



#### PRUSSIC ACID POISONING

Farmers and ranchers should be cautious when turning livestock out to graze on hybrid sorghum-sudan pastures. Prussic acid poisoning, caused by hydrogen cyanide in the plants, occurs when livestock graze pastures that have been damaged by frost or when pastures perk up and begin fast growth after a droughthy period. Hay that is improperly cured can also present prussic acid poisoning problems for a short time. Nitrate poisoning may occur during the late fall on winter pastures when there is a lot of cloudy

Suppose a man sees his son being beaten up by a neighborhood bully. Does he have a legal right to use force in his son's defense?

He does indeed. Parallel to the right of self defense is the right pastures are short. This doctrine goes all the way back to the days of feudalism, when the master of the household was legally entitled to protect his family from attack.

> But in such situations, there is always the chance of escalating the violence. Therefore, the law places careful limits on this right of family defense.

1) The force used must not be excessive. For example:

A father found his son involved in a fracas with the man next door. Rushing to the rescue, he knocked the man unconscious with a mighty blow on the head. Then he followed with a swift kick in the abdomen
