# **Eagles Lose District 10-A Crown** To De Leon By Score Of 21-6

The Goldthwaite Eagles were upset Friday night 21-6 by the De Leon Bearcats on Eagle Field for the District 10-A Crown.

De Leon scored its first six points when running back Larry Kimmell went over from the two yard line. The PAT was good.

Goldthwaite ran three plays and punted on its first series the only time they had the ball in the first quarter.

Gary Park scored for the Bearcats on a third and nine situation from the Eagle 27. Four plays later after a penalty had moved the ball back out to the six, Kimmell scored again. Extra point was good.

A pass interception by Benny Humphries and a missed field goal stopped the next two De Leon drives and the Bearcats had the ball when the half ended. Goldthwaite was trailing by a score of 14-0.

During the first half Goldthwaite had the ball four times. Twice they gave it up on interceptions by Toby Mahan and David Tucker. Fourteen plays, seven rushes, five passes and two punts were all the Eagles could manage during that time.

After the half it was a standoff as each team had three possessions and scored once.

De Leon scored midway in the fourth quarter on a run by John Arguero. PAT was good.

Goldthwaite took the kickoff and moved 53 yards in 11 tries for their only six points of the game. Quarterback Johnny Johnson completed four of six passes to keep the drive moving. Johnny Miller got the touchdown from a yard out with 3:56 remaining in the game. Johnson's run for two points failed.
