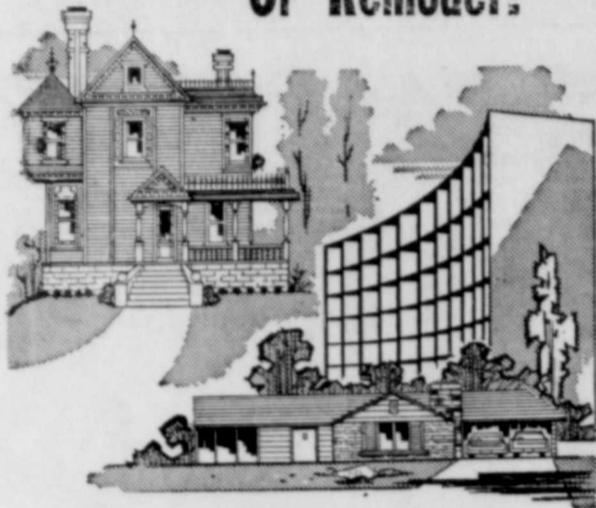

For a good source of Vitamin C and a good idea if you want fruit with few calories, try grapefruit.

The fruit you select will be truly tree-ripened, because grapefruit won't ripen after harvest like pears or bananas.

When shopping, select grapefruit which feels firm yet springy to the touch. If the fruit is heavy for its size, it will usually be thin skinned and juicier than course skinned fruit that is puffy and spongy.

Don't worry about skin blemishes and minor discolorations. They don't affect the fruit's eating quality — only its appearance.

A half of a fresh grapefruit is a boon to the dieter, since it can be served as an appetizer, salad or dessert and contains only about 75 calories. Remember too, that grapefruit offers the most Vitamin C when the pulp is eaten along with the juice.

If you must sweeten your grapefruit, try honey. Remove the center core of the fruit, fill with honey and let it stand for several hours so the flavor will spread throughout the fruit. What a treat for mealtime or snacktime!

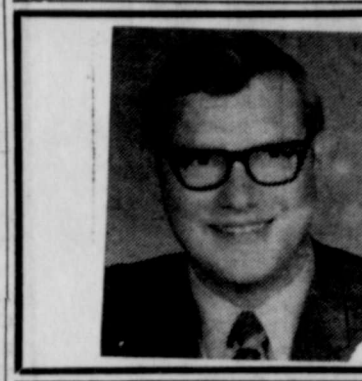

HIGHLIGHTS and SIDELIGHTS FROM THE STATE CAPITAL

An ancient legal dispute involving Texas' sovereignty over its tidelands is in court again.

The U. S. Justice Department has filed a suit against Texas, challenging the state's regulation of fishing within the farthestmost two leagues (six marine miles) of the historic three-league (nine-marine-mile) boundary.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has requested President Nixon to intervene in the latest federal attack.

The Attorney General further requested an opportunity for the state to present its position to the State Department and Justice Department. The state, he noted in a letter to Nixon, was not notified prior to filing of the action.

Martin claimed the new action is contrary to the position taken by the Eisenhower-Nixon administration in 1953 and in 1957.

He submitted to the President excerpts from the state's brief filed in the original boundary suit which was decided in Texas' favor by the U. S. Supreme Court in 1958. He also included a 1957 letter from the late President Dwight D. Eisenhower to then-Gov. Price Daniel. Eisenhower expressed the opinion that Texas should "have the right to explore and exploit the submerged lands extending seaward of (its) coastline for a distance of 3 marine leagues into the Gulf of Mexico."

Martin urged Nixon to inform him if his position as president is the same as that expressed by President Eisenhower.

COURT REVISION URGED

A Supreme Court justice and president of the Texas Civil Judicial Council says it's time the legislature submits to voters a constitutional amendment on judiciary reform.

Associate Justice Tom Reavley said Texans are demanding "major surgery" on the court system. Suggested Reavley:

- The State Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals should be merged into a single court of last resort.

- Fourteen Courts of Civil Appeals should be given jurisdiction over criminal as well as civil cases.

- There should be fewer levels of lower courts with less overlapping jurisdiction.

- Appeal procedure should be "simpler and speedier."

- Judges and cases should be transferred to match resources with needs in keeping with better management of the court systems.

The 63rd Legislature, Reavley said, should be asked next year to submit the constitutional amendment proposing court reorganization and modernization.

SPECIAL TRAINING APPROVED

The State Board of Education approved contracts for special training next school year of 2,611 children in non-public schools.

Largest single group involved is the trainable mentally retarded category with 1,887 youngsters.

Pupils, from pre-school age through high school level, will attend 12 schools operated under the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation and 35 independent non-public schools.

The State Board of Education also reviewed a \$1.1 million research program supported by 90 per cent federal and 10 per cent local funds.

Board members voted to uphold orders of Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar sustaining local school board "haircut rules" and dress codes.

COURTS SPEAK

The Court of Criminal Appeals refused to go along with an argument that the aggravated assault law discriminated against men—and concluded it's still worse for a man to hit a woman than the other way around.

Texas Supreme Court held a county judge can't prevent a township incorporation election if 200 residents present the required petition. The decision upheld an Athens district judge

and the Tyler Court of Civil Appeals.

The High Court sustained lower courts and refused to knock out of operation a Houston legal aid service for the poor in spite of objections to it by some lawyers who claimed it is costing them money.

APPOINTMENTS

James W. (Jack) Ward of Amarillo has been named by Gov. Preston Smith as a member of the Texas Mass Transportation Commission for a six-year term.

Smith also named eight to the Real Estate Research Advisory Committee. They are Joe W. Loper of San Antonio, Glenn W. Justice of Dallas, Mrs. Katherine Boyd of Arlington, Dr. Walstein Smith Jr. of Waco, John A. Worley of Dallas, George O. Yamini of Dallas, Julio S. Laguarda of Houston and R. L. Pardue of Houston.

HEALTH STUDY LAUNCHED

State, local and federal health officials this week began an intensive study to determine if health hazards exist for workers in the American Smelting and Refining Company plant in El Paso.

Air samples will be taken within the plant to discover possible toxic materials, and blood and urine samples will be taken from about 800 employees.

The survey will complement a comprehensive health study to evaluate lead hazards in the plant vicinity which was initiated by local health officials several weeks ago in cooperation with the State Health Department. A.S.R.C. is cooperating in the survey.

PARTIES SLOW

Secretary of State Bob Bullock complained about early response to his request that county political party officers submit early estimates of May primary election expenses.

Bullock said a week after he asked for the estimates only 99 (of 254) counties were represented in replies. He warned again no state funds will be allocated to local parties until estimated expenditures are submitted on prescribed forms.

Some county chairmen explained they were taking their time since the new state primary financing act makes them responsible for inaccuracies in their figures.

JUNE 1 PUPIL TRANSFER DEADLINE

Texas Education Agency has held parents who want to transfer their children from their home school to a nearby district must submit requests by June 1.

Once approved by the receiving school board, the request must also be cleared by T.E.A. State approval is a term of a U.S. District Court order filed in Tyler relating to desegregation of schools. Under the order, transfers are not to be permitted to reduce or impede desegregation or encourage discrimination.

SHORT SNORTS

Texas cities and counties would get about \$202 million this year under a federal revenue sharing bill before a U. S. House committee.

College teachers in a meeting here endorsed the idea of collective bargaining rights for public employees.

Likely date for the next special session of the legislature on appropriations and taxation appears to be the week of June 21.

The State Treasury, declares Treasurer Jesse James, had a greater net return on its time deposit interest "than any billion dollar bank in Texas."

Texas National Guard units have reached the highest rating level in 10 years, according to Adjutant General Ross Ayers.

New state bank charters are being sought at Balch Springs (Dallas County) and Houston.

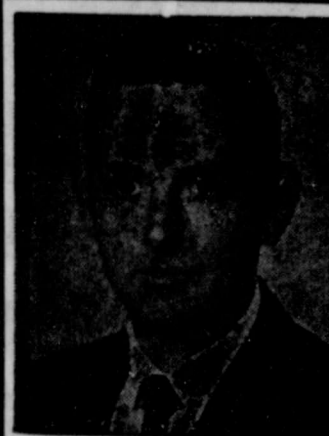

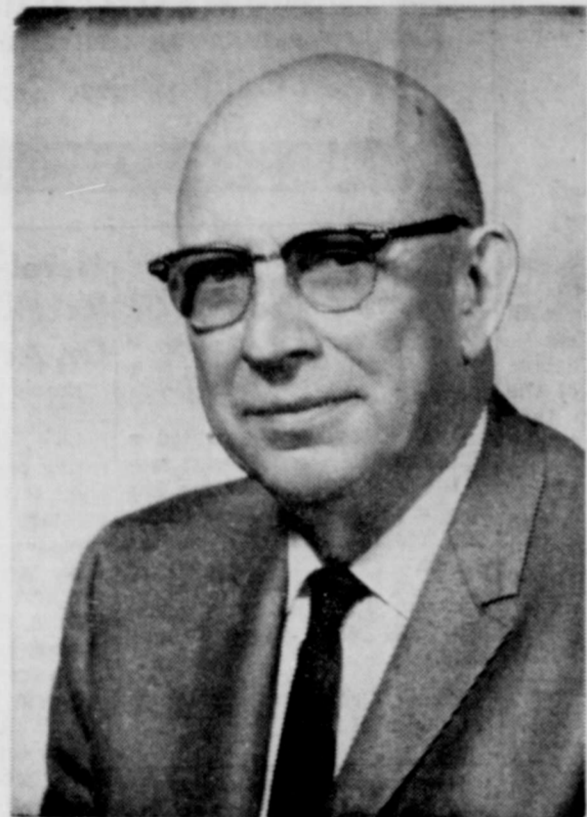

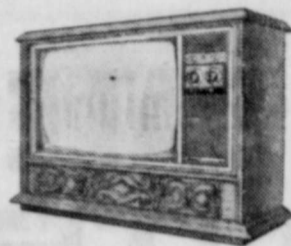

April 30 is a new tax deadline for about 72,000 Texas employers.

Wage reports must be filed by then with Texas Employment Commission for purposes of unemployment taxes during the first quarter of 1972.

Employers have been notified by mail and sent forms and instructions.

Reports must include wages paid and names of employees, along with taxes due. Employers brought under coverage of the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act are mainly those who have one to four employees. New employers receive a tax rate of one per cent, which may scale downward after two years depending on unemployment experience. Some non-profit, charitable and educational organizations are subject only if they have four or more workers.

Cattle grubs are among the most costly pests of the livestock industry. The figure of \$100 - 300 million per year has been put on the total amount lost to the cattle grub. Loss of flesh and reduced milk production, and migration and parasitism of the grubs within the animal's body causes irritation and nutritional losses. Warbles in the back lower carcass values, and breathing holes in the skin reduce the hides leather value. All of these losses concern the producer, feeder, packer, and the consumer.

For effective grub control, treat cattle with systemic insecticides - chemicals absorbed into the animal's body where they control grubs by contact action. Systemics are available as sprays, dips, backline pour-ons and as feed additives or mineral mixtures. Administer treatments in our area between May 1 and July 15.

For beef cattle, the following methods are shown with either being satisfactory depending on the best suited to producer's situation.

Sprays - Co-Ral 25 per cent wettable powder; Ruelene 25E; and Neguvon 80 per cent soluble powder. Animals should be wet thoroughly to the skin.

Dips - Co-Ral 25 per cent wettable powder. Other dips besides this may be available.

Backline Pour-ons - 4 percent Co-Ral; 9.4 percent Ruelene; 8 percent Neguvon.

Mineral Mixes and Feed Additives - Rid-Ezy and Steer-Kleer are fed free choice to range animals for a 75 day period. These materials can also be fed in feed-lot rations at specified rates for 7-14 days. Trolene FM

fed regular ration for 7 days.

For Dairy cattle, not systemic insecticide presently is registered for grub control in producing dairy animals. Rotenone spray or dust can be used to control grubs in the back of dairy animals.

Keep a lookout for screw-worms. The number of cases are increasing by large numbers in the state of Texas. All livestock and pet owners should be on the alert of any worm cases especially after working of livestock and samples taken of any case of worms.

The Texas Highway Department is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed highway improvements on U. S. Highway 84 from North Bennett Creek, west of Center City, east to 0.3 miles east of Mills-Hamilton County Line (a distance of 6.5 miles). The proposed highway project will pass through the towns of Center City and Star.

This project will be developed in cooperation with the Federal Highway Administration and financing of construction will be 50 per cent State and 50 per cent Federal; therefore, FHWA's approval has been requested.

The contemplated location is along the present U. S. Highway 84. The proposed center line is variable from along the present highway center line to twenty-two feet from the present center line. Additional right of way will be required on either one of both sides. The minimum right of way width involving new right of way will be 120 ft., and the maximum will be 260 ft. All of the present right of way is being utilized. The maximum horizontal curvature will be 15°. The proposed road will have two 13 ft. traffic lanes and 9 ft. paved shoulders. The horizontal and vertical alignment will be designed for 70 MPH. Climbing lanes will be provided where necessary. This project will provide a completed highway to the standards and safety features for the expected traffic volume in accordance with current design requirements. Following the existing alignment, it will be necessary to relocate the Masonic Lodge building in Center City. There will be no homes or businesses displaced by this project.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design, environmental studies and all other available data concerning the development of this project may be inspected and copied at the Resident Engineer's Office at Goldthwaite, Texas. "I have been your Assistant District Attorney for the past sixteen months, and I have engaged in all the above. I am a native of Bell County and have resided in Bell County all my life. I am married to the former Scharlet Diane Carter, and we have one small son. I attended Temple High School, where I graduated with honors and went to Baylor where I obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree, and obtained my Teacher's Certificate. I then went to Baylor Law School and graduated in the top ten percent of my class, and then went immediately to work in the District Attorney's Office. WHEN THE TEMPERATURES soared into the middle 90s in mid-April, Sen. Murray Watson took off his coat, wiped the perspiration from his brow and kept on shaking hands. Getting out with the people has been the main reason Watson has been victorious in every political race he's entered.

Their answer probably will be:

"It's time for a change," Watson declares as he takes his campaign for Congress into every section of the District. "I am seeking this important office because I believe it is time for a change. No longer will yesterday's answers solve today's problems. We must have new vision, new ideas, and new solutions if we are to progress in the Seventies, if the 11th Congressional District is to share in the growth and prosperity of this new decade and the decades ahead.

Watson Would Work To Cut High Food Prices

For the past 16 years as a member of the Texas Legislature, I have worked for the protection of the consumers of this state having supported and helped pass a loan shark regulatory act requiring full disclosures in truth and lending.
