Gold-Tex AQHA Show Scheduled Monday, July 31

The Gold-Tex A. Q. H. A. show is scheduled for Monday, July 31, it was announced this week by Thurman Head, representing the show directors.

This is an annual affair, sponsored jointly by the American Quarter Horse Association and the local organization. The show was cancelled last year because of the VEE quarantine.

Work got underway Tuesday when plans were announced for this annual event which will be held at the FFA Rodeo Arena north of the Elementary School.

Contact work for trophies to be donated by interested business firms and individuals got underway Tuesday. During the past years since the AQHA approved show has been held here by the Gold-Tex Quarter Horse Association, trophies have been donated for the show. Lone Star Gas Rate Hike Probable; City Council Okays First Reading

The City Council of Goldthwaite approved the first readings of the proposed Lone Star Gas rate height at a special meeting Monday night. The proposition will be reviewed by the council two more times before it can be enacted. The increase will amount to approximately two to three per cent for most city of Goldthwaite natural gas users.

L. J. Ward, local gas representative, Wedge Turner and Melvin Walters were on hand to answer questions from the council about the gas rate increase. The new minimum charge will be \$2.20 for the first one thousand cubic feet of gas consumed. The old rate was \$1.86 for the first 800 feet, so in reality there is only a slight increase. The rate increase passed unanimously.

Wendell Tucker, Goldthwaite home builder, was told to proceed with his plans for a proposed access street in a subdivision located off Fisher Street on the north end of Goldthwaite.

The Council gave him the okay to lay out streets which ever way is acceptable. The city was in receipt of a letter from the Texas Highway Department asking whether the city would enforce Federal Beautification Regulations or whether the

highway department should enforce these regulations. The Council unanimously gave this power to the highway department.

The main part of these new regulations is that no sign shall be erected within 660 feet of the nearest edge of the right-of-way of any major highway. The regulation was one of the holdbacks in a recent State of Texas and Federal government cooperative highway building program.

The city council again did not act on the petition from the city employees asking for retirement program. At the August 7th meeting the council will have a representative from the Texas Municipal League to discuss the question. The program will be a matching funds retirement program with the city employees and the city paying equal shares.

The Council canvassed election returns from the recent sewer bond issue and the one per cent City Sales Tax election. They recognized the passing of both issues. The sewer bond issue carried by a 159-90 vote and the sales tax proposition by a 171-81 margin.

County Wide Youth Rally Planned For Sunday Afternoon, August 20

Representatives from various Mills County Churches met Sunday, July 16 to discuss plans for a county-wide Interdenominational Youth Rally to be held at Lake Merritt Sunday, August 20, at 4 p.m.

It will be termed "One Last Summer Fling" since it will take place the day before most of the county schools begin their fall semester.

Activities include swimming, water skiing, volleyball, a hot dog supper, a talent show and a concluding vesper service.

The intention of the rally is to bring all the Mills County Youths between the ages of junior high and college together for fun and fellowship.

All churches in the county are being contacted and asked to

support this effort to instill Christian Fellowship in our youth.

Elaine Harper of Goldthwaite was selected as chairman of the talent committee with Cindy Johnson, also of Goldthwaite, Lois Mild of Priddy and Danny Crosby of Star serving as "talent scouts."

Youth wishing to contribute to the talent program should contact one of the above members.

Other committee chairmen are: Victor Limmer of Priddy, food coordinator; Billie Ledbetter, recreation; and Blake English, publicity.

Dana Saylor To Head European Beef Program

Darwin E. Stolte, President of the U. S. Feed Grains Council, has announced the initiation of a European-wide beef development program. The program is set up to regulate the costs of meat imports, increase domestic grain utilization, and develop consumer pressures for more and better beef.

Dana H. Saylor of Lubbock has been named to head the beef development program and will begin his assignment in August with headquarters in Rome. After 13 years with Ralston Purina Company and manager of Purina's large-scale commercial feedlot, his career encompasses all aspects of the beef industry.

As a youth, Saylor won several top honors in livestock judging contests as a member of 4-H and FFA Clubs. He attended Tarleton State College, Stephenville, Texas and received his BS Degree in 1957 at Oklahoma State University. In 1959 he received his MS Degree in Meats and Nutrition from the University of Kentucky, where he served as teaching assistant in beef production and livestock judging courses. He was active as a Beef Cattle Specialist for the Kentucky State Extension Service in establishing a beef herd performance testing program.

If you lost your pep and your "get up and go?" you have a faded appetite. Vegetables, packed with vitamins and minerals, can help to...

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quality or condition, don't bruise them. Injuries cause spoilage, so handle carefully.

Consider size. Large sizes are not always of the best quality or the most economical. Again, buy with use in mind.

Also check quality. If waste and low quality offset reduction in price, purchase may prove a bargain.

Nutrition-wise, there is a considerable loss of Vitamin C when vegetables are wilted and limp. But other vitamins and minerals are retained.

Low prices aren't a guide. If prices are low due to an over-abundance, it's possible that quality at these prices does constitute a bargain, but only when quality justifies.

Consider seasonal production. Especially when freshness and economy are wanted for canning and/or freezing.

Cook vegetables quickly and to the tender-crisp stage for best flavor, brightest color and minimum loss of food value. Use a small amount of water, keep utensils covered and don't throw away cooking liquid.

Avoid pre-soaking and stir as little as possible. Serve promptly.

Many pecan trees in our area are badly infested with the yellow aphid which is the cause of the sticky substance called "honeydew". The honeydew is an excretion from these insects while they feed on the leaves of the pecan.

These aphid in sufficient numbers can cause injury to the tree as well as the pecan production. It also creates an ideal medium for development of sooty mold fungus. Chemical for control is Malathion at the rate of 1 tsp. per gallon of water. There is one individual in Goldthwaite who has contacted me stating that he is available for spraying trees, lawns, and etc., if anyone desires the service.

Erysipelas is a bacterial disease of swine that is extremely hard to eliminate. Producers that have had the disease in their herds can either vaccinate or go out of business.

Once a farm is infected, the producer must deal with the disease for years. Germs are released from the infected animal in its excretions. These disease carrying wastes causes a build-up on the farm and other animals become infected through contaminated food and water. The disease can be picked up from contaminated soil.

Symptoms vary with the form of disease. Generally, the pig runs a temperature of 104 degrees or higher and refuses to eat. Joints become swollen and the animal prefers to lie down. Spotting, usually light to dark purple, appears and disappears on the skin. Sometimes sloughing of the skin occurs. Gangrene can set into the tips of the ears and tail, causing them to fall off. Death may occur in acute cases before there are any real symptoms.

The vaccination program should consist of vaccinating

the breeding herd every six months, preferably 30 days before farrowing. Pigs nursing on vaccinated sows will be immune for their first six weeks. At six to eight weeks of age, they should be vaccinated to provide immunity through marketing age.

The pecan weevil is a late season pest to Texas pecan. The kernels are eaten out by larvae. The adult, a brownish weevil about three-eighths inch long, appears in August and chews a hole in the shell and deposits her eggs. The eggs hatch into a creamy white grubs with reddish brown heads and feed inside nuts attaining a length of about three-fifths inch.

Frequently, certain trees in the same bottom are more heavily infected than others, apparently because of differences in adult preference. Begin jarring trees the first week in August to determine when to apply insecticide. Place a large sheet under a tree and jar the limbs with a padded pole. Weevils will drop to the ground where they can be counted. When three or more weevils are jarred from random samples of trees, insecticide application should begin. Insecticide recommended for pecan weevil is Sevin, at rate of 3-lb. of 80 per cent wettable powder per 100 gallons water.

Horses should be vaccinated for Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE) diseases. A small outbreak in Mexico has prompted many officials to become alarmed of another outbreak in Texas. Horses should be vaccinated yearly by a veterinarian.

Keep on the alert for screw-worms. Mills County total for 1972 now stands at 20 cases. We need your help. Send in all samples of worms. Vials for samples are available from my office, Ronnie Davis, Animal Health Inspector, and other places.

An elated angler bass off his line and at his catch.

Since when did bass men chuck back their finds ugly black or yellow in his prize bass would think twice about wormy fish to his shame.

But there is no cause for alarm.

The worms are encysted in the dorsal fin area near the skin and easily removed with a knife.

According to Texas Wildlife Fisheries experts parasites in both fresh water fish are harmless.

Freshwater fish are infected with black and grubs.

Both parasites have a complicated life cycle with three hosts: fish, water and snails.

Fortunately, man is not host to these worms and is not harmed by eating fish as long as they are well cooked.

Some of the coastal marine sportfishes, speck and redfish, are also subject to parasitic worms which are only in fish.

These worms are not harmful to humans and detract from the quality of fish except for its looks.

Many other parasites common to our nation's waters are practically every fish at one time or another.



WHO'S GOING TO HELL?

Members of the church of Christ often hear, "Oh, you're the church that thinks everyone else is going to hell." This statement is false for no human being can say who will be lost and who will be saved. But all of us often wonder, "who is going to hell?" The Bible does not give names, but it does tell us what kind of people are going to be lost. Here is a list of those people:

July 25-31 Proclaimed Farm And Ranch Safety Week In Mills County

County Judge Cecil Egger proclaimed July 25-31, 1972 as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Mills County, at the request of DeWayne McCasland, Mills County Farm Bureau president. In his proclamation, Judge Cecil Egger said "experience has shown that caution, common sense, skill and protective equipment can counter many hazards and keep accidents and injuries

to a minimum. Emphasizing the importance of protective equipment, Farm Bureau President McCasland said "the agricultural worker may have need for more types of personal protective equipment than the average construction worker." Farming is an occupation that involves a number of diversified jobs ranging from construction to machinery repair, and the types of protective equipment a farm worker might need run from such commonly used items as work gloves to considerably more complex respiratory equipment.

The county farm leader said the accidental death rate for farm and ranch residents in Texas averaged over 250 per year during the decade of the sixties. Reviewing the 1971 Texas Accidental Deaths in Rural Areas Report - which shows a total of 203 deaths, President McCasland pointed out that the breakdown is as follows: fire, explosion and burns - 35; drownings - 29; firearms - 28; machinery - 26; tractors - 22; falls - 22; animals - 17; electric current - 9; suffocation and asphyxiation - 9; poisoning - 4; hanging - 1; and lightning - 1.

"If this 'Unwelcome Harvest' of accidental deaths in rural Texas is to be reversed and the needless suffering and losses substantially reduced, each of us must become more safety conscious, not only during Farm SAFETY Week, but every day of the year," McCasland concluded.

News From Social Security Office

Social security beneficiaries need not apply for the 20 percent benefit increase signed into law by President Nixon on July 1. Glen McNatt, social security manager in Brownwood, said today that all social security beneficiaries who are on the benefit rolls in September will receive the increase automatically. The increase is effective with payments to be made October 3 for the month of September.

The average monthly benefit for the retired worker goes up from \$134 to \$162; for a retired couple from \$224 to about \$271. A widowed mother with two children will receive an average social security benefit of about \$386, up from \$322. For a disabled worker with a wife and one or more children, the new average monthly payment will be about \$354, increased from \$295. The special monthly payments made to certain people age 72 and over who are not insured for regular social security benefits will also be increased by 20 per cent, from \$48.30 to \$58.00 for an individual, and from \$72.50 to \$87.00 for a couple.

The new law also provides for automatic annual increases in benefits as the cost of living rises in the future — a recommendation made by President Nixon in his 1969 message on social security. Under the new law, the maximum amount of annual earnings that are counted for benefit and tax purposes will rise from the present \$9,000 a year to \$10,800 in 1973 and to \$12,000 in 1974. Thereafter, this amount would be adjusted automatically to keep pace with rising wages. This means that as earnings rise, workers whose earnings are at or above the level of the maximum earnings base will pay social security taxes on higher earnings, but they also will have those additional earnings counted in figuring the benefits that will be payable to them and their families in the future.
