City Councilmen Vote To Continue Sewer Project

The Goldthwaite City Council voted to proceed further with plans for a new and larger sewage treatment facility at its meeting Monday night.

The plant, to be located adjacent with the present system east of town, will probably be built at a total cost of more than \$200,000. Federal grants should be available to help finance part of the project.

The new plant, designed by Rady and Associates, engineers of Fort Worth, is projected to be able to handle sewage output from a town of 2500 persons.

An industrial waste ordinance was reviewed. It was the con-

sensus of council members that new industrial type sewer connections would have to be designed and built so as not to create problems at the new plant. New industry may have to share in the cost of increasing efficiency to operate.

Rady representatives were in attendance at the meeting and outlined the steps now needed to get the plant built. They presented a series of slides showing cost breakdowns, and project capabilities to the councilmen.

Councilmen Lester Geeslin, Hollis Wiggins, Donald Padgett, Jim Smith and Ancel Morgan were in attendance. Mayor Ray

Duren and City Manager W. C. Barnett were present, as was City Secretary Glynn Collier.

Results of the city council election held last Saturday were certified. Re-elected to regular two-year terms were Lester Geeslin, Jim Smith and Hollis Wiggins.

Area School Trustees Elections Held; Little Voting Activity Seen

Voting activity was light in Goldthwaite and Mills County elections Saturday.

The race for Priddy school trustee was the closest contested race. With three trustees to be elected and four candidates, Milton Meir polled 43, Elton Bufe and Paul Kunkel, each with 42, and Lohmm Fiest lost, polling only 23 votes.

A special election will be held later to decide the outcome of the tie.

MULLIN SCHOOL ELECTION

In the Mullin trustee election, Ira Lethco had 43 votes. Deeward Chesser had 24 votes and Wallace Hickman polled 19 votes in a write-in effort. H. R. (Dick) Roberts lost, getting 19 votes.

Billy Bradford, with 11 votes, and Culver Emdy, with 12 votes, were elected to regular positions to the Star School Board. Dean Kincheole edged Russell Crosby 13 to 12 to fill an unexpired term of office, left by Charlie Griffin.

In the Youth Communication Program Don Phillips from University High of Waco won first place in Speech Contest and received \$15.00 from the District for his high school.

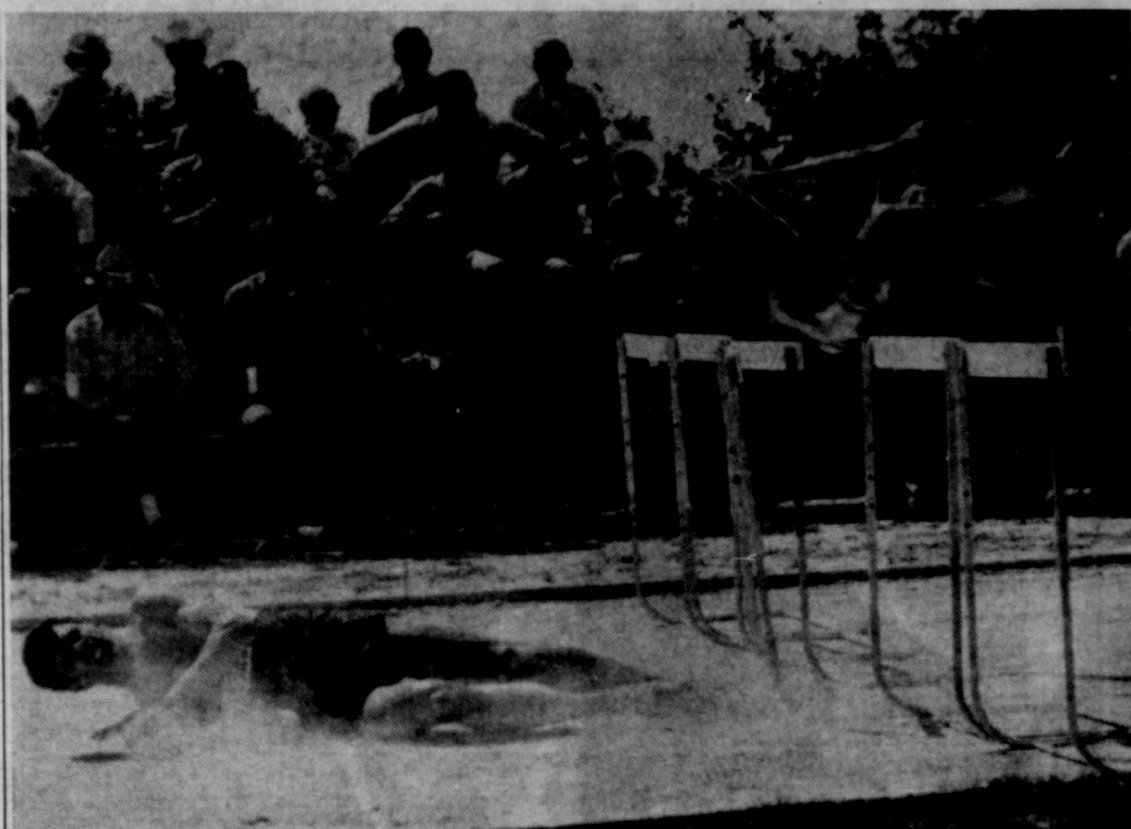
In the Poster Contest Goldthwaite children won all three first places. The winners were Kelli Connally, Kathryn Lewis, and La Quita Williams.

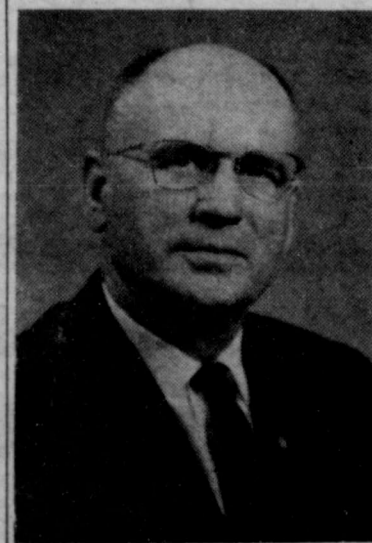

Coastal Bermudagrass Still Being Respected As Quality Range Grass

College Station - Coastal Bermudagrass is still among the best - producing, good-quality grasses in Texas, says Dr. Neal Prall, Extension specialist at Texas A&M University. Although Coastal has to be planted from grass or vegetative plant material, approximately two million acres are growing in Texas. Furthermore, many farmers and ranchers throughout Texas are planting additional acreage. 'Stray producers and cattlemen recognize its potential for range, high-density agriculture,' points out Prall. A strong characteristic of Coastal is its drought tolerance, contends the agronomist. Its deep root system enhances drought tolerance.

Another 'plus' factor is that Coastal responds well to fertilization. 'This means improved protein content,' notes Prall. 'In addition to increased grass growth, the additional grazing, fertilization also enhances drought tolerance and helps decrease weeds in Coastal pastures. Soil should be fertilized according to soil test recommendations.'

The agronomist recommends planting fresh, viable sprigs in clean, well-prepared seedbeds. Sprigs should be kept cool and moist after sowing. Weed control will allow stands of Coastal to become established more rapidly. A pre-emergence herbicide should be applied at planting, especially if the soil is noted for weeds. 'When the grass is fully established, plan to use high rates of plant food and graze the grass short,' says Prall. 'These two practices help maintain forage quality and improve livestock performance.'

THE SUPREMACY OF THE UNSEEN, THE ETERNAL.

A things-loving generation such as ours breeds pride of possessions and an undue emphasis upon gadgets, appliances, credit cards for more things, and in fact anything that can add comfort and luxury to everyday life. Luke reports the parable of Jesus, of the rich man who made this mistake and of whom God said: "Fool . . . your soul is required of you. Therefore, be not anxious about your life, what you shall eat, nor what you shall wear . . . Instead seek His kingdom. Store up treasures in heaven where thieves do not steal nor moths destroy."

The Apostle Paul in writing to the Christians at Corinth warned them of the dangers of putting emphasis on the external . . . the temporal. Corinth was the wealthiest and most important city in Greece . . . a city of low moral standards. Paul was disturbed by the easy accommodation of the Christians to the pagan ways of life. The deterioration of their moral life, the divisiveness that followed in their fellowship and their loss of respect for authority caused Paul to write them a stern letter. He upbraids them and asserts that if we are Christian the love of Christ will control us because Christ died for us and for all.

In pointing to the true goal of life he said in 11 Corinthians 4:8: "We look not to the things that are seen but to the things that are unseen; for the things that are seen are temporal, but the things that are unseen are eternal." This is a bold assertion of the reality and power of the unseen. There is a vast realm of the universe that can not be comprehended through

the physical senses. No one can see gravity, electricity or chemical affinity. We only see the manifestations of these invisible powers. We can not take a picture of the atmospheric pressure but we do not doubt it. The energies of the sun perform miracles of growth and beauty and power. But in the realm of the mind thought is greater than any of the above mentioned powers. Thought conquers the forces of nature and makes them serve man. Overcomes the pull of gravity and builds highways in the sky.

Is there anything greater than thought. There is in the moral realm. LOVE guided by conscience. It is as much above thought as thought is above gravity. Love conquers thought and sends a man out to sacrifice his life in service to his fellow man. It is a tremendous reality that has its roots deep within us. Love directed by the unseen power of the image of God within us is the basis of character. The ancient Greeks said that conscience is the voice of God sounding down the aisles of man's soul. It is the celestial spark that needs to be kept alive.

But FAITH enlightens conscience, empowers love and takes hold of God. It touches the hem of His robe. It is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence or assurance of things not seen. Paul invoked faith and Rome turned Christian. Livingstone invoked faith and lighted a candle in darkest Africa.

We pity the blind and the deaf and think of the beauty and harmony they miss . . . the sky, the earth, a child's laughter, a mother's voice. But the Bible says that more to be pitied than the blind or the deaf are those who have eyes to see and see not, ears to hear and hear not. This sets forth the mystery and power of the spiritual nature. Music is unreal to the deaf and color to the blind. Just so, faith is unreal to the prayerless.

Truly we come through the door of prayer and penitence by faith into the reality of life and love and fellowship with the unseen Father because of the love and the sacrifice and the resurrection of Jesus Christ who came to reveal the Father. Such love, says Paul should control us. It can and it will if our eye is single, our purpose fixed and our goal the goal of the eternal. Look not at the things which are seen . . . they are temporal, but at the things that are unseen . . . they are eternal. This is the true goal of the Christian.

Mills Co. Has Total Of 754 Farms According To U. S. Census Bureau

Mills county showed a total of 754 farms in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released by the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census, a part of the Department's Social and Economic Statistics Administration (SESA).

In the last previous Census of Agriculture (1964) the number of farms reported in the county was 743.

Of the county's total farms in 1969, 499 are reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agricultural products in the year, as compared with 433 in 1964.

The report also shows average farm size in the county was 626.6 acres, and average value of these farms (land and buildings) was \$77,103.

Other figures from the report are:

1. Value of all farm products sold in 1969, \$9,085,399; in 1964, \$5,962,850.
2. Value of all crops sold in 1969, \$423,183; in 1964, \$773,746.
3. Value of all livestock, poultry, and their products sold in 1969, \$8,662,001; in 1964, \$5,180,658.

Reported for the first time in an agricultural census is information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of farms from which agricultural products totaling \$2,500 and over were sold. Including family farms using this type of business structure, 5 of the county's \$2,500-and-over farms are incorporated.

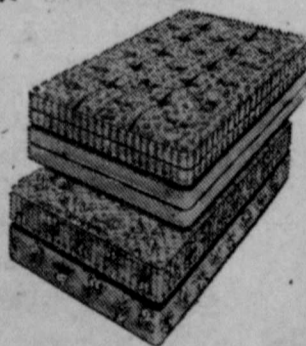

Screwworms have reached as far north as Medina County and livestock producers to the north should be on the lookout and should check animals closely, especially those with wounds, cautions Dr. James Novy, veterinarian in charge of field operations for the Mission Screwworm Center. All worm samples should be sent to the Screwworm Lab, Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572.

Doings by DANIEL

Insect control in the home garden is always a problem because of the varied number of insects which attack the garden throughout the growing season. Many insecticides are available for control with some being more toxic to humans than others. All insecticides should be treated as dangerous for human consumption and care should be taken not to disobey the manufacturers recommendations.

Some insecticides recommended for home gardens are carbaryl (Sevin), diazinon, dicofol (Kelthane), malathion, methoxychlor, rotenone, and sulfur. These are available as dusts, wettable powders, and emulsifiable concentrates. Dusts generally are marketed in ready-to-use form, whereas wettable powders and emulsifiable concentrates must be mixed with water. Percentages of active ingredients vary in each formulation; follow carefully the directions on the label to insure correct dosage.

Three types of insect groupings which causes problems in the home garden are the sucking insects, chewing insects, and soil insects.

Sucking insects insert their mouthparts into plant tissue and remove plant fluids. Examples are aphids, leafhoppers, stinkbugs, harlequin bugs, mealybugs, squash bugs, thrips, and fleahoppers. Insecticides recommended for sucking insects include Malathion, Diazinon, Se-

vin, and Sulfur.

Chewing insects eat holes in leaves, stems, fruit, and even bore into plants. Examples are grasshoppers, potato beetles, flea beetles, cucumber beetles, blister beetles, caterpillars, leaf miners, and leaf rollers. Insecticides recommended include Sevin, Diazinon, Malathion, Methoxychlor, and Rotenone.

Soil insects such as wire worms, cutworms, whitegrubs, ants, cabbage maggots, onion maggots, and seed corn maggots often cause extensive damage to seeds and young plants. Most of these insects can be controlled by treating the soil with Chlorodane before planting. However, if already planted, Chlorodane can be applied to soil at the plant base.

Remember: Many insecticides can not be used on some types of vegetables. These are restrictions on number of days of application until consumption. Publications are available from my office which are up-to-date on insecticides.

Pecan trees should be sprayed at this time of year for Scab and Pecan Rosette. For scab, the chemical Maneb plus Zincion (80 per cent WP) at the rate of 4 tablespoons per 3 gal. water or 2 lbs., per 100 gal. water, should be used. Zinc sulfate (78 per cent WP) for pecan rosette at the rate of 3 tablespoons per 3 gal. water or 3 lbs. per 100 gal. water.

"Martin said that he turned the stock offer down because it would have cost too much, because NBL was in 'shaky' condition, and because he did not buy 'speculative' stocks."

"He did not comment on the ethical aspects of a state official's accepting a stock tip of that sort—perhaps, because Martin, as attorney general, had ruled in favor of Sharp on a key legal issue about Sharptown State Bank only two and one half years before Sharp made the stock offer to Martin."

"Martin's ruling had the effect of increasing the bank's capitalization dramatically and thus its ability to make large loans, ultimately giving Sharp the financial resources he used in the manipulations charged by the SEC."

As you know, hundreds of Texans lost their life savings because of Sharp's stock manipulations and it probably wouldn't have happened but for Atty. Gen. Martin's legal opinion. Don't you agree, it's time for a change in the office of attorney general of Texas? Just so you'll know what you'd be changing to, I'd like to tell you a little about John Hill. I'm a native Texan, grew up in Wink and Kilgore, was national debate champion at Kilgore Junior College and graduated from the University of Texas Law School. I served in the Navy during World War II, practiced law (much of the time in courtrooms) in Houston, and was secretary of state from 1966 to 1968. I certainly would appreciate your support. It is time for a change.

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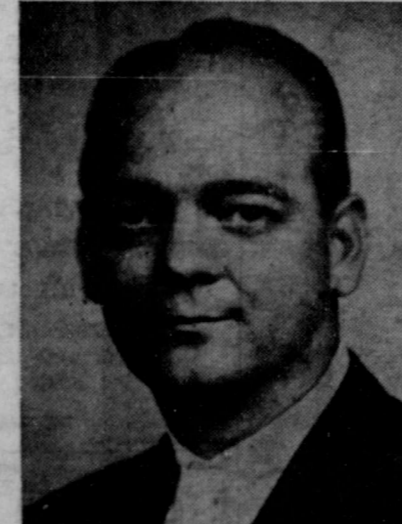
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Byron Tunnell Announces for Railroad Commission

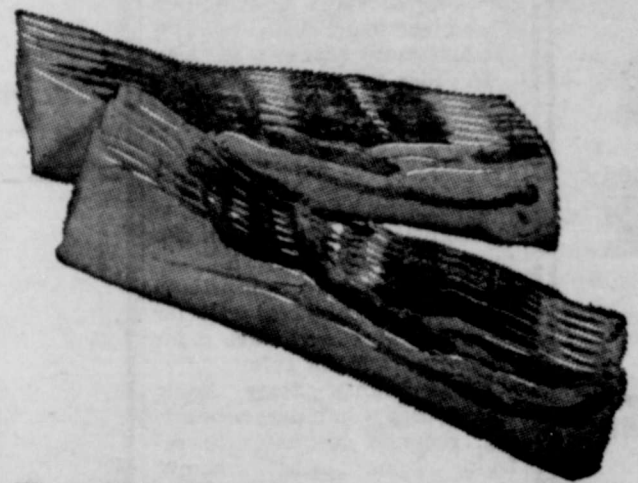
