Camm Lary Jr. Candidate For Texas House Of Rep., Dist. 43

Camm Lary Jr., a 30-year-old Burnet native who is a former assistant in the State Attorney General's Office and the Texas Senate, announced Wednesday afternoon as a candidate for the Texas House of Representatives.

"I intend to go to our people of Burnet, Lampasas, Mills and Bell County and urge them to keep faith and trust in our state government and to allow me to work in their behalf for responsive government," Lary told a hometown reception in Burnet.

"After a great deal of negativity out of the state capitol during the past year, I intend to base my campaign on the positive qualities of representation with integrity, experience and energy," said Lary.

"The representative elected from this 43rd District will have a new district, a new task to effectively and fairly represent a combination of our population which has never before been represented by the same person."

"As a former assistant attorney general and a legislative assistant in the state senate, I know state government and many of the problems that need correction in our system. As a native of this district, I have strong feelings for these people and this area and seek only to be of service to my district, our state, and to our democratic system."

"The coming sessions of the legislature will demand action on vital questions affecting our citizens such as: lower car insurance rates, an effective regulation for clean air and water that would allow sensible economic development, expansion of our recreational areas, a reduction in crime and illegal narcotics, a lessening of death and destruction on our highways, economy in our state spending, and an enforceable and meaningful ethics bill for legislators and state officials."

Lary attended Burnet schools,

graduating from Burnet High School in 1960 where he lettered in football, basketball, baseball and track and held various class and school offices. He was a member of the National Honor Society, the Kawanis Key Club, Speech Club and the band.

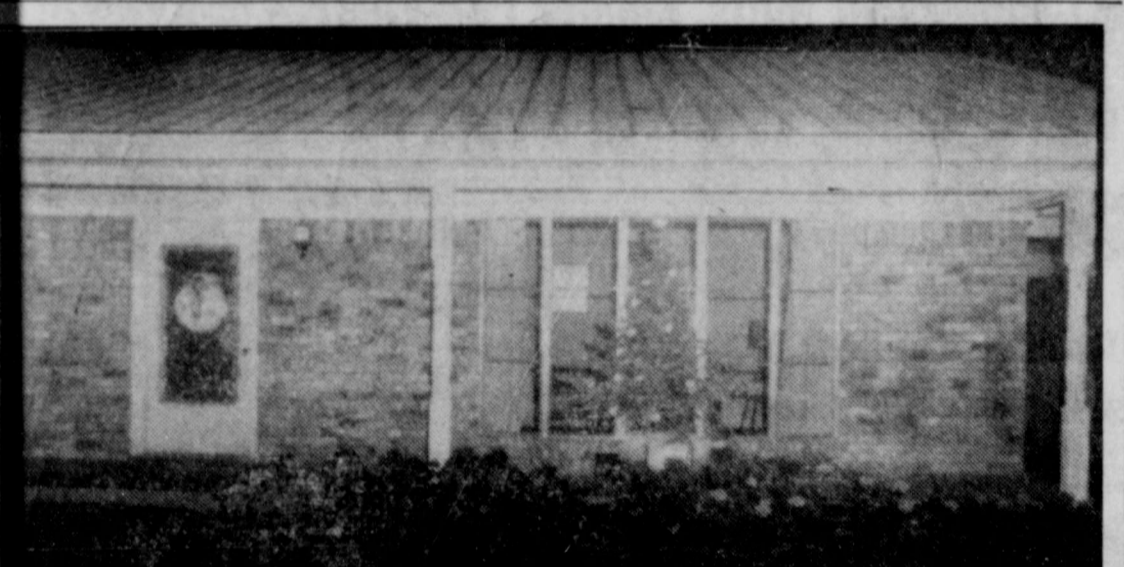
He was graduated from Texas A&M University in 1964 as a Distinguished Student with a degree in economics. He was graduated from the University of Texas Law School in 1967. Lary is a commissioned officer and is a member of the Naval Reserve.

In 1967 he worked as a legislative assistant for a state senator and later for the Texas Water Rights Commission. He recently served in the State Attorney General's Office before returning to practice law in Burnet.

Lary and his wife, Louise, are members of the Church of Christ and both have been active as Sunday School teachers and other phases of church work.



TURNIP — Mr. Z. Karnes of the Center City section brought in this king size turnip last week. The vegetable weighed over ten pounds and was shown on his place.



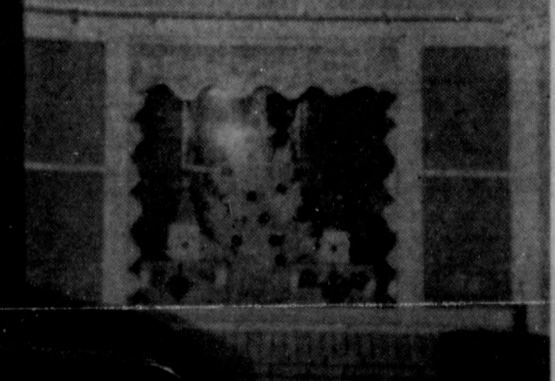

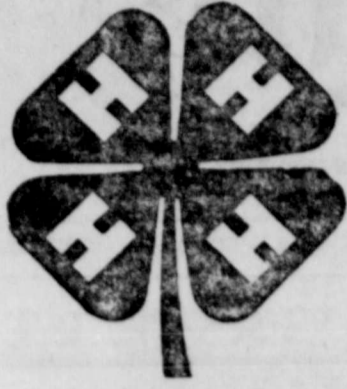

The youth Mills County worked many hours on their livestock and a little reward goes a long way. An interested party in the youth, it is hoped that next year can be even better.

An Income Tax workshop open to the public will be held next week with James Denton, Extension Farm Management Specialist, conducting the workshop. Mr. Denton will answer questions concerning income taxes. He will also give pointers on various ways saving money through proper planning of income taxes. There will be ample time for asking questions and other related problems. The workshop will be free of charge to the public.

Cash income to farmers and ranchers on all agricultural commodities in Mills County could be more than 16 million at the end of 1976. This will be an increase of more than 12 1/2 percent from 1968-1969 figures, which beef cattle and sheep contribute a large part of the income. The projections are based on studies of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and are part of the "3.76 in '76" program, a state-wide project to increase agricultural cash receipts by more than \$1 billion. Total receipts from all agricul-

tural enterprises in Mills County are presently about \$13 million. The most important ones are beef cattle, sheep, & goats. They are expected to account for about 70 percent of the projected 1976 totals.

These projections are based on estimates from the County Program Building Committee after separate predictions were made by Extension economists. The figures were published for each county, Extension district and economic area in Texas.

Mills County producers will have access to production information and techniques that can help spell success for the Texas goal of \$3.76 billion in '76.

THE MILLS MINISTER

Last Friday morning I arrived at the Mills County Stock Show just in time to be a spectator at the swine judging contest. The 4-H and FFA members had their swine groomed and cleaned, ready to go. At the appointed time Mr. Charles Conradt told them to let their entries into the ring. This they did and the judging commenced.

I must tell you in all honesty that I never was as disappointed in anything in my life as I was in that swine judging. The judge, (an honorable man I understand), didn't even pay any attention to those qualities which make the pig a unique member of the animal kingdom. He did not judge the pigs on their ability to oink. He completely ignored the volume, duration, and musical quality of the oinks. He did not judge the pigs on their ability to root in the dirt. I noticed some of the animals were outstanding rooters. The judge overlooked this attribute completely. The same sad thing could be said of the porkers wallowing ability. The curl in the tail and the beadiness of the eye garnered not a glance. Not once did he line the pigs up at feed trough to see which one ate like a pig the best. He never investigated even one sow's ear to see if it would make a suitable silk purse. All in all, it was a dismal, disheartening performance. He was a complete failure as a swine judge.

Now we will never know which pig was the piggyest one of all. You ask, "What did he judge then?" I will tell you. He looked for conformation, which had the cleanest lines, the longest loin, the biggest hams, etc. He was looking for those qualities that put the most meat per dollar on the market shelf or on the housewife's table.

Of course, we know that the judge used the proper criteria in his judging. The shrillness of a pig's squeal is meaningless when an animal is judged. What really counts is the quality and quantity of muscle in a top grade swine. Often we judge swine with a keener eye than we judge people. We look at the superficialities of a person, the cut of his hair, the color of his skin his life style, or perhaps his past history and judge him on that rather on his real qualities. Jesus never made this mistake. He saw people for what they really were. He saw the reality of life and depth of soul that constitute the character of man. He saw possibilities or failures that often escape the casual scrutiny we give people we judge.

In the time of Jesus tax collectors were hated and abhorred. They were abhorred because they fraternized with a conquering army, the Romans, and they were hated because they made great fortunes from the misfortunes of their fellow countrymen. It was to one of these hated and abhorred tax collectors, Matthew by name, that Jesus came and called to be a disciple. On another occasion in Jerusalem Jesus looked at the spiritual leaders of the day who were so fine and holy looking in their beautiful garments and compared them to sepulchers, white on the outside and corrupt on the inside.

Both times Jesus looked beneath the exterior and saw the real men underneath. In one he saw a man of worth, a man of high quality. In the other he saw corruption and the decay of evil.

In the world in which we live there still are Matthews and Pharisees. We get them confused because we see only the outside, the superficial and miss the inner depth of men.

Wouldn't it be wonderful if we judged men with as much insight, discernment and keen eye for quality as we judge swine.

Under this Assurance, these organizations are committed not to discriminate against any person on the ground of race, color or national origin in their policies and practices relating to applications for service or any other policies and practices relating to treatment of beneficiaries and participants including rates, conditions and extension of service, use of any of their facilities, attendance at and participation in any meetings of beneficiaries and participants in the conduct of the operations of these organizations.

"Any person who believes himself, or any specific class of individuals, to be subjected by these organizations to discrimination prohibited by Title VI of the Act and the Rules and Regulations issued thereunder may, by himself or a representative, file with the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250, or the Rural Electrification Administration, Washington, D. C. 20250, or these organizations, or all, a written complaint. Such complaint must be filed not later than 90 days after the alleged discrimination, or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. Identity of complainants will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the Rules and Regulations."

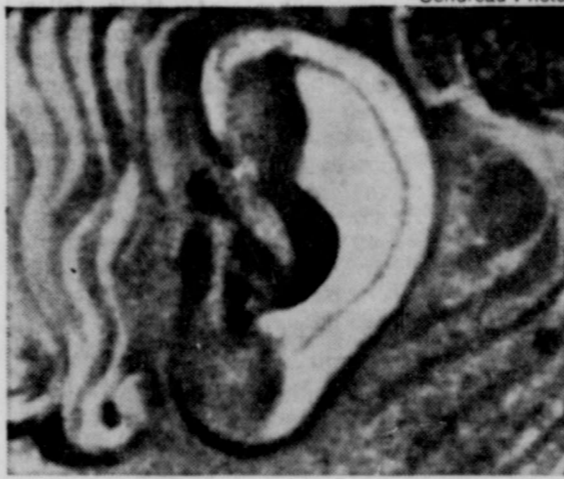

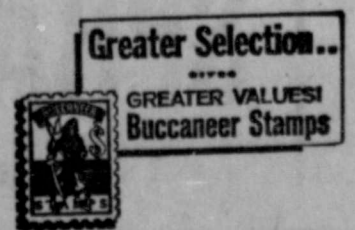
