'Pinch' On Multi-State Theft Ring Involves Mills County Law Officers

A resident saw a man carry a saddle into a home in Meridian and suspecting that the saddle was stolen, phoned law officers and directly caused the shut down of a Multi-State theft ring. Arrested last Tuesday by Bosque County sheriff was Gene Sloan, 35, of Meridian. He was charged in Bosque County with receiving and concealing stolen property and remains in the Bosque County jail at this time in lieu of \$15,000 bond.

Sloan's alleged theft ring connects to Mills County with the theft of a trailer and three saddles from the C. J. Crawford place located 10 miles west of Goldthwaite on Farm Road 574. The saddle which Sloan allegedly had in his possession was stolen from the Mills County ranch.

Mills County Sheriff H. G. Brooks was called to Meridian and participated in the arrest of Sloan.

Arrested for the theft of the trailer and saddles was Wilfred McMillan, now confined to Mills County jail, and Donald Russell Shaw, both arrested in Weimar. Shaw is in the Burnet County jail at this time.

Law enforcement officers say that to date recovered stolen merchandise includes 15 stock and horse trailers, three diesel

tractors, six small Ford tractors, several vehicles, numerous saddles and guns. These items have been recovered from an area ranging from Pueblo, Colo., to Houston, Texas and total in value well over \$100,000.

The trailer stolen in Mills County belonged to J. C. Brownwell of Denton who recently

purchased the Crawford ranch.

Taking part in the investigation besides the Bosque County Sheriff's Department and Sheriff Brooks were Ranger Bill Gunn of Waco, Ranger Bob Favor of Brady, Cattle Raisers' Association officers Bill Newcome of Waco and Bob Mimms of Brady, the sheriff of Gon-

zales County and Sheriff Miller of Columbus, Texas.

Investigating officers stated that it would be at least two more weeks before the investigation is complete and that more stolen property will be recovered and several more arrests in connection with the thefts are anticipated.

DPS Estimates Traffic Accidents Will Claim 58 Lives Over July 4th

AUSTIN — Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today estimated that traffic accidents would claim 58 lives in Texas during the 102-hour July 4th holiday weekend from 6 p.m. Friday, June 30 to midnight Tuesday, July 4.

The DPS director said that if the holiday is typical, approximately one-third of the fatal accidents will involve only one vehicle.

Traffic law violations will contribute to many of the fatal mishaps with the major factors including speed too fast for conditions and driving while intoxicated.

In an effort to hold the toll down, Speir said the DPS, local law enforcement agencies, and the news media of Texas will cooperate in a special "Operation Motorcide" program. Information on fatal collisions will be tabulated at DPS Headquarters in Austin and released 3 times per day during the holidays in an effort to increase driver awareness.

All available Department of

Public Safety patrolmen will be on duty, placing special emphasis on drinking and reckless drivers. Across the state, many city police departments and also county sheriff's departments will have extra personnel assigned to intensified enforce-

ment efforts.

"I urge all Texans and visitors to put on their best driving manners and actively join in the 'Operation Motorcide' effort so that this July 4th holiday might be as safe as possible," Speir said.

Why Do We Stand When The Flag Goes By?

(Editor's Note: With July 4th upcoming, the following patriotic release is very timely. It was prepared by Reagan Brown, sociologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, after he heard a young boy ask his dad, "Why do we stand when the flag goes by?")

College Station — At Texas A&M University home football games, the Corps of Cadets always marches in to the music of the Aggie Band. At one of these events, recently, I heard a young boy ask his dad, "Why do the people stand up when the flag goes by?" I didn't hear the father's answer, but I began to wonder how I would have answered him.

I think I would have begun by pointing to the live oak trees

around the university drill field planted in memory of Texas A&M University students who gave their lives in World War I. After the game I would have taken him by the Memorial Student Center built in memory of over 900 Aggies, whose names are on a bronze plaque at the entrance. They gave their lives in the World Wars and those since. I would have also pointed out other memorials on the campus, those that remind us of sacrifices in the most recent wars.

Later, when I could have a quiet time with him, I would talk about Concord's Bridge, Shenandoah Valley, Flanders Field, St. Lo, Guadalcanal, Bastogne, Korea, and Viet Nam. I would mention to him my young

Aggie friend, James Ray '63 of Conroe, who has been a prisoner of North Viet Nam for more than five years. And, of course, all the other young men imprisoned over there.

I would then talk of what our flag represents, what kind of country it flies over. I would remind him that America is the land of the refugee, the land of "the huddled masses longing to be free," and a land dedicated to justice, tranquility, and the general welfare of its people.

I would tell him of the average man and woman and the hundreds who have conquered the mountains, prairies, and plains. I would discuss with him how the very lines of the maps have been marked by the blood of hundreds who plowed and

planted and fought and planned, and whose offspring have poured their abundance around the world to lift others. Then I would talk of the slant eyes, black faces, Nordic color, Irish enthusiasm, Italian grace, German laughter, Baptists, Catholics, Methodists, Texans, Yankees, Republicans, Democrats, and a thousand and one other tall, short, fat and thin people who call themselves Americans.

We would discuss the "land of the free," "home of the brave," the opportunity to climb the ladder of success according to ability and desire. Then we would talk of the philosophy of "how you play the game" and about "not who your Mama or Papa is," but what's your "life game plan." I would remind

him how each man can worship God as he pleases, sing, whistle, dance, and cheer as his conscience dictates. Next we would discuss our responsibility to our neighbor, to our environment, to the minority, sick, lame, orphans, and those in their golden years.

Yes, as I thought about how I could answer, as I began to enumerate why we stand when the flag goes by, I caught myself standing there in the quietness of my office. The thoughts caught me up in a reverent respect and I wanted to cry out how much I love the land that has done so much for me. I thought of the nine boys in our company, Company G-272 Infantry, 69th Division, two of them black, who were killed in

World War II. I thought of all the schools, jobs, homes, hospitals, and families that make our country not perfect, but far ahead of any other country in the world.

That is the reason why we stand, my boy. So we can get a good look at the red, white, and blue as it passed by, representing all of those sacrifices, all those hopes, all of those things we want for future Americans. This flag going by gives you the privilege to keep sitting, if you want to. But if you are part of the fabric of those who have made it possible for you to rise up in respect, you by your actions will trigger a standing ovation. So stand tall when the flag goes by, so it can always pass your way again.

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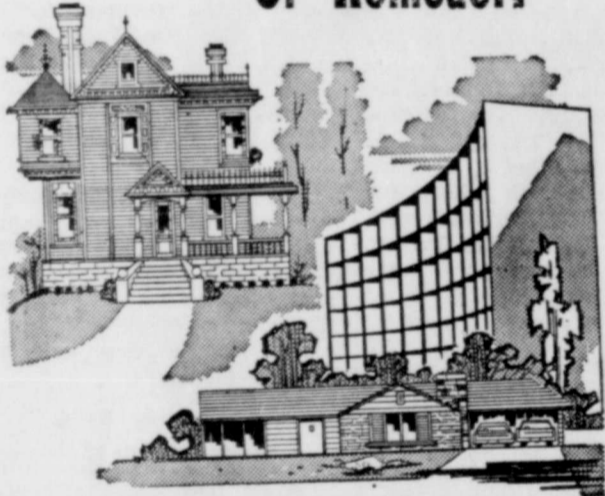
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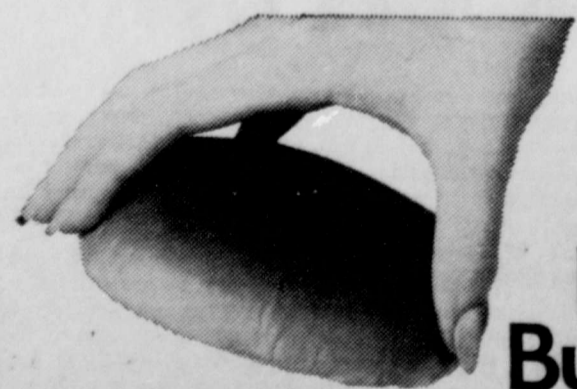

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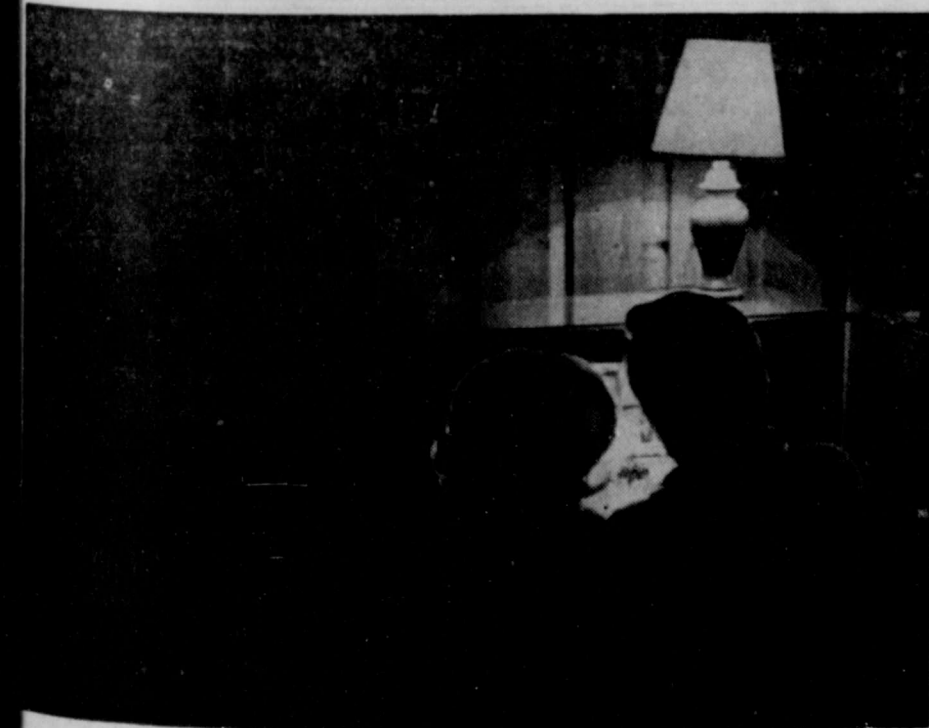

"Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." These seem basic rights. And yet we are a little concerned about modern man's interpretation of that word "happiness." If it could be realized, would it really be the treasure that he is seeking? Is there something better? To this latter question we must answer, Yes, if only for the reason that happiness is a sometime thing,

here today and gone tomorrow. God offers us something far better — a permanent joy that is not affected by the ups and downs of life — a condition called "blessedness."

The beatitudes give us eight steps to the summit of heavenly blessedness on earth. Some people think that the beatitudes merely describe the characteristics of those who have repented of their sins and become followers of Christ. But a Christian must aim at growth and maturity. There is no place, at least in this life, where we can say that we have reached the ultimate of God's standard for us. What the Lord is giving us here is guidance on how to grow to that mark He has set before us, even though we can not fully attain it here. There is blessing in the way, whatever the degree of accomplishment may be.

The farmer reaps what he sows. If he plants one acre of grain, he will reap only as much grain as will grow on one acre of land. Everything has a cause and an effect. If you do not eat, you will be hungry, undernourished, and eventually die. If you are not humble enough to acknowledge your ignorance of certain things, you will never ask questions in order to learn. There is a parallel to this in the Christian life, where we also find a process of cause and effect. The degree of your happiness (or blessedness) is determined by your meeting the conditions laid down by our Lord.

What does all this mean to you? "Blessed" is that person in whose heart God Himself dwells. If God does not indwell you, you will sooner or later experience a sense of emptiness and futility. Looking within yourself you find nothing but disappointment. Looking around you, you will find much to depress you. 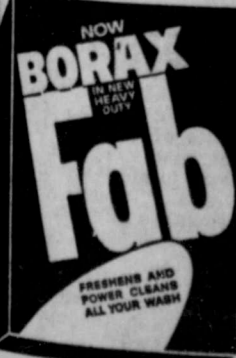

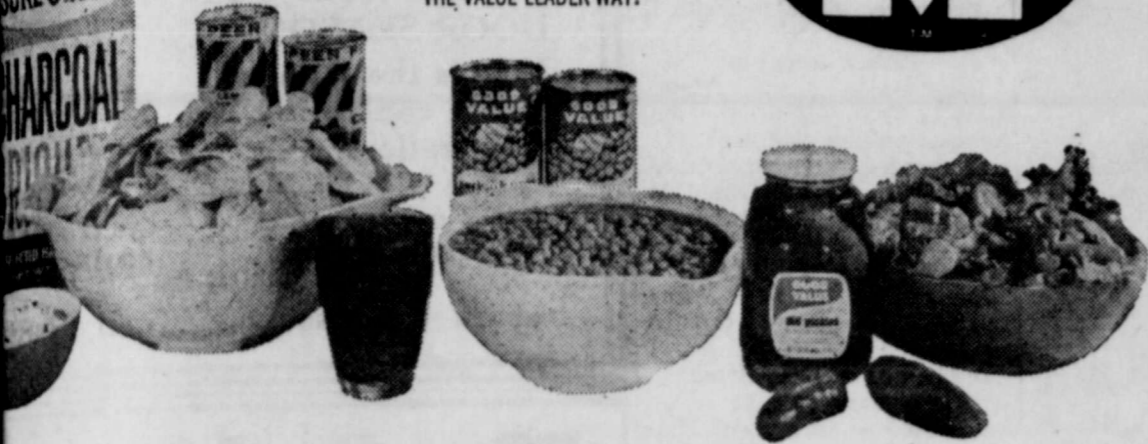
