## Goldthwaite Schools Registration August 17-18; Teacher Corps Listed

Registration of students in Goldthwaite High School will be Thursday and Friday, August 17 and 18. Junior High and Elementary students will report to school Monday, August 21, for the first day of school.

All new students between grades seven and twelve should report to the office of Hoyett

Browning, Principal, Tuesday, August 15, in order to pre-register.

New students for grades one through six are to report to the Elementary Principal, T. J. Williams, for registration on August 15 also.

Regular students will register in the following order: August

17, 9:00 to 11:00 seniors and 1:00 to 3:00 juniors; August 18, 9:00 to 11:00, sophomores and 1:00 to 3:00, freshmen.

To be classified as a senior a student must have thirteen credits. A junior must have nine credits and a sophomore has to have four credits.

The teachers now assigned could be changed when school starts depending on the number of students in each grade.

Coach Danny Spradley and Band Director, Richard Haddock will teach in the elementary school except for the two classes that they will teach in high school. The band director will handle the elementary music and physical education in the lower grades.

A smaller number of seventh grade students has occurred this year and only one class is planned at the present, but this will change if too many register.

The Goldthwaite school system will have twenty-one teachers plus one teacher of Title I, two vocational teachers and a superintendent. The state will pay for seventeen teachers, one Title I, vocational teachers and the superintendent. The local district must pay part of the other four teachers. The plan is to try to use the same number of teachers as last year. This will also be changed if needed.

Superintendent Gilbert Davis said, "We do sincerely hope to have the best school year ever this year. Let us all work for that goal. If we all do what we can, we will have a good year. The students deserve the best that we can give them."

## Park Maintenance Fund Drive Needs Extra Boost To Reach Minimum Goal

Twenty-eight more boosters have added \$288 to the Mills County Park Maintenance Fund Drive. As of Wednesday noon, sixty-six persons and business firms had contributed a total of \$988 to the drive.

W. P. Duren, chairman of the park committee, announced Tuesday that \$212 more will be needed to reach the minimum goal of \$1,200 to insure a park caretaker for the year.

For the past several years the committee has been conducting

the volunteer contribution drive to provide money for the park upkeep.

When the plan was first adopted, it called for enlisting 100 persons to give \$12.00 or more to the park maintenance fund each year to take care of the job. This amounts to only \$1.00 per month for each contributor.

A number have given more than the suggested \$12 during the past several years which has been a big help to the committee in reaching the goal without personal solicitation.

"Some who have been boosters of the fund in the past have overlooked getting their checks in so far this year," Duren said when commenting on the need for additional contributions.

## Thirty Children Complete Summer Head Start Program Friday, July 28

The summer head start program which is sponsored by the Hill Country Community Action Program and the Goldthwaite Independent School System ended Friday, July 28, with thirty children completing the course.

Thursday the children presented a short program for parents and friends. Fifty-six interested persons were present for the program and had lunch with the children afterwards.

Director-teacher for the head start program was Mrs. Veona House. Mrs. Christina Campbell was teacher for the older group of children. Teacher aides were Mrs. Shirley Cox of Star and Mrs. Lena V. Poindexter of Goldthwaite. Others working on the program were Mrs. Minnie Beard, cook; Mrs. Ruth Coats, nurse; and NYC workers, Rosa Saplen, Mary Lou Flores and Sherry Wisdom.

During the course of the program the children were given medical and dental examinations, urine tests and TB tests. Also, thirteen DPT shots, eight measles, sixteen oral polio and ten rubella vaccines were administered. During the eight week program vision and hearing tests were given to the children by the head start nurse. The children were taught how to accept help and direction from adults, how to play with other children, besides prepar-

ing the children for being away from home when they start to school.

During the course of this program 1271 meals were served, volunteer workers contributed 659 hours to the program and paid workers' time amounted to 2180 hours.

Mrs. House feels that the program was very successful.

## New Guidelines Set For Free Or Reduced Lunches

The State of Texas has sent out new guidelines for schools to follow for free or reduced price of the school lunches.

The Goldthwaite Independent School District will give each student the first day of school a guideline and an application blank for application of free or reduced lunches.

If a family meets the income requirements, they should apply for the lunches. Everyone will be notified if they are accepted. The application must have a list of the number of people in the family, family income and a few other questions besides the signed application. They must be kept on file for adult purposes at the office of the Superintendent.

The school hopes to keep the lunches at 30c for elementary school grades and 35c for junior and high school.

A balanced meal will be served each day. The meals must meet prescribed standards.

Superintendent Davis invites all parents to come by and eat in the schools cafeterias anytime. He hopes the school will have the best lunches possible and asks that parents come and talk about anything that they feel would make it better.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER 13 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 82)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 65 to read as follows: "Section 65. Wherever the Constitution authorizes an agency, instrumentality, or subdivision of the State to issue bonds and specifies the maximum rate of interest which may be paid on such bonds issued pursuant to such constitutional authority, such bonds may bear interest at a rate not to exceed a weighted average annual interest rate of 7%. All Constitutional provisions specifically setting rates in conflict with this provision are hereby repealed. This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "To set a six percent (6%) weighted average annual interest rate for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority presently having a specified interest ceiling."

Many factors are involved in the profit-loss margin of cow-calf operations: supply-demand, rainfall, and many others. However, the most limiting factor falls on the producer in the form of management. Profitable production from beef breeding herds can be obtained only if the animals are free of diseases or insects so they might perform at their inherited ability. Nutritional deficiencies are the primary causes of 75 percent

of all Texas cattle losses. Failure to receive sufficient energy causes excessive weight losses, failure to cycle and conceive. Protein shortages reduce feed intake, lower the animal's resistance to infections, slow repair of damaged tissue and impair transporting of vitamins A from point of storage to point of need. Mineral inadequacies or improper balances may result in reduced growth rate, lowered reproduction rate as well as specific problems such as grass tetany. Disease involving reproduction such as Brucellosis takes a large toll each year without many producers knowledge. Internal parasites are due to two causes: Maintenance of animals or protein-deficient diets and overstocking on pastures. Control of extended parasites is necessary to maintain healthy, productive beef cattle.

The above mentioned are just a few of the factors affecting a cow-calf operation and most depended on management. Record keeping plays a vital part in production efficiency. For example, many producers never keep records on costs involved in their operation. The following are general estimates of cost per cow for one year and actual costs for individuals must come from actual records. The estimated cost to run one cow per year is \$93. Put your own figures in on all costs such as feed, vet, interest, and many others and the amount of your own will surprise you. This figure can help you determine your cost per 100 pounds of weaned calf. This requires two simple formulas: (a) Average weaning weights times percent calf crop weaned equals pounds of weaned calf per cow. (b) Cost per cow divided by pounds of weaned calf per cow equals your cost per 100 pounds of weaned calf.

Release me from the cravings to straghten out every ones affairs. keep me from the recital of endless detail. Give me wings to get to the point. Seal my lips when I am inclined to tell of my aches and pains. They are increasing with the years and my love to speak of them grows sweeter as time goes by. Teach me that glorious lesson that occasionally I may be wrong. Make me thoughtful but not nosey, helpful but not bossy. With my vast store of wisdom and experience it does seem such a pity not to use it at all, but thou knowest, Lord, that I want a few friends at the end.

### E&H Savings Bonds Purchased In June

During June there were new purchases of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$1,877 according to Mills County Chairman W. P. Duren. Sales for the first six months totaled \$32,154 or 53 per cent of the 1972 goal.

Texas sales during the year were \$16,451,782 compared with \$15,781,727 during June. This is a rise of 4.2 per cent over the year-to-date sales totaling \$525 for 53 per cent of goal of \$202.3 million.

New purchases of E and H Savings Bonds over the year during June amounted to \$523 million, 43 above sales during the year. Sales for the months were \$3,247 million per cent above 1971 total amounting to \$170 million reported for the first six months of 1972, 34 per cent of \$172.3 million exchange year.

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pecan Growers Association, Drawer CC, College Station, Texas 77840, proposes a referendum election on October 23, 1972, under the provisions of House Bill 764, 61st Legislature and House Bill 525, 62nd Legislature on the proposition of whether or not pecan producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 50 cents per 100 pounds to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members for a 12 man pecan producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pecans.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Drawer CC, College Station, Texas 77840, before midnight on the date of election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business or producing, or causing to be produced pecans for commercial purposes in the amounts of 300 pounds or more total over the last three years is eligible to vote, including owner of farms and their tenants and shareholders, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed pecan producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot may obtain one at his local County Agent's office.

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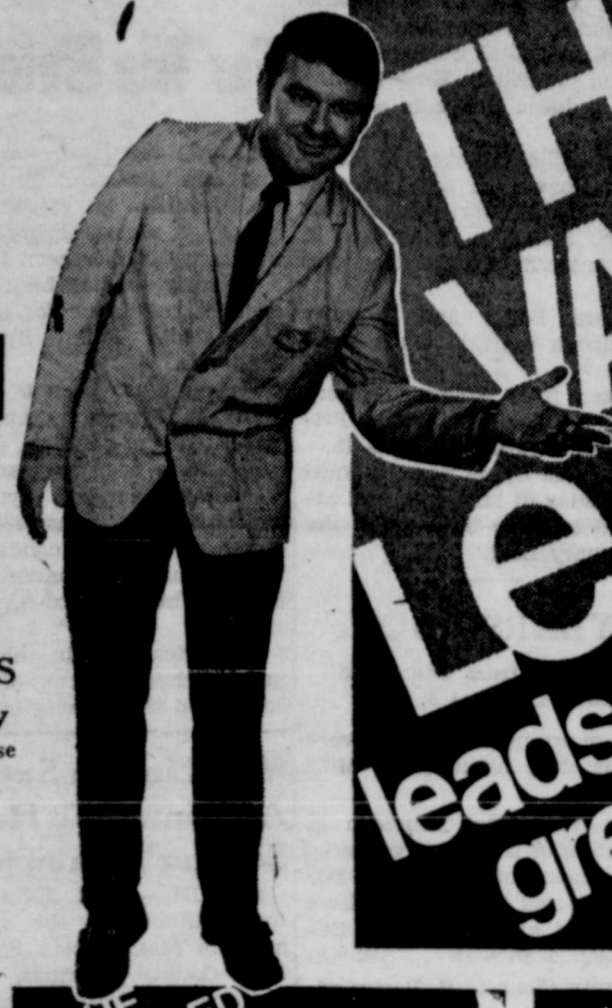

of over \$38 billion in the current fiscal year, the deficit may be in the neighborhood of \$30 billion. The combination of people keeping too much withholding income tax payments and a little lower than expected federal spending explains the difference. Before we cheer the good news of a smaller government deficit as a sign of returning sanity in the federal government, the record should be looked at more closely. The fact that the deficit could be a mere \$30 billion provides little indication that federal spending has been brought under control.

In the past 10 years, U. S. gross national income has increased 100 percent, but federal spending has gone up 120 percent. The heaviest drain on tax money has been health, education and welfare. These outlays have gone from \$23.7 billion to \$82.2 billion, an advance of 250 percent. Just in the past two years these costs have jumped a massive 44 percent. Neither Congress nor the latest crop of Presidential candidates has shown any concern over this trend. Most candidates merely propose to tax the rich and spend more.

As one publication notes, "No leading politician has the courage to tell the electorate that rich and poor alike and everyone in between are going to face tremendous federal tax increases if they continue to expect hand-outs on the present

Jernigan has been a pianist with the Symphony and has presented pre-concert lectures which have been successful.

He has organized symphony orchestras in Texas and has served as assistant conductor of the Richardson Symphony and of the University of Texas orchestra.

While teaching in the Dallas public school system, Jernigan conducted the all-city orchestra

for seven years and was named as the most outstanding conductor of the year by the Teachers Association of Dallas Jaycees.

In 1961, he completed in orchestral management sponsored by the American Symphony Orchestra League, studied extensively in Santa Barbara, California, Austria and Hancock, Michigan.

Jernigan is currently working toward a doctorate at the University of Texas.

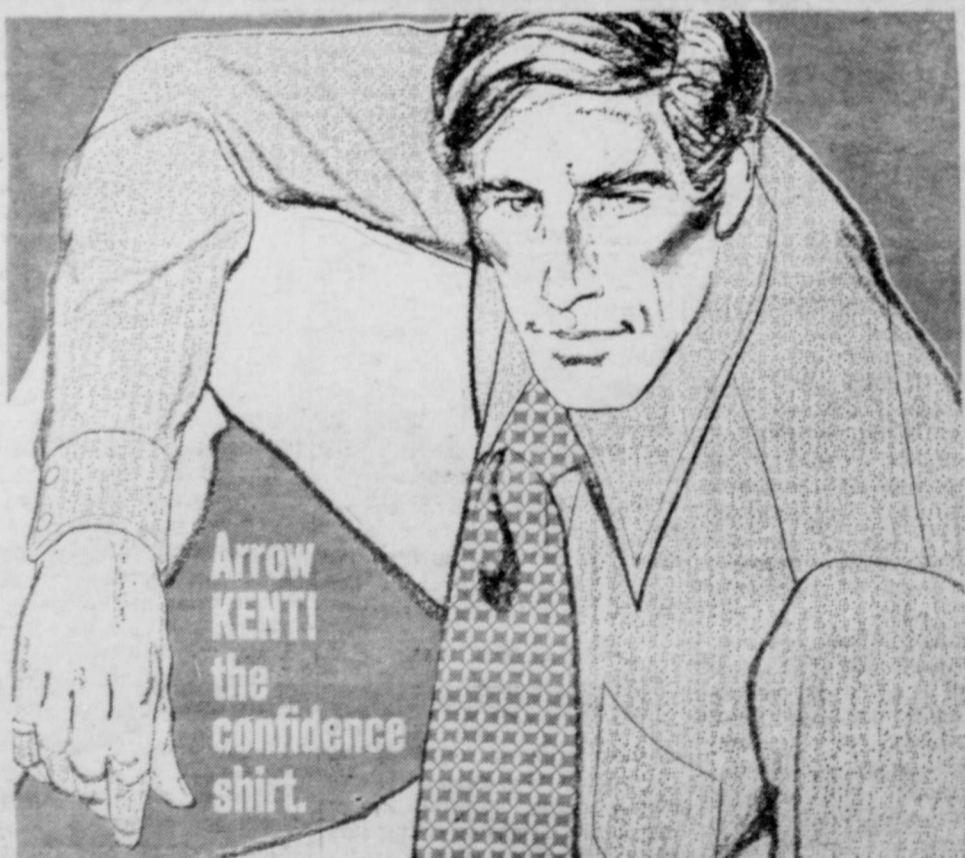
