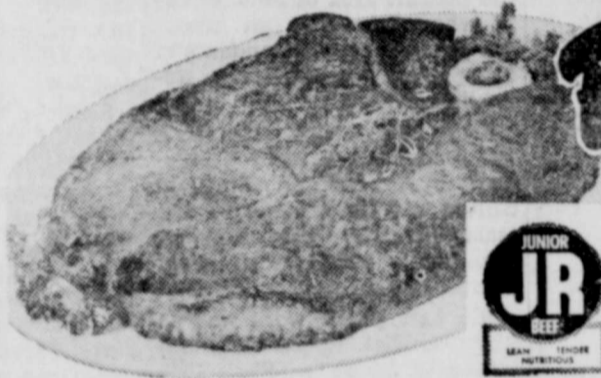

John George Berry

John George Berry, son of John Don Donaldson Berry and Amelia Walk Berry, was born December 19, 1882 in Burnet County, near Lampasas, Texas. He passed away in Scott and White Hospital, Temple, Texas on July 22, 1971.

John was the third child in the order of birth of eleven children. The family moved to the present area of Mills County when John was an infant. His parents were descendants of two pioneer families of the Republic of Texas.

John Berry's first visit, as a lad, to the new town of Goldthwaite was with his father, to deliver a load of oats to the teamsters who were building the Santa Fe Railroad from Temple to San Angelo, Texas.

His first public work was as City Marshal under the late Mayor W. H. Trent. From 1914 to 1922, he served as supervisor of a street building program.

From 1924 to 1939 Mr. Berry was connected with the Texas Highway Department, when that part of the State Government was acquiring land for the Texas system of highways and organizing districts; he served first as supervisor of Mills County road construction; also supervised building and maintenance of road projects in Mills, Lampasas, Brown, Hamilton, Coryell, and McClennan Counties.

He was active in the Highway Beautification program and took special interest in the planning and development of Patterson Park on Prescott Creek in Mills County and a small park in the city limits of Goldthwaite at the junction of the Lampasas and San Saba Highways.

Since 1939 Mr. Berry had devoted his time to ranching and interests in New Mexico.

On January 1, 1923 John

George Berry was married to Nora Arminta Hooks in Goldthwaite.

He was a member of the local Lions Club, a Mason and a member of the Methodist Church, active in Sunday School and served many years on the Official Board as a steward and trustee.

Largely through his efforts the Memorial Granite Marker, the entrance gate and fence were installed at the local cemetery.

Services were held in First United Methodist Church July 23, 1971 with the pastor, the Rev. Gordon Talk officiating. Pallbearers were his nephews.

Mr. Berry is survived by his wife, Mrs. Nora Hooks Berry; three sisters, Mrs. Richard Slack, Mrs. John Hill, and Mrs. Frank Taylor; and a number of nieces and nephews and a host of friends.
