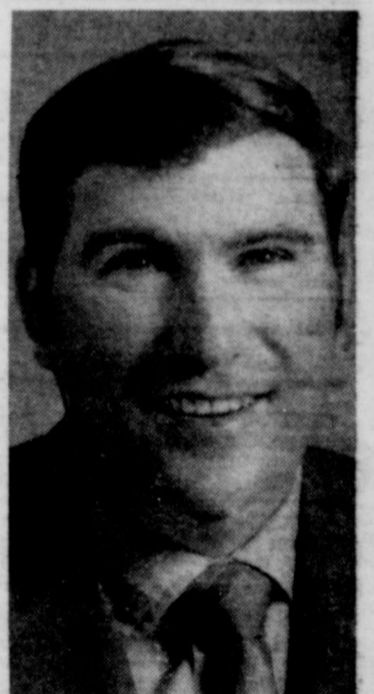

Dan Jones To Run For District 43 Position In House Of Rep.

A 31 year-old Burnet County rancher has announced he will run for the District 43 position in the Texas House of Representatives in next spring's Democratic primary. (Burnet, Lampasas, Mills and the southern portion of Bell Counties) He is Dan Jones, who owns ranches near Lampasas (in the Dobyville community of Burnet County) and near Bertram, and a lumber yard at Dripping Springs.

Jones has made it clear that he will steer an independent course while in Austin. "I've had experience down there for four years and I've seen damage that can be done if a legislator is not determined to be independent of the lobby and the establishment machine," Jones says.

"I feel it my first obligation to serve my home district, not to kow-tow to some lobbyist's version of what I should do in Austin," he adds.

Jones was born at Buffalo, in Leon County, East Texas, and was raised on a farm. He graduated from Buffalo High School, where he was active in student government. He was twice elected president of the Future Farmers of America chapter and one year was president of the Green Hand organization made up of first-year FFA members.

On completing high school, Jones commuted to Sam Houston State University, studying political science. At the same time he was in the automobile sales business in Buffalo.

Jones was an employee at Texas Motor Transportation Association, Inc. for four years working as director of public relations. He acquired an intimate knowledge of the Legislature's workings.

"There was a lot I just didn't approve of," Jones says. In June of this year he resigned to operate his Burnet County ranch that he had bought in 1968 near Dobyville.

He lives there with his wife Jan and their two children, Bryan, 5, who attends kindergarten in Lampasas, and new baby Stephanie born just a month ago.

"Mainly, I want to say that this is going to be a person-to-person campaign," Jones says. "I have been asked by a number of friends to make this race and

to do so wearing out as many pairs of shoes as I can - not spending as much money as I can."

He hopes to come as near as possible to meeting every resident of the new district, which has no incumbent House member under the recently devised redistricting plan.

"I will pay my filing fee just as soon as I am legally permitted to," Jones says. "But until the court case on the new redistricting is settled, a candidate can't file."

Jones says he is intent on "restoring integrity in Texas government and fair representation for all the people in this district. Everything I will do will be for the people of this district."

"I will not vote on a piece of legislation on the basis of what a lobbyist thinks best," Jones says.

He says this independence will extend into the coming race for speaker, which will name the man who will guide the House in the coming session. Jones intends to remain uncommitted to any speaker candidate until the day the House members vote on the question. "I don't believe it's fair to the people of this new district for me to be tied to one man," Jones says, "especially in a new district, where the sentiment of the voters is unknown."

PLANTING TREES, SHRUBS

If you're planning to add some trees or shrubs to your landscape this fall, plant and care for them properly and reap the benefits in later years. If the plant is bare-rooted, dig a hole large enough so that the root system can spread out naturally. The planting depth should be about the same as at the nursery. For balled or burlapped plants, the hole should be about 1 1/2 times the diameter of the ball and the depth should be the same as the depth of the ball. Water the plant thoroughly but do not fertilize until it becomes well established.

WATCH FOR RANGE FIRES

COMPOSTING

FIGHTS POLLUTION

Rather than burning leaves this fall and polluting the air, use them for a compost pile. This will provide a good source of organic matter for potted plants, for topdressing the lawn, and for building up the soil in flower beds and shrub borders. To make a compost pile, alternate layers of vegetable matter and garden soil. Each layer of vegetable matter should be watered thoroughly and sprinkled with a commercial fertilizer.

Crop Dusters Can Be Held Responsible For Crop Damage

When bugs invaded his field of muskmelon, a farmer sought the services of a crop duster company. The company sent out a pilot to dust the field. But because of the wind, the deadly insecticide drifted to the behives on the neighbor's farm. The bees languished and died by the thousands. Result: a damage suit filed against the crop duster company by the farmer who owned the bees.

In court, the company protested that it could not be held responsible for the vagaries of the weather. Nevertheless, the court granted the farmer's claim. The court pointed out that the pilot, if he had been reasonably careful, would have foreseen the danger and delayed his spraying until the wind died down.

Crop dusting zoomed in popularity after World War II. Surplus airplanes were available. So were surplus pilots. And so were new and potent insecticides.

But, like many technological advances, this one has brought legal complications in its wake. Repeatedly, courts have held crop dusters responsible for failing to take reasonable precautions in their work.

One pilot underestimated the carrying power of his spray equipment. Another pilot failed to give fair warning to a neighboring landowner. A third pilot disregarded the special characteristics of the chemical he was using. In each case, a court found enough evidence of negligence to impose legal liability on the company.

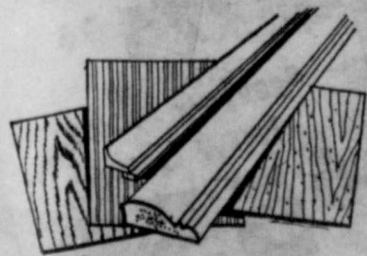

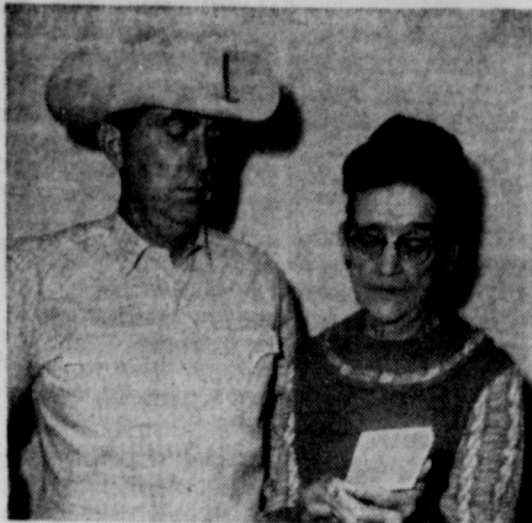
Chapel. Interment was in the McGirk Cemetery. Bro. Alfred McCurdy officiated.

ELIMINATING THE MESS IN BROILING

Broiling is a highly recommended way to cook tender cuts of meat, but many homemakers shy away from broiling because it can make such a mess in the oven. Extension home economists suggest ways to keep the oven cleaner while broiling:

Place lightly crushed foil in the broiler pan under the broiler rack to catch meat drippings and keep them from overheating.

Be sure meat drippings have sufficient draining. If aluminum foil is used to cover the broiler rack, be sure to punch holes in it.

Edge fat won't add moistness to meat, so trim away excess fat and slash the remainder at one-inch intervals.

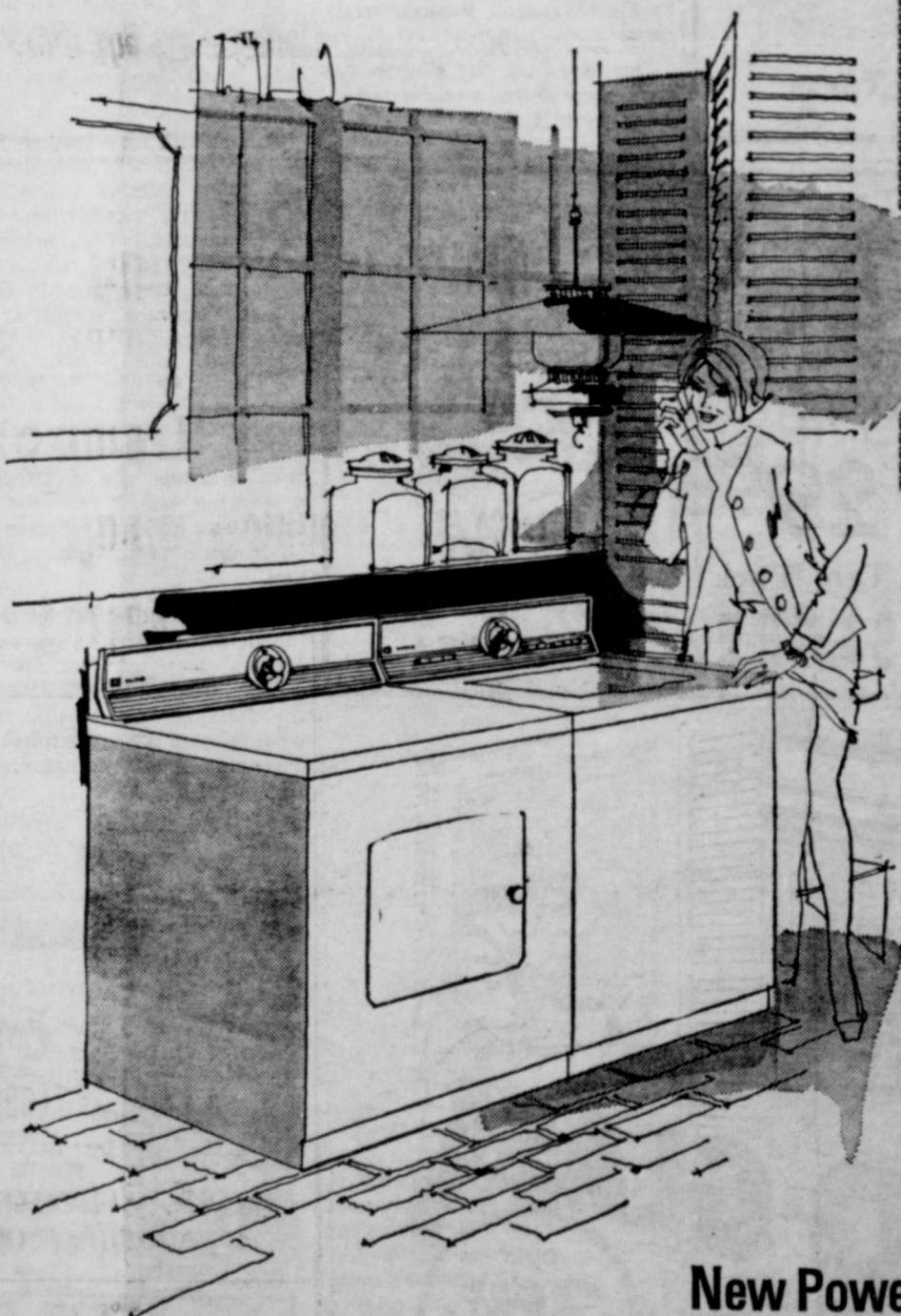
