## \$7,486.75 Paid At 34th Stock Show Auction

The auction sale of livestock following the 34th annual Livestock Show was not up to par with last year's sale, but was still rated as quite a success, according to the show officials. The auction was held last Saturday evening following the 2-day livestock show so the Mills County 4-H and FFA boys and girls would have a chance to sell their livestock.

Stock show boosters came from all around — Goldthwaite, Mullin, Priddy, Brownwood, San Saba, Lometa and Lampasas.

The 107 animals that were sold brought a total of \$7,486.75. Layton Black, chairman of the committee, stated that it was a good sale with a good response from the buyers. The auction sale which was held at the Mills County Commission Barn facilities, afforded many boosters an opportunity to attend who in previous years were unable to take part in the bidding on stock in person.

Other members of the sales committee were Sig Jernigan, Don Geeslin, Joe S. Langford, Y. B. Johnson, John Smith, and Thurman Johnson.

Sixty-three lambs sold for a total of \$2,809.05 with an average of \$44.59.

Forty hogs were sold for a total of \$3,291.45 with an average of \$82.29.

Four calves were sold for a total of \$1,386.25 with an average of \$346.56.

The top selling lamb, sold by Tony King, weighed 115 pounds at \$1.60 per pound for a total of \$184.00 to Don Geeslin Farms.

Terry Aldridge had the top selling hog which weighed 185 pounds and sold at 70¢ per pound for a total of \$129.50 with the Community of Mullin the buyer.

## Congressman W. R. Poage Announces For Re-Election

TO THE PEOPLE OF MILLS COUNTY:

For many years it has been my privilege to represent your neighbors to the east. I hope to have the honor of representing Mills County in the future, but in the meantime, I must be re-elected. I am this week filing with the County Democratic Chairman of each of the counties comprising the new 11th District for nomination as our Party's candidate in the May primary.

As one who has been so ably represented in the past by my good friend Omar Burleson, you may not be familiar with my record.

I have sought to help build Central Texas. I have been privileged to have an opportunity to assist in many projects such as the Flood Control Dams of the Brazos and its tributaries.

I was the author of the first Upstream Flood Prevention program. I was the author of the Rural Telephone Act of 1949 and of the recently passed Rural Telephone Bank Bill.

I was the co-author of the Poage-Aiken Bill under which we have established rural water and sewerage systems in many parts of the country.

I am the author of the comprehensive Rural Development Act now pending before Congress.

For five years I have been the Chairman of the Agriculture Committee — one of only 22 committees in the House. As such, I have no such dictatorial powers as many people believe, but I think it is clear that I am in a position to be of more help to our District than anyone without such seniority.

I have no "patent medicine" remedies for the problems of the world or of our country. I

still believe in and love and respect my country and its flag. I believe in the enforcement of all our laws. If a law is bad, it should be repealed. I believe in aid for the needy, but I have insisted that those who can work should work. I believe in the necessity and equality of sacrifice in order to control inflation. Finally, I believe that this is a Representative Democracy and that it is the duty of the "Representative" to try to reflect the views of those he represents.

You may not agree with my views, but I only ask that you give me credit for a sincere expression of my ideas. Since you are not acquainted with my efforts, I invite you to inquire of any citizen who has lived in any of the counties heretofore constituting the 11th District.

On my staff, in Washington and in Texas, I have some very

# Local School Trustees Call Special Election

The Goldthwaite Independent School District Board of Trustees has ordered an election for the purpose of asking the voters of the district to reset the rate that can be charged for the local maintenance fund.

At present, the maximum is \$1.25 per \$100 valuation and they are asking that it be reset to \$1.50 which is allowable in State Law 116.

This does not mean a tax increase but only reallocation of funds. In 1971, the total rate was \$1.65; \$1.25 going to local maintenance and 40 cents to the Bond Sinking and Interest Fund. At the present time, the District's valuation is \$7,944,362.00 and payment on bonds and interest runs about \$20,000 per year.

On this valuation a 25 cent rate would retire

bonds and interest. Money collected for this fund cannot be used for any other purpose.

If the voters should approve a rate change the school could use part of the money to maintain property, and pay maintenance personnel to keep the schools clean. If voters do not approve the rate change, either valuations would have to be raised to get the needed maintenance fund money or the school program cut back. Our school must meet certain standards set by the State Educational Department.

The money put into the local maintenance fund is used to pay the local district's part of teacher salaries, all utilities, repairs and upkeep of buildings and equipment, custodial care, and all local expense except transportation. According to one board member, he stated that the

1971-72 school budget contained no "excess fat" but included only enough money to repair and replace equipment as needed. He said he felt the community expected the board to maintain the school plant.

It was pointed out that since the recent ruling of Federal Judges that property taxes were unconstitutional that much concern has been expressed over school taxes.

The passing of this election would not effect this final court ruling as any new school financing program would probably take two years to set up and the requested rate change is necessary for school operation next year. Again it was pointed out that this would not mean a tax increase at this present time.

WHEREAS, there is an urgent need for an active crusade to increase the public's knowledge, acceptance, and appreciation for the highly significant contribution which agriculture makes to the economy of our county and to the level of living enjoyed by its citizens, and

WHEREAS, it is recognized that all citizens of this county have a vital stake and a legitimate self-interest in the general well-being of the farmers and ranchers who provide the great abundance and variety of food and fiber of highest quality which we all enjoy, and

WHEREAS, "3.76 in '76" is a well-conceived program designated by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, with the endorsement and active support of agricultural agencies, organizations, and individual leaders, to help the agricultural industry achieve its full potential through an intensification of efforts by producers, agribusinesses, and professional agriculturists to bring about an increase in income to Texas farmers and ranchers of \$1 billion by the end of crop year 1976, and

WHEREAS, \$610 million of the \$1 billion goal has been achieved through the 1971 agricultural season, and

WHEREAS, the achievement of an increase of 3 1/2% million in agricultural income by the end of crop year 1976 will improve the net profit and competitive position of Mills County farmers and ranchers and make highly significant contributions to the future economy of the county.

NOW THEREFORE, I, CECIL EGGER, County Judge of Mills County, Texas do proclaim the week of January 17-23, 1972, as "3.76 in '76 Week" in Mills County and call upon all citizens to join in this observance and to dedicate their efforts to the achievement of its stated objectives.

## State Senator Murray Watson, Jr., Announces For Congress, Dist. 11

WACO — State Senator Murray Watson Jr. of Mart is an announced candidate for the Congress, 11th District, in the 1972 Democratic primary election.

"I am seeking this important office," said Watson, "because the people of this district have convinced me it is time for a change."

Watson, a 39-year-old Waco attorney and businessman, has served in the Texas House of Representatives and in the Texas Senate for 16 years, representing the Central Texas counties of McLennan, Bell, Falls, Burnet, and Milam. Watson has never been defeated in a race for public office.

Watson, in announcing his candidacy said, "I plan to wage an active and vigorous campaign in all the 14 counties comprising the 11th Congressional District. These are McLennan, Bell, Falls, William, Milam, Burnet, Mills, Lampasas, Hamilton, Coryell, Bosque, Hood, Somervell and Paragard counties."

Watson earned degrees in Business Administration and Law at Baylor University, then served as a Bill Clerk for the Texas Legislature in 1955. This experience, combined with three years in the Texas House, served him well when he began his service in the Senate in 1963. He is now serving his third term in the Upper House.

While serving in the Senate, Watson chaired the important

Insurance Committee and the Committee on Environmental Matters; he was vice-chairman of Rules, Transportation, Agriculture, and served on the prestigious State Affairs, Finance, Jurisprudence, Water and Conservation, Oil and Gas and Constitutional Amendments committees.

Watson was honored by his colleagues by being selected President Pro Tempore of the Senate in 1969. When he was Governor of Texas on July 12, 1969, several thousand of his constituents paid tribute to him by attending traditional Governor-for-a-Day activities.

Watson said he would announce his candidacy for Congress in the near future.

Grass tetany is beef cows can be a problem during the winter season. This condition results from a mineral imbalance and especially occurs during cold, cloudy weather. The minerals concerned are magnesium and calcium which are used up very heavily due to later stages of pregnancy and those nursing calves. Unfavorable weather conditions put additional strain on the cows.

To overcome conditions that may lead to grass tetany, the use of mineral blocks containing magnesium oxide and sup-

I once met a very extraordinary woman in New Guinea after WWII. Her husband had become a Christian martyr during the war. The man Yot was the head of the Nohonob congregation. During the Japanese occupation of the territory, the white missionaries had been either evacuated by the Australians, or taken prisoners by the Japanese invaders. The entire work of the church was left in the hands of the native leaders. Yot gathered his people morning and evening for devotions and conducted worship services on Sundays. Some of his enemies among his own people resented his leadership. They went to the Japanese soldiers and made accusations against him. They claimed that he gathered his people together to pray for the return of the Australians. Yot denied this. He was told that he would be punished if he were to continue in his activities. A ban was put on all religious activities, but Yot persisted. His adversaries bound his hands and feet and put a pole between hands and feet and carried him to the Japanese camp in the manner in which they carried their pigs.

The Japanese told him that if he would cease to hold meetings he could go free. Yot refused. They then built a fire and held Yot over it hoping to get a promise out of him. When he insisted on holding worship services they held him over the fire until he died.

When I returned to New Guinea after the war, I met

Yot's widow. I asked her where she was living. She told me. She was living among those who had killed her husband. I expressed surprise. To my surprise, she gave a witness that shamed me. She said, "If I could not forgive those who wronged me and my husband, how then could I ever expect to have God forgive me the wrong that I do?" Surely this woman had an insight into true Christian character which had escaped me.

How many of our own people do we know who hold a grudge or even a hostile attitude toward people who may have committed some much lesser offense toward them? I dare say that there are many. This hostility and these feelings cannot remain secret. They come to the surface easily. Then they wonder why others have these same kind of feelings toward them. I must refer to the passage which St. Paul writes to the Galatians (6:7). "Be not deceived, God is not mocked, for whatsoever a man sows, that shall he also reap."

Love and forgiveness are rewarded with love and forgiveness. How people can sit side by side in the same church holding ill feelings toward each other, shows lack of insight into the prayer they pray together when they pray the Lord's Prayer. Specifically, "forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us." Forgiveness is the key to harmony, and it comes as a gift from God.

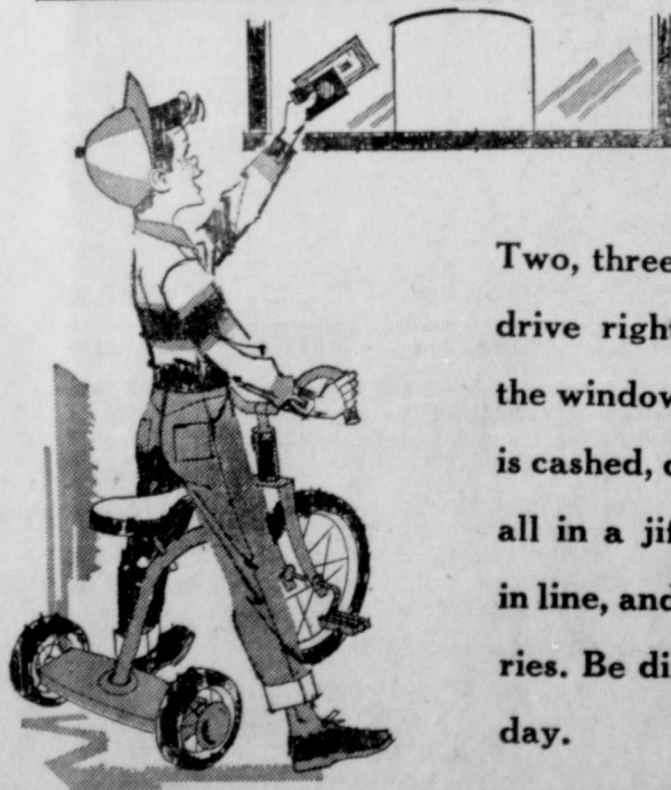

As a general rule, figure to

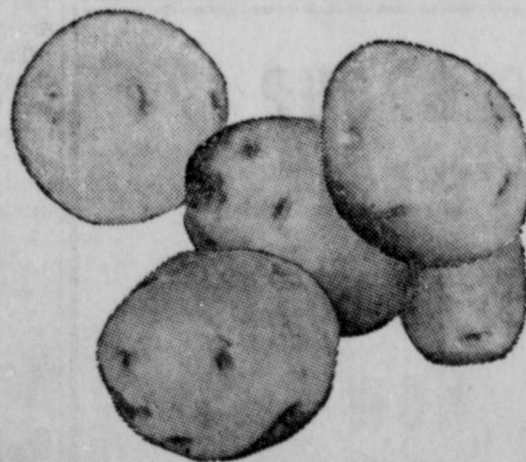

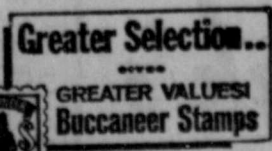
