The safe at the Priddy Post Office was drilled and peeled late Saturday night or early Sunday morning and over \$600 in stamps and cash was taken.

## 1972 Easter Seal Campaign To Begin In Mills County February 28

Mr. Glynn Collier will head the 1972 Easter Seal Appeal in Mills County. It was announced by Rodney D. Hardgrave, Dallas, President of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas.

Residents of Mills County will receive the annual Easter Seal Appeal letters in the mail beginning February 28. The Easter Seal Appeal, conducted yearly to provide disabled persons and their families treatment and services, will continue through Easter Sunday, April 2.

Mr. Collier is one of 223 men and women throughout Texas who are serving in this capacity. The cost of the statewide Easter Seal program is over one million dollars, financed mainly by the Easter Seal Appeal. Almost 90 per cent of all funds

raised by the Easter Seal Appeal remain in Texas to support the growing needs of the disabled in the State.

Special emphasis is being given in the 1972 Easter Seal Appeal to the disabled citizen or his family in Mills County who may need assistance and not know where to obtain it. Any disabled person can contact Mr. Collier at the Mills County State Bank, Goldthwaite, who will refer the request for services to the Easter Seal Society. A determination of the extent and type of assistance needed and the most efficient means of obtaining that assistance will be made. Arrangements for needed treatment or service will be made by the Easter Seal Society.

## Eagles Whip Dublin; Are Undefeated District 10-A Roundball Champions

### Johnson's 25-Foot Jumper Wins Game In Final Six Seconds Play

The Goldthwaite Eagle boys basketball team captured the 10-A District title last Friday night by defeating a fine Dublin team at Dublin 35-34. The Eagles never trailed in the ball game until the last two minutes and at one point in the third quarter held a 12 point lead.

The Eagles didn't play one of their better games against Dublin, but the Lions defense had a lot to do with this. In the two games with Dublin the Eagles have shot 21% and 29% from the floor; their height forced the Eagles to take some bad shots each game and each time

it was hard to rebound against them and come up with a second shot.

The ability of a team to fight back and score with only six seconds left in a game, is one good example why the Eagles are 10-0 in district play and undisputed district champs.

With Dublin in control of the ball and only a few seconds left on the clock, Bennie Humphries forced a Dublin player to lose the ball out of bounds.

Johnny Johnson brought the ball down court for the Eagles with only 6 seconds left on the clock. At the top of the key he managed to clear himself of a man who had been guarding him man-to-man all night and made a 25 foot jump shot that gave Goldthwaite the District Championship and prevented a possible play-off with Dublin had the Eagle lost.

High point in the game was Johnny Johnson with 15 points, Benny Humphries 8 pts., Clinton Wesson 6; Joe Hudson 2; and Bill Fisher had 4 points to round out the Goldthwaite attack.

## Census Bureau To Survey Employment Situation Here

A number of households in this area will be interviewed during the week of February 14, for a survey of employment and unemployment conducted by the Bureau of the Census, Percy R. Millard, Director of the Bureau's Data Collection Center in Dallas, announced today.

This is a monthly survey conducted nationwide by the Bureau for the U. S. Department of Labor. A sample of households is scientifically selected to represent a cross section of all households in the United States.

The employment and unemployment statistics which are based on results of this survey are prime indicators of the economic health of the Nation. The December survey showed that 80.2 million persons were employed and 4.7 million unemployed. After allowance for usual seasonal patterns, both were virtually unchanged over November.

Information supplied by households participating in the survey is confidential by law and is used only to compile statistical totals.

Census Bureau interviewer who will visit households in this area include Nella P. Casbeer of Lampasas.

In other council business city manager W. C. Barnett gave his monthly financial report and said that tax receipts for 1971 came in exceptionally well prior to the February 1 deadline. Only 2 - 3% of the taxes are delinquent now.

The city has installed 300 feet of 6 inch sewer line on Fourth Street. CM Barnett said that sewer and water line construction would pick up as the weather improves.

## CORRECTION

Last week's article, reporting on the Goldthwaite Lions Club meeting, said that Milton Schwartz is president of the Goldthwaite School Board of Trustees. Mr. Schwartz is a member but is not president of the Board. Also, the board does not yet know the rate of taxation for local maintenance. The article said that \$1.40 would be the figure, however, budget requirements will dictate the rate, and until these requirements are known the rate is not available.

## Guidelines For Publicly-Financed Primary Elections To Be Reviewed

New guidelines for conduct of the state's first publicly-financed primary elections are due to reach local election officials this week.

Secretary of State Bob Bullock, as chief Texas election officer, drafted the rules in line with a federal court amendment to the decision outlawing filing fees as proposed in a 1971 law.

Bullock interpreted the latest order as authorizing the state to foot the bill for primary election costs. He said an earlier opinion permitted use of nominal filing fees to regulate length of the ballot but not as a revenue-raising device placing a wealth requirement on candidacy.

The chief election officer ordered this mandatory filing fee schedule for both Democratic and Republican candidates (or an alternative nominating petition signed by qualified voters): Statewide offices, \$400; U. S. representative, \$300; state senator, \$150; state representative, \$100; chief justice or associate

justice, court of civil appeals, \$100; member state board of education, \$50; district judge or judge of any court having district office status, \$100; district attorney or criminal district attorney, \$100; all county offices except county surveyor or inspector of hides and animals, \$150; inspector of hides and animals \$50; county commissioner, \$50; justice of the peace or constable for counties above 200,000 population, \$50; justice of the peace or constable for counties under 200,000, \$25; all party offices, no fee.

Fees must be paid in full by February 23. In lieu of filing fees, candidates may elect to file petitions by a March 6 deadline. For statewide offices, 2,500 signatures are necessary. For other offices, signatures urging candidacy must be equal in number to at least two per cent of the entire vote cast for a party's gubernatorial candidate in the last general election for the territory served — or at least 25 and no more than 300 signers.

World War II, Korea, and Viet Nam, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jess R. Massey of Goldthwaite. He is married to the former Bobbie Oberhause and they have one daughter, Cathy. They now reside in Santa Ana, Calif.

Entering the Marine Corps immediately after graduation from Goldthwaite High School, Lt. Col. Massey has held every rank from Private Recruit to his present rank. He was lauded for exceptionally meritorious service as Commanding Officer of Marine Barracks at the U. S. Naval Station, Sangleys Point, Republic of the Philippines from June 26, 1969 to June 30, 1971.

He was cited on numerous occasions for his contributions to Cavite City and the Republic of the Philippines. Lt. Col. Massey personally led a rescue party during the killer typhoon of November 1970 and was credited with saving the lives of 44 fishermen whose boats had been swamped.

His quick actions in providing transportation and medical facilities to the wounded after the assassination of the Cavite City Chief of Police in December of 1970 was the subject of high praise.

He is the only Marine officer to be officially adopted as a "Son of Cavite" by unanimous vote on May 22, 1971.

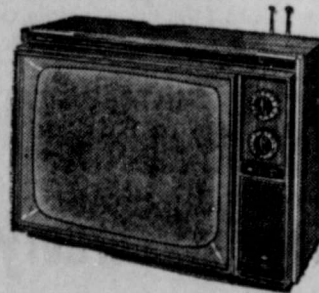

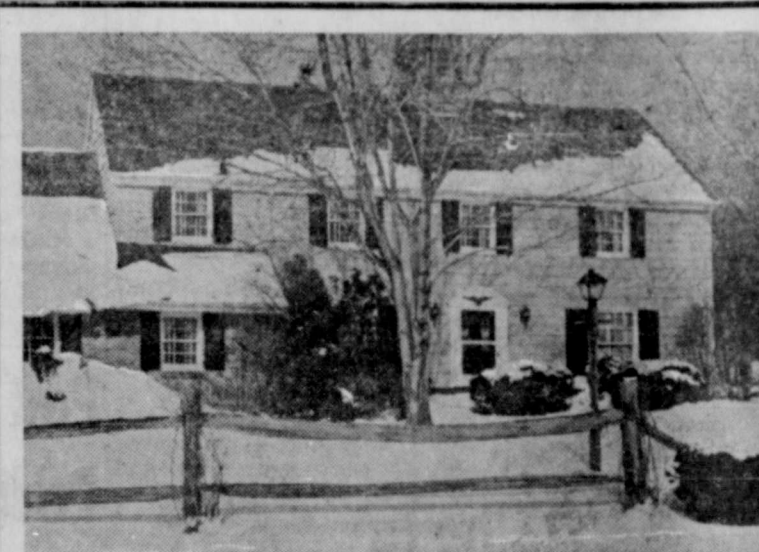

4-H members are reminded that the County 4-H Food Show is coming up Tuesday, February 22, at 7:30 p.m. The theme this year is Food for Special Occasions. Your leaders have all food show information.

How do you care for potted plants which are bought at the florist or received as a gift?

The flowering plants from the florist usually aren't the type that may be kept as permanent house plants. These plants were raised in a cool humid greenhouse and don't take kindly to the hot, dry conditions of our house. So treat them as long-lasting, cut flowers. Enjoy their beauty as long as possible, but don't be sad when they fade and must be discarded.

Preserve your plants in the following ways:  
Keep plants cool with a temperature of 70 degrees F. during the day and 60 degrees at night. Set the pot on crushed stone or gravel in a pan of water. The water will evaporate and increase the humidity of the air around the plant. Place the plant so it will receive as much sun as possible during the day, but avoid putting it in a southwest window. Water the plant regularly. It will use more water in a dry home than it did in the greenhouse. Apply just enough water to moisten the soil. Keep the plant out of drafts. This is particularly true of poinsettias. If located in a draft, the leaves often drop. Wash the leaves with soapy water at room temperature to control insects and give it a fresh appearance. If serious foliage diseases develop, the plant should be discarded to reduce the possibility of its spreading to other plants you may have. Azaleas and chrysanthemums may be saved for planting outside if they are hardy varieties. Check with the florist to see if the variety you have is suitable for outdoor planting.

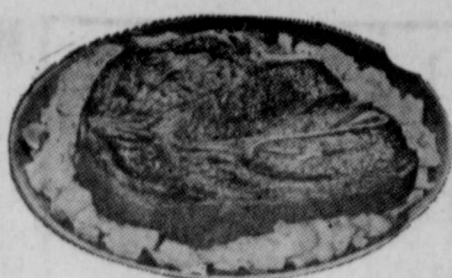

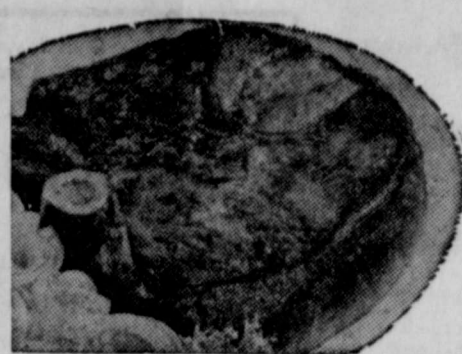

Farm Bureau**

Newsworthy notes of U. S. Congressional action for area farmers and ranchers were compiled this week by local Farm Bureau President DeWayne McCasland.

On Wednesday, January 26, the U. S. Senate Committee on Agriculture and Forestry killed the Strategic Reserve Bill (H. R. 1163) by a vote of 10 to 4.

Senate Joint Resolution 172, however, is still very much alive. Senator Humphrey has added cotton to the wheat and feed grains provisions of this bill and says he will make every attempt to secure passage.

S. J. R. 172 provides for a return to acreage allotments and marketing quotas, and would of 1970 gives them to makes window. Farm Bureau policy calls for a continuation of the Act of 1970, without limitations of payments, until it has had a chance to prove itself one way or the other. Many producers like the extra freedom the Act throw the Act of 1970 out the management decisions in their individual operations.

If area producers are serious about wanting a continuation of the Act of 1970, let Senator Tower and Senator Bentsen know about it.

Hog cholera, once on the brink of elimination from the state, has again gained a foothold—this time in South Texas. Fifty-four counties are now under state and federal quarantine. Since the costly disease can be transmitted easily, hog producers are urged to use all precautions so that the disease will be curbed.

If producers notice any sign

of sickness among hogs or the animals go off feed, suspect hog cholera first. The animals should be checked immediately by a local veterinarian or state or federal animal health official. Ronnie Davis is the local state animal health officer.

Farrowing problems, abortions still-born pigs, and weak or "shaker" pigs may be due to cholera.

**License Plates Can Be Received  
Through Mail From State**

You don't have to stand in line anymore if you don't want to in order to register "Old Betty" — or whatever you call the faithful family car.

Texas motorists can get their 1972 license plates by mail if mail or applies for his license renewal form, the registration fee and one dollar to their county tax officer prior to March 1.

This allows for the 30 days that are necessary for the application to be processed and the license plates delivered before the April 1 deadline. The plates themselves become available at the tax office or sub-station February 1.

If the motorist prefers, he may register his vehicle in person by taking the handy three-part form to the county tax office. It takes the clerk only a fraction of the time it used to take to process the form, collect the fee and send the motorist on his way with new plates.

Whether the driver uses the mail or applies for his license in person — the important thing for him to remember is to be very careful NOT to separate the three-part application form.

Even though the three-part renewal form carries the warning "DO NOT Separate or Detach Any Parts of This Notice" in large letters on the reverse side, some motorists do just that.

Department officials stress that the entire form must be mailed in or brought to the county tax office or substation. A stick down strip showing the new license number is attached to all sections of the form and

then the tax office separates the form, returning the license receipt to the owner.

Applications for license plates should only be sent to the county tax office. Motorists should NOT send their payments to the Texas Highway Department because this will depay their registration.

During the month of March, it will be necessary for owners to apply in person at the County tax office or sub-station to obtain the 1972 license plates. In any event, owners will save themselves time and trouble by using the new computerized forms in this third year under the new system.

With the form, a certificate of title and last year's registration receipt is not needed.

So register now and display your new plates. This will remind your neighbor it is time for him to do the same.

**Mills ASC Committee Announces  
1972 Special REAP Practice Area**

Mills County ASC Committee has announced the 1972 Special REAP practice area. The area is bounded on the north by "Toddy House Road"; eastward to the first county road past Mt. Olive Cemetery; south along county road to North Bennett; to Center City, to intersection of FM-572; northwest along FM-572 to a point approximately 1 mile SE of Goldthwaite near city dump and northward along the upper ridge of the Cowhouse Mt. Range to the intersection of "Toddy House Road."

The one factor which benefits farmers and ranchers most is the increase in per farmer limitation of cost shares earned. The cost-share rate is the same as regular REAP practices based on 50% of the cost for sprig-

ging/seeding and seedbed preparation.

The County ASC Committee originally felt that the per farmer limitation could be set \$400 per farmer. Now, however, due to increasing participation it appears that the per farmer limitation will be approximately \$300. Funds of \$8,000 have been set aside for this Special Practice area.

Eligible practices within Special Project are establishment of permanent grass such as coastal bermudagrass, etc.

All potential participants are urged to contact the Mills County ASCS Office for details of the program.
